The official title of the KENNLCKS KENNL is. Student owned and operated semisweekly publication of the University of Kentucky." The term, "student controlled," might be added to the title for it is the object of the KENNLC or reflect the opinions and decisions of the student body both in its various sections and as a vibule.

However well or poorly the KENNL may collect news and print the campus scene, the paper cannot be a truly democratic effort, cannot be totally or lairly representative of campus thought and life unless the student body does its share in offering suggestions, constructive criticism and opinions on the sucress of

campus thought and life unless the student body does its share in offering suggestions, construc-tive criticism, and opinions on the success or failure of Kernet, campaigns and efforts. Thus, to be actually student controlled the Kernet, constantly must be guided by the criti-cism of students. This criticism cannot be gained by reporters or editors in their daily work. To be effective, it must be spontaneous, a result of interest and enthusiasm on the part of the reader.
