More doctors leave Med Center

The UK Chandler Medical Center has had 14 surgeons resign during the past year, according to medical center officials.

Two additional surgeons have pending resignations. In response, UK is forming a committee to review the department of surgery and its leadership.

Dr. Robert Salley, associate professor of cardio-thoracic surgery, became the latest doctor to put in his resignation two days ago.

Dr. James Holsinger, medical center chancellor, said officials are still talking with Salley.

"Twe not heard at this time positively whether Dr. Salley is going to leave," Holsinger said.

Salley has declined comment.

Salley's resignation follows that of Dr. Michael Sekela, director of UK's heart-lung transplant unit, 13 days ago.

Sekela said transplant patients in his department

are not given sufficient care following their operation.

He said that the hospital needs to hire additional qualified people to care for post-transplant patients and that he has been trying to bring these changes about for three years.

"(The hospital) offers people transplant surgery but do not provide adequate care afterward," Sekela said. "It's not the proper thing to do."

Sekela said patients need to have an assigned post-transplant physician. He said he has asked UK to hire at least two additional cardiologists and lung specialsts.

The success of UK's transplant program has increased the number of transplants performed by the hospital and, therefore, the number of patients that need to be followed up on, Holsinger said.

"(Sekela) was working an inordinate amount of time," Holsinger said.

NATION Hubbell admits moving Clinton's files

WASHINGTON — Former Associate Attorney General Webster Hubbell revealed yesterday that he removed a large number of Hillary Rodham Clinton's files from their Little Rodham firer the 1992 presidential election.

In his third appearance before the Senate Whitewater Committee, Hubbell said he also removed from the firm another file — which he had kept in his office drawer — regarding a bank owned by the Clintons' Whitewater investment partner.

Hubbell said he moved all of the material to a Little Rock warehouse early in 1993 — insisting to skeptical Republicans on the Whitewater Committee that he "maintained the integrity" of all documents in his possession. The files eventually were turned over to Whitewater prosecutors.

Did Hubbell "vacuum" the files' inquired Michael Chertoff, the committee's Republicant staff lawyer who is a former prosecutor.

"I don't appreciate that, Mike," replied Hubbell. At another point, Hubbell said, "Vacuum to me means disappear, and they're all still here. Hubbell has pleaded guilty to two felonies in Whitewater and is serving a prison term.

Hubbell testified that the file in his office drawer related to the Bank of Kingston, a financial institution owned by James McDougal, the Clintons of Whitewater partner. McDougal also owned Madison Guaranty, the Arkansas savings and loan at the center of the Whitewater investigation.

Senate votes to overhaul farm system

Senate votes to overhaul farm system WASHINGTON — The Senate voted yesterday to break the decades-old link between farm prices and government subsidies, giving farmers sinstead a series of fixed but declining payments. The action could lead to the eventual end of farm payments.

The 64-32 vote came despite a last-ditch fight mostly by Midwestern Democrats who wanted to save at least some connection between prices and payments. Twenty Democrats joined the majority. Opponents charged that Republicans were offering welfare to farmers while cutting money for education, school lunches and health care for the poor. In exchange for less government support, controls over most planting decisions would end, along with requirements that acres be idled. Freed from those controls, backers say, farmers will prosper, planting every free acre and shipping grain the world over to feed.

Ron Brown's activities.



Bill would limit UK's system

At least one Kentucky legisla-tor thinks the state's community college system should cut its ties to UK.

to UK Rep. Freed Curd (D-Murray), chairman of the House Education Committee, has been working on a bill that would separate the Community Colleges System from UK and merge them with the Kentucky Tech vocational system.

the Kentucky Tech vocational system. He sent his proposal to the Legislative Research Commission early this week to draft the bill's formal language. Curd said yesterday that the bill should be in committee sometime next week. He said the main advantage of this proposal would be the local control of the colleges and tech schools.

But UK officials think the bill is a bad idea and are questioning its purpose.

The proposal would create two types of boards, local boards at each of the schools in the system and a "superboard," which would serve as the chief coordinating and decision-making body for all the schools.

At the local level, the board would include two community college members, two vocational school members, two labor leaders, two business leaders and two industry leaders. This group would help determine the needs of the local community.

The "superboard" would include governor appointees and would finalize budgets, handle certification and make other decisions that would affect the system as a whole.

Curd said UK pockets much of the community college funding the plan, the money would go to the schools and the state.

He added that UK does not treat the community colleges and their surrounding communities fairly.

"UK tells them they are just an advisory board," Curd said.

Students can prepare for England tour

This summer the Gatton College of Business and Economics will include England on its European tour. UK students will have the opportunity to earn four credits while studying in Lancaster, England.

For nearly 10 years students have traveled to Austria to Study during the summer, but this is the first time that the College of Business will put on the program in England.

"We have had the Austria program for sometime," said professor Keith Johnson, organizer of the Lancaster program. "We're trying to get the England one established with the University of Lancaster."

The Lancaster program lasts from July 8 to July 27, and because the programs in Vienna, Austria is from Aug. 1 to Aug. 2, some students can take part in both programs. The programs are similar because students register for one of the three-credit hour electives and a required one-credit course that looks at the history and cultural of the host city and country.

The Austria program attracts mostly seniors and gradu-

The Austria program attracts mostly seniors and graduates, while the Lancaster program is geared toward sophomores and juniors and seniors who are working toward a major or minor in business.

"England has an advantage also in that you don't have a language problem," Johnson said, "and so you don't have to be capable of speaking German (spoken in Austria) to sur-

wive in the cities."

The \$1,250 cost covers housing in the student dormitory and trips to Scotland and excursions throughout England, including two visits to London.

Johnson said most trips will take place on the weekend. But students will get a chance to visit London's financial district one day during the week as a kind of class fieldtrip.

Lancaster has a population of about \$50,000. It is located on the coast, in what is called "The Lake County" and is roughly equidistant between Scotland and England.

England's influence on the United States is what led him to choose England as the country for the study abroad program, Johnson said.

"England has a tremendous impact on the history of this world and in particular on the history of (the United States)," Johnson said. "It's difficult to get an appreciation for history in this country because we're pretty young. We don't have any buildings that are \$500 years old — they don't exist."

He said students will benefit greatly from the Lancaster

He said students will beneft greatly from the Lancaster program.

"They can probably expect to develop a lot of camaraderie (with other students)," Johnson said. "You'll be with those people in class in the mornings, you'll be touring with them in the afternoons, and having a good time socializing."

Johnson added that students will develop a tremendous sense of history and time perspective, as well as a general respect for "older things."



Boy's death raises legal question

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — The air was cool and the ground wet, so 14-year-old Ryan Sayles wore a jacket May 17 as he stepped off a school bus in front of his Kansas City home.

Halfway across Missouri, the Statehouse was quiet, the legislative session over.

But a little-noticed law passed just a few days earlier would soon come into play in the tragic sequence of events that followed.

As Ryan got off the bus, the drawstring of his jacket good of the second of th

fell to his death under the big wheels after keeping up with the bus for half a block.

What the Legislature did before it adjourned would ensure that the bus driver would escape serious penalties for careless and imprudent driving.

"We screwed up," said Rep, Gary Witt. "Occasionally, we make a mistake."

Witt has since helped the state House pass an amendment to restore the higher penalties. The Senate has not acted, but Gov. Mel Carnahan considers the change a high priority, his spokesman said Wednesday.

The intent of last year's law was to lower the criminal status of speeding to avoid costly, time-consuming jury trials.

But the legislation failed to specify the targeted subsection of the law, and as a result also reduced careless and imprudent driving from a misdemeanor to an infraction.

House tightens penalties for domestic violence

FRANKFORT, Ky. — The Kentucky House stepped up the fight against domestic violence by passing toughening penalties.

Rep. Michael Bowling, the bill's sponsor, said it would put Kentucky at the forefront in punishing people who abuse their spouses and companions.

"It helps protect the women and children of this stare," Bowling, D-Middlesbron, said yesterday. "Essentially, this bill makes Kennucky the No. 1 state in America on domestic violence." The bill, one of several proposed by a task force, sailed through the House 90-0 with little discussion. It now heads to the Senate. Bowling said the vote signaled the House's resolve to crack

down on domestic violence.

A key feature would make it a felony punishable by a prison sentence of 1 to 5 years for a third conviction of a domestic violence-related assault. The first two offenses would remain misdemeanors, Bowling said.

Bowling said that provision responds to one of the biggest problems in trying to curb domestic violence.





Clinton attempting to ease tensions

WASHINGTON — Trying to ease tensions, President Clinton said yesterday a military confrontation between China and Taiwan is unlikely. He urged their political leaders to "find a way to work this out."

Asked what would happen if the island were attacked by China, the president told reporters, "I don't believe that will happen."

Defense Secretary William Perry has said he is concerned but not alarmed that China is using "military maneuvering" to try to influence Taiwan's demo-cratic presidential election March 23.

In appearances before a Senate panel, administration officials said yesterday they believe the Chinese threats are mostly posturing but warned Beijing that any attack would have "very grave consequence."





LoS ANGELES — O.J. Simpson is putting his slain ex-wife on trial in the civil case against him, opening the bedroom door on violent battles and depicting her as a drug and alcohol sbaser.

How this will play with a jury remains in doubt.

"This is an extremely risky thing for Simpson to do at the trial itself unless it can be backed up. Trashing the LAPD in a criminal trial to riske a recomble doubt clearly worked, "UCLA law professor Peter Arnenlla said.

Trashing the victim of a brutal murder — and one's former wife — in a civil case, which will hinge on Simpson's credibility, is a highwire act.

He repeatedly refused to admit domestic abuse — except in one 1989 incident. That tag doesn't cover the times he roared cruses at Ms. Simpson, kicked her door in or battled with her in front of friends at a Christmas party, he suggested.

"She's hit me on numerous occasions," Simpson said.

are very clear. He was very typical of having been a batterer and a stalker. But batterers want to say, "I don't have a problem." Sexual attraction and two children kept the couple trying to salvage their relationship, Simpson said.

Just a month before Ms. Simpson was murdered, Simpson said he told her he wanted to end their relationship forever.

Asked what he said, Simpson replied: 'I don't know. We talked. We ended up getting very affectionate, and we teased that this is what we should do to split up all the time. Because you know, it was kinda hot. So it was fun, you know."

Many protesting legislation to censor Internet

SAN FRANCISCO — Portions of the Internet will go into "virtual mourning" today to protest legislation outlawing sexoriented material on line.

Opponents of the Telecommunications Act said they will change the background color of their World Wide Web pages to black with white or gray text as soon as President Clinton signs it into law.

Normally, text on the World

Normally, text on the World Wide Web is dark-colored on a

light-colored background.

Web pages will remain in this virtual state of mourning for 48 hours to protest a provision that would outlaw electronic transmission of indecent and other sexually explicit materials to minors, said Shabbir Safdar, head of Voters Telecommunications Watch, a coordinator of the protest.

On another front, the American Givil Liberties Union and 19 other groups said they would file a court challenge to the indecency provision on the grounds that it is overly broad and a violation of the First Amendment.

At issue is whether the Internet can be regulated like radio and TV. Supporters of the indecency provision, led by the Christian Coulition, say it legally regulates speech to shield children from

upheld such restrictions and radio.

But free-speech advocates argue that the Internet is not a broadcast medium because users not only pay fees to access it, but also must actively search out sites. They say reasonable adults can decide for themselves what they — and their children — choose to

Lori Fena, director of the San Francisco-based Electronic Frontier Foundation, said on-line users are already concerned about the law's ramifications.

"We've been getting hundreds of messages from individuals who are concerned about their liability. People who are not doing anything that could be objectionable are censoring themselves out of fear," Fena said.





Artists look at societal ills for their inspiration

His paintings of a dejected Superman and a pop art cow are lacquered with bold strokes and an abundance of personality.

Art critics have attempted to categorize his work into contemporary art pigeonholes, but Foulkes explores a wide variety of subject matter to explore what he says is the "underbelly" of the

American psyche.
Foulkes often relies on photography as a jumping-off point for his art.

Familiar cartoon images of Walt Disney and Mickey Mouse, politics and advertising help mold the symbolic facet of his work. In contrast to cute mice and smiling faces, Foulkes comments satirically on the darker side of life with cutting, black humor.

Foulkes' work, whether dark Foulkes' work, whether dark or cutting and cute, always possesses à strong narrative that leaves lasting staying power of primary-colored images and lasting social commentary.

The Contemporary Arts Center in Cincinnati will hold 40 of Foulke's work titled, "Between a Rock and a Hard Place," through March 31.

Also scheduled at the Arts Center are the works of Judith Schaechter, titled: "Modern Martyrs in Stained Glass."

Schaechter borrows the familiar images of church stained glass windows.

Schaechter's works don't illu-minate and celebrate Christian tales, but offer a window into the dirty soul of contemporary soci-

dirty soul of contemporary society.

Her works attempt to shed light on cultural tragedy, unfortunate comedy and unsightly sides of culture.

Schaechter is also known for her record jacket art for bands including Midfunk, Scab Cadillac and David E. Williams.

Films explore grim diseases

Weekend offers two brutal looks at desperate lives

'Clean, Shaven'

Very few films that attempt to disturb viewers with grim disturb viewers with grim, unsettling footage contain enough substance to tolerate the grisly sights. Clean, Shaven, how-ever, is so graphically intense that the most gruesome of scenes are remarkably watchable in some bizarre way.

some bizarre way.

The film chronicles the story of Peter Winter, a schizophrenic man, searching for his daughter while being chased by a detective who believes he murdered a young girl. Full of pain and aggression, the man rigorously inflicts self torture in fits of dis-

Peter Greene's evocation of a

Peter Greene's evocation of a crazed mind produced one of the more ghastly characters in recent memory. Along with a starring role in Laws of Gravity and smaller parts in Pulp Fiction and The Usual Suspects, Greene's stellar performance may push him into cult fame.

First time writer/director Lodge Kerrigan shows off his talent by using avant-garde techniques with sparing dialogue. He develops the characters paranoia with obsessive close-ups focusing on seemingly insignificant objects. Haunting lulls of silence are often interrupt with screech-

are often interrupt with screeching noises and chaotic sounds.

Clean, Shaven comes highly recommended but with a disclaimer. The film is definitely not for the squeamish. The

detailed, at times gross, portrait of the horrors of mental illness represents a bold piece of film-making for those who can bear watching.

Leaving Las Vegas

After much talk and a long wait, Leaving Las Vegas finally makes its Lexington premiere tomorrow. A well-done picture all around, it's worthy of any lofty praise it has received and well worth the

and well worth the

and well worth the delay. Leaving Las Vegas tells the story of Ben Sanderson (Nicholas Cage), an alcoholic who's lost his job and his family, and moves to Las Vegas to deliberately drink himself to death. On arrival he meets Sera

himself to death. On arrival he meets Sera (Elizabeth Shue), a prostitute that Benhires to give him company for an evening. The two embark on a seemingly destructive relationship as they join in each others' misery rather the alternative of loneliness and despair.

Through it's ugly material, a beautiful romance emerges with Sera's embrace of Ben's suicidal drinking binges. In a movie full of remarkable scenes, a particular mid-film sequence has Sera showing her devotion to Ben by giving him a flask as a gift.

For all its brutal sequences, there are scenes of much needed comic relief coming from Ben. Writer/Director Mike Figgis presents a brilliant exploration of the nuances of alcoholism and depression. The grainy footage along with interspersed commentary from Shue are received.

mentary from Shue are techniques used effectively.

Not enough can be said the performance by Cage.
In another bold role selection, he balances fits of uncontrollable shakes, drunken rages and affectionate feel-ings toward Sera. Shue's portrayal of a detached hooker is heartbreaking. She tackles the part-with a distinct vibrancy that makes you hope for Sera, and lets you believe her accep-tance of Ben. Both turn in Oscar-caliber performances that are sure to be remem-bered for a long time

to come.

Fair to come.

Leaving Las Vegas, although unpleasant, is a fabulous representation of unconditional love.

Dealing with tough subject matter, the film empties out the emotions of viewers and doesn't give much back.

Although it ends on a depressing note, you can leave with the gratifying feeling that you've just seen a rare masterpiece.

only original member not in the current lineup.

The expanded lineup includes Bratton on mallet kat, keyboard and vocals.

Hanchett plays bass and sings while Waldner plays assorted percussion instruments. The prolific Dave Farris (10 Foot Pole and Catawampus) plays drum kit and Andrez (Drez) Hunter (The Minstrels and Round Trip Sounds) adds flute and assorted sounds with a midi wind controller (basically an electronic woodwind instruelectronic woodwind instru-

Arte Bratton, an integral part

of the original lineup because of his songwriting, has now taken over at guitar and sings some

His musical experience has included stints with the late, great Velvet Elvis, the Cyclone Rangers and an experimental group from Louisville called French TV.

The band's percussive roots

have been strengthened by opportunities to play with Gideon Alorwoyie, a master drummer from Ghana who was brought to Lexington by Synco-pated Inc., and Ibou Cissoko, an African drummer and guitarist from Mali.

"Rhythmic Refreshment" is

the band's most recent recording and highlights their multi-dimensional reality.

"Rhythmic Refreshment"

only expresses only a part of their live performances, which concentrate on meshing musical rhythms with the body.
