Gouverneur meris and visioson supported it on the ground that it would keep out the dengerous incluence of multitudes; while Williamoun, Wilson, Elsworth, Pason, Butler and Franklik opposed it on the ground that was a subject on which the people were jeallus, and it would not be well to excite their jealousies by depriving some of them of the vote as to Federal offices when the same citizens have the right to vote in the States. Franklin urged the importance of maintaining the public spirit of the common people.

Valley Suffrage Conference, and I am greatly hoping you will be in attendance. I wished very much that I might have seen you lenger in Nashville. I would have liked to consult with you about your point of view of the reselution instructing the Congressional Committee of the N.A.W.S.A to "investigate and premete the right of wemen to vote for W.S. Congresmon and Senators by Congressional action". At leng as the great body of suffragists hoped to gain the submission of a U.S. Constitutional Amendment it seemed impossible to turn their attention to the importance of Federal Suffrage, as the right to vote for Congressmen by Congressional action is called. But new that it is certain nothing can be dens duting this Democratic administration along that line I think it highly important that Democratic wemen, especially, should turn serious attention to the Federal Suffrage. There are two things about which I have a strong conviction; one is, that the party which gives wemen suffrage will gain the larger number of the vetes of the enfranchised wemen; and the second, that the Republican party will do so the next eppertunity it has, if it cames into power before suffrage is extended to women. The first conviction is sustained by the fact that history re-peats itself; and this has been twice illustrated in our history; the Democrate first established manheed suffrage, giving the peer man equal rights with the rich, and the democratic has ever since been emphatically the peer man's party. Again, the republicans extended suffrage to the negre, and maintained itself fer years in power by their The secend cenviction is sustained by the evident facts that weman suffrage has gained such power that complete victory cannot long bo deferred, and the Republicans have no states rights abjections to gaining for themselves the support of grateful wemen. I think, therefore, that Democratic wemen should be alert in secauring advantage to their ewn party by urging a form of Matienal suffrage which can be given by Democrats without contravening their States! Rights principles; and this form is found in Federal Suffrage. I hope this subject is going to be theroughly discussed at Indianapelis; and that is a great reason why I am very desirous that you shall be there. My dear Miss Finnegan,

I have been reading with delight of the success of the suffrage measure in the Texas legislature. I am looking hopefully for complete victory. I wish it to redound as much as possible to the success of our cause over the whole United States, and to aid in that, I long to have you come to the Mississippi valley Conference.

It has been arranged that at the Conference the subject of Federal Suffrage, that is the right of women to vote by action of Congress for U.S. Congressmen and Senators, shall be given full discussion. You know a resolution was passed at the N.W.A.S.A. Convention in Nashville that the Congressional Com. of the National should "investigate and promote" this right; but because the convention was so much taken up with the U.S.Con.Amendment very little thought was given to the Federal Suffrage, which I consider a much more valuable and hipeful measure than a U.S.Amendment; for it can be given us by a simple majority vote of both Houses, without any reference to the States; and with that much political power the women could gain for themselves constitutional amendments in the sever al states.

The thing which makes it pre-eminently a desirable measure for the Southern States is that it does not in any way conflict with States' Rights, and therefore cannot excite the atubbern epposition of the states rights states, so many of which are in the South.

When we consider that history is likely to repeat itself, and that
the party which is chiefly instrumental in giving suffrage to wemen
will gain the most advantage from the votes of the newly enfranchised wemen, and that if the present Democratic Administration lesss
its chance of enfranchising wemen, that is, of giving their cause
a tremendous impetus, the next administration may be of another
party, which will certainly not be so blind to its own interests,
you will see that I feel it a matter of the utmost importance that
Southern wemen should exert themselves to push this Federal Suffrage measure at once, both in our own states and in Congress. The
Miss.V.Conference will give us the best opportunity for doing so
that will come up during the year, and I doem it of importance that
none of the states which are taking so prominent a place as TTexas
ought to be unrepresented there.

I wish you would consider this aspect of the question, and I believe you would feel that it is worth a great effort to go to Indianapolis to help to plan to push this measure.

At Nashville, both Mrs. Medill McCermick and Mrs. Funk expressed themselves as greatly interested in it; but as the Cenvention at Nashville discussed it very little, I believe it would
spur on their efforts if now the Indianapolis Conference would
insist upon its importance.

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
