WE URGE THE CITIZENS OF EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT TO FORM SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT LEAGUES, AND SUGGEST TO THEM THE FOLLOWING PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION I. The name of this organization shall be the School Improvement League ofDistrict.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The purposes of this organization shall be :

1. To arouse interest in education and to insist upon the importance of every child being in school every day of the school term.

II. To unite all the people of this community for the improvement of our public schools by placing in the school, with the consent of the Trustees, facilities for health, comfort and education, together with objects of beauty; (2) by planting trees, shrubs and flowers in the school grounds; (3) by encouraging the establishment of a public library in connection with the school; (4) by making the school the center of the community by furnishing wholesome and instructive amusements; in a word, to improve the physical and intellectual environment of our future citizens.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION I. Anybody interested in the objects of this League may become an active member on condition that.....

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION I. The officers of this League shall be: a president, vice-president, a secretary-treasurer and a librarian, who shall be elected at each annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

SECTION I. This League shall meet regularly once a month, or oftener, at the call of the president.

ARTICLE VI.

SECTION I. That this League may be in touch with the general work for the betterment of public schools throughout the State and county, it shall enroll itself with the secretary of the County League for the betterment of public schools, and shall send to her a formal report of its progress at least twice a year.

ARTICLE VII.

SECTION I. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

SOME MONEY WILL BE NECESSARY TO CARRY ON THE WORK OF THE LEAGUE, BUT THE METHOD OF RAISING IT SHOULD BE LEFT ENTIRELY TO THE MEMBERS THEMSELVES.

Constitution of TheCounty School Improvement League.

Art.I. NAME.

The name of this organization shall be The.....County School Improvement League, and it shall be auxiliary to the State Organization.

Art.II.OBJECTS.

The objects of this League shall be:

1. To arouse interest in the educational conditions, problems and work inCounty.
2. To interest the people of the county in the improvement of their schools.
3. To establish a local League in every school district in the county.

Art.III. MEMBERSHIPS.

Section I. The local League of each school district shall be a member of the County League without the payment of dues; and the local Leagues shall be entitled to send one delegate to the County League for every ten members or fraction thereof.

Section II. Any person may become an associate member by the payment of one dollar annually to the treasury of the County League.

Art.IV. OFFICERS & EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The officers of this League shall be; a president, a vice-president and a secretary-treasurer. There shall be an executive com-

mittee, composed of the officers and four other members. All officers shall be chosen by ballot at each annual meeting.

A majority of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Art.V. ANNUAL MEETING.

This League shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as shall be designated by the president. At this time officers shall be elected and other general business transacted. All associate members and accredited delegates from local Leagues shall be entitled to vote.

Art.VI. REPORTS.

This League shall send, through its secretary, a full report of the year's work to the Chairman of the State Organization of which it forms a part on or before the first day ofof each year.

Art.VII. AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

THE Purpose of this organization shall be to associate young women in personal loyalty to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; to promote growth in Christian character and service through physical, social, mental and spiritual training; and to become a social force for the extension of the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF THE Y. W. C. A. FOR THE YEAR 1919



AS the Young Womens Christian Association of Lexington closes the third chapter of its history it is with a consciousness of; 1st. that it has enjoyed the continued blessing of a great God; 2nd. that in our community there dwells a group of loyal men and women ever ready to do their part in "backing up" the young womanhood of the city; 3rd. that some of the young women of Lexington are aware of what it means to be associated with other girls and women having for their object mutual helpfulness in developing of Christian character. The last year has brought us many advances. At this time the Board of Directors of 21 members, with 13 well organized committees, carries on the work.

BALCONY, Mrs. John Gilchrist, Chairman

There is the Balcony committee that cares for the upstairs of our building. This committee early in the year saw the need of the Club girls for a room all their own, so had the wall built that gave them the quiet of a real room. This has been furnished in good taste, and kept in order until we have as nice a Club room as any Association in the country. The class room, committee room and rest room are also on this floor and cared for by this committee. Although the rest room has been used much we want it to serve even a greater number this year. A few minutes rest at noon gives you new energy for your task.

FLOWERS, Mrs. Silas Mason, Chairman

The above heading possibly does not convey to your mind a large scope for activity and service. But this committee has been one of our most useful ones. Since last March when the first spring flowers bloomed our building has been supplied with them. They have brought pleasure to all coming into the building. Also it has been a source of income. Each Saturday there has been a sale of flowers. Up to July 1st. the Girls Clubs took charge and earned some of their Conference money. Then, too, a garden of the Residence was supplied with shrubs, etc. This was one of the new committees this year.

LITERATURE, Miss Roberta Newman

Another new committee, has been most active in providing books, magazines, and news papers for both of our buildings. These have been the gifts of many friends.

CURRENT EVENTS, Mrs. J. R. Morton, Chairman

This committee brings to the members of our Board at its regular meeting some of the things being done by our organization at large.

CAFETERIA, Mrs. Asa Jewell, Chairman

At the close of 1918, when our Cafeteria was just three months old, we wondered what a year would bring forth. We have been more than gratified. From reports of many patrons we know the public feels we are doing them real service, not only in furnishing good food but in providing what is proving to be

a real social center. Frequently we hear people say "this is my second home." Also this department has been a real boon to the Association for it has introduced us to many new friends. There has been some financial gain which has gone to the Association to make possible a larger work among girls.

EDUCATIONAL, Miss Francis Jewell, Chairman

Work of this committee has been varied and interesting. There have been classes in sewing, millinery, type writing, English, basketry, tin painting, gymnasium and swimming. Also there have been a number of interesting and instructive lectures. Members of the Staff of the College of Arts and Sciences of the U. of Ky. began in November a series of University Extension lectures. The School Board and Play Ground Association have aided us by giving to us the use of the Senior High Gym. and Lincoln Pool one night a week.

RESIDENCE, Mrs. Nat Pettit, Chairman

The opening of this department was felt to be a real advance. On the 8th. of April the first girls came to make their home here. The capacity is 13 and seldom is there a vacancy, usually a waiting list. Thirty-two girls have been members of the family. The transient room has been occupied by 182 women. Not only has this residence been a joy to the girls living there but it is demonstrating ideal living quarters for girls at moderate cost. With our gift of \$10,000 we are looking forward to a permanent Residence for a larger number of girls.

SUB-COMMITTEE---GARDEN, Mrs. Paul Justice, Chairman

One wondered when looking at the old bricks in the yard of our Residence what could be done. The energetic work of this group has transformed this spot into a lovely and refreshing garden.

EXTENSION, Miss Edith Bain, Chairman

This department has existed for over a year but in September with the coming of a special secretary it was thoroly organized, and plans are now being carried out by which we hope to group a large number of girls in progressive and profitable work. The work falls in two divisions: 1st. the Girls Clubs coming to the building, there are three of these. These Clubs meet once a week, are all organized, have programs of profit and pleasure to themselves, and do some social service work. The 2nd. division is the Association going out to groups of girls at their places of employment, particularly at the noon hours. These programs vary according to the need and pleasure of the girls. At the Lexington Laundry regular work has been established. Each Wednesday at noon the Extension secretary and a committee member go to the laundry for a program. Indoor picnics have been given in several places just at the close of business hours.

GIRL'S WORK, Miss Minnie T. Cramer, Chairman

In the Lexington High School there is a club of 40. This meets every other week at the Association for supper, followed by programs of recreation or education. The alternating Wednesday Club meets in the afternoon for business session. In the Junior High School there are two "Girls Reserve" groups. These meet once a week. The programs for these girls embody such codes as

make for good health and establishing of habits that will enable them to grow into useful women.

SUMMER WORK, Miss Francis Jewell, Chairman

Time was when the Association "stopped" in the summer, now it is one of the most active seasons. The third summer of our camping at Camp Daniel Boone was a joy to 133 girls, 80 of them were our own girls the other 53 coming from near by towns. The time has now come when we must look forward to a camp of our own. A two weeks stay in the great out of doors is a great factor in building up a girl, and giving her a right out-look on life. Provision should be made for a recreational field in the city. Picnics, hikes, etc., were part of the summer program. Summer Conference is always an important feature in every Association. The first year Lexington had 3 representatives, the second 5, and the last year ten. Summer Conferences are always an inspiration. Meeting and talking with Association members from other cities gives new ideas as well as give you strength of being banded with those who have the same object as oneself.

FINANCE, Mrs. C. H. Berryman, Chairman

This committee has some times been called the skeleton of the Association. It is most essential and yet it and its work are not visible except through other departments. To plan and raise money for such work takes women of vision in its possibilities and faith in its accomplishments. Wisdom in the investment of funds is bringing interest that is helping enlarge the activities of the organization, thru the finance work the public is being linked up with our work in a very substantial way.

RELIGIOUS WORK, Mrs. L. Roberts, Chairman

Although all of the work in the Association has the Religious motive, there is this department organized to promote by inspirational meetings and Bible study the inner life of the girl. The Vesper Services during the last year have been well attended; the programs interesting and helpful. Two Bible classes have been conducted, one on the book of Mattehew and one on the life of Paul. A new branch in this department is the World Fellowship program. The Conference Club (composed of those who have been to a summer conference) is being directly responsible for the program. Thru these we are learning the need of the girls in far away lands, and are beginning to appreciate how all womanhood is bound together.

MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Howard Gratz, Chairman

The foregoing reports are of various groups; this includes every one enrolled in the Association. It was with great pride, and gratitude on the 31st. of December that we entered the 1003rd. member, a gain of 365 during the year. Every one has had a part in the things that have been accomplished. Yes, even you who just paid your dollar, shared, but we wish another year you would join one of the active groups. One of the groups not before mentioned is our Business Womens Club studying conditions in our city and endeavoring to help the younger girl solve some of her problems. Then there is the large number of women serving on committees, cashiering and waiting upon you in the cafeteria.

The statistical table shows the total attendance at various classes and clubs of our Association. It does not give attendance of such outside organizations as College Club, D. A. R., etc., nor does it give a record of such services rendered as use of rest rooms, telephone, direction to a room or introduction to the Association in another city, suggestions of a position, etc. It is a wonderful thing to be in line of service today. The heritage of the American Y. W. C. A. woman and girl is a rich one. Some one has asked "when does a daughter repay her mother for her care, sacrifice and love?" It is answered "never, she in turn gives to her daughter." We as Association women and girls are to pay our debt by loving service to the girl and woman who needs us. In thinking of a gift of service we are conscious of how much we owe to the President of our Association. Miss Withers has most generously given of herself and most efficiently led us for these years. As we, over 1000 strong, now face the new year shall it not be with a realization of our own need of a well developed and consecrated Christian life and service. Let us think of the girls and women of Lexington, and the world. Remember that Jesus Christ waits to bring them the abundant life thru us. This wonderful privilege can be ours. "Arise and let us go hence."

Resolved: That whereas the Twenty-fifth Annual Council of the Diocese of Lexington which was held in Fort Thomas February 10 and 11, 1920, amended Canon II, Section 2, of the canons of the Diocese so as to make women equally eligible with men for election to the Diocesan Council, we receive this privilege with faith as a new opportunity of service given to the women of the Diocese; and

Whereas it has occurred frequently that parishes and missions in this Diocese have failed in sending their quota of lay delegates to the Annual Council, the Woman's Auxiliary in convention assembled recommends and urges all its branches to present to their several vestries names of women suitable to be elected as delegates or alternates to the Diocesan Council.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN BRANCH OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF LEXINGTON.

1. This branch shall be known as the Lexington Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.
2. Its purpose shall be to forward in every way within the diocese the interest and plans of the Board of Missions.
3. Its membership shall be composed of the parish and mission branches within the diocese.
4. Its officers shall be a president, three vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, United Thank Offering Custodian, Educational secretary, and Junior President.
5. The president shall call all meetings and preside over them, and with the other officers shall plan the affairs of the branch. She shall serve as chairman of a committee on the Devotional Life of the branch.
6. There shall be three vice-presidents, respectively for, The Ohio River Region, the Blue Grass Region and the Mountain Region. (Districts to co-incide with Diocesan districts) Each vice-president shall have entire charge of all work in her district, under the direction of the president. She shall preside in the absence of the president when a meeting is held in her district. *Secretaries added.*
7. The secretary shall receive and keep a list of the Parish Officers, send out notices of meetings and keep minutes of them, and give such aid with correspondence as may be needed.
8. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the branch and pay such bills as are endorsed by the president. She shall receive and forward all monies, except the United Thank Offering, given to redeem pledges made by the diocesan branch. She shall receive from the parish branches reports of money given them through the treasurers of their parishes, which reports she shall incorporate in a supplement to the report of money received by her, and make this report at each meeting of the Executive Board and at the Annual Meeting. She shall serve as chairman of a committee on Finance.
9. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall furnish the women of the parishes with United Thank Offering Boxes and leaflets, and bring to their attention in other ways the purposes of the United Thank Offering. She shall keep a list of contributions, and make semi-annual collections and put these amounts at interest in some bank in the diocese.
10. The educational secretary shall prepare herself for the training of the parish leaders of study classes. She shall seek out one or more such leaders in every parish and mission, and personally or by correspondence, train them for their work. She shall co-operate with the Educational Department of the Board of Missions, and the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary for Mission study in all their plans, and each year follow as far as she may be able, the study courses presented by them. The Educational secretary shall serve as chairman of a committee on missionary information.
11. The Junior President shall have charge of all work of the Junior Department

13. These officers shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall transact all business of the branch in the interim of Annual meetings and shall meet not less than twice a year. The expenses to and from said meetings shall be paid from the Central Fund.
12. The Central Fund shall be ⁵⁰ 25 cents per member annually, of which ~~five cents shall be for the use of the president, five for that of each vice-president, and five cents for the secretary.~~ *to be distributed according to order of Board*
14. There shall be one annual meeting held in May for the nomination of officers and for the transaction of business. Each branch shall be entitled to send two voting delegates in addition to its president in person, to the annual meeting; but other members of the branches shall have the privilege of the floor except when otherwise ordered by the meeting.
15. Each officer shall serve for a term of three years and shall be eligible to succeed herself for one more term. Nominations shall be by ballot, those receiving the largest number of votes shall be considered chosen subject to the approval of the Bishop.
16. Roberts Rules of Order shall be the book of reference on parliamentary questions.
17. This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two third vote of those present.

Note. To avoid changing the entire Board at the same time the terms of officers chosen at the meeting in September 1919, shall be as follows:- President, United Thank Offering Custodian and Secretary, three years-1922- Vice president of the Ohio River Region, vice-president Mountain Region and the Junior President two years-1921- Vice-president of the Blue Grass Region, treasurer and educational secretary one year-1920. After the first term hereby provided all terms shall be for three years.

Kentucky has its part to play in the great drama that is now as wide in its scope as the world itself and let her do it well. It requires brains, honesty and courage and our people have all these qualities yet and let them use them in the registration of Kentucky's voice in the greatest Convention in which our party delegates have sat in a generation.
