The following motion was submitted by Professor Miller
with the request that it be discussed at the first faculty
meeting at the opening of the fall session of 1916:

"No student who has failed twice in a subject
and has repeated it once in class, shall have the
privilege of again taking it with the regular class.

A student, however, who has been thus debarred
from a class in a subject on the list required of
him for graduation, may, if the Faculty of the College
of which he is a matriculate so orders, be permitted
to substitute therefor other work; provided that
this subject in which he has twice failed is not the
required work in English in the course he is pursuing."

On motion of Dr. Peter the following motion was
unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTIONS OF SIMPLIFIED SPELLING.

"WHEREAS: the Faculty of the University of
Kentucky approves the movement for simplified
Spelling ~~Spelling~~ Board and desires to promote this
movement, therefore be it resolved

1 - That we adopt for use in official publica-
tions and correspondence in this institution the sim-
pler and shorter alternatly spellings authorized by
the Standard, the Century Dictionary or Webster's
Dictionary.

2 - That we adopt, for use in official publi-
cations and correspondence, the Twelv Words adopted
by the National Education Association, viz: program,
catalog, decalog, prolog, demagog, pedagog, tho,
altho, thoro, thorofare, thru, thruout.

3 - That we allow students in their ^{ritten} work
to use, when such use indicates a consistent and intel-
ligent spelling habit, any spellings which any of the
leading dictionaries (Webster's, Standard, Century)
giv vocabulary place as recommendation of the Amer-
ican Philological Association, the (British) Phil-
ological Society, or the Simplified Spelling Board.

4 - That this action by the faculty is not in-
tended to control the usage of individual members,
although such personal use is greatly to be desired."

On motion of Dr. Kastle the meeting adjourned
until Monday, May 29th. at 3:45.
