

The Senate met in the Little Theatre Monday, December 10, at 3:45, President McVey presiding.

The reading of the minutes of July 23 and October 8 was postponed until the next meeting.

The Committee on Student Publications made the following report of their action of the request of certain students to publish a comic magazine "The Meouv", which was referred to them by the Senate October 8:

"The undersigned committee on student publications, having been instructed by the Senate to pass on the appended communication asking permission for certain students to publish upon this campus a comic magazine, and the same committee having been given full power to act, it desires to report that it has given permission for such publication upon the conditions set out in the proposal, namely:

"That the paper shall be censored before publication by a representative of this committee.

"That the University shall in no way be responsible financially for expense of publication or other expense incurred by the proposed publication.

"That the matter to be published be submitted to the censor either in copy or in proof.

"That the publication shall be suppressed immediately and finally upon appearance in it of any matter that shall have been printed without submission to censorship."

This report was approved by the Senate.

The following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

- ↓ "Mathematics 11. Spherical Trigonometry. Two hours a week for 1/2 semester. One credit.
- ↓ "Mathematics 12. Least Squares. Two hours a week for 1/2 semester. One credit.
- ↓ "English 35. Advanced Dramatic Production. Three credits.
- ↓ "Physics 111a and 111b. Electricity and Magnetism. Lectures and recitations three hours per week. Three credits per semester.
- "This course is identical with 102a and b, except that it does not have any laboratory.
- ↓ "Zoology 110. Individual Work in Zoology. Three credits."

The following recommendations from the College of Education were approved:

- ↓ "Education #71 - Trade Analysis and Course Planning - This course is an analysis and organization of the teaching content of trades. Its aim is to

acquaint skilled artisans and related subjects teachers with the type of content of their trade and, thru a thoro analysis, arrive at a teaching order for the content of that trade. Three Credits.

"Education #72 - The Teaching of the Trade Subjects - This is a method course, the aim of which is to evolve a special way of instructional management and practice teaching for trade teachers who have had Education #71. This course is especially essential for persons expecting to fulfill the requirements of Vocational Trade Teachers. Three Credits.

 "Education #73 - The Teaching of the Related Subjects - This course has to do with related subjects and the methods of handling same in connection with vocational education classes in the high schools. It concerns itself with, first, an analysis of the subject and, second, with the principles and methods of class room management. Three Credits.

"Education #74 - Vocational Guidance - A course designed to give teachers, principals, superintendents and welfare workers a comprehensive view of the factors in Vocational Guidance, the agencies contributing to or influencing life choices and an analysis of the human and economic resources of a given civic unit. Three Credits.

Action on the recommendation of the special committee on summer session and commencement program was postponed until the next meeting. The Secretary was requested to send mimeographed copies of the recommendation to members of the Senate.

Action on the list of candidates for degrees to be presented to the Board of Trustees at the December meeting was postponed to a special meeting to be called later.
