HERE SHALL THE KERNEL ALL STUDENT RIGHTS MAINTAIN

MEET THE NEED

There are two facilities, considered by most authorities, as necessary and vital factors in the social and recreational life of every progressive university, which are lacking upon our campus. They are obviously an adequate ball room and a swimming pool of some kind. This belief has consistently been expressed by The Kernel and is concurred in by an overwhelming majority of the student body.

In planning the Student Union building, which was originally considered with the idea of meeting social and recreational needs of the student body, the latter need has been definitely left out because it was believed that the funds provided would prove inadequate for its inclu-There are two facilities, considered by n

provided would prove inadequate for its inclu-sion. It was presumed that by eliminating the swimming pool, more money could be applied to the ball room and thus better facilities would be possible.

be possible.

However, as plans near completion, it appears that the idea of providing an adequate dance floor is almost omitted. At present the plan is to include a ball room so small that it will hardly accommodate the lesser social functions, such as tea dances, thus necessitating the continued use of the gymnasium for the greater

continued use of the gymnasium for the greater number of dances.

Dancing is certainly not the main purpose and objective of the student body, but if any attempt whatsoever is to be made at a program of social life in which dances form an integral part, facilities must be provided. For a University, the size of the University of Kentucky, to be compelled to hold its more noteworthy social functions in a hamilie structure, such as

to be compelled to hold its more noteworthy so-cial functions in a barn-like structure, such as is our gymnasium, is wholly undesirable.

In addition to the need for a place suitable for holding dances there is also the problem of preserving and keeping in condition the bas-ketball floor to be considered. The former is needed in order to maintain proper conditions for the dignity which should grace all social functions of an institution of higher learning; the latter presents itself as a matter of expedithe latter presents itself as a matter of expedi-ency, as the basketball floor is kept constantly in a condition unfit for playing because of danc-

ing thereon, and will eventually have to be re-placed because of added wear.

The Kernel is attempting only to express the desires and wishes of the student body in re-The Retrie is attempting only to expices to the student body in regard to the Student Union building, and it believes that the all-pervading wish is that adequate ball room facilities may be provided, over and above the other purposes of the building. Lounging rooms and meeting places for organizations are desirable, but certainly the student body can find plenty of places to loaf on the campus now (perhaps too many) and organizations can always meet in classrooms. Therefore, in conclusion, The Kernel believes that it expresses the desire and feeling of the student body in contending that it would just as soon not have a Student Union building at this time if it is not to meet the outstanding social and recreational need of our campus. Notwithstanding the fact that the President, in a recent publication in The Kernel, gave the very sensible reason that the ball room floor had

very sensible reason that the ball room floor had to be reduced in size, as inadequacy of funds, The Kernel still respectfully indulges the hope that some steps may be taken even yet, so to work out the problem financially, that this uni-form desire of the students, for an adequate dancing floor, may be materialized.

HAUPTMANN IS DEAD

Bruno Richard Hauptmann, Jersey carpenter, is dead in atonement for the death of Charles A. Lindbergh Jr. on the night of March 1, 1932. It is difficult to understand the undercurrents which made the case so sensational, and causes the layman to wonder if the case is closed.

Certainly the political aspects are not closed. Attorney-General Wilentz and Hunterdon Coun-Attorney-General Wilentz and Hunterdon Coun-vy Prosecutor, Anthony M. Hauch, have fought Governor Hoffman at every turn. There is con-siderable ground for the assumption that "Jer-sey Justice" has been prostituted to Jersey poli-tics. Both Wilentz and Hoffman will be can-didates from their state to the opposing political conventions, and seek offices in the state. Wilentz must have realized that in the open the seasons. must have realized that in the event he was su cessful in convicting a man for the murder of the Lindbergh child, his political fortune would be reade. Hoffman, on the other hand, realized that if he could become the savior of an innocent man his fortune would also be made.

Following the sensational trial of thirteen
months ago, the people of the United States held
little doubt as to the guilt of Bruno Richard
Hauptmann. Had he been electrocuted then,
public sentiment would have sanctioned the act.
With the passage of time, it became apparent
that the evidence was mainly circumstantial,
and the custom sensities in many prints as to and the question remains in many minds as to the fairness with which this alien was treated.

It is difficult to believe that Hauptmann was alone in planning or executing the crime for which he died. Circumstantial evidence upholds the state. However, they possessed fingerprints and footprints taken from the scene of the murder, but the state failed to prove that they cor-responded with those of Hauptmann. Threads of direct evidence did not check, and were excluded from the trial.

The Kernel does not take the attitude of criticizing the courts for the sake of criticism alone. Our laws must be upheld, and the dastardly crime of kidnaping and murder must be ended. It is a regrettable fact to find our courts so manipulated by politics, however, that their decisions raise questions in the minds of the citi-

The Lindbergh case is not closed. Both Wil-entz and Hoffman will continue their political journey, keeping the case open. Mr. Hoffman is to be commended for certain aspects of his participation in the case. In granting reprieves to the condemned man, he allowed the defend-ant a chance to produce evidence which might have saved his life.


