MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE - OCTOBER 12, 1936

The University Senate met in the Lecture room of McVey Hall, Monday, October 12 with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of May 11, May 27, and August 19 were read and approved.

Since this was the first meeting of the year, President McVey introduced the new members of the University Senate who were present.

The Committee on Duplication of Work presented the following new courses and changes in courses which were approved;

College of Education

The College of Education recommends that Education 222a and 222b, The Thesis Course, 6 credits, be changed to Education 222, Research in Education 3 credits.

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The faculty of the College of Education also recommends the authorization of the following new courses in Education:

1. Education 77, Shop Management Problems, 2 credits.
2. Education 78, The Conference Method of Instruction in Industrial Education, 2 credits.
3. Education 79, Determining Related Subject Content, 2 credits.
4. Education 80, Principles of Industrial Education, 2 credits.
5. Education 108, Coordination Techniques in Industrial Education, 2 credits.
6. Education ²²⁹~~224~~, The Elementary Principal. This course deals with problems related to the elementary principalship, such as the professional preparation; selection and status of the principal; relation to other administrative officers, supervisors, teachers, pupils, and parents; problems of attendance, discipline, health and records; the application of sound principles of the improvement of teaching. Emphasis will be placed on the community relationship of elementary principals and teachers and ways in which they may cooperate and improve the life of the community. Attention will also be given to problems presented by members of the class as outgrowth of their experiences. 3 credits.
7. Education 269, Achievement Testing in Home Economics. This course is intended to acquaint teachers of home economics with techniques used in measuring attainment in home economics in the junior and senior high school and college.

Prerequisite: Teaching experience. 3 credits.

It is recommended further that Education 108, Public Education in the United States, be permanently discontinued.

Professors Randall and Koppius were elected representatives on the University Council to succeed Professors Card and Downing.

Dean Wiest made a report for the committee appointed to investigate the question of organizing a credit union on the campus. The Committee found that it was desirable to incorporate under the state law rather than under the federal law. A brief analysis of the proposed work was given. The matter was then submitted to the floor for discussion. The motion was approved that the Senate recommend through the President to the Board of Trustees that authority be given to organize a credit union. The motion was made and approved that President McVey appoint a committee to carry out the plans for the proposed credit union. President McVey announced that he would continue the present committee for that purpose.

Announcement was made of the convocation, Tuesday at 10 o'clock at which President McCracken of Vassar College would be the speaker.
