## Capital campaign brewing

### Decision set for Spring semester

The goal is to jump from number 45 in the nation to at least number 20. This is much harder to accomplish than it seems.

Right now UK is in the early stages of a probable capital campaign that

may turn itself into one of the top 20 research universities in the country.

An outside consultant will conduct a feasibility study to determine how much money the university will need to raise, who the donors will be and to "talk to people about it," said Joe Burch, Vice President of University Relations.

The consultant will most likely be from outside the Lexington area.

"There are two or three firms that we know of and are comfortable with. We will choose from them," said Rex Bailey, the director of the Development Office. "The consultant will talk to supporters to find out what kind of interest there is."

"The study will determine a reasonable goal for the campaign, and find

out people's opinion and support both within and external of the university. The consultant will talk to deans, other administrators, faculty, staff, corporations, and alumni."

The role of the Development Office will be to direct the consultant to the right people outside of the University. When UK decides to launch the capital campaign, the development office will coordinate it.

This is not the first time UK has conducted a capital campaign. But it is the first time the campaign has involved the whole campus. Traditionally, campaigns were conducted for separate needs, such as the building of the library.

The library campaign was held from 1991 to 1992. The process was

similar to this one and generated over \$124 million for the new building.

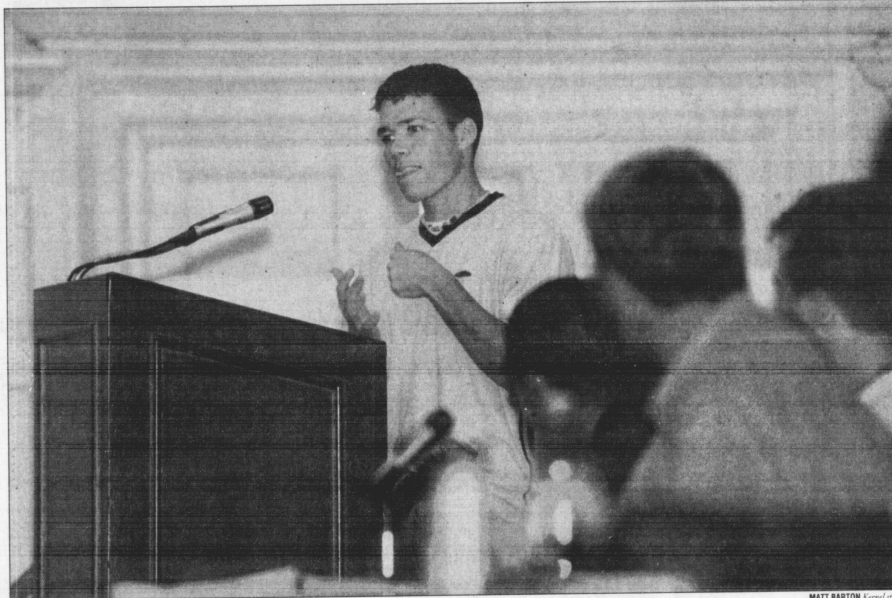
Now the university needs money to fund chairs and professorships. To measure how many research contracts the school has with the government.

"UK is generating about \$125 million right now in research funding. (To go from 45th to 20th) we need to attract much larger research contracts than we do today," Burch said. "No decision has been made to launch a capital campaign."

The decision will be made after the feasibility study is done in early 1998.

If there is going to be a capital campaign, the second step will be to identify primary sources for support. The

## Group tackles relationships

More than 40 people gathered in Memorial Hall last night as members of the UK Promise Keepers organization tackled the relationship issue.

The word of the night was "integrity," and nearly all of the seven speakers had something to say about it. The Promise Keepers advocate integrity in relationships of all kinds.

Although the national Promise Keepers movement focuses on men, UK Promise Keepers openly accepts women members. Two women spoke at last night's meeting. Lisa Yanarella, a library science graduate student, talked about

improving intimate relationships.

When men and women concentrate too much on the physical part of relationships they become "naked bodies with veiled souls," she said.

Several speakers defended abstinence and bashed premarital sex.

Brian Hicks, a social work senior, said people can get over past mistakes and turn around their lives.

"If you've gone down the wrong path, you don't have to stay there," Hicks said.

The national Promise Keepers organization believes in sexual and emotional purity in relationships, and it calls upon men to own up to their responsibilities.

Although not affiliated with the national organization, the UK Promise Keepers support its cause. Promise Keepers is a national group of Christian men who take an oath composed of seven promises it believes will help them become better people in the eyes of God.

The group, started by Bill McCartney, the former head football coach at the University of Colorado, is famous for its huge religious gatherings where men pour out their souls in dramatic displays of emotion. The most recent one, held last Saturday in Washington, D.C., drew hundreds of thousands of men and women.

### LOCAL Miller shows up in White House video

Lexington Mayor Pam Miller shows up in one of the 44 videotapes the White House released of executive mansion coffees with President Clinton and Democratic Party donors.

Miller said she was never asked for money and did not contribute to attend the February 1996 breakfast, which featured coffee and rolls and the company of about 20 other city and state officials. Miller did not know whether any of the other guests — which included a California education leader, a city official from Maine and legislators from Maryland and Virginia — were asked for money, she said.

A White House official invited Miller and the officials to the breakfast to discuss issues they thought needed federal attention, she said. Miller talked to Clinton about the need for more job training, she said.

The mayor said she did not realize the coffee, which began about 7:45 a.m. and ended about 9:15 a.m., had been videotaped.

### EKU faculty scammed again

RICHMOND, Ky. — The faculty at Eastern Kentucky University has again become the target of a credit card scam.

Director of Public Safety Tom Lindquist issued a warning to faculty last week saying that several members of the faculty had become victims of fraudulent credit card applications made out in their names. He suggested that faculty members be extra vigilant in protecting their Social Security numbers and other vital information to prevent their own credit records from being victimized.

"The scheme involved using the names and Social Security numbers of employees to obtain credit cards in the employee's name," Lindquist said. Lindquist also suggested that all Eastern faculty obtain copies of their credit histories to assure that no one had falsified applications using their information.

He said the first rash of credit card fraud affected more than 300 members of the faculty.

## Committee promoting security

The Inclusive Learning Committee is trying to make students, faculty and staff feel safe and secure during the school year by promoting UK's policy on racial and sexual harassment.

Members of the Committee produced and distributed pamphlets discussing what constitutes racial and sexual harassment and where people can go for help if they feel they've been harassed. They distributed the pamphlets to residence halls, fraternities and sororities on campus, as well as to incoming freshmen at fall orientation.

Student members of the Committee also rallied for the formation of emergency phone number cards with the Committee's principles printed on the back. Some of the principles printed on the cards include "lifelong learning," "academic excellence and personal integrity," "freedom of thought and speech" and "cultural diversity and human dignity."

The Committee promotes viewing UK as a diverse institution committed to sharing the ideas of different cultures. A shortened statement put together by the leaders of the Committee is "the active engagement of students, faculty, staff and alumni in the pursuit of learning in an environment of equality, civility, academic freedom, security and mutual respect for the rights and responsibilities of all members."

One of the goals pursued by people engaging in inclusive learning is "to enrich the quality of life of citizens at the local, state, national and global levels by extending the practices of inclusive learning outside the borders of the university campuses."

Everyone is invited to participate in meetings and events.

"There is no set list of exactly who is involved with the Inclusive Learning Community because we (members) are constantly in the process of becoming," said Vice-Chancellor for Minority Affairs Lauretta Byers.

But lone student representative Alejandro Stewart said the committee could do more to include more student members.

"The members of the committee could try a lit-

Kaplan sues Princeton promotion

False claims part of suit

The Kaplan and Princeton reviews have taken their competition to the courtroom. Kaplan filed a lawsuit against The Princeton Review for alleged false promotional claims.

Kaplan claimed that The Princeton Review put false claims on the book *Cracking the GMAT CAT 1998 Edition with CD-ROM* and on *Inside the SAT & ACT 1998 Deluxe Edition* that is currently in bookstores and at distributors.

"These were clearly not innocent mistakes," said Andy Rosen, chief operating officer for Kaplan Education Centers.

"Although Princeton Review says they noticed the misstatements long before we contacted them, they continued to ship products with the false information."

Representatives of The Princeton Review disagreed.

"Before the suit was filed we had already taken measures for corrections," said Paul Cohen, executive director for Princeton Review in area states.

The two companies are very competitive.

Kaplan said its software has become the No. 1 seller in the test prep category, outselling The Princeton Review two to one, according to PC Data report for August 1997.

However, Cohen said this is because his company's software was only in the store part of the month and that Princeton still outsells Kaplan in software seven to one.

on the software box were discovered in mid-August and shipping continued until Kaplan filed the lawsuit.

With the settlement, The Princeton Review will place stickers over the false statements on the front and back covers of the books.

The errors included saying the CD-ROM for the GMAT and CAT practices had four practice tests when it only had one.

The SAT and ACT books erred in their promises of video feedback that tracks your progress on the practice test and an ability to print the 300 most commonly tested words on the SAT.

Paul Cohen, public relations manager for The Princeton Review, said The Princeton Review had to pay no monetary damages and that Kaplan was out tens of thousands of dollars.

The company accomplished little, he said, since The Princeton Review was correcting the mistakes anyway.

As part of the settlement agreement for the lawsuit, the defendants did not have to admit liability.

The two companies are very competitive.

Kaplan said its software has become the No. 1 seller in the test prep category, outselling The Princeton Review two to one, according to PC Data report for August 1997.

However, Cohen said this is because his company's software was only in the store part of the month and that Princeton still outsells Kaplan in software seven to one.

# Koestner to speak about rape experience

A nationally known sexual assault prevention advocate will speak at UK today about her experience with date rape.

Katie Koestner, a date rape survivor, will speak at 7:30 p.m. in Memorial Hall as part of Women's Awareness Week. A question and answer session will follow.

Her crusade of speaking out against date rape began in 1990, and she has been in the national spotlight ever since.

She appeared on the cover of the June 3, 1991, issue of *Time*

magazine and has made numerous appearances on television programs. Some of these include "The Oprah Winfrey Show," "Geraldo," the "NBC Nightly News," "CNBC Talk Live," "Larry King Live" and an HBO movie titled, *No Visible Bruises: The Katie Koestner Story*.

Many newspapers, among them the New York Times, Los Angeles Tribune and Philadelphia Inquirer, have also printed her story.

Koestner, who graduated Magna Cum Laude from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va., in 1994, has dedicated herself to reaching campuses with her "No/Yes" program.

Since graduation, she has spoken at more than 400 colleges, high schools and military institutions, and her message has reached hundreds of thousands of students in 46 states.

Koestner is well-traveled, but one of the four states she has not yet visited is the Bluegrass. "I think it's a very exciting time for us," said Melanie Cruz, president of the Student Government Association. "Katie has had many speaking engagements across the country, but this is the first time she's ever spoken at a school in Kentucky."

Koestner, who was raped at William and Mary in 1990,

thought the school did not respond strongly enough to her case. The school banned the man involved from residence halls but allowed him to remain on campus.

"The hearing officer told me that this is an educational institution, not a penitentiary," Koestner told *Time*. Outraged, she went to the media for exposure.

Although Koestner thought William and Mary's punishment was too lenient, it does show how rape can be an issue for dorm life.

"Having gone through something like that as a student, she brings similar material, but a different angle," said Melanie Tyner-Wilson, assistant director of Residence Life Programming. "Her angle helps reinforce the training that our residence advisers already have."

She has spoken at many conferences and was the keynote speaker for both the East and West Coast Student Conferences on Campus Sexual Violence in 1995. She also has produced several guides and publications about date rape.

She has written a chapter for a book on the Women's Anti-Violence Movement and has co-written several guidebooks, such as *Total Sexual Assault Risk Management Strategies for Colleges*.

Besides speaking to students, Koestner has dedicated herself to passing federal legislation on sexual assault. Through her new conference with Congressman Jim Ramstad, Koestner served as a catalyst for sexual assault legislation. She was largely responsible for Congress' endorsement of the Victim's Bill of Rights, passed into law by President Bush in 1992. As far as UK Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs James Kuder is concerned, Koestner's visit is very timely.

"We have an obligation to bring someone like this to campus," Kuder said.

# SGA tables march bill

Student Government Association senators wasted little time last night in deciding to table a funding bill for a black women's group.

Senators listened for about 10 minutes as a total of three officers and one non-member of Circle of Imani explained their reasons for attending the Million Woman March in Philadelphia on Oct. 25.

After the group's discussion, Senator at Large Phil Feigel asked the senate to table the bill until its next senate meeting on Oct. 22 because of Circle of Imani's fundraising efforts in the last week.

Circle of Imani originally asked for \$1,510 to pay for transportation and lodging to attend the gathering. But after the group's meeting with the Appropriations and Revenue committee on Oct. 1, which passed the bill unfavorably, members raised more money. The fundraising decreased the amount the group was requesting to \$840.

"I commend your fundraising efforts," Feigel said. "But in one week if you raise that much money how much money can you raise before the next Senate meeting?"

The Senate voted to table the motion by a vote of 16-5-2.

Social Work Senator George Myers said the bill itself needed to be debated.

"I wanted a debate to take place, that's what we're here for," Myers said.

Feigel said after the meeting he would like to see more groups come to SGA as their last option.

Circle of Imani said in a written statement that they cannot raise any more money. The 14 people who are attending the event have raised \$1,700 for the trip "and we feel that we have done a huge portion."

The group said the \$600 it raised between the two meetings was raised by the Million Woman March State Coordinator Kathy Williams, who raised the money from the Lexington community.

The march is intended to open dialogue on community and diversity issues. Women, men and children will interact and learn from women leaders such as Winnie

Mandela and Maxine Waters. In its proposal to the Senate, Circle of Imani said the march will lead to better understanding of themselves, which will open more lines of communication with others and bring more diversity to UK.

The march is intended to prioritize human and environmental issues, according to the Million Woman March organizer's website mission statement.

When the group returns, it will co-sponsor a workshop with Portia Weatherall, a Cleveland radio host on Oct. 28, which will focus on self-esteem. The group plans to use the information it receives from the Million Woman March to educate students during a week-long women's symposium at UK.

Circle of Imani has been on campus since 1993. The purpose of the group is to smooth the transition from young adulthood to womanhood. An information pamphlet states that the "establishment of a woman's network will help self-esteem through self-empowerment and community service."

# Student using e-mail as aid

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Alan Kuo, a leukemia patient, has turned to IU students to save him during his final grasp on life. "I wish more than anything to continue enjoying this blessing we call life," Kuo said on his Web page just before his health deteriorated, preventing him from writing more. Asian students now have the opportunity to save Kuo by registering with their local bone marrow donor program. Kuo, an Asian student at the University of California, has reached IU via e-mail. A plea for help has been circulating among Asian groups on campus, asking Asian students to sign up with a bone marrow registry. Registering would help not only Kuo, but also other Asians needing bone marrow transplants. After being contacted by a concerned IU graduate student who

read Kuo's e-mail, the South Central Indiana Donor Center searched the IU campus Sept. 22-26 in a bone marrow registry drive for a student who matches Kuo's genetic makeup. Bone marrow screening is achieved through a blood test. No matches were found. Bone marrow donations are needed but uncommon, said Tom Adams, Indiana Donor Center field representative. "Platelets are needed because, once donated, they can only be stored for five days before they have to be discarded," Adams said. "Platelets help patients with cancer, leukemia and bone marrow recipients. Over one-half of the donations go to children, and it is important because there

aren't many platelet donors. Even though most people say that they don't want to take an hour and a half of their time to make a donation, it's really not that much to ask when you are saving somebody's life." Kuo is hospitalized with Chronic Myelogenous Leukemia, a cancer of the blood, in San Francisco. He has been told he has one month left to live unless he finds a bone marrow donor who matches his genetic makeup. Because tissue types vary by ethnicity, Kuo needs an Asian donor. Signing up at a local donor center registration drive can help Alan Kuo or others in need of a bone marrow transplant. Julie Brady, administrator of the South

Central Indiana Donor Center, has been aiding in the search for a matching donor for Kuo. "Kuo has less than a month and a half to live," Brady said. "It is imperative that we find a match. I encourage students not only to make the commitment to sign up for a bone marrow registry, but also to bring a friend. And, if you are a member of an Asian group, put out a plea at a meeting." Kuo's desire to live is large. His statement, "Please save my life by registering with your local marrow donor program," is circulating on his Web page around the world. "What we are doing is making a difference," Sarah Titzer, South Central Indiana Donor Center's communications coordinator said. "An Asian IU student contacted us today to find out information to help Kuo — and that is exciting." For more information, call the South Central Donor Center at (812) 339-0696.

# Pledge claims hazing incident

BOSTON—The Brookline Police Department is criminally investigating allegations that one of Northeastern's fraternities — Phi Gamma Pi — hazed a pledge so severely last week that he needed to be treated at an area hospital. The fraternity has been suspended from all university activities until the investigation is complete. According to sources, a freshman pledge complained to his Stetson Hall West resident assistant that he was paddled at a fraternity event early in the week. By last Wednesday the university had acted, notifying the fraternity of its suspension by delivering a letter to Phi Gamma Pi President Steve Tollator. Director of Student Activities Todd Shaver authored the letter, which states: "The incidents I refer to involving your fraternity

include: Violating sections of the Greek Relationship Statement and the hazing of six of your new members. These are not only violations of university policies, but of the state of Massachusetts." There was no answer at Phi Gamma Pi's house on Kent Street in Brookline over the past several days. When university officials learned of the alleged incident, NU quickly launched its own investigation, said Janet Hookalo, NU director of public relations. Dean of Student Affairs Ron Martel said Tuesday that Brookline police are now solely handling the criminal investigation while his office continues to investigate the fraternity. Numerous phone messages left for Brookline police Captain Peter Scott were unanswered, but Jim Ferrer, Associate Director of NU's Public Safety, said the victim now claims his injuries were not serious and will not press

charges. "He thinks the situation has been blown out of proportion," Ferrer said. "He doesn't think it should be pursued by anyone." The person who answered the buzzer at the 18-year-old's dorm room Tuesday said the freshman from New York was not home. If it is found that members of Phi Gamma Pi were aware of any hazing, and the victim did not consent to the action, a criminal violation could be found, Ferrer said. Massachusetts law states that anyone who knowingly takes part in, or does not report hazing, may face a fine of up to \$3,000 and a one-year prison term. The allegations of hazing at Phi Gamma Pi come within one week of the Sept. 29 death of Massachusetts Institute of Technology fraternity pledge Scott Krueger. The freshman went into an alcohol-induced coma after binge drinking at the Phi Gamma Delta

house on The Fenway. Fraternity members at Northeastern said recently that hazing occurs to a much lesser degree on NU's campus. "We do our best to follow school regulations," said Dave Vellasco, president of Kappa Sigma, who added that initiation "rituals" are standard nationwide. Vellasco said Kappa Sigma performs standard initiations, which all pledges and brothers must swear not to disclose. He added that there have been no hazing complaints from past pledges. David Lemasa, president of Alpha Kappa Sigma and public relations chair of the Interfraternity Council, said NU is a model for Greek communities. "You see students at other schools showing signs of sleep deprivation, you don't see that here," Lemasa said. "But you do at the UNHs and Virginias of the world."

**UK, BG rivals on soccer field**

There is no love lost between the UK and Bowling Green State men's soccer programs.

When the Cats joined the Mid-American Conference two years ago, they faced the Falcons for the first time. The two teams played to a scoreless tie at Cage Field, then met again at the MAC Tournament.

In the second round of the tourney, UK played a man down for almost 50 minutes. Last year, the nailbiters were nowhere to be seen.

"Last year, they handed us our lunch two times," UK head coach Ian Collins said. "Ever since that first game, it has become a pretty good rivalry."

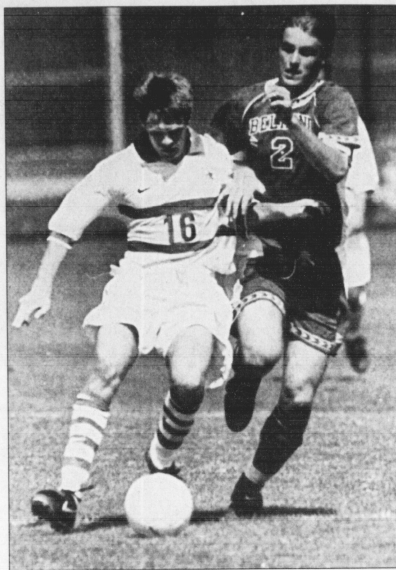
UK traveled to Mickey Cochran Field and lost 3-0 in early October. Then, once again, the teams met in the MAC Tournament. This time, the contest was not nearly as close.

In the MAC Championship game, UK lost 4-0 in OT. The Cats were once again a man down, on BG's home field, and were without one of their senior leaders, Greg Lobring, who was injured earlier in the year.

"I think they did some things at the end of that game to try to humiliate us, and I think our players remember that," Collins said. "Ever since that game last year, I've been looking forward to this game."

Ever since the Cats joined the MAC, BG has been their biggest conference rival. Collins chalks it up to mutual respect rather than a matter of hatred.

"I think you can respect someone, but that doesn't mean you have to love them," Collins said.

Indeed, some of the players feel Bowling Green might have taken it upon themselves to embarrass the Cats in last year's championship game.

"We're really fired up for this game (tomorrow)," Schuer said. "The last time we played them, they kind of embarrassed us, and we're coming out (tomorrow) to try and get some revenge on that."

Players that have faced BG before know what to expect. Senior Brien Baltzell has played in all four contests and wants nothing more than to finally be able to beat the team, currently ranked

16th in the NSCAA poll.

"It's going to be a great game," Baltzell said. "My sophomore year, we felt like we outplayed them twice. We're thinking this year is going to be our year."

However, for all the respectful talk from Collins, don't expect it to be tea and crumpets between the two teams. The Falcons currently lead the MAC in number of penalty cards, and play a physical game.

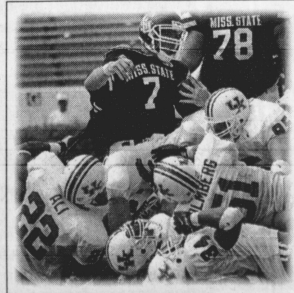

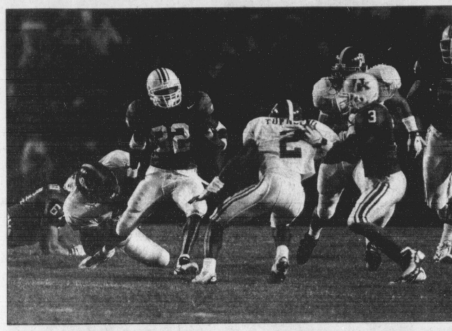

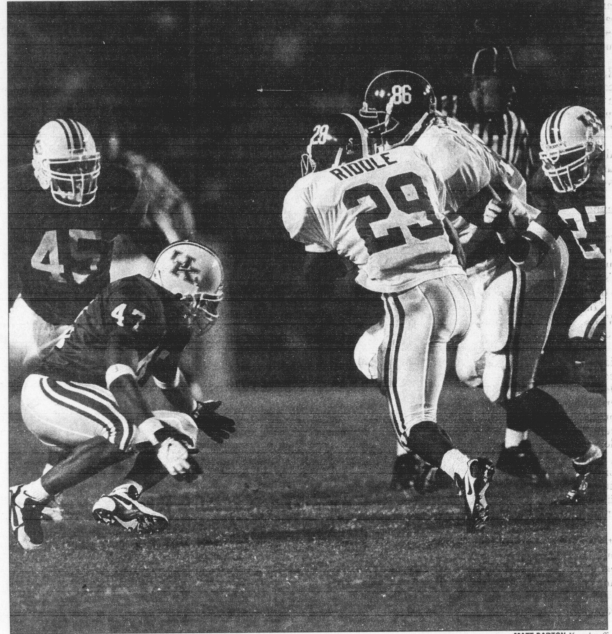
# 'Cocks riding Wright track

There's a right way and a wrong way.  
 For the South Carolina offense, there isn't a choice. The only way is the "Wright" way.  
 Anthony Wright's way.  
 With a multitude of weapons in his arsenal, Wright is the general responsible for leading the offensive attack of his troops down the field.  
 "He can hurt you in many ways," UK cornerback Littleton Ward said.  
 Ward pretty much summed it up.  
 Wright has a cannon for an arm with the ability to throw the long ball to his receivers.  
 "The best player on their football team is their quarterback," UK defensive backs coach Tim Keane said. "If you've ever seen him throw the football, good Lord, he's one of the best there is."  
 However, Wright's quickness and agility out of the pocket makes opposing defenses even more fearful of his style.  
 "He's just like a running back," UK linebacker Bob Holmberg said.  
 "He's probably the quickest quarterback we've faced all year. I hate playing against those types of quarterbacks. They're dangerous."  
 The combination of his passing capabilities, decision-making and field vision creates a Jeff Blake-type quarterback to stop.  
 "Now when he starts running around, he's very shifty," Keane said.  
 "He's like a snake because he's hard to catch."  
 Offensive-minded USC head coach Brad Scott is used to a player of Wright's abilities at the quarterback spot.



Before being hired as the head coach at South Carolina, Scott was Bobby Bowden's offensive coordinator at Florida State from 1990-94 where he coached ex-Seminole QB Charlie Ward.  
 "We're very pleased with his abilities there at the quarterback position," Scott said. "He does put some pressure on the defenses with his running skills as well as throwing the ball very well this year."  
 Wright, a native of Vanceboro, N.C. said he still is waiting for the big game this season, like when he threw for 351 yards against Mississippi State in 1996.  
 "This far in the Gamecocks' season, Wright is averaging 224.4 passing yards per game.  
 The impressive statistic in the South Carolina passing game is that Wright has thrown nine

touchdown passes compared to only four interceptions.  
 In 1996, he threw only eight scoring strikes with six interceptions, two of which came in his big game versus Mississippi State.  
 "I don't think I've had a breakout game this year," Wright said. "I'm still waiting for the breakout game."  
 "I'm just trying to play within myself."  
 His lack of a breakout game could be due to the absence of a USC ground attack.  
 The lack of production from sophomore tailback Troy Hambrick in the running game has forced the Cocks to rely on the pass more this season.  
 "It's put more pressure on our passing game," Wright said.  
 Scott said Wright has played well so far but believes a more bal-

anced offense would further the skills of his signal-caller.  
 "If we can get a little bit more of a mix in our attack, I think that is certainly going to help him," Scott said.  
 "We can utilize his skills even better."  
 "I think one of our backs is going to need to step it up," Wright said. "(Our offense) is capable of scoring a lot of points when we're clicking on all cylinders."  
 Scott said as the South Carolina season wears on, Wright will only improve as he takes more snaps in game action.  
 "I think as he continues, as the year goes on he'll get more confidence and more and more experience," Scott said. "We think Anthony is right on target right now."

**Bobo no boo-boo**  
 Mike Bobo scoffed at the notion of being ranked higher than Peyton Manning.  
 There it is, though, in black and white. The top-rated passer in the Southeastern Conference is Georgia's senior quarterback, the one who has guided the No. 13 Bulldogs to their first 4-0 start since 1982.  
 "Sure, I'm rated higher statistically," Bobo said. "But everybody knows he's the best quarterback in the nation. I'm not trying to go out there trying to complete more passes or throw for more yards than Peyton Manning."  
 Bobo enters Saturday's game against No. 9 Tennessee with a much better rating than the Vols' Manning.  
 "It doesn't even enter my mind that I'm going to go out there and try to outperform Peyton Manning," Bobo said. "That's hard to do and I'm not even thinking about that."  
**Tigers regrouping for Gators**  
 Florida is ranked No. 1 in the nation, averaging five touchdown passes and nearly 50 points a game. Pretty scary, LSU coach Gerry DiNardo admits. But that's not his biggest worry.  
 "What's been on my mind more than Florida is how we can get our team to play hard again," he said. "How to get our team to play with emotion. I didn't think we played with much emotion against Vandy. How to execute the offense, defense and kick game better than we did against Vandy."  
 Just a year ago LSU was undefeated, ranked No. 11 and heading for Florida, certain it could play with the big boys. The Gators denied that trying to complete more passes or throw for more yards than Peyton Manning.  
 This year LSU is ranked 14th. However, after losing to Auburn and dropping out of first place in the SEC Western Division, the Tigers barely made it past Vanderbilt, a team they expected to handle easily.  
 The difference in play from game to game, or even series to series, has DiNardo questioning the performance he can expect Saturday night against Florida (5-0, 3-0).  
 "I think if our Mississippi State team shows up and our Auburn team shows up — except for the last three minutes on defense — I think we've got a football game on our hands," DiNardo said.

# Freshman duo learning quickly

Both are probable starters for Saturday's game against South Carolina.

They are Hal Mumme's young guns on offense — Jermaine White and Derek Homer.

"You have to start over again," White said. "It's 'freshman do this, and freshman do that.'"

Homer started three of UK's first five games and played significant minutes in each. The running back has 100 yards rushing and 149 yards receiving. His learning curve was swift.

"All my hell was in camp," Homer said. "They are going to test you as a freshman, and I came in here Mr. Football, so the older guys wanted to see what I was about."

The Wildcat halfback responded to the rite of passage with 103 yards receiving in UK's 40-34 win over Alabama.

It highlights the Fort Knox runner's first season so far.

"It was wild, because I used to watch them on TV," Homer said of Alabama. "When you get introduced to play the Crimson Tide, it's a great moment. To beat them is that much more."

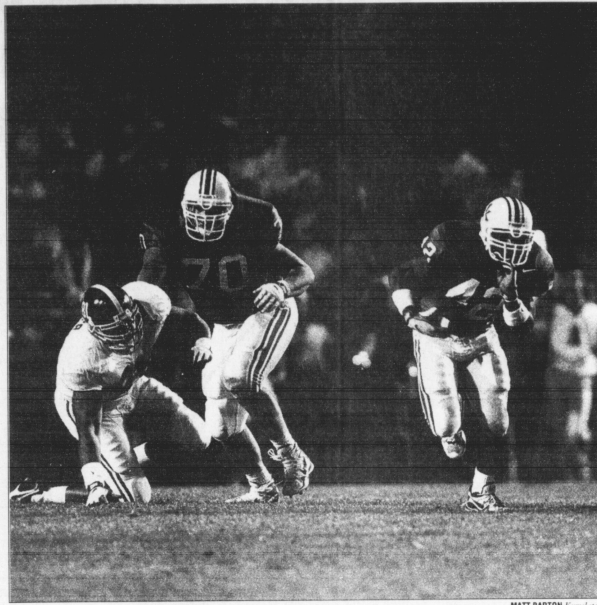
His freshman counterpart, White, is being thrown to the wolves this weekend.

White could start his first collegiate game, replacing injured receiver Kio Sanford, who hobbled around practice in pads yesterday with a sprained ankle. Sanford is still eligible to play under team rules, but his limp was visible.

White caught one ball this season in limited playing time, but the 6-foot-6 receiver offers UK quarterback Tim Couch a sizable target.

"I don't really think about (starting my first game)," White said. "I have just been getting ready in practice for when my time comes."

The UK freshman from Gainesville, Fla., was heavily

recruited by South Carolina. He said he always wanted to play at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia, S.C.

"I don't think it is as big a deal as it would have been had I not played this season, but I have been in every game," White said. "For me, I'm expected to perform like a senior as a freshman. We're expected to grow up real quick."

Homer said he talked to White about the challenge.

"I told him to just go out there and do his job," Homer said. "He has the talent. The coaches will

have him prepared. He just has to do what he's capable of."

For Homer, the Southeastern Conference road test is one of the main reasons he chose UK. He said playing in the SEC means playing against the best every week, and he loved shocking Alabama.

"I came in here in the summertime, and I looked down our team list," he added. "I felt coming into this year that we'd do better than people expected. We didn't know what to expect, so how could people in the SEC?"

Going into their road tilt with the Gamecocks (2-3, 0-3 SEC), the Wildcats are 3-2 overall and 1-2 in conference. For the first time since 1993, the Cats are fighting for a bowl berth.

According to Homer and White, that chance has the team attitude electric.

"It's great to be on this team as a freshman," White said. "It seems as if the whole team is young and going to play together for a long time. It's great to have success now, because we know we're only going to get better."

# UK men's tennis diving into strong southern tourney

No. 6 Wildcats looking to prove ranking valid

The saying goes, "Cats are afraid of water."

One exception: The Wildcats are not the least bit scared to dive into one of the deepest pools of talent in the country.

That is to say the No. 6 UK men's tennis team is ready to show the nation what it is all about this weekend in the Southern Interscholastic Tournament.

The tourney is being hosted in Athens, Ga., by No. 4 Georgia and includes other powerhouses such as No. 5 Mississippi, No. 7 LSU, No. 8 Duke, No. 10 Florida, No. 21 Alabama and other prominent southern schools.

"The Southern Collegiate tournament is probably the best tournament in the South every year," UK coach Dennis Emery said.

"We are ready to start another year with our players and begin to reestablish ourselves on the collegiate scene."

Emery has all of his players back except last season's No. 25 Ludde Sundin, who graduated. And senior Dan Spaner is out for at least most of the fall season due to mononucleosis.

The Cats still have plenty of talent left in senior Cedric Kauffmann (No. 7), who made it to the finals of the first grand slam tournament of the year last weekend, and senior Marcus Fluitt (No. 47).

"We have a possibility of getting a much higher ranking," Fluitt said. "Coming back sixth in the nation does not mean anything unless we do something with it.

We have to prove ourselves again. We have got everybody's attention, but everybody still wants to beat us. This tournament should tell us where we stand from the beginning."

One of the big sparks in the spring season was Carlos Drada. The 22-year-old Colombian brings a lot of experience to the team since he played in professional tournaments before coming to Lexington last spring.

Last season Emery said Drada would "do for UK tennis what Derek Anderson did for UK basketball."

"I have been working on playing with stronger emotion this season," Drada said. "We have been practicing really hard and we need to go out there and show that we can beat anybody."

Drada's teammate from Bradenton Academy, junior Ariel Gaitan, brings a lot of consistency and skill to the table for the Cats. Last year he played in the top six all year long and won the H.H. Downing Fall Classic Championship in the fall.


"I am looking forward to the tournament this weekend," Gaitan said. "Over the summer I have gotten my serve bigger and improved on my movement. It hurts us that Dan is out for a while but we have to try to do our best."

Yohan Hessou (No. 95), a sophomore transfer from Troy State, also is expected to contribute in his first tournament as a Cat. The Sweden native seems to be cool and confident going into this weekend's tournament, despite coming from a mediocre team to a top 10 team such as UK.

"There's no real pressure on me," Hessou said. "I am just going to take one year at a time. I should do well this weekend; I have been playing really well in practice. I am just going to take it one match at a time."



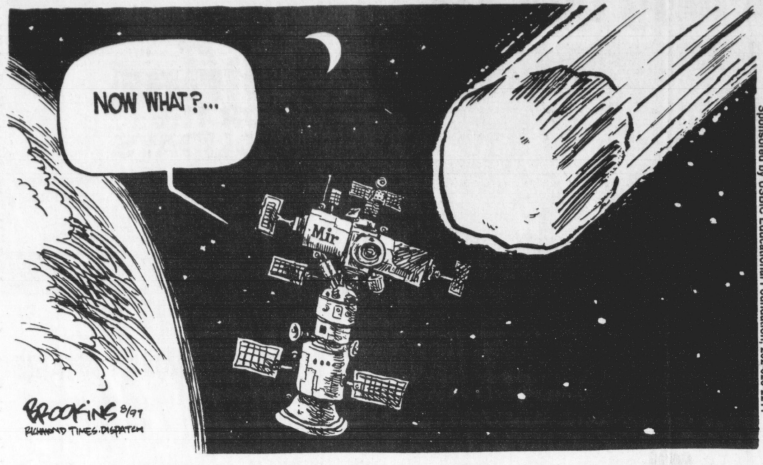

## It's about time!

There is light at the end of the tunnel for plus/minus grading. Of course, we thought the same thing last spring when the issue was tossed around and a final vote delayed. The handling of this issue has been inexcusable, and the University Senate owes an apology to the students and faculty.

There is no reason for educated and mature adults to have dragged out something this important for more than two years.

This is especially distressing when the time and energies wasted on a relatively simple issue could have been spent on more important matters such as University Studies requirements, the quality of required courses and the overall quality of classroom instruction.

This Monday, the debates and the hand-wringing end as the Senate considers three possible grading scales for use in every undergraduate college.

The first option is a whole letter system with no plus/minus grades and the second option is known as a GPA Neutral system. It allows professors to assign plus/minus grades that are not computed into a student's grade point average. A third option

is a true plus/minus system that counts in the GPA. GPA Neutral is a nifty compromise and nothing more. It will foster confusion and frustration for professors and students as they struggle to find meaning in meaningless grades.

In fact, such a system could harm pre-law students because the plus/minus marks will be computed as true plus/minus grades by law schools regardless of UK's wishes to the contrary.

As for the true plus/minus option, students have repeatedly voiced opposition to this system and a failure to find consensus on it after two years is proof enough that it's time to move on and return the University to a whole letter grade system.

If professors are worried about grade inflation, then they should bite the bullet and hold students to a higher standard that doesn't give out A's and B's to just anyone. Not only is such accountability long overdue, but it's far superior to the quick fix of plus/minus grading.

# Learning the ways of love

## Larson gives insight into relationships

Jeff Larson gave a lecture last night in the Student Center entitled "Strengthening Marriage Through Better Listening." The focus of the lecture was to introduce methods of improving couple communication.

Larson received his Ph. D. from Texas Tech University in 1980, and has since taught at Montana State and the University of Florida.

Larson currently is a professor of marriage and family therapy at Brigham Young University and has been married for 25 years.

"I attribute the success of my marriage to the good communication between my wife and me," Larson said.

Larson admitted it is difficult for couples to listen to each other. He said 85 percent of married couples who go to counseling do

so because they are unable to communicate.

"Most couples never truly listen to each other," he said.

"The listening cycle will teach people to communicate within their relationships."

Larson said the cycle consisted of five steps.

The first step is to "attend," which is done by being attentive.

The second step is to "acknowledge."

"You can just nod your head," Larson said.

"Anything to let your partner know that you are following what they are saying."

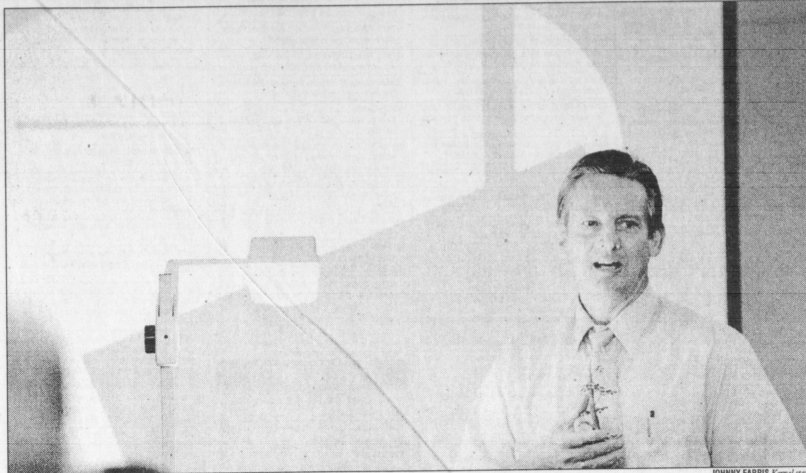
The third step in the listening cycle, he said, is to "invite" by asking partners to further explain their thoughts on the topic. The next step is to "summarize" by paraphrasing what your spouse has said.

And finally, "ask." Larson said asking open-ended questions is crucial so no confusion exists in the relationship.

Larson said following these steps can be awkward.

"At first, it may be like taking piano lessons," he said. "You are overwhelmed by all the keys and are not sure when to hit which

"It can be a struggle to remember when to nod or how to word questions."

Larson assured everyone that following the steps of the cycle will become second nature with practice, just as hitting the correct keys on the piano.

Larson will be teaching UK graduate students in marriage and

family counseling for a two-day seminar. The seminar will give the students insight into Larson's communication and listening methods so they can counsel others.

Larson also gave advice for the strengthening of a marriage.

"When dealing with a conflict, discuss a date and time in which

you both will be open to exchange your ideas," he said. "Decide ahead of time what you want to accomplish by the end of the discussion."

"To gain understanding, you need to put your own concerns temporarily on hold, so as to give full attention to your partner's problems."

"I think that Larson's approach to couples communication is a well grounded approach to solving problems," said Dr. Brian Jory, acting director of the marriage and family therapy program and the family center on campus.

"Larson did a fine job of telling the basics."

volunteer leadership group will consist mostly of UK alumni, students and friends, will be the people who will actually conduct the campaign. Bailey estimates this campaign will last from three to five years.

"Students aren't aware of the role of development in general; they only hear about it when they build the library," said Jason Kuhlman, an integrated strategic communications senior and president of the Student Development Council. "The University as a whole would not be what it is today without the large number of private donations that come in the form of \$100 here, \$50 there."

Students should care, he said, because this campaign — if successful — could give their degrees more prestige.

"It makes their degree a little more valuable," Kuhlman said. "Of course to facilitate this, you've got to have the money. Tuition and state allocation is only going to cover so much. Usually what that does cover is the more mundane, basic operations of the University."

"Fundraising at the University is very elaborate and very widespread. There are lots of very rich people out there that, for them, UK has a very special place in their heart. I wouldn't see the cost of this campaign trickling down into student dollars."

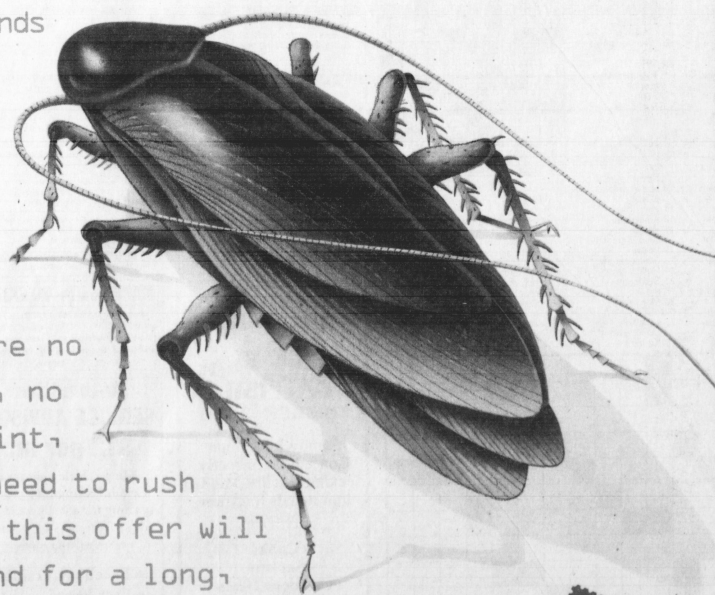

"I had heard rumors about (the gathering), but I was struck by how diverse the crowd was, people from all walks of life," said Joe Schuler, executive director of academic affairs for Student Government Association.

SGA President Melanie Cruz vetoed a bill last week that would have given \$1,648 to the UK Promise Keepers' trip to the Washington gathering. The bill was unconstitutional, she said, because it supported an organization that discriminates against women, a violation of the association's by-laws. The event, "Stand in the Gap," supposedly excluded women from attending, but UK Promise Keepers President Josh Walton said, "there were a lot of women at the conference."

Walton said many wives support the organization because of its emphasis on bringing back family values like fidelity and responsibility. He said women's groups who criticize the group's movement as chauvinist have it all wrong.

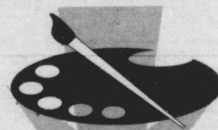

# Pinball wizard

UK Theatre season starts with musical

"See me. Feel me. Touch me. Heal me."

UK Theatre opens its 1997-98 season today with The Who's classic rock opera, *Tommy*.

*Tommy* tells the story of a boy struck deaf, dumb, and blind after witnessing the murder of his mother's lover by his father, who is presumed dead. Throughout his childhood, the title character is relentlessly tormented by his uncle and cousin, and generally shunned by society. His family searches far and wide for a cure for him, but it's eventually the game of pinball that brings him out of his dark, silent world.

Director John Loschman believes *Tommy* speaks to the typical college student. "Students in college age are just beginning their journey. Watching *Tommy* deal with his obstacles will cause reflection," Loschman said. "It's about finding your inner strength and believing and trusting in yourself. Until we can do that, we can't open ourselves to others. You have two choices in life: You can either move on or let yourself be pushed back."

*Tommy* overcomes many hurdles to become the person he is in the end of the performance. Loschman played the role of Tommy in a production in San Francisco in the early '70s. That production was very focused on Tommy's growth as a person, and Loschman welcomed the opportunity to direct his own version of it at UK. "Having lived life since then gives me more insight into the play."

This version differs from the expected Broadway presentation of *Tommy*. Typically, the Broadway version presents the play as a high-tech musical, with lots of flashy production numbers and special effects.

Loschman instead chose to focus on the emotional discovery that Tommy experiences. Rather

than having the play based in reality, it takes a slightly surreal turn and moves the viewer to use their imagination. While there is a lot of dance and movement involved, it's in a more organic and less staged form than you see in many traditional musicals.

There is no set time period for the play, and the costumes are contemporary and sleek, almost as if they are yanked off the pages of *GQ* or *Vogue*. The set is simple, and allows the viewer to imagine space, rather than giving definite guidelines of "this should go there, that belongs here."

Think of it as MTV meets Broadway: You have rock music telling a story in a highly visual form, like most rock videos. There is room for interpretation by the audience, and viewers are pulled in and become a part of the action.

The rock music, played by a rock band on stage with the actors, also appeals to a younger audience.

The Broadway version tuned the rock aspect down a bit, opting instead for more traditional strings and the like. This production is a return to the roots of the show, and rock is at the very

core of it all. One scene that will particularly intrigue college-age viewers is the scene where a young Tommy experiences an acid trip as part of an attempted cure for his deafness and blindness. As Tommy feels the effects of the drug, the movement, lighting and sound take a turn toward the fantastic. People become toys to Tommy, and the world is a bright, noisy place unlike one he has ever imagined. The audiences will have their senses of sight and sound challenged by this scene.

The actors think they've gained a lot from this show, and that it will appeal to the UK audience. Another theater senior Erika Schmelzer added that the director "conveys his creativity so well that he has helped us take this production to the next level."

Theater sophomore Betsy Albert gave one more reason the show will have definite appeal for UK students, "It's all about sex, drugs, and rock 'n' roll."

# Cale comes to UK

Former Velvet star to perform tomorrow night

John Cale will grace the Singletary Center Friday. He'll be arriving from Holland, where he has spent four days rehearsing all new material.

The arrangement: Cale on piano, BJ Cole on steel guitar, and an anonymous string player, possibly from the Soldier Quartet.

Tomorrow night at 8 p.m., he'll give Lexington a unique, one-time performance of sound and melody that no one else in the world may hear.

More on that in a bit. First, John Cale, the musician.

He was a piano prodigy from the Welsh hills and invaded the States by courtesy of a Leonard Bernstein scholarship.

His most pronounced pimple on the public consciousness is his role as a founding member of the Velvet Underground.

On the first two VU records John Cale was an integral part of the sound and song writing.

His erudite screw-you approach to rock 'n' roll, combined with Reed's romantic sadness, skewed the stakes for challenging, inventive rock forever afterward.

But history didn't end in 1968, when Reed kicked Cale out for being too strong of a voice.

John went on to help create the first goth sounds on Nico's *The Marble Index*. He sowed punk seeds with his production of the first Stooges album. In the '70s he began his massive (and massively obscure) solo career, generating a body of work that ranged from minimalist piano compositions to "ethy, manly"

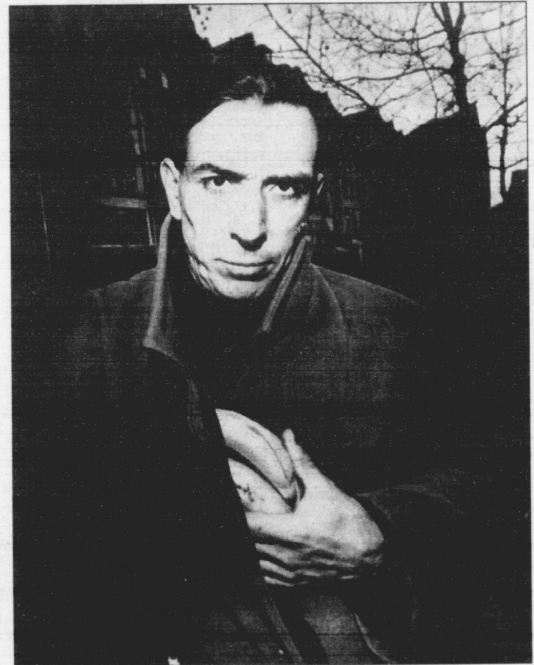

rock which gave birth to much of the snarling punk staging.

His performances were enacted with a bloodlust unexpected in a classically-trained piano player.

The 1980s saw a quieter, infinitely more disturbing Cale, edging away from the then-overblown punk craze in search of new ventures, creating *Music For a New Society* and protesting against the Falkland Islands War.

He ushered in New Wave with his Spy record label, not to mention more production for bands like Siouxsie and the Banshees.

His solo work again bridged the gap between composition and rock, making scores of film scores in addition to "pop" albums by himself and with Lou Reed and Brian Eno.

But that's only a nugget of John Cale history. For me, personally, the man's music speaks volumes more than any list of achievements.

Pick almost any record by him and you'll find he's twisted and played with all conventions. Tense, gutsy rock with more intestinal fortitude than most big-balls guitar metal-wank

albums get sublimely arranged. He can create efficacious moments of horror through nasty, primal riffs.

John Cale is the Joseph Conrad of rock.

That isn't all, though. Another delight of a Cale album is the depth and dimension it carries. Every recording has its own lush brightness. "Sylvia Said" and "Emily" top my all-time list of gorgeous, melancholic love songs. "Fear Is a Man's Best Friend" expresses a deep-felt anxiety. He did a desperate, hungry justice to "Heartbreak Hotel" that Elvis could have never achieved in all his cheese appeal.

One of Cale's most fascinating and endearing aspects is his constant change and experimentation, something I respect above all else. As one of rock's innovators he understands that change is how the genre survives and adapts.

His recent work has flipped between Cajun country, Moroccan percussives, film scores and noisy psychological profiles.

No, Cale won't be performing his greatest hits or Velvet Underground tunes tomorrow night, and that's fine by me.

The prospect of hearing a brand-new work composed especially for Lexington has to be one of the more exciting events of the year.

Missing it would be a criminal act.

# The Great Outdoors

## A practical guide to local camping

When the great outdoors comes to mind, most think of big mountains, lakes, wild animals and places that are way too far away. Not quite. The great state of Kentucky offers numerous places to experience the natural side of life.

The Daniel Boone National Forest stretches 690,000 acres and over 21 counties in Kentucky. The forest offers 554 miles of hiking trails and allows all types of camping.

The Red River Gorge is often the most thought of and traveled spot in the Daniel Boone National Forest. Its locale is convenient for UK students and its numerous arches are some of the most aesthetically appealing in the state.

Rock Bridge in the Gorge is one of my favorite spots for hiking. All the arches are impressive but a creek flows under this one," said Mel Dean, a non-degree student.

The Red River Gorge spans 26,000 acres of the Daniel Boone National Forest and is used by 500,000 people annually. The Gorge is famous for its arches and rock houses.

These houses offer unique places to hike, camp and

explore. It's also one of the most popular places for rock climbing in the Eastern United States.

However, with all this attention problems have arisen.

"People are loving it to death," said Jorge Hesel, Dispersal Recreation specialist.

The Gorge has the highest death rate among the parks with an annual number of about 104, Hesel said. Hesel also said it has the highest number of rescues per year at about 63.

"It's (the Gorge) being used beyond its capacity. It's highly used. If people just want to get away from other people they need to go somewhere else," Hesel said.

Hesel suggests people explore other parts of the Daniel Boone National Forest, which are just as beautiful.

One option to explore is the Shelovoe Trace National Recreation Trail. This trail stretches a 269-mile range across the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Shelovoe means Big Turtle and the name was adopted by the Shawnee Indians. This trail hits many highlights throughout the forest. It passes through the Big South Fork National Bridge and includes the five Kentucky wild rivers.

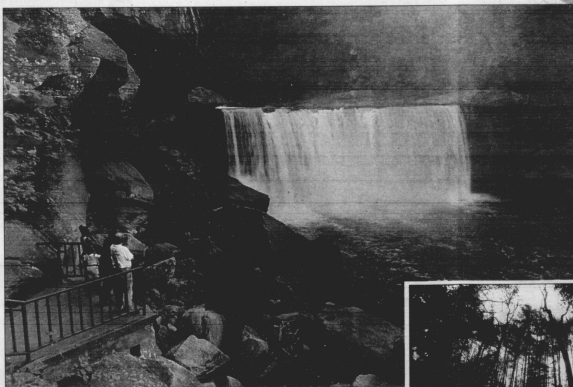

**FALL TIME** Cumberland Falls (above) is one of the many scenic camp sights within a day's drive.

The Big South Fork National Recreation Area is also another viable option. South Fork is located in southern Kentucky and northern Tennessee.

It offers hiking, primitive and established camping, hunting and fishing, as well as mountain biking and other outdoor activities.

South Fork is also known for its exclusion.

"I can hop on the trail at any given time and not see another person for three days," said Greg Gues, a forestry junior.

Popular areas to visit in the South Fork are the John Muir Overlook, Yahoo Falls and the Steady Creek area.

Cave Run Lake covers 8,270 acres and is located 15 miles south of Morehead. It offers camping as well as water activities.

Camping is permitted in almost every area of Daniel Boone National Forest without registering as long as campers follow the rules.

Basic etiquette brings such slogans as "Pack it in, Pack it out" and "Leave no trace" to mind. Other appropriate guidelines can be found at any ranger's station.

Inexperienced hikers and campers are advised to stop at the ranger's station to learn about the area, as well as learn about new places to explore.

There are seven district offices through the forest located in many different spots.

Anyone can contact the ranger's station for information and maps on hiking and camping.

The AISDA Forest Service

can be reached at (606) 745-3100 or be written to at 1700 By-Pass Rd., Winchester, Ky., 40391.

UK also offers a center to get acquainted with local hiking and camping.

The Outing Center, located in the student center, rents equipment to students or faculty on a weekend or weekly rate. Equipment such as tents, sleeping bags, backpacks and stoves can be found here.

"We have a lot of information about where to go camping and about other outdoor activities," said Chris Bingham, an employee of the Outing Center and a non-degree undeclared graduate student.

The outdoor type can enjoy endless acres of camping, hiking, hunting, or mountain biking at their own backyard.

# Not too 'Old' to rock

## Dallas band set to rock Lexington

When the chugging clickity-clack of the Old 97's locomotive-like rhythm section comes through the speakers, one can't help but wonder about the band's name.

The Old 97's, who will be appearing at Lynagh's tonight with Chicago band Mount Pilot, took its moniker from a 1906 train-wreck ballad, "The Wreck of the Old 97." Earlier this year, the band released a stunning collection of relentlessly driven songs on its major label debut, *Too Far To Care*.

The Dallas quartet, one of many bands that has been lumped into the "Cowpunk" category, are one of the few that pull it off convincingly.

"We went into the studio looking to show more of what we sound like as a band," explains bassist Murry Hammond.

"Our first two records were twangier, sort of because we recorded them in home studios. This time, we had better technology, and we had a rock producer in Wally Gagel, and I think it gave a better representation of the band's sound, which is rock 'n' roll."

Rock 'n' roll with an unquestionable touch of Texas twang, that is. *Too Far To Care* is one of the better records of 1997, chock full of scorching rock tunes and the occasional lilting ballad.

The band's songs run the dynamic gamut, from the explosive "Timebomb," to the quiet wrecked-relationship song,

"Salome." The 97's also stray into unusual territory with the ultra-twangy homage to the West Texas badlands, "W. Tx Teardrops," and the all-out punk frenzy of the closing track, "Four Leaf Clover."

With such an array of styles at its expense, you would think the Old 97's could avoid being labeled "Cowpunk" or "Insurgent Country" or whatever. Alas, the music industry today seems to thrive on fitting bands neatly into categories.

"We know that we're stuck in that group because we incorporate some country things into our songs, but it's kinda silly that the media uses the same old generalizations across the board," Hammond said.

For example, the assumption that all alt-country bands owe their sound to the seminal post-punk country band Uncle Tupelo?

"Exactly. To be perfectly honest, I'd never heard an Uncle Tupelo song until a year ago. That stuff just isn't my cup of tea," Hammond said. "I challenge someone to go into our records and show me where we sound like them. We basically grew up listening to that '70s arena-rock, and some Johnny Cash and Merle Haggard on the side."

Despite incessant touring in support of *Too Far To Care* the Old 97's have found time to work on a project that it just couldn't pass up.

"We just recorded a single with Waylon Jennings. It was basically us playing while he sang. It was real cool. He saw us and liked us, and the rest is history, I guess." The single should be out by the end of the year.

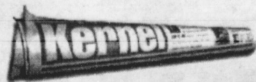

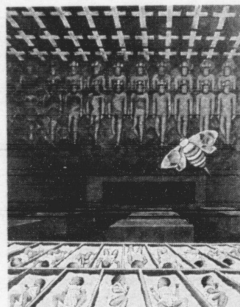

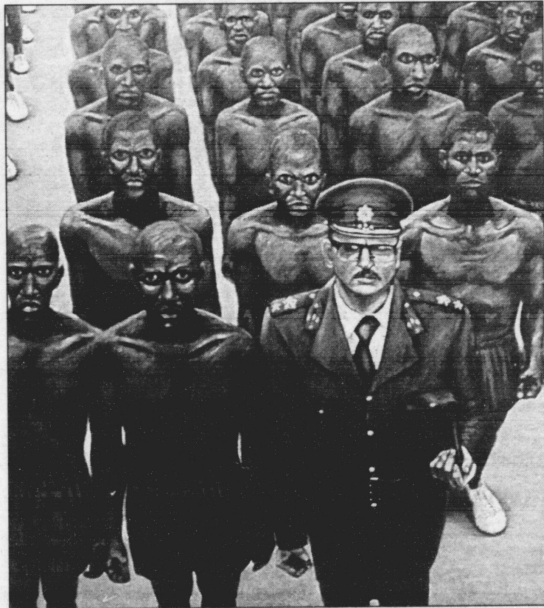

They read like apocalyptic postcards from Van Gogh.

All of the sudden a person with a head made of broccoli who is supposed to resemble George Bush falls into the mix.

Welcome to the world of Chris Huestis.

Huestis, a faculty member from the UK College of Architecture, will show his collection

*Dreamscapes: Dreams from sleeping, daydreaming, thinking* at UK's Rasdall Gallery (257 Student Center) through Oct. 29.

The show contains everything from social/political satire to vegetable-headed people.

Huestis lived in New York and Washington, D.C., before coming to Lexington. The influence is apparent in such works as "Bitburg," a cynical look at Ronald Reagan mistakenly honoring a war memorial for S.S. Nazi troops, and "Nancy in The Subway" an oil painting of a subway scene Huestis witnessed while living in New York.

"I was doing a take-off of the 'Scream' by Edward Monk," suggests Huestis of his painting

depicting Nancy Reagan's face in the bottom corner.

Ronald Reagan isn't the only president in Huestis' collection.

"I've done every president from Kennedy to Clinton. I did LBJ in the seventh grade, but I didn't know much about him. I

just knew he had big ears and a big nose. He was sort of a character all to himself."

While Huestis continues to paint presidents, he thinks today's political figures are not as interesting. "They don't, make

politicians like that any more, I mean look at Gore, he's just so boring and clean-cut."

Many of his works also deal with civil-rights. Photographs of Nelson Mandela, large masses of people being engulfed in a huge fire in front of the White House, lynching of a black man, and many others all capture Huestis' unique perspective on politics. "I let the image tell me what it wants."

On the lighter side of things are Huestis' vegetable paintings. He was influenced to do this by reading the book *The Decline of the West* by Oswald Spangler.

"I made certain people in life different fruits, such as a priest that's a pumpkin and a cop that's an apple.

"One time when Don McLean played in Lexington he asked me to do a 'Ms. American Pie' for his song 'American Pie' and I did."

As part of the exhibit there will be reception tomorrow from 6 p.m.-9 p.m. featuring Huestis, which will include free concessions.

Other events scheduled during the exhibit are a poetry reading by Joe Wegrzyn, an English department faculty member, on Monday at 7:30 p.m., and a Gallery talk with Huestis on Wednesday at 7 p.m.

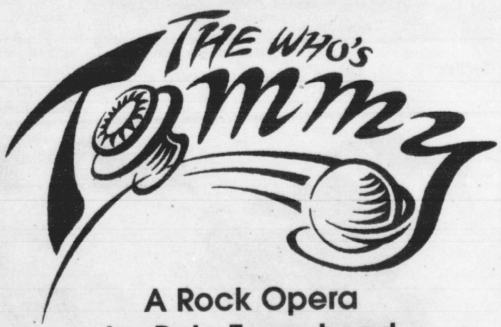
**Mondo**

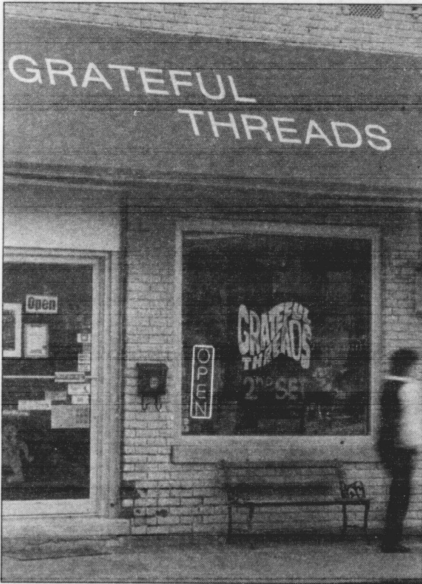

"It's a really great store with a lot of unique merchandise you can't find anywhere else," said Patti Ruhl, an accounting junior

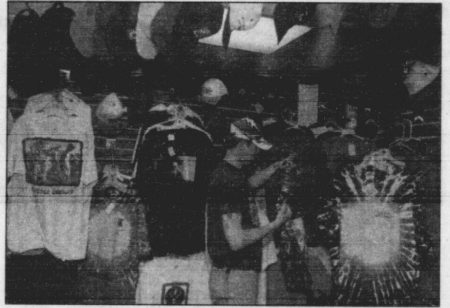
and a frequent visitor to Grateful Threads.

"It's a great way to keep the music and spirit alive," Stambough said, remembering the band is important because of the way it moved people. "The Grateful Dead had a stigma of being a drug band, but it was more than that.

It's about peace, love, taking care of the earth and being together. It's one place I felt totally accepted no matter what I looked like."

Grateful Threads helps keep a unique type of music and movement alive by helping people remember and learn about the band.

One of the most asked questions: Why is Jerry missing a finger? (A wood chopping accident from his childhood.)

"Grateful Threads is a great place to come and remember the band and exchange tour stories and memories," Stambough said.
