Expert: Options confusing

An expert on health-care reform said yesterday that too many Amer-icans lack health insurance because they can't afford it or because they don't understand the myriad options available to them

"Politicians tend to think in pro-"Politicians tend to think in pro-gram budgers and taxes rather than overall welfare," said Prian Dowd, an associate professor in the Insti-tute for Health Services Research at the University of Minnesota. Dowd addressed a group of about 30 people yesterday afternoon in the College of Business and Eco-nomics Building during his speech "Health-care Reform and the Role of Government."

reauth-care Reform and the Role of Government."

He addressed overall health-care issues, including views of the current market status, conditions for a healthy market and potential problems in operations.

outlined problems health care as the current cost, the individual and small group market, the many uninsured and federal expenditures in the area.

Currently, health insurance costs are approaching the same percentage as the average mortgage, which Dowd said is too high for a family of four with both parents working income averaging \$20,000 a year.

Individual and small group mar-kets do not protect consumers from being refused coverage or having their risk redefined and their premi-



ums increased, he said.

Dowd also said that federal expenditures in the area of health care have increased 2,222 percent from 1980 to 1990.

The solution to these problems lies in the areas of efficiency and fairness, he said.

Current markets create inefficient means of dispensing health-care coverage and services. The public seems to have two views on why markets do not work. markets do not work.

Neglect and resistance to change

Neglect and resistance to change are reasons for market difficulties, while others feel the current system can never work, Dowd said. Dowd said there are several nec-essary conditions for maintaining a healthy market, including better in-formation, improved entry ability for new firms and need-reflecting premiums.

premiums.

One way to improve the health-care market would be to introduce more "pool plans," he said.


Pool plans involve grouping together large numbers of people who otherwise would search for health care as individuals or in small groups.

Several health-care, plans, could

Several health-care plans could be offered within each pool that would match needs of members.

Keeneland residents evacuated from hall

More than 290 Keeneland Hall residents were rushed from the building last night after several students on the first floor complained of eye, nose and throat irritation. Emergency personnel and UK Police arrived at the scene about 29.45 in response to a fire alarm at the residence hall. Moments later, the UK Environmental Quality Management team arrived to inspect the building for possible gas leaks.

John Lowry, director of the team.

John Lowry, director of the team, said at about 11:30 p.m. that no gaseous substances had been identified and that the building would remain evacuated throughout the evening. "We don't know what it is." Lowry said, "That's why we're not taking any chances."

He said environmental personnel would conduct a more extensive investigation into the source of the substance beginning at 6:30 this morning.

Keeneland's male residents were sent to Wildeat Lodge and Holmes Hall for the evening. Females were sent to Jewel and Boyd halls.

UK spokesman Ralph Derickson confirmed that at least one resident, a 21-year-old woman, was treated

at UK Hospital and released.

About 40 students had complained about irritation prior to the evacuation. Fifteen residents received first aid treatment on site.

Apparently, the irritating substance was first noticed by residents on the firsts floor of the building. Sammy Gillespie, an agricultural engineering sophomore who lives on the east end of Keeneland Hall, said his eyes and throat became irritated earlier in the evening and worsened as time progressed.

He said no one was able to identify the source of the colorless, odorless substance.

The Wildcats definitely need a brake job, judging by their finish in team defense in the Southeastern Conference (dead last).

One thing that worked at times for the Cats last season was the accelerator, which finished at a respectable sixth in the SEC in team offense, which included a national-time attack.



Bela's boys bring jazzy spacegrass to theater

It's not that four in the band was a crowd, but the departure of Howard Levy (keyboards/harmonica) has made this turn-of-the-21st-century musical unit into a tight three-piece band that just rears back its head and lets out its space-aged barbaric yawp.

Fleck and the Flecktones are making their second area appear-ance this year (They played earlier this month with Al DiMeola at Coyote's in Louisville, Ky.) tonight at 8 at the Kentucky Theatre.

While Levy left because of the band's exhausting 200-plus dates a year for the past three years, Fleck and brothers Wooten (Victor Lamonte, merely one of the best bass players on the planet and Roy "Future Man," who mans the synth-axe drumitar) have headed back into the studio and are working on album No. 4, a followup to Flight of the Cosmic Hippo, which spent time nesting at the top of the Billboard and Cashbox Contemporary Jazz charts.

Much akin to the group's last Lexington appearance (Flight of the Cosmic Hippo tour April '92 at the UK Student Center Grand Ballroom) where Fleck flogged out a load of tunes off the then unreleased UFO TOFU, the show to-



Play "Bigfoot," "Whitewater, "Scuttlebutt," "Metric Lips" o "Flying Saucer Dudes."

Only a Manhattan-born jazzman who learned his impeccable timing by listening to J.D. Crowe, and who's named after Hungarian com-poser Bela Bartok, could have such a twisted sense of song-title humor.

If the audience is real good Fleck may even get over "Life Without Elvis" by figuring out Lexington's "Yee-haw Factor." Or the audience may even get some "Sex in a Pan."

Bela Fleck and the Flecktones are performing tonight at 8 at the Kentucky Theatre. Tickets are \$12.50. According to the officials at the Theatre, there were around 20

night more than likely will feature a good portion of tunes that will appear on the upcoming release re-corded without the magic fingers of Levy.

Like Fleck's SRO Grand Ball-room performance, expect to be whirled away to another musical planet by the former Lexingtonian who slides down the neck of a vin-tage pre-war (1937 mahogany) Gib-son five-string with the same case that he careens the Deering Cross fire electric banjo into the crooks and crannies lying between jazz, bluegrass, be-bop and unexplored musical galaxies.

With such a talented and inventive musician as Levy missing, presumed having a good time at the homestead, it would be easy to sulk about the loss of a guy who often blew the harmonica while playing keyboards, played the pennywhise and used household objects like a coffee cup for effects on his harmonica.

But Fleck, who lived here from 1979 to 1981 and played in the band Spectrum before joining avant garde Nashville-based acoustic band New Grass Revival, isn't one to stop and smell the roses or the pizza.

The slide-wielding banjoist (see "Bonnie and Slyde" off *UFO TOFU*) and the Wooten brothers have churned out more than 20 new songs, which surely will get tried out on the Kentucky Theater audience.

However, the best part of Fleck's shows is the give and take between the artist and the fans. This is the guy who let a fan pick the name for his second album, Flight of the Cosmic Hippo.

But, perhaps even more fun than Fleck's melodious picking is Victor Wooten's bassic instincts and Fu-ture Man throwing down the wham-my bar on his drumitar while strolling the audience is getting to yell out requests to Fleck.

Straight Outta Ireland, a compilation CD released by Scotti Bros. Records, features some laddies who are green as can be, but are sure to be wishing that they can be included in yer celebrating.

Straight Outta Ireland features mostly unsigned bands from the emerald homeland, most o' whom would be thrilled to grab the attention of a record label or two and say "top o' the mornin' to ya!"

Like most compilation discs, Straight Outta Ireland has a few impressive entries, as well as a few disappointing ones. There are 11 tracks to choose from, each differ-ing in style and talent.

Ing in style and talent. The two best songs on the album are performed by two different bands who claim the same singer as their musical mentor. And who might that singer be, you ask? Why, that British vocalist of vocalists, Elvis Costello, me laddies.

But it is some pretty good progressive bands searchin' for that ever alluding pot o' gold at the end of the record deal. A few of these laddies have put forth a booty full o' well-written songs.

On Slowtown, Big Wheel proves to be doing its own thing and in a very diverse and pleasant way. Although most tracks are guitar-heavy and probably would fall into the popfrock category, there are a few songs that seem to be influenced by a touch of jazz. This element adds to the band's worth in that these slower, jazz influenced tracks are some of the strongest on Slowtown.





Russian court says Yeltsin violated law

MOSCOW — Russia's Contitutional Court cleared the way esterday for parliament to renove Boris Yeltsin from office,

move Boris Yeltsin from office, concluding that the president violated the constitution when he declared emergency rule.

The Supreme Soviet scheduled a session today to debate starting unprecedented proceedings against Yeltsin, who said he acted to protect Russia's democratic reforms.

Gleeful hard-liners shouted for the president's immediate ouster

in a brief but raucous meeting of the legislature shortly after the court ruling.

court ruling.

"It's absolutely clear there are grounds for initiating the impeachment process. That's without question," parliament speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov, Yeltsin's main rival, announced after the court decision.

Khasbulatov is expected to push today for the Supreme Soviet to convene the larger Congress of People's Deputies, which can remove the president by a two-thirds vote.

Bates proposes tuition payment plan

"A deferred payment plan would relieve some of the stress over the financial burden, and then students can concentrate more on their stud-ies."

Cameron said people worry over the summer whether they are going to be able to raise the money to pay for tuition

ate students' worries and allow them to pay for college like they were paying a car payment.

Michelle Garrett, an SGA LCC senator, said most students at LCC work, so a payment plan would help them budget their money for college.

She also said the plan would help those UK students who not only work, but also come from families with more than one student in col-

Bates said his idea for the tuition deferment plan is not an empty campaign promise.

"If I am elected because students want a tuition payment plan, then I will fight to get it for both UK and LCC."

Student Activities Board member Gennie Stuart and Kappa Alpha social fraternity president Jason Roney gave endorsement speeches.

He stated government should also help facilitate different information systems, such as published satisfaction surveys and review licensure to insure that it protects consumer interests instead of provider incomes. Dowd suggested that government revise the ERISA and McCarran Fergeson acts as well as adopt an aggressive anti-trust policy, end tax subsidies and open panel laws. By doing all of these things, there would be more people in pool situations, rate of premium increases would be lower and consumers would be able to choose lower cost plans.

"We are delighted that, nationally, we were ranked that high," said Dr. Jordan Cohen, dean of the UK College of Pharmacy.

The UK College of Pharmacy as named third in a listing of top was named third in a listing of top pharmacy programs by U.S. News and World Report in its annual guide to the top graduate schools in the country.

Cohen said the college has had good rankings in other reports for several years, but that this ranking its higher than we have ever been."

UK was ranked third behind the University of California at San Francisco and the University of Texas at Austin.

The college was given an average reputation score of 3.5 out of a possible 4.0, and finished one-tenth of a percent behind the other two schools who tied for first place.

Every school that offers a doctor of pharmacy degree was asked to participate in the poll by ranking fellow institutions in several cate-gories: reputation for scholarship, curriculum, quality of faculty and quality of graduate students.

Cohen said one of the benefits of being placed in the poll is faculty recruitment.

"It will help in recruiting outside faculty and retaining good faculty," Cohen said.

Cohen said the recent statewide budget cuts for universities will make it tougher for the UK College of Pharmacy to maintain its stand-

"(The cuts) require individual units to identify outside sources for funding," said Cohen, adding that funding is always a "major worry."

The cuts will mean that the col-lege will have to keep current on health-care issues and offer a broad base if it is to remain among the top schools in the nation.

Cohen said that the programs in the college will reflect upcoming national and state health-care initia-tives to assure that students will be competitive with those at other schools.

Consumers would be protected from repeated health screenings and risk redefinition. Administrative costs and plan search costs would be lowered and the group would have better purchasing clout in the market.

This type of plan currently exists in Florida and Minnesota. Dowd is a member of a Minnesota plan, which he said has shown good results. Government does not have a monopoly on pooling plans, but it provides yearly open enrollment periods for new members.
