# Wildcat Gridiron News

#### KENTUCKY vs. VIRGINIA TECH

The "hour of decision" arrives tonight with history-laden and tradition-steeped Stoll Field as the stage and a pair of would-be football giants the principals in an enactment designed to post proof as to what the future holds for each.

Both the visiting Gobblers of Virginia Tech and Kentucky's "Fearless Forty" have sights set squarely on this one as the big test of ambitions for 1963 and picking the favorite by any proven standard is difficult.

Surmounting all the usual factors that go into forecasting is the psychological incentive that will drive the rival head coaches and members of their staffs in quest of victory that would be particularly tasty on the occasion of "K Day." In the stands as special guests will be a large number of former UK lettermen. On the field, both Tech Head Coach Jerry Claiborne and Kentucky Chief Charlie Bradshaw as well as several aides also hold the distinction of being ex-Wildcats.

Aside from the sidelight of battling ex-Wildcats, the sixth match between Kentucky and VPI shapes up as a whale of a game along the lines of age versus youth. The Techmen check in with a highly-dangerous, experienced unit built around 28 lettermen headed by ace quarterback Bob Schweickert and plunging fullback Sonny Utz. Knowhow is so prevalent throughout the lineup that it's doubtful a sophomore can break into the top 22. The Winged T offense admittedly is more explosive than a year ago and

defense even more rugged than that which has led the tough Southern Conference for the past two seasons.


Confident-but-youthful Kentucky cannot match their foe in experience but nonetheless is proud of the potential of 26 highly-talented sophomores and the experienced leadership of 14 lettermen. The 'Cats are short on numbers again but boast more "playable" depth than was the case at any time during the 1962 campaign.

Kentucky leads in the series, 2-1-2, which resumes after a 21-year lapse.



the honorable BERT T. COMBS

Governor of Kentucky




Closing out a four-year term as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Bert Thomas Combs is able to look back with a special degree of pride on a distinguished career of public service that carried him up through the ranks to the chair of chief executive.

The 52-year-old public servant, who in his capacity of Governor also serves as chairman of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, began his career as a lawyer immediately upon graduation from the UK College of Law in 1937 and later entered political life when he became city attorney of Prestonsburg. He next held the post of Commonwealth Attorney for the 31st judicial district of the state and from 1951 to 1955 served as a judge on the state's highest tribunal, the Court of Appeals.

His distinguished background also includes service as a captain in the Judge Advocate General's Department and he was the recipient of both the bronze star and the medal of merit during Army service.

During his administration as Governor, an office to which he was elected in 1959, the State of Kentucky has made outstanding progress in many fields—including education, agriculture, industrial development, highway construction and social welfare.

Governor Combs is a native of Manchester in the Eastern Kentucky mountain area and worked his way through Cumberland College prior to entering the University Law School. He is married to the former Mabel Hall and they have two children, Lois Ann and Thomas George.

### KENTUCKY FOOTBALL OUTLOOK — 1963

There's an age-old axiom in the football world that warns the optimistic: "You can't win with sophomores!"

To this assertion, Kentucky's youthful and determined grid chief Charlie Bradshaw replies calmly and confidently that "it has been done before and I dare say it will be done again. At least, you can bet your last Tennessee ticket that the Wildcats will be giving it a good effort to win this year. I am confident that hard work and the right mental attitude will get the job done in a winning fashion."

Thus is pointed up both the chief problem facing Kentucky's football force in 1963 and the planned solution.

Inexperience and dependence on sophomores—who make up nearly 65 percent of total squad strength—certainly will be one of the main factors standing in the path of the first winning season since 1960.

Although again thinly-manned with only 40-odd hands on the roster, Kentucky will enter the '63 campaign slightly better off than last year from a depth standpoint due to the very presence of the talented and aggressive soph group. While hopes for improvement on the 3-5-2 record posted in 1962 by the notable "Thin Thirty" are hinged to a great degree on the promising sophomores (as many as six could be in the opening lineup with another half dozen backing them up on the No. 2 unit), the squad will have the services of 14 returning lettermen and much dependence is being placed on their talent and leadership.

In fact, as Coach Bradshaw analyzes the situation confronting his second Wildcat edition, the team's principal strength has to be in the leadership qualities of its veterans. "We are counting very heavily on their steadying influence to carry our sophomore group to even greater heights than they showed promise this spring of reaching," he declares. "This Southeastern Conference is a man's league, not one for boys, and our youngsters are going to be subjected to a lot of pressures in the process of growing up quickly to responsibilities. Here is where our older men come in and, if the situation develops as we are hoping, Kentucky will definitely be a force to be reckoned with by any team."

The Wildcats may be inexperienced in their overall picture and still much "thinner" than the normal SEC football powerhouse, but they are not exactly untalented.

In huge senior tackle Herschel Turner, the Kentuckians have wrapped up in one explosive package both leadership and talent. A 6-3 and 225 pound gentleman who is "rough as a cob" on the field, Turner is the "apple of the eye" of every professional scout who sees him.

Although experiencing the fight of his life for a starting assignment over a heralded sophomore, another vet who adds much danger to the Kentucky offense is versatile halfback Darrell Cox. The 1962 second team All-SEC performer led

the 'Cats in ground gained in '62 with a 4.4 average and ranked among SEC leaders in almost every offensive department

And lending further steadying influence in the backfield is senior Perky Bryant, returning fullback regular. He might be the lone veteran in the starting combo of backs.

Super star of the sophomores—at least one with a big responsibility and indications of meeting it well—is quarterback Rick Norton. He stepped in as heir-apparent to graduated hurler Jerry Woolum and this spring proved himself fully capable of eventual stardom. Norton, former Louisville prep All-America, is at his best as a passer and shows great poise and confidence in his play calls.

Manning the halfback posts may be a pair of soph scatbacks, sensational Rodger Bird at left (if he can beat out Cox) and Mike (Quick Draw) McGraw at right. Second to Bird in freshman ground operations with a 4.6 average, McGraw surprised most observers with the quick adjustment he made from fullback to halfback last spring.

In the line, Turner will hold the spotlight but there are several top-flight sophs capable of being "scene stealers." One of the best prospects to command public and opponent attention is rangy Rick Kestner, successor to graduated All-American Tom Hutchinson at left end and a prime target for Norton aerials. Along the rest of the forward wall there is a harmonized blend of returnees and sophomores with many positions a toss-up as far as the actual starter is concerned.

Overall, the Wildcats bid to be an exciting, highly dangerous Split T offensive group with Norton's pinpoint passing complemented by the running of speed demons Cox, Bird and McGraw and the power drives of fullback Bryant. And there will be no letup when a different unit is in the game

Defense is another matter for the time being. One of Bradshaw's major concerns is the absence of adequate line-backing and defensive guard play. The situation in the defensive secondary is better and improved over a year ago.

The schedule, however, may be the toughest problem that Kentucky has to lick. Early season tests against Mississippi and Auburn—two of the nation's best—and a midyear clash in the home lair of Louisiana State's Tigers highlight the Wildcats' 1963 assignment sheet.

But there's no defeatist attitude in the Kentucky camp despite all the problems that must be resolved satisfactorily. As Bradshaw spells it out, "I feel real optimistic over our chances. We have a bunch of youngsters with a burning desire to be good football players and some older boys with valuable experience and sound leadership. They can't tell you a single game they expect to lose."



## University's New President Knows Value of An Athletic Program . . .

Dr. John Wieland Oswald, new president of the University of Kentucky, is an educational administrator who believes organized athletics have a definite place within the university community.

Having himself been a college athlete, Dr. Oswald is now one of the staunchest supporters of the teams wearing the Blue and White. However, he advocates that any campus athletic program should be kept within the proper perspective and that over-adulation should be avoided.

Dr. Oswald served as vice-president for administration at the University of California at Berkeley before becoming the sixth chief executive of UK.

The native of Minnesota did his undergraduate work at DePauw University where he majored in botany. He played varsity football—captaining the DePauw eleven in 1937—and earned letters in basketball and track.

He was awarded a Ph.D. degree in plant pathology at the University of California in 1942 and entered the U.S. Navy the same year. As a PT boat skipper and later, as a divisional commander, he participated in over 50 missions in the Mediterranean.

After World War II, Dr. Oswald returned to academic life and advanced through the ranks at the University of California. He has published over 70 papers on plant pathology investigation and has done research work in the Netherlands under Fulbright sponsorship.


In 1962, he was named to the Sports Illustrated Silver Anniversary All-America, an award the magazine confers upon former college football players for outstanding achievement in their chosen professions.


Other members of the Oswald family are his wife, the former Rosanel Owen of Alabama, their two daughters, Elizabeth and Nancy, and John, Jr.



be paid to these former athletes, but two ex-Wildcat footballers in particular are due to capture the public fancy—for they are the rival head coaches of tonight's opponents. Jerry Claiborne, now entering his third campaign at Virginia Tech, and "sophomore" Coach Charlie Bradshaw of Kentucky have much in common besides a burning desire for victory out of this "homecoming-in-reverse" battle. Both are former UK ends whose playing careers under Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant overlapped from 1946 to 1949. Each served a hitch on the coaching staffs of both Kentucky and Alabama prior to becoming head coaches for the first time a year apart. As if this incentive was not enough for the visiting Gobblers, the school's president (Dr. Robert Hahn) received a degree from UK, Athletic Director Frank Moseley was a former staffer here and three members of the coaching staff (Doug Shively, Moon Conde and John Shelton) have Kentucky connections as player or coach.

## Bernie Shively — A Man Of Many Talents . . .

Nationally recognized for his direction of one of the nation's most balanced collegiate athletic programs, University of Kentucky's veteran Director of Athletics Bernie A. Shively is truly a gentleman of many talents.

He gained his greatest fame as a football All-America guard at Illinois in 1926 on the same grid outfit made famous by the immortal Red Grange. And, demonstrating a claim to being one of the finest all-around athletes in Illinois' history, Shively also laid claim to the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling crown and annexed letters in track before graduating in 1927.

Following his graduation, Shively came to Kentucky as a line coach in football. During his 35 years of service to the Kentucky athletic program, "Shive" also served as head football coach one season (1945), track coach and baseball coach as well as heading up the University's Physical Education Department. He became Director of Athletics in 1938.

For almost as long as the Southeastern Confer-

ence played a post-season basketball tournament, Shively served as chairman and the experience had stood him in good stead as he now directs the University's own highly-successful Invitational Tournament and supervises the NCAA Basketball Tournament in the capacity of committee chairman.

Shive also tried his hand at basketball officiating in the SEC for about 20 years and served several seasons as Supervisor of Officials for the Ohio Valley Conference. He is a past chairman of the NCAA's summer baseball committee and since 1954 has been president of the SEC Coaches and Athletic Directors Association. In addition, he has found time to be active in civic and University projects.

A native of Paris, III., Shively and his wife, Ruth, have two children. A son, Doug, was cocaptain of the Wildcat football team in 1958 and now is an assistant grid coach at Virginia Tech. Daughter Suzanne was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of UK in 1957.





## Wildcat Coach Has Qualities For Success . . .

The personification of qualities of inner toughness, outwardly serious demeanor, quiet determination, ability, confidence and integrity . . . That's Kentucky's head football coach.

Charlie Bradshaw, 38-year-old ex-Wildcat player and assistant coach, fulfills all these qualities that are the background for success and goes a step further . . . He's an inspirational leader who exudes the toughness that it takes for those around him—staff and players—to get the job at hand done in a way that will pay off with success.

He believes in the direct approach and in the short span of just one season has instilled his formula in the minds of his charges. Kentucky footballers are now convinced that success is approached only through determined hard work.

Bradshaw's football philosophy was schooled into him as a player by Paul (Bear) Bryant and influenced by nine years of experience in an assistant coach capacity at UK and Alabama.

Born and raised in Montgomery, Ala., Charlie played football at Sidney Lanier High before coming to Kentucky as a 1942 gridder. He didn't see any action that year and withdrew from the University after one semester to enter the Marine Corps.

He returned to UK to play end for the 1946, '47 and '48 seasons and for three games in 1949 before being ruled ineligible by the Southeastern Commissioner. He remained on the Bryant staff as a student assistant and then returned to Sidney Lanier as a coach and co-ordinator in 1950.

In 1954, he came back to Kentucky as an aide on the Blanton Collier staff and stayed until 1959 when he moved to Alabama and an offensive coaching job under Bryant.

He was hired to replace Collier here on Jan. 10, 1962, and was extended a four-year contract.



# Wildcat Coaching Staff

University of Kentucky's football coaching staff this season presents a composite picture of youth plus experience. Statistics on Head Coach Charlie Bradshaw and his 10 full-time aides provide an average look of only 33 years of age but a background of no less than nine years in the profession of tutoring football. All told, the staff represents 101 years of coaching experience.

MATT LAIR (Kentucky '48)—First UK aide ever to hold the title of Assistant Head Coach . . . Played as a blocking back and guard on same Wildcat teams as Coach Bradshaw . . . The 39-year-old North Middletown native has background of 16 seasons of grid tutoring, including five previous years at UK (1954-58), two at Texas A & M, one with Texas Tech . . . Works primarily with defensive line.

HOMER RICE (Centre '51)—Entered collegiate field in 1962 after nine championship seasons and seven undefeated campaigns during 11 years in Kentucky-Tennessee high schools . . . Aggregate record 101-9-7 for period . . . Won seven "Coach of the Year" awards . . . Little All-America QB at Centre . . . The 36-year-old native of Ft. Thomas is charged with making UK's offensive operations go.

DAVE HART (St. Vincent '50)—Newly assigned to the responsibility of defensive coach of the Wildcats, Hart is former highly-successful schoolboy tutor in Pennsylvania . . . Compiled 86-18-3 record in 11 years, last eight at Johnstown . . . The 37-year-old native of Connellsville, Pa., was the state's AAA "Coach of the Year" in '58 . . . Invaluable recruiter.

**GEORGE SENGEL** (**Kentucky '48**)—Louisvillian Sengel's career as a Wildcat wingman overlapped that of Coach Bradshaw by a couple of years and his former teammate asked Sengel to stay on the staff he had joined in 1961 . . . The 40-year-old Air Force vet had nine years of coaching in schoolboy ranks in Florida and Kentucky prior to becoming UK end coach.

BUD MOORE (Alabama '61)—A 23-year-old Birmingham, Ala., native, Bud picked up his initial playing and coaching experience under Paul Bryant and Charlie Bradshaw at Alabama . . . He was a star end and tackle for the Tide in the 1958-60 period, served briefly as student assistant and coached one year at Gadsden (Ala.) High before joining Bradshaw staff at UK in 1962.

GEORGE BOONE (Kentucky '61)—One of the most determined players ever to wear the blue and white of UK, Boone started out on his own but soon won scholarship aid and became outstanding tackle... The 25-year-old Louisvillian stayed on Wildcat coaching staff in part-time role after completing eligibility in 1960, became regular coach following year and retained by Bradshaw as a line assistant.

RALPH HAWKINS (Maryland '57)—One of the most valuable coaches on the staff, Hawkins has background of collegiate and professional play plus coaching experience in both schoolboy and college ranks . . . The 28-year-old bachelor from Washington, D.C., was freshman coach at Maryland before joining New York Titans . . Coached high school ball in D.C. and served as backfield assistant at SMU.

BILL JASPER (Tennessee '52)—A native Kentuckian from Somerset who traversed a route through enemy territory enroute to joined the Wildcats, Jasper is former star linebacker at Tennessee . . . Joined the Bradshaw staff in 1962 with successful record for 10 years' work in Kentucky and Tennessee high schools . . . Supervises gridders' academic program . . . 34 years old.


JIM CARMODY (Tulane '56)—Newest addition to the Bradshaw staff, Carmody transfers allegiance from alma mater Tulane where has an outstanding center and later (1961-62) an assistant coach . . . Coaching background of the 30-year-old New Orleans native also includes three-season stint at Holy Cross and championship year with Army team in Korea . . . Works with UK freshmen.

RAY CALLAHAN (Kentucky '56)—A newcomer to the staff but no stranger in Kentucky grid circles, 30-year-old former UK guard standout Callahan enters the collegiate field for the first time after successful high school career . . The Lebanon native capped fourth season as head coach at Danville High by winning state AA title in 1962 and picking up personal honor as AA "Coach of the Year."

## Athletics At Kentucky

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in nine different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National

Collegiate Association.

A board of directors, headed by University President John W. Oswald in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. Ex-officio members, in addition to the president, include Dr. Leo M. Chamberlain, Dr. W. L. One of the beauties of college football has been that, like the English language, the stock market, or the mind of a co-ed, it is subject to constant change.

Sometimes these changes evoke criticism and confusion, as did the radical revision of the substitution rule made last January, but in the end the game keeps on growing and expanding and becoming more exciting to players and spectators alike.

What you are seeing every Saturday afternoon of the 1963 season is the effort of the coaches to come to terms with the new substitution rule and deploy their manpower for maximum effect.

Briefly, the new rule is this: either team can substitute freely on second or third down or on first down earned on a drive if, in all cases, the game clock is stopped. No more than two players can enter the game for a fourth down play or one on which the ball has just changed hands.

This stern restriction on substituting on fourth down or on a play on which the ball changes hands, of course, means that there is a real risk of being compelled to take the offense with a defensive team and vice versa. Even before the season started everyone, starting with Coach Paul Dietzel of Army who more or less originated the style, agreed this doomed the three platoon system consisting of a first or two-way team, and two others, one defensive, one offensive.

The restrictions of the new rule obviously mean players must be coached in both offensive and defensive skills. Undoubtedly substitutes will flow in and out of the game but under controlled conditions. For one thing, that phrase, "if the clock is stopped", is all important. Teams do not like to throw away a precious time out in order to make substitutions. That is why other means are being employed—an incom-

plete pass or a running play that goes out of bounds.

Probably the net result of all this is something that might be termed unlimited limited substitutions. Or maybe limited unlimited substitutions. Substitutions aplenty, yes. Restrictions aplenty, yes.

Ever since the "iron man" days of football when it was a matter of pride to finish a game with the same 11 men who started it, or as close thereto as could be achieved within the limits of human strength, a great debate has raged in college circles as to whether substitutions (a) favored the team that was deep and rich in manpower or (b) were desirable simply because they permitted more boys to take part in a game. The weight of evidence now seems to rest with (b). After all, college football is intended to provide recreation for young athletes as well as paunchy spectators, and the more of both classes engaged in the enterprise the better.

Of course there is no denying that what every coach wants is wave on wave of large, fleet, aggressive, tough, intelligent, young men each weighing 250 pounds or more and running the 100 yards in :09.5. That's the dream, anyway. The reality is what you are seeing, and is considerably below the ideal. That being the case it makes a lot of sense from the viewpoint of sportsmanship to have, back of the really few men who are big, tough and fast, some frail and skinny youngsters who only get into the game in specialized situations—to throw the right pass, make the important field goal, or break away for a brief but dazzling run. The new rules give them the opportunity.

It is to these and to all the others who range in size and strength between runts and the behemoths that the rules committee addressed itself. If everything proves out this could be one of the best changes that have ever been made in the rules book.

However, it is wise to keep in mind that what we have been discussing here are the techniques of football, not the fundamentals. The fundamentals still remain: vigorous bodily contact, a courageous heart, the ability to fit individual daring into a team framework, and the discipline that comes from playing to win but being able to accept defeat like a gentleman.

The superficial rules of this very basic game may change but not the game itself.





#### 1942—KENTUCKY 21, VA. TECH 21

Virginia Tech's Gobblers were not to be denied on this war-year afternoon in Roanoke as they roared from behind to salvage a 21-21 tie with **Coach Ab Kirwan's** Wildcats in the fifth game of the series that was to be interrupted for 21 years

Kentucky had scored in each of the opening quarters, drawing first blood on a short-yardage smash by quarterback **Phil Cutchin** climaxing a 77-yard drive and later adding a 47-yard punt return TD by **Charlie Kuhn**.

Early in the third stanza, VPI blocked a UK quick kick attempt and turned it into their first score. But the Kentuckians still had fight left. After an exchange of punts, the Wildcats took over on Virginia Tech's 25-yard line and drove in for their third touchdown of the afternoon.

Trailing 21-7, the home team returned the ensuing kick-off to the 32. Five plays later, VPI had covered 68 yards to tack on its second marker and a successful PAT made it a ball game at 21-14 as the quarter ended.

Unable to move the ball, Kentucky was forced to kick and this proved its undoing. The fired-up Gobblers unleashed a devastating ground game to move 80 yards to a touchdown in just 10 plays and, despite the pressure of the situation, successfully kicked the PAT to knot the count at 21-21. Neither team threatened again.

#### 1941—KENTUCKY 37, VA. TECH 14

Kentucky forged into the forefront in gridiron relations with Virginia Tech, two victories to one and a tie, as **Coach Ab Kirwan's** boys rolled over the Gobblers with ease, 37-14, in the only game of the series ever played in Louisville.

Only three plays after the "Big Blue" had won the opening coin toss and elected to receive, speedy halfback **Ermal Allen** scooted around end on a 53-yard romp to touchdown territory and the Wildcats were off and running in the highest scoring match in UK-VPI history.

Aside from the scoring fireworks, the main attraction of the day was the way Kentucky's hard-charging line gobbled

up the Gobblers—stopping Tech threats cold and causing miscues that the Wildcats turned into scores.

UK annexed its second marker before the opening period closed and picked up a third TD in 20 minutes of action early in the second quarter as quarterback **Phil Cutchin** fired a strike to **Carl Althaus**.

Passing and running through the opposition almost at will, UK chalked up a 25-0 halftime advantage and padded their lead in the second 30 minutes with a **Junior Jones** run and another TD pass from Cutchin to Althaus. For the fifth time, the PAT try failed but it mattered little as VPI could manage only two desperation scores in the final period.

#### 1931-KENTUCKY 20, VA. TECH 6

Success came for the first time to one of the rivals in the recently inaugurated Kentucky-Virginia Tech series as the Wildcats rolled past the visiting Gobblers, 20 to 6, in a Stoll Field thriller engineered by **Coach Harry Gamage**.

The game, much closer than the final score indicates, was not put "on ice" until the Wildcats' **Ellis Johnson** turned in a sensational, 58-yard punt return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Kentucky had racked up its first points of the day midway of the first frame with the aid of a VPI miscue. Recovering a fumble on Tech's 22, UK moved in on the hard running of Ralph Kercheval and Shipwreck Kelley. Johnson actually scored.

VPI countered with a TD of its own and was on the move for another late in the half when Kelley picked off a pass and ran 92 yards to score—only to have an official rule he stepped out at the Gobbler's 36. Not to be denied, Shipwreck covered the remaining distance on the next play. But again he was ruled to have gone out of bounds, this time at the three. Kercheval then went in for the TD.

During the entire third period and part of the fourth, Kentucky stood off repeated VPI threats to protect its 14-6 lead until Johnson's sparkling run virtually eliminated further danger.


