### Research project examines high blood pressure in state

High blood pressure among Kentucky youths will be the subject of a new study youths will be the subject of a new study at U.K which was recently awarded federal funding. Program director Gorden Guthrie, assistant professor of medicine, said the study will focus on the function of the adrenal gland in Kentucky adolescents. "For some reason," said Guthrie, "Kentucky high school students have higher blood pressure in comparision to other high school students. A fair percent of those students have blood pressure which medical doctors would consider high." "Kentucky is a hotbed for hypertension," said Guthrie, a condition associated with the stress of high blood pressure.

"Hypertension is known," he said, "to be the major cause of stroke and heart attacks. Kentucky has a high rate of stroke and heart attack victims com-pared to those in other states. Kentucky Sens. Walter D. Huddleston

a S31, 100 Public Health Service Grant for the program.

Faith Miller, press aid for Huddleston, said the grant is from the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, which is sponsored by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

The institute funds similar research projects throughout the United States, but UK's research on the adrenal gland is the first of its kind.

A group of Bourbon County high school students will be a part of the study that will measure the function of the adrenal gland in relation to hyperfersion.

Working with Guthrie will be Drs. Theodore and Jane Kotchen. The emphasis of their research will be on other hormonal and hemodynamic measurements in the students. They will also test the relationship of psychological effects, diet, and stress to high blood pressure.
It is not known what exactly causes hypertension, although many believe that it could be the amount of salt in the

diet. Guthrie speculates that high blood pressure could involve the adrenal gland.

pressure could involve the adrenal gland. The adrenal gland is associated with salt and water in the metabolism. "People of Eastern and Central Kentucky en jay a lot of salt in their diet," said Guthric, citing areas associated with the phenomenon. If sufficient amount of information is discovered, Guthrie believes that the studies could lead to a preventive measure of hypertension. As of now, however, the studies will try to prove the realtionship of the adrenal gland to hypertension.

The project came about after it was known that the students with the potential of high blood pressure were available. Jane Kotchen conducted a survey that identified the initial population of high school students who had higher blood pressures than that of their peers.

The grant is renewable for three years and has a total value of \$90,000. The majority of the costs will pay for machinary and technical support.

### UK buckles, admits 7 more med students

University officials have decided, pending appeal, to be ready to squeeze in seven third-year medical students next year at the already jammed Medical School rather than lose UK's portion of an \$48 million detail agrain program.

By bowing to federal pressure, the University loses its authority over admissions requirements of the seven extra places it has been instructed to leave open. American medical students, transferring from foreign schools, will fill those spots. To be accepted, they must meet standardized national requirements, and will not have to pass the University's own criteria. In planning to enforce the regulation, the Department of Health Education and Welfare (HEW) in effect authorizes double standards for those who want to attend U.S. medical schools, and uses quotas to achieve that duplicity.

Many transfer students began their education abroad because they were unable to meet domestic entrance requirements. U.S. institutions should have the right to find out whether the transfers can meet though the proper in the prop

### Fear and loathing in Rome

### Former Kernel Managing Editor blazes career in Italy

Editor's note: One of the toughest careers to launch and be successful at n the United States is journalism. Deadline pressure, screaming editors and overwhelming competition face thousands of would-be Pulitzer Prize

thousands of would-be Pulitzer Prize winners.
When former Kernel Managing Editor John Winn Miller joined the horde last year after graduation, be stumbled through a side door on his way to a career. Namely, he went to litaly.
Miller detailed his discoveries and insights in a letter that will be of interest to journalism students, world travelers and culture freaks everywhere:

### By JOHN WINN MILLER

How I ended up in Rome — as graduation approached, I went into a panic and started looking for a job everywhere. I spent a week in New York where I went to 16 interviews with York where I went to 16 interviews with magazines and publishing houses. They were all very nice but had no openings I applied for an internship on the Daily American (DA, in Rome) and about a month later I found out that I had been chosen. ### The old and the new **ELP continues Works** with impressive Vol. 2

Emerson, Lake and Palmer—the group many had given up for dead before the March release of Works. Volume 1—have returned with another album in the musical collection mold.

Works, Vol. 2 offers much the same as its predecessor, only in half the space. The single disc constructed in much the same format as Vol. 1, with each of the members having a few independent tracks and then several tracks featuring the trio together. At least five of the tracks have appeared on other albums or singles, including "Brain Salad Surgery," which was not included on the album of the same not the debuted this May on the backshed of the "Fanfare for the Common Man 'snife.

The album's standout track, "Barrellouse Shake-Down," is taken from a Keith Emerson single that was released only in Great Britain. The song is a paring lig Band arrangement of an Emerson composition—one that conjures up images of the 1940's, Glenn Miller and the jitterbug.

Greg Lake's haunting vocals continue in much the same vein as on the previous album. His 1975 holders prelease, "I Believe In Father Christmas," makes its first album appearance, but "Watching Over You" is trance, a state from which Lake can either drive in social commentary, as with "Father Christmas," or moisten the eyes with a love song, as he does with "Watching."

As a group, ELP is in fine form. "Tiger In A Spotlight" opens the first side with some fine rock-and-roll. The second-side wrapsup with "Show Me The Emerson-Godfrey Solman orchestrations for this cut, and the piece is a beautiful example of what can be done with barroom blues.

MARK FARNER Mark Farner [Atlantic]

In the early 1970s Grand Funk Railroad (GFR) was the hottest band in America. The group sold out Shea Stadium faster than the Beatles did Almost every album they put out went gold or even platinum.

Gradually their popularity diminished. Last year, and about a dozen albums. GFR broke up and lead singer-guitarist Mark Farner went out on his own. Now we get dear Mark's first solo endeavor, Mark Farner, the cover of which is adorned with photos of him barechested, something quite common on GFR albums. It's a pretty slick cover for an incredibly nondeagaint.

No, it's not obnoxiously noisy, like Kiss, or overproduced, like Gino Vanelli, or even cutesy, like Shaun Cassidy: It's just dull Farner has a very good singing voice and a fair hand at the electric gutar. With GFR he could at least generate some footstompin' rock and roll, despite the group's failings. But his solo album suffers from poor production; it has no punch. It also suffers from corm lyrics and overly conventional instrumentals. In others words, they sound like everybody else's in-strumentals.

Possibly the album's best

like everybody else's Instrumentals. Possibly the album's best cut is the first one, Dear Miss Lucy. The song sounds much more popish than GFR ever did and showcases Farner's clean-sounding voice. This one should keep AM listeners happy, if it goes that far. The mapir fault in this song however, as in most of the songs on the album, is mediocrity—in the "leave—alone girl" lyrics and the disappointing gutar solos Farner seems to have



### Fear and loathing in Rome Italian press is wary of terrorism

Now to answer some of your questions.

I took the job because I was hungry and because I was hungry and because I would be on the ground floor of a potentially influential neespaper. We have complete editorial freedom and I am getting to use all the skills that I learned at the Kernel. Few journalists get such a ternational paper.

In terms of prestige, the paper does not rate very high. It is located in Rome and circulated in Southern Europe and the Mideast. Our circulation so far is at most 3,000. Let's say it is a small-town paper with the potential to become a major newspaper in Europe maybe.

I don't have any background in Italian or the

one into trouble.

One night, a friend and I were at the foreign press club bar and we wanted to play chess. I asked the bartender for the "il chesso." The silence that filled the room told me that I had ordered the record think 4 fler giving me

silence that filled the room told methat I had ordered the wrong thing. After giving me he board, he took me behind the bar and said in broken English and Italian, "No chesso. Chesso is word bad—ioliet." I apologized and slid out of the bar.

Just a word about the Press Club bar. It's like walking into a "B" movie. It's filled with the great and the washed-up journalists. There's no telling who might walk in — Gore Vidal, old friends of Hemingway, KGB agents. It's incredible! it just loaded with characters—the English journalist who looks and talks just like Caryone, the reporter from the National Enguirer defending his ethics and the latest jazz star courting the press. The bar in itself is an education.

For fun, I cat. Really. Rome is one of the deadest

Rome is one of the deadest towns I've ever seen.

Everything closes at midnight and there aren't any bars or discost to go to. So for fun I go to the English language cinema and watch ten year-old movies, but the real entertainment in Italy is meals.

An average meal takes two hours, but I have spent as long as five hours at one meal. Italians don't cram all their food on one plate — everything has a course. First you have pasta (spaghetti,lasagna,etc) then

spagnetti,lasagna,etc) then you have a meat course, then salad, fruit, dessert, and finally coffee and liqueur all washed down with litres of local wine. A meal like this can be had for less than five dollars.

I also spend a lot of time massaging my kneecaps.

I also spend a lot of time massaging my kneecaps.

As you may or may not know, the radicals in Italy don't like journalists. To show their displeasure, they have borrowed a technique from the IRA—shooting kneecaps. More than 20 journalists of all political bents have been shot so far. So you can imagine that I am a little nervous. Actually there is some reasoning behind their harred of journalists. In Italy there really isn't a free press in the American style, all of the newspapers are owned by political parties. You can tell a person's politics by the newspaper be or she reads. You may have read about all the violence over here. A couple of times it has really hit home. Last month there was a demonstration, violent, as usual, near our office.

Before it was over, bullets were flying everywhere and the office was filled with tear gas. The bullets weren't coming in our direction but the paper was a few hours

late getting out that night.
Another time the managing editor got a call from home that one of his friends, a local politico in the ruling Christain Democrats, had been shot by the left-wing Red Brigades.
The Red Brigades had pumped to builets into him, mostly after he had already fallen to the ground. We intercepted the pictures of the shot-up friend before the managing editor saw them. Amazingly, the friend lived.
I live in a beautiful five-room apartment in Trastevere. Thanks to Mussolini, I can afford to live in a place like this. You see, Mussolini passed a law (which hasn't been repealed) that landfords can not raise the rent as long as the same person lives in the apartment.
My rent is 50,000 lire a month 'about \$900. It is very picture-sque here — Time called Trastevere the chicest place in the world to live. For all you film fans, much of Fellini's "Roma" was filmed here.
