



The condition of her hall's bathroom and the laundry room has been a nightmarish experience for her.

"This dorm is in bad need of repair, and I have complained about it from the time I got here," she said.

The final straw for Stith came when she had to wade through water to get to a working washing machine.

Residents of Donovan Hall has the state of ill-repair in specific areas of the dorm, and think their complaints are falling on deaf ears.

One laundry room with six washers and eight dryers serves the dorm, which is home to more than 300 female students. Often, only one or two washing machines work and students wait in line to use them, Sith said. Starting in 1998, some part of tuition and fees now count as tax credits when you file 1998 federal income tax returns.
This is the first year these credits are available, said Dan Boone, a communications specialist for the Internal Revenue Service. The two new credits are the Hope Credit and the Lifetime Learning Credit.
The Hope credit is available to freshmen and sophomores, it counts 100 percent of the next \$8,000 of tuition and fees as a tax credit up to a \$1,500

Kubrick dead at 70

The death of Stanley Kubrick robbed the film world yesterday of one of its towering masters, and came just as he completed his latest opus, Eyes Wide Shut, a starstudded project shrouded in secrecy.

studded project sincolors.

The Bronx-born Kubrick, who created such film classics as 2001: A Space Odyssey, Lolita, A Clockwork Orange and Dr. Strangelove, died yesterday at age 70 at his home outside of London of natural causes.

causes.

Kubrick was in post-production on his long-awaited latest film Eyes Wide Shut with Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman, which like his other projects, was filmed in great

secrecy over a long period of time.

The drama's initial production shoot lasted for a grueling 15 months from November 1996 through Jan. 31.

Then Kubrick announced last April he was bringing back several key cast members for re-shoots.

Kubrick was known to control every aspect of his films even to the pen color that could be used to circle advertisements.

He was also known to bard on his Actors. One story that circulated from the set of his Vietnam War drama, Full Metal Jacket, was that when he asked his actors who wanted to volunteer to die early in the move, almost the entire cast raised their hands.

one man who did volun-teer and was selected to die early in the film found that he then had to lie around playing a corpse in the mud for three months.

"We were fortunate to have screened the inches."

"We were fortunate to have screened the just-completed Eyes Wide Shut, Stanley's final picture, last week," said two executive officers from Warner Bros., the company that produced most of Kubrick's films over the course of three decades.

"It is a fantastic movie and a fitting close to a tremendous career. We look forward to sharing this movie when it is released as planned this summer and believe that it is a tribute to a remarkable and unforgettable man. We

Longer seasons benefit youngsters

Governors come and go, strip mining and envi-ronmental issues tend to split residents, while poverty is still a huge problem in many parts of the state.

Life extends well outside the walls of the class-room. Advocates of longer seasons are not asking educators to lower their standards, they just want kids to reach their potential

A tribute to Stanley McGowan

To the editor:

I must not be the only person grieving the loss of Stanley McGowan, but I am a person who should share a little story about Stanley. I did not know him for long, but what I did know about Stanley. I did not know him for long, but what I did know about and genuinely good person. He was much more of a hero than many of us will ever be.
