Prof. Bartholomew degree of L.L.D.

College newspaper.

The committee appointed to consider the applications for permission to establish a college newspaper, reported through its chairman, C. W. Mathews as follows. - see insertion next page - On motion, the report was adopted.

E. E. Simpson + a.m. degree.

The committee appointed to consider the eligibility of Mr. E. E. Simpson for the degree of A.M., reported that upon investigation it was found that Mr. Simpson had been regularly prosecuting his studies for this degree, with German as major and French as minor subject. On motion it was ordered that Mr. Simpson be recommended to the Board of trustees for the degree of a.m.

The Committee of the Faculty appointed to consider the application of Messrs. Clarke Tandy and others for permission to establish college newspapers, respectfully submits the following report;—

1. The Committee believes that if properly conducted, the publication of a college newspaper is a desirable feature of college life.
2. The committee endorses the regulations heretofore prescribed for the conduct of college newspapers, in substance as follows;—
 - a. The editor shall furnish a bond of \$ 250.00 to be filed with the Business agent of the College, to cover all possible losses on the part of subscribers, advertisers, and printers.
 - b. The matter and general make-up of each issue shall be submitted to the Professor of English Literature for his revision and approval.
 - c. The Editor shall have the aid of a sufficient corps of assistants who are acceptable to the Faculty.
3. The committee recommends in addition the following regulations;—
 - d. Any publication issued as a college newspaper belongs to the college and is not vendible.
 - e. The college newspaper should be of such a dignified character as to reflect credit upon the institution, and it must have no objectionable advertisements.
 - f. In the future, public announcement shall annually be made by the president that all candidates for the editorship of the college newspaper should present their applications for the same upon some specified date in the Spring term; that these applications shall be canvassed by a committee of the faculty, and that the selection of an editor shall be based, — other things being equal — upon the candidates proficiency in English.
 - g. Any violation of these regulations shall render the newspaper liable to suppression.
4. The committee recommends, — since Messrs. J. R. Viley and others have withdrawn their application in favor of Mr. Clarke Tandy, that the latter be granted the desired permission to conduct a college newspaper during the next college year, upon his acceptance of the regulations herein set forth.
