B.A.C. standard may go down

The continuing saga to curb alcohol-related accidents aims for blood alcohol content

Drinking and driving is always a key issue on college campuses, but if the legal intoxication level is lowered, it might become an even bigger topic.

House Bill 366, which would lower the legal intoxication blood-alcohol limit from .10 to .08, is currently being debated in Frankfort. Having a blood-alcohol level of .08 is the equivalent of a 170-lb. person drinking four beers.

"I think it sounds good," said Jimmy Brock, a chemical engineering freshman. "I don't drink myself, and it might cut down on people drinking and driving."

Victor Hazard, associate dean of students, said personally, he advocates changes to limit alcohol

use because of its dangerous effects.

Although Hazard did not advocate for or against the bill, he did promote restrictions on drinking.

"Getting alcohol in control by any means will help students as well as the state of Kentucky," he said.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Jack L. Coleman Jr., would also require police to seize drivers' licenses during arrests, instead of allowing the prosecutor to do so after the arrest has been made.

It would also outlaw open containers in passenger compartments in vehicles. As of now, Kentucky does not have any open-container laws.

Finally, the bill would make those driving with a suspended or revoked license face a Class D

felony charge, instead of a Class A charge, which they face now.

"Students will exhibit drunken behavior whether they're .08 or .10 to possibly make officials suspicious," Hazard said. "This will be a violation of the law more than the code of student conduct."

Some students agree that driving drunk is wrong but don't think lowering the blood-alcohol level is needed.

"Personally, I wouldn't drive after four beers," said Shana Allen, a family studies senior. "But I don't think it would decrease drunk driving because the people who drive drunk are incoherent anyway" and therefore unable to make responsible decisions.

Regardless of the outcome of House Bill 366, students, especially those who drink, are likely to be affected by the policies.

"Clearly, students are citizens, and as citizens, it will impact them," Hazard said.

UK improves national ranking

Closer to Top 20: National Science Foundation places UK at 32nd, up from 46th

UK's recent 14-place jump from 46th to 32nd on the National Science Foundation's research ranking of public universities may prove to be of benefit to both students and faculty.

Sylvia Williams, assistant to Chancellor Elisabeth Zinser, discussed the relationship between UK's NSF rankings and the degrees of UK graduates. "This lends more prestige to the university so the degree that future students receive will ultimately be more valuable," Williams said.

In addition to making UK graduate stock worth more in the job market, Jerry Bramwell, vice president for research and graduate studies, said that UK benefits as a whole from the recent NSF rankings.

"This will help the university in retaining and recruiting the best faculty," Bramwell said.

The NSF determines their rankings, in large part, by the amount of money spent by the research facilities of US colleges and universities.

Zinser described the significance of the NSF's ranking system. "It is one of the most well recognized indicators in the environment of research institutions nationwide," he said.

Zinser hopes that UK's leap in the rankings will be a catalyst in the university achieving its state-mandated goal of becoming a top twenty research university by 2020.

Bramwell explained that when a university advances even a single digit in the NSF rankings that it is a marked improvement, and advancing 14 places is almost unheard of.

Bramwell cites two reasons why UK made huge steps in the rankings. The first source of improvement is a change in the way UK reports their research expenditures.

Bramwell admitted that in past years UK has underreported the amount of money spent.

Now, according to Bramwell, UK's expenditure reports have become more consistent. Bramwell thinks that this change in reporting

has brought UK more in line with its benchmark schools.

Bramwell said that the second source of improvement lies within the activities of the research and development department.

"We have done remarkable things as far as bringing in grants," Bramwell said.

President Charles Wethington affirmed the convictions of his fellow administrators, suggesting that as UK moves up the NSF scale, students reap the benefits.

"The better this university is, and the better it's perceived, the better the opportunities are for the students of the university," Wethington said.

UK's recent awards, rankings and accolades

U.S. News & World Report

This publication lists America's top colleges and universities with regard to quality and value. This system divides the nation's colleges into four tiers. The first tier lists those universities that are of top quality and value; the fourth tier lists those with the least quality and value. In this system UK is in the second tier. Schools are listed alphabetically in the second through fourth tiers.

The National Science Foundation National Research Ranking

The NSF is an organization of the federal government. Their system of ranking is largely dependent on how much money a college or university spends on research and development. UK is ranked 32nd among public universities according to the NSF.

The Carnegie Foundation

This foundation uses a classification system to group both public and private colleges and universities. UK is categorized "Research University I," which is defined as a university that offers a full range of baccalaureate programs, gives high priority to research, awards at least 50 doctoral degrees a year and receives at least \$40 million in federal support.

Preventing backpack theft

For most students, it's a habit to walk into Kennedy's or UK Bookstore and drop off their book bag before shopping in the store.

Both stores use policies to enforce this ritual as an anti-theft measure.

"We've had a book bag drop forever, and the lockers have been there for nine years," said Carol Behr, Kennedy's BookStore general manager.

Kennedy's and UK Bookstore have lockers, which cost \$25, to secure bags. Upon retrieval of property, the quarter is then returned.

But what if your bookbag gets stolen?

Some students still worry about leaving their bag up front, in a heavy traffic area. Even with the lockers, both stores have signs saying, "We are not responsible for lost or stolen articles," adding to some students' worries.

Both stores claim if students are not comfortable leaving their bags in lockers, they can leave the

bag at the service desk where an employee can keep an eye on it.

But Travis Manley, commander of central records and operations for UK Police, agrees with students who worry.

Leaving your bag up front at the bookstores is "not how we recommend it because the UK Bookstore is located close to the main doors, and it's easy for someone to pick up a bag and walk out with it," he said.

Roy Hutchins, an integrated strategic communications junior had his bag stolen from Young Library, just a few weeks before finals last semester.

"If someone would have told me that earlier," he said, "maybe I could have gotten my books back. I'm definitely going to do it this semester."

Robinson said to be extra careful as school progresses.

"The end of the semester seems to be the worst time for bags to be stolen," Robinson said. "We get a lot of reports around that time."

Be prepared

To avoid getting backpacks stolen:

- Know what is in your bag
- Know what books you own
- Do not leave book bags on tables
- Keep book bags with you at all times

Extra protection:

- Put a mark on a page in every book, so that you will know the book is yours, if stolen

If your book bag is stolen:

- File a police report
- Alert all text bookstores

Grandmothers arrive for Elian meeting

MIAMI — The grandmothers of Elian Gonzalez arrived yesterday for the government-ordered meeting with the 6-year-old Cuban boy they have not seen in more than two months. Mariela Quintana and Raquel Rodriguez arrived at Opa-locka Airport just after 3 p.m. EST. They are expected to be taken by helicopter to the meeting at the Miami Beach home of Sister Jeanne O'Laughlin, president of Barry University. Her home was chosen as a neutral site in the tug-of-war between the boy's Cuban and Cuban-American relatives. In Washington, meanwhile, political maneuvering intensified over legislation to make the 6-year-old a U.S. citizen.

Storm leaves 150,000 without power

NEW YORK — More than 150,000 people in the Southeast are still without power after a massive snowstorm hit the East Coast yesterday. Many schools and businesses across the East also were closed again yesterday, along with all Philadelphia offices and courts and most Maryland state offices. Traffic deaths on snowy and icy roads were reported from the Carolinas to New York, and two people were found dead of exposure in South Carolina. Hundreds of people remain stranded in their cars along Interstate 85 in North Carolina after 2 feet of snow fell.

Hatch ends campaign, endorses Bush

WASHINGTON — Sen. Orrin Hatch dropped out of the presidential race yesterday and endorsed George W. Bush, a man he once quipped would be a good president only after spending eight years as Hatch's No. 2. He said his admiration for Bush had grown during their months on the campaign trail. "I believe Governor Bush is the one who can unite the party and bring the White House back to us," Hatch said. He abandoned the race after a last-place finish in Monday's Iowa caucuses, where he received 1 percent of the Republican votes.

Candidates prepare final N.H. debate

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Presidential candidates engaged last night in their final debate in this state prior to next week's first-in-the-nation primary. The Republicans are up first in a hotly contested race between front-runner George W. Bush and Arizona Sen. John McCain. Struggling to field a sensitive abortion question, GOP presidential candidate John McCain said today if his 15-year-old daughter wanted to end an unwanted pregnancy it would be a "family decision, not her decision."

German cabinet OKs Nazi fund plan

BERLIN — Germany's Cabinet approved a draft law yesterday on distributing payments to survivors of Nazi-era forced and slave labor, but officials said there was still time to change the bill to answer the criticisms of lawyers and victims' groups. The bill was not made public, pending possible changes, and it will be reviewed by the Cabinet again in March. The proposed law has come under attack because earlier versions counted previous compensation against payments victims could receive from the new \$5.2 billion fund.

China tightens controls on Internet

BEIJING — The government yesterday ordered companies to register computer programs used to transmit sensitive data and vendors to reveal the workings of their software, a move that may scare off foreign companies seeking to profit from the Chinese Internet boom. The rules announced also expand China's vague state secrets laws to the Internet. Everyone, from Internet sites to chat-room users, must now gain approval from agencies protecting government secrets before publishing previously unreleased information on the Web.

eToys.com settles suit with Swiss

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Online free speech advocates chalked up a victory this week as eToys.com — a leading e-commerce site — dropped its lawsuit against a group of artists in Switzerland who had been posting provocative images at etoy.com. The settlement marks the conclusion of yet another controversy over domain names as renegade Internet developers create controversial Web sites offensive to corporations.

Dow up 37, Nasdaq down 74

NEW YORK — Just before the closing bell on Wall Street, the Dow industrials were up 36.91 to 11,066.80. Advancing issues on the New York Stock Exchange led decliners 1,596-1,430. The Nasdaq was down 73.63 to 4,093.78.

Flyers' Lindros set to return

PHILADELPHIA — Eric Lindros plans to return to the Philadelphia Flyers' lineup for tonight's home game against Florida, confident he is fully recovered from a Jan. 14 concussion. The game will also mark the debut of center Keith Primeau, acquired from Carolina on Sunday for Rod Brind'Amour. The Flyers are 0-2-2 since Lindros left the lineup and haven't won a game since Jan. 11 at Carolina.

Gay marriage dispute grabs Vermont stage

Despite a snowstorm, more than 1,500 people crammed inside Vermont's Statehouse to offer their opinions on whether gay marriages should be recognized. The forum was the first since the state Supreme Court ruled last month that gay and lesbian couples were being unconstitutionally denied the benefits of marriage.

The Legislature must now decide whether marriage statutes should apply to homosexuals or whether a separate domestic partnership system should be established.

People wore their opinions on their lapels Tuesday, with hundreds of pink circles declaring, "I Support The Freedom to Marry," mixing with hundreds of white ovals with blue letters stating "Don't Mock Marriage."

"Vermont is famous for maple syrup, cheese, scenic beauty and traditional values," said Ruth Goodrich. "Is this gay marriage what we want Vermont to be famous for?"

Lee Moffatt said he and his male partner deserve the same rights as opposite sex couples: "I, too, represent the face of Vermont."

No state has legalized gay marriage. Ever since Hawaii's Supreme Court raised the possibility of same-sex unions in 1993, Congress and 30 states have passed preemptive laws saying they won't recognize such marriages if they are legalized in any other state.

Hawaii has since barred gay marriage, and a March 7 measure on the ballot in California seeks to do essentially the same thing. Vermont is the only state considering legalization.

Legislative leaders and Gov. Howard Dean predict that lawmakers will enact a domestic partnership act, but Jonathan Radigan told lawmakers there is a huge difference between the partnership and marriage.

He said that although he would ask his partner to marry him, "I doubt I will ask him to be my domestic partner. It sounds like someone who cleans the house."

Specialization: the edge in real world career hunts

When competing for a job, something has to distinguish you from the rest of the pack

Many majors at UK offer in-depth courses that allow students to specialize in a particular area within their major.

While that may sound like more work, advisors at UK's career center say these specialties will help students find better jobs when they graduate.

Kim Reinsdorf, an international economics senior, found that the College of Business only offers a minor in international business. She's specialized her degree through the College of Arts and Sciences by pursuing a Spanish degree.

"I have always wanted to work in international business, and this is the best way to obtain the background knowledge that will be required when I go into the work field," she said.

Students enrolled in their college can take courses which give them a specialty that give them more knowledge within their area of study, said Ken Freedman, assistant director of central advising.

"We have many areas students can focus on once they get into the upper division," he said.

Such specialties can be found in the university bulletin listed under each college.

For example, students in the College of Agriculture have various specialization courses such as agricultural communications, agricultural education or an option for public service and leadership.

"Students would take courses outside of the College of Agriculture that would focus on their specialty," said Susan Skoss, director of academic services in the College of Agriculture. "The types of courses and the hours a student would take would be decided depending on the specialty."

Students who are undeclared or want to find a specialty within their major can take a System Integrated Guidance and Information test that is administered on a computer. The test results give the student an idea of what might interest him.

Some students have taken such tests in the past.

"My high school gave us a career test and a few of the suggestions for possible careers included dancer and garbage man," said Thad Stolarski, a finance freshman.

But students are reminded that the test answers are not the absolute truth.

"The test results are not fool proof answers," Freedman warns. "They are merely food for thought."

Any student who is currently undeclared or is interested in a specialty within their college can contact the testing center at Frazee Hall to schedule a vocational test.

New Hampshire primary in Democrats favor

The abbreviated race for New Hampshire is shaping up on the Democratic side as, in Bill Bradley's words, "a whole new ball game," with Vice President Al Gore seeking opportunities to hitch himself to President Clinton's economic coattails.

Gore, who boomerangs between shunning Clinton and embracing him, has settled on the latter in his attempt to win next week's primary and deny Bradley any comeback from his sound defeat in Iowa.

Gore was reaching yesterday for a chunk of the credit for the 1996 welfare reform that congressional Republicans pushed and Clinton signed. The theme of Gore's noontime appearance at the Electropac company here was timed, aides said, to dovetail with Clinton's welfare-related announcement yesterday of new measures to collect back child support.

Gore's all-out drive for New Hampshire includes spending about \$20,000 on a half-hour TV "infomercial" to air on Saturday, two days before the vote.

Not only was Gore campaigning on the current record-breaking economic expansion but also on the premise that he could lead the country into deeper prosperity.

"The question that must be answered in this election is not whether or not we're better off than seven years ago. We know that we are," Gore said. "The question is can we do even better?"

On Thursday, Gore was briefly suspending his commitment to campaign in New Hampshire "every minute of every hour of every day" lead-

ing to next Tuesday's ballot, to fly to Washington to be with Clinton in the House chamber for the State of the Union address.

"What the Clinton-Gore administration has done over the last seven years economically helps Al Gore a lot, and I think President Clinton will be a very valuable asset during the campaign," said Bob Shrum, a top Gore adviser.

In his one appearance Tuesday, Bradley appealed to voter distaste with negative politics.

"If you are tired of misrepresentation in political campaigns to pursue a personal agenda, if you are tired of what you have seen in the last decade in this country, then you can send a message," he said at Alvirne High School in Hudson.

Bradley and his wife, Ernestine, later waited out the snowstorm at a Holiday Inn as Gore exhausted his entourage — sleepless from a week-long flight out of Iowa — by skidding around Manchester looking for things to do.

What was to have been a one-rally day for Gore, who professed to be running on just one hour's sleep, was suddenly crammed with impromptu stops at Dunkin' Donuts, the plow garage and an MTV rock concert, for which Gore changed into tight blue jeans.

Now that Gore has reclaimed his front-runner's edge in statewide polls, voters like Joe Sullivan, a teacher and self-described liberal, suggest that Bradley has little time to waste in demonstrating an ability to beat Gore.

"I thought Bill Bradley was a hell of a candidate, but, in the long run, if Al Gore is going to be the nominee, I figured I might as well get on board," Sullivan said.

'Game of survival': Fight past intense offense, tied score

ATHENS, Ga. — Cue the hallelujah chorus.

With a hard-fought, 75-69 victory over the homestanding Bulldogs Wednesday night, UK coach Tubby Smith reassured his dominance over the gymnasium — once known as "The Tub." However, the success of the former savior of Georgia basketball was in doubt virtually till the night's conclusion.

"It was a game of survival," said coach Smith. "Georgia really got after us down the stretch."

With just under four minutes remaining, Georgia forward Anthony Evans knotted the affair at 64.

The Cats, effortlessly holding their composure before a frenzied gathering at Stegeman Coliseum, scored four straight on layups from Jamaal Magloire and Tayshaun Prince. Georgia drew to within two with :58 to play, but its offensive attack ran dry in the final minute as Magloire and Prince scored the final three points to clinch the victory.

UK scored 43 points before the half-time buzzer — the Cats' most prolific opening period of the season. UK freshman Keith Bogans, who finished with 14 points, scored the Cats' final eight of the half to give his team a 43-37 advantage.

But Georgia, coming off its best performance of the season — a 90-62 win over South

Carolina — led for much of the first half, with junior forward Shon Coleman scoring 15 of his 26 points.

Magloire, fresh off being named the Southeastern Conference Player of the Week, continued his stalwart play, successfully battling UGA's inside game to finish with 19 points, 10 rebounds.

"Jamaal was really the difference maker," coach Smith said.

UK sophomore Tayshaun Prince was key down the stretch, scoring 10 of his 14 points in the second half. Despite a poor offensive first half, he turned the Dawgs away in a quiet, consistent fashion. Coach Smith attributed the deadly silence of Prince's attack to his defensive orientation.

"Tayshaun was concentrating on the defense more than offense. He's kind of unassuming the way he scores," he said.

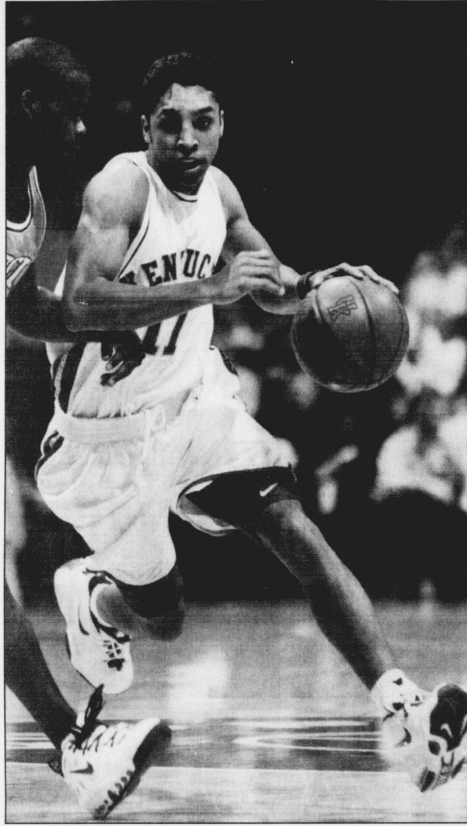
Smith was pleased with the Cats' continued offensive success. The strong showing bodes well for the rest of the season.

"We had good balance again. That's what we need to win," he said. "If we can continue to shoot the way we did tonight, we'll have a lot of success."

UGA coach Jim Harrick chose to go with the man-to-man defense against UK.

After the game, he felt that the Cats would have scored one way or another.

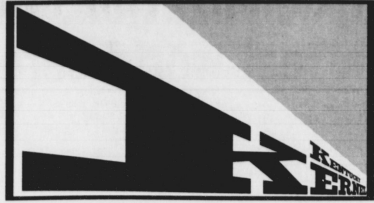
"We decided to go with the man-to-man. You've got to pick your poison," Harrick said.

Magloire continues excellent play

Growing confidence: Jamaal continues roll; "We couldn't stop him," says Harrick

ATHENS, Ga. — A few years ago, many would believe the words "Jamaal Magloire" and "go-to-player" to be the perfect oxymoron.

But with several NBA scouts on hand, the UK center showed why he opted to return for his senior season.

In another display of low-post dominance, Magloire scored a team-high 19 points and pulled down 10 rebounds for his eighth double-double of the season while leading the Cats to a 75-69 win over Georgia.

"We couldn't stop him," said Georgia coach Jim Harrick. "He was the difference in the game. He's better than any big man we've faced all year."

Proving his maturity and newfound success as an on-the-floor-leader, Magloire scored what was probably UK's most important two buckets of the night. On the heels of a Bulldog run, Magloire's floating one-hander with 2:35 remaining silenced the 10,000-plus standing fans and put UK up four. Close to a minute later, after a three pointer by Georgia's Adrian Jones that cut the Wildcat lead to two, Magloire answered with another lay-in-all part of the show according to UK coach Tubby Smith.

"We're always looking for him," Smith said, admitting probably the only way to stop the big man is by double-team. "It's really tough for anyone to stay with him one-on-one."

Coaches weren't the only ones impressed with Magloire's play last night. A scout from the New Jersey Nets was overheard whispering a surprised "wow."

When asked to describe Ma-

gloire's game, the scout said: "He's just so big."

Perhaps Magloire's line said the rest.

"Everything's coming together now," Magloire said. "I feel confident when I have the ball."

While junior Shon Coleman exploded for a career-high 26 point performance for the Bulldogs, the team's second leading scorer Anthony Evans (16.1 points per game) shot just 4-of-10 from the field and finished with 12 points. Once again Magloire was a force on both ends of the court.

"Jamaal's the best low-post defender in the country," Smith said. "It's hard for anyone to shoot over 6-10 when you're a good shot blocker."

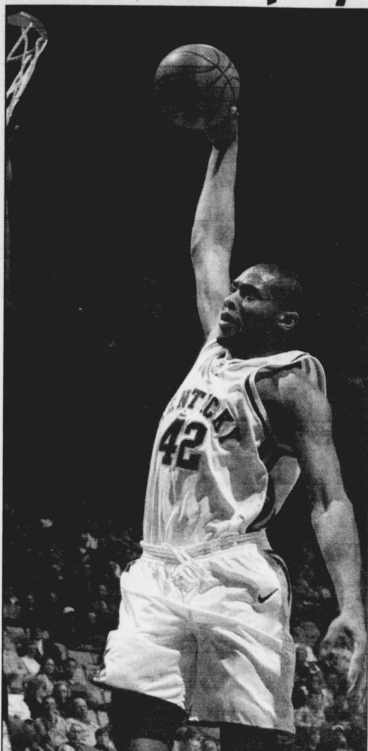
In an age where the temptation of a pro contract seems to subdue college talent and suck it dry, Magloire's a diamond in the rough. After last season, Georgia lost leading scorer Jumaane Jones to the NBA. Across state, Dion Glover jumped ship from Georgia Tech.

"He stays in school, and look what it does," Harrick said. "Jones leaves. Glover leaves. We struggle. (Georgia Tech) struggles. I'm sure Kentucky would've struggled without Magloire. He's a very, very good college player — a little bit better than probably anybody in the SEC."

For Magloire, last night's performance was just another day wearing blue.

Sure, he wants to be a top draft pick in the NBA. But that seems to be the least of his concerns. Right now, anyway.

"If we win, everything takes care of itself," Magloire said. "My first priority is to win a national championship."

A tale of two very different teams

Ups and downs: UK and Alabama's teams polar opposites

In an evil parallel universe somewhere, Alabama could beat Kentucky.

Kentucky returns all five starters from last season, while Alabama returns one. Kentucky looks to score inside first, while the Crimson Tide starts on the perimeter and works its way inside, almost as an afterthought.

UK has used the same starting five all season. UA has used at least eight different starting lineups. The two teams even feature former junior college teammates at Trinity Valley (Tex.) Community College: UK's Shantia Owens and UA's Boo Barnes.

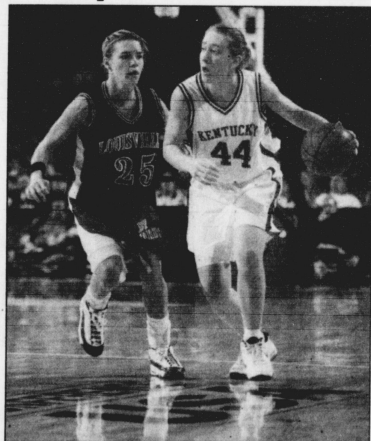
And while UK has increased their quality of play since beginning their Southeastern Conference schedule, UA has regressed: They've increased the number of turnovers by nearly four per game. The shooting percentages of every starter have declined. Their assists are down. And their lone win came over perennial doormat Ole Miss, and the Crimson Tide had to overcome a 19-point deficit to pull out that lone SEC win.

But UK coach Bernadette Mattox isn't buying any of that as her team prepares for their clash in Tuscaloosa, Ala., tonight.

"They're really starting to come into their own," she said of UA's squad. "They're very athletic. They rebound the ball. They run a triangle offense and they get great movement from all their players."

Both teams are coming off losses at home, but in very different circumstances. UK scared the bejeesus out of No. 4 Tennessee, while UA lost by 20 to No. 22 Mississippi State. In their game with MSU, the Crimson Tide shot a less-than-stellar 39.7 percent from the field and recorded six assists to 23 turnovers.

Mattox hopes the Cats have

put all thoughts of what might have been against UT behind them.

"They know you can't sit and dwell on that," she said. "They know how well they played in the second half. They're aware of what they're capable of. Hopefully we'll be ready to do that."

UK will look to establish their inside game, considering that Alabama runs a three-guard offense. But height isn't necessarily a guarantee of success, Mattox cautioned.

"Look at LSU," she said, referring to the Lady Tiger's 66-59 win over UK in which LSU neutralized the Cats' height advantage. "They're all short across the board, yet they battled against us. You've still got to come out and fight. It's not a given."

Alabama has patched the holes left by graduation by hitting the JUCO ranks, and they've yielded Barnes and

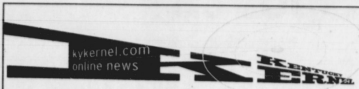

Taquilla Allen, UA's leading scorer. The 5'9" Allen plays nearly 35 minutes per game in conference, and she's averaging 15.3 points per game.

"They've got a few players from junior colleges, and they're all coming in and doing a good job. All their JUCOs are starting to come around," Mattox said.

This is the first of three straight home games for UK, who will visit Tennessee and Arkansas on the next two Sundays, respectively.

"It doesn't matter who's on the floor," Mattox said. "If you don't come out ready to play in this conference, it doesn't matter who you're going against."

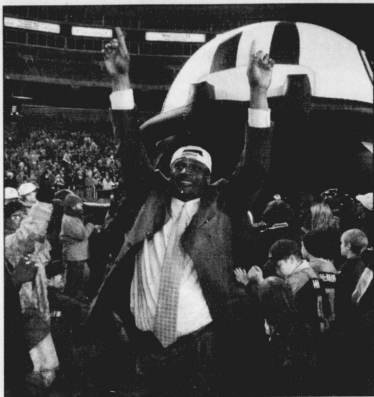

Teams prepare for big battle



Titans on top

The St. Louis Rams and Tennessee Titans just started creating excitement in their own cities this season. They sure haven't built a national following yet.

That's the challenge facing ABC this week, getting the entire country interested about two teams most people haven't seen play until the last couple of weeks.

"This game is perfect for the fans tired of seeing the Packers, 49ers and Broncos every year," ABC announcer Al Michaels said. "This is probably the most improbable Super Bowl matchup of all time. Looking at it in the preseason, this would have been an almost inconceivable pairing."

The Rams didn't make a single prime-time appearance on either ABC or ESPN, and their 14 games on Fox were shown, on average, to about 20 percent of the country. The Cowboys got more than 2.5 times that exposure.

The Titans, who played twice on ESPN, were beamed, on average, to about 12 percent of the nation on CBS — less than one-quarter of the coverage area of the Dolphins.

There hasn't been a Super Bowl between two outsiders like this since Cincinnati played San Francisco in 1982 — the only other matchup of teams that didn't have winning records the previous year.

"This is a very challenging matchup for us," ABC director

Craig Janoff said. "These are two teams we haven't seen on Monday nights. I don't think anyone would have predicted this."

Certainly the NFL schedule makers didn't think that Tennessee and St. Louis would go from a combined 12-20 last season to the Super Bowl this season. Or that Atlanta and Denver would go from the Super Bowl to a combined 11-21.

That's why the NFL is considering a proposal for next year to hold off deciding which late-season games will be shown on Monday nights and nationally on Sunday afternoons until a few weeks before, instead of a few months.

"Clearly as our schedule evolved this year, it didn't turn out great," ABC producer Ken Wolfe said. "San Francisco, the Jets and Denver falling apart makes for a difficult time for all of us. I don't think the league was entirely happy. If this comes to pass, it would be a great thing for the us and the fans."

So instead, the four-hour pregame show will mix in an emotional feature on Walter Payton with a national introduction to the two teams playing this week.

"We can't take for granted that everyone watching is totally familiar with these two teams," said John Filippelli, the vice president of production for ABC Sports. "It's incumbent on us to find the right balance between letting people know the players and doing what's emotional."

The ABC's of inline

So many to choose: Your personal guide to shopping for inline skates

Pretty soon the snow will disappear and warm weather will call you outside. Inline skating, a perfect activity for the outdoors can serve as a means of recreation for the active.

If you've already started shopping around, you've probably noticed the different types of inline skates.

Here's a short buyer's guide to help you sort through the mess.

First off, you need to know what kind of skating you plan to do. The main categories consist of recreational skating, fitness skating and aggressive skating.



Recreational skates

These skates will suit you well for skating around parks or campus and having an all around good time. There are two main types of skates within this category:



Hard shell

These skates look similar to ski boots and are the most recognized among the public. This variety tends to be less expensive, starting at around \$90 and going upward to \$200 for a better pair. They also offer slightly more support and durability.

Soft boot

Soft boot skates feel and fit like regular shoes and are lighter and more comfortable. You sacrifice a little support and durability with this variety. A pair of these will run you at least \$120.

Neither of these skates are necessarily better than the other. It's just a matter of personal preference.



Aggressive skates

Their small, hard wheels and tank-like boots identify these skates that are used for stunt and trick skating.

Probably the most important aspect of an aggressive skate is its durability. You want to get something that will take the abuse of being slammed against walls, half pipes and railings. Prices start at around \$120.



Detachable skates

These are a new variety of skates on the market. As the name implies, the chassis is detachable from the boot. This allows you to skate to class, snap off the wheels and walk into class. What better way to look suave?

The biggest drawback is you're left wearing bulky, ugly shoes that don't feel as comfy as your regular kicks. Combine that with their higher price — they run at least \$160 — and you realize why these are not as popular as regular inline skates.

When buying any skate, quality is probably the most important factor. Purchasing qual-

ity brands like Rollerblade, K2,

Bauer or Roces makes it easier to take care of problems

that might arise and to find replacement parts.

To find the skate that suits you best, try on different varieties by different manufacturers. Just like shoes, each brand will fit differently.

You also want to pay attention to the bearing number. The bearings should have an A B E C number, usually between one and seven with one being the slowest, seven being the fastest. Beginners should start with ABEC-1s. These will keep you from picking up way too much speed and flying into a tree at the bottom of the hill. As your skill increases, you can upgrade your bearings.

Another important thing to consider when buying a pair of inline skates is where you buy them. Go to a store with employees who know what they're talking about and can help you find the best skate for your budget.

Inline skating and skateboarding revived

Skateboarding and inline skating continue to gain popularity among all age groups

University of Kentucky students have always complained that the campus should be more commuter-friendly. Coupled with the lack of student parking and traffic jams, driving to class can be a venture.

Due to the inconvenience of driving, people of all ages have begun adopting a more accessible set of wheels to travel: skateboards and inline skates.

The rebellious sport of the '80s has seen a recent influx in popularity on the national and local spectrum. Once perceived as the badge for irreverent punks, kids of all shapes, sizes and backgrounds revived the sport, proving their youth is not misguided, just misunderstood.

Originally popular in California, skating has become a more publicized and national sport in the past few years. "My customers are anywhere from 11 to 33," said Tony Connor, co-owner of the Void Skateshop.

Connor and his friend Job Fawns opened The Void, which sells skateboards, shoes and clothing, nearly two and a half years ago, and both played instrumental roles in the building of the Woodland Skatepark. Paired with the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, local skaters provided the ideas for the park and the county explored the financial and construction aspects.

Since its opening, skateboarders and inline skaters have crowded the park religiously. Connor estimates that he skates at the park four to five hours everyday. Some skaters will drive from as far away as Richmond or Cincinnati to skate for a few hours and then turn around and go home.

Large crowds often develop outside the skating area to watch skaters. A myriad of personalities, including small children, college students and adults, watch as skaters attempt a variety of moves from railslides to kick-flips.

Since the opening of the park, the interest in skateboarding and inline skating has skyrocketed.

"There is a whole new group of kids who didn't even know what a skateboard was, and now they're riding," Connor said.

If popularity continues to increase, then students will no longer have to worry about trying to drive to class. They can simply strap on some skates or jump on a board, and parking will definitely not be a problem.

Patrick Justice, an undeclared freshman and avid skateboarder, loves the sport. He said his health has improved since he started skating.

"Skateboarding is good for your cardiovascular health," Justice said. "Your calves and leg muscles get pretty big."

Skating, however, isn't for the weak at heart or the weak of legs. Justice said he discourages older people from taking up the sport because of its intensity and the difficulty associated with learning the tricks.

Old and young alike can acquire injuries in the world of skating. A report conducted by the Consumer Product Safety Commission showed that one in every twenty-five inline skaters will have an injury that warrants a hospital visit this year. With pads, this chance of injury is decreased, but not totally eradicated.

Despite the risks associated with inline skating and skateboarding, your heart and muscles could benefit. According to the International Inline Skating Association's Webpage (www.iisa.org), you can burn 450 calories in a half-hour of skating. The webpage also states that the amount of calories you burn changes depending on how fast you skate, how often you skate and the type of inclines you take.

Though less effective than running, skating falls in an area that appeals to both young and middle aged people. Besides, who wouldn't want to see their mom or dad on skates?

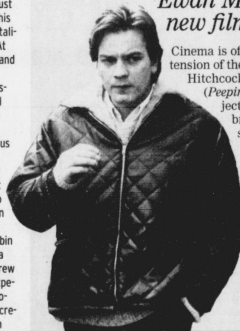

Higher education happenings

The climate looks good for those pursuing higher education. Here are a few updates on what's going on.

Patton asks for higher ed money

Tuesday, Gov. Paul Patton proposed his financially-ambitious higher education budget, which includes increases in universities' operating budgets, monies for endowments, enrollment and retention efforts and construction/renovation.

To fund these projects, Patton is asking for a nearly 20 percent increase over his last budget. This jump will raise the Council on Postsecondary Education budget from the current \$974 million to \$1.16 billion by fiscal 2002. The council oversees all of Kentucky's colleges and universities.

The proposal also allocates \$120 million for the "Bucks for Brains" endowment program, which enables state universities to use state matching money to attract top researchers and teachers to their campuses. Last year UK maximized the amount of money it could receive from this program.



Clinton wants more Americans in college

Last week, President Clinton proposed a \$31 billion plan to make college education more affordable. The crowning jewel of the proposal was a \$10,000 tax deduction to help millions of Americans pay for tuition, books and university fees.

At least that's what Kroger, the nation's largest grocery chain, operating 2,268 grocery stores, including Fred Meyer, has suggested to Cosmopolitan magazine. Kroger is covering up the front of Cosmopolitan, which is the No. 1 magazine read by women on college campuses.

Cosmo's enticing covers featuring classic lines such as, "Be the Best Sex of His Life," "How to Tease Him Mercilessly, Seduce Him Slowly, and Then Rock His World in Ways He's Only Dreamed About," are apparently not suitable for the checkout stand.

Pressure groups, such as Morality in Media, and customer complaints are what encouraged Kroger to take such drastic measures.

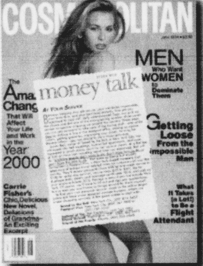
And according to Kroger spokesman Gary Rhodes, it's Cosmo's storylines that are more of a concern than the images. Mr. Rhodes must have realized that distinguishing between words and images is important. After all, if it were an image of a woman in a skimpy dress with cleavage that was the problem, all women's magazines would have to be covered up at the checkout stand.

A trip to Fred Meyer makes this situation seem somewhat interesting. In a myopic attempt to cover up what traditionally may be considered the sexiest women's magazine in the world, founded by the infamous Helen Gurly Brown, the grocery store failed to consider any other women's and men's magazines that also say "sex" on their cover.

What about the February 2000 issue of Glamour, which is openly exposed right beside the hidden Cosmo, stating: "Let's talk about sex: 1) 23 Erotic Ways to Make Sex with Him Sweeter, 2) Sex and Size: Is He Too Big? Are You? How to

Maximize Your Pleasure Match, 3) Top 5 Things to Do Before a Big Date." This line must have passed the Fred Meyer test of what's appropriate for its customers, or will it soon be covered up too?

Hmmm ... I wonder what comes next. Are condoms on the hit list? You've seen the words on those boxes, things like "plea-



sure," "extra large," etc. Perhaps they too should have a black cover. What about the lingerie department? Are you sure undergarments are suitable for customers' eyes — you may want to reconsider these departments — bras and panties can be pretty traumatic for a young child.

And what are we to do about the men's magazines with covers of practically nude women on them? Men's Journal this month, for example, features a woman in a strapping bikini with no lining that barely covers her breasts or her crotch area. Should this magazine even be allowed in the store?

It seems to me that the Kroger criteria, and that Morality in Media group and customer complaints that encouraged it, are fo-

cusling on the wrong issues. I mean come on, we live in a world where 5-year-olds get on the Internet at school and view hateful, violent, hard-core pornography and then go home to watch Howard Stern asking women to strip down so he can rate their bodies. Don't you think there are more important things to worry about than the cover of Cosmopolitan?

Mainstream women's magazines aren't hateful, they are not pornographic and, in many ways, they are a valuable forum for women.

Consider that over the years these publications have moved women's health agendas, made clear that "no means no," fought the glass ceiling, screamed equal pay for equal work and in the case of Cosmopolitan, made women active sexual beings (granted, it's mostly with the goal of pleasing men but it's better than the chastity belts of last century).

So please, leave these magazines alone. Let their readers decide the publications' fate, not some special interest group and a few disgruntled grocery store customers.

And for those still saying, "But what about the children?" direct your energies elsewhere. Find pay for equal work and in the case of Cosmopolitan, made women active sexual beings (granted, it's mostly with the goal of pleasing men but it's better than the chastity belts of last century).

Sex is a part of life; in fact, it makes life. Women are a part of sex, and they're allowed to talk about it — so if you're looking for something to cover up, look elsewhere.

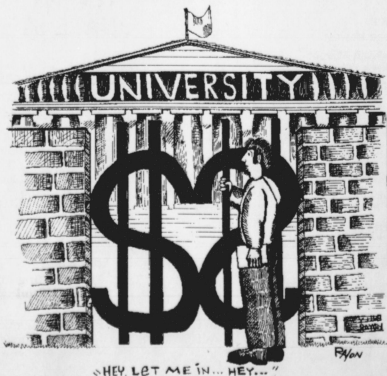
