NEW YORK — A U.N. scientific panel on climate change says it is now convinced that global temperatures have warmed over the last century because of human activity, The New York Times reported yesterday.

The statement, contained in a draft summary of a report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, marks a shift in the views of top climatologists, who previously said that they could not tell whether global warming has been caused by the burning of fossil fuels or natural climatic variations.

The experts now say that a new generation of computer studies has given them confidence in computer studies has given them confidence in the parel's summary says global warming "is unlikely to be entirely due to natural causes and that a pattern of climatic response to human activities is identifiable in the climatological record."

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Gov. Brereton Jones left the hospital yesterday and returned to the Governor's Mansion to continue recovering from a back injury he suffered when he fell from a hore, an aide said.

Jones, who went into Central Baptist Hospital on Thursday night, was feeling better yesterday and was able to be up and walk with a walker, Lilly said.

Jones was fitted with a back brace Saturday and Lilly said the brace was working well. The governor wears the brace anytime he is not lying down, Lilly said.

Jones was thrown from a horse on his farm on Labor Day when a saddle strap broke. Doctors have said he fractured two vertebrae in his lower spine, and Jones has described the injury as painful but not serious. His recovery is expected to take some 90 days, or about the amount of time left in his term.

Prohibition will soon be available to Lexington residents. The Lexington City Brewery christened its
tanks on Friday, officially returning beer brewing to
Lexington.

A crowd toured the facilities, getting a first-hand
view of what is going to be the longest bar in Lexington at 114 linear feet.

Patrons will be able to sit at the bar and enjoy
regional specials, like hot brown pizza and watch
their beer be produced.

Thirteen stainless steel and copper vats will produce the four standard and one seasonal beer, brewmaster Brad Fournier said.

The four regional beers draw their names from
local figures including the Belle Breezing Light,



Service offers safe walks

In the midst of darkness, P.J. Foster was not taking any chances walking alone along the shadowy campus paths. The lights around Patterson Office Tower and White Hall Classroom Building were failing Tuesday night, making campus travel treacherous. Foster, a library and information studies graduate student, called the free campus escort service to deliver her safely to her car.

"Most of campus is lit up pretty well," Foster said. "But there are big rows of dark bushes I hate to walk past at night."

Two murders at Ball State University, Foster's undergraduate alma mater, influenced her decision to use the Student Government Association-sponsored service.

The service, run by the Air Force ROTC, offers security and peace of mind for people walking from place to place at night. It is entering its fourth year of existence this fall. Cadets voluntarily run the operation on a rotating basis.

Four or five cadets work from 8:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m., Sunday through Thursday. Chris Berg, one of the cadets, said the service only averages four to six calls per

only averages four to six calls per night.

Berg, a psychology senior, said that 12 calls in one night is the most he has ever encountered.

One problem, Berg said, is people often do not want to wait the 10 to 15 minutes it takes for an escort to come get them. Despite that, the number of users is growing and he thinks more people should take advantage of it.

"The numbers pick up every year," Berg said. "Safety in num-

bers is a deterrent."

Senior cadet Sarah Hale said that women use the service the majority of the time, but said the service is not limited to females. One female and three male, cadets staff the service each night. The men serve as escorts and the women dispatch.

To use the service, call 257-5518. The dispatcher asks the caller's name, location and destination. She records the time of the call and sends an escort with an emergency radio linked to the UK Police. The escort then accompanies that person to his/her car, dorm or other destination around campus. SGA is setting up a new escort service phone number that will be ready in a couple of weeks. When the number is on, the ROTC request that users call 323-FREE first and then 257-5518 if the other line is busy.

Gators send Cats to 12th straight loss

Quarterback controversies on the UK football team are like punts.

Wait a few plays, and chances are you'll see one.

In each of the three seasons prior to this one, the Wildcat QBs found themselves mired in some sort of battle for time. Three years ago, it was Pookie Jones and Ryan Hockman. Then it was Jones and Antonio O'Ferral. Last year it was O'Ferral and Jeff Speedy. And after UK's 42-7 Joss to Florida on Saturday, it's Speedy and Billy Jack Haskins.

Yes, Billy Jack Haskins.

The Paducah, Ky., native entered the game in the fourth quarter and finished 5-for-5 passing for 82 yards, including a 30-yard bomb to true freshman Craig Yeast for UK's only score.

Following the game, UK coach Bill Curry admitted during his postgame press conference that he might have waited too long to pull the trigger on the QB switch, saying "looking back on it, we probably should've" had Haskins in the game earlier.

"Billy Jack Haskins has shown that he deserves a chance to compete and we're going to go into this week with the two quarterbacks even steven and see who does the job on the practice field, said Curry, who added that a decision on the starting QB will come some time later this week.

Both quarterbacks will receive an equal number of reps during practice. But Curry said Haskins needs to "develop poise at the line of scrimmage" while Speedy needs to start throwing on rhythm.

However, the UK coach said "a great deal of what happened tonight was not Jeff's fault," in reference to several dropped passes by UK receivers.

Haskins, meanwhile, made his





case on the field, but didn't politic much after the game.

"Watching from the sidelines, I thought I could make the plays (Speedy) was making," Haskins said. "But Jeff was moving the ball down the field if (the receivers) would've caught it."

Speedy credited the Florida defense for his 6-for-21 passing night. He threw for only 40 yards in three quarters of work.

"There was no intimidation to it, I was just off rhythm," he said. "If we would've executed the plays, we'd have had a chance at the end of the game."

So where does that leave the controversy 'Still hanging around. And at least one Wildcat thinks that's a good thing. Moe Williams, who started at tailback on Saturday, knows all about controversy over a starting job. He lost his to Raymond McLaurin prior to the season.

Third-stringer runs roughshod over porous Wildcat defense

Give UK's defense credit, said
Florida wide receiver and all-purpose Wildcat nemesis China
Boering — they sure do hit hard.
But Florida's bruised offense merely winced, as several Gator backups shined against UK.
Elijah Williams went down first. Florida's starting tailback was kicked badly in the ankle.
Next went Fred Taylor, the second-string tailback from Florida. He suffered a slight shoulder separation early in the game.
The depth chart contained only one other name at that slot — Terry Jackson, a redshirt freshman.

"The next thing I knew, Terry was it," Florida coach Steve Spurrier said. "And he certainly responded well."

Statistically, Jackson's response sesulted in 16 rushes for 138 yards. The third-stringer found enough holes against a mostly

Florida sophomore Ernie Dubose, who wasn't even listed on the depth chart, filled in at full-back in the fourth quarter and finished with 30 yards on six caries.

"Florida has great players at tailback," UK coach Bill Curry said. "They have at least three players who are ever hard to tackle in the open field."

Meanwhile, Jackson, the brother of Florida's former star wide receiver Willie Jackson, was happy just to get his hands on the ball.
"I hadn't had the opportunity to carry the ball like this in a long time," Jackson said.

He was moved to fullback as a junior in high school. Then, he was recruited by Florida — and UK— as a defensive back.

After a slew of injuries last spring left Florida crippled at the tailback spot, Jackson was given a shot at returning to the backfield.

"We watched him run last spring, and certainly he's a quality back," Spurrier said. "We left him there, fortunately."



"I wasn't planning on singing this song tonight, or this decade, he says.

It's a special moment when he asks the audience to sing along, and the voices of everyone in the hall fill the room on the chorus.

He tells me about the re-recording of "Alice's Restaurant," his most famous song. Due to problems with Warner Brothers

about the rights to the album (which is still making a substantial amount of money, he says), he decided to re-record it on his own label instead of fight for it.

It was an unusual experience to do this recording, he says, because of advances in technology since it was originally done in the '60s, like multi-track recording. Additionally, some instruments he used the first time around are not easily available now.

"We made a '60s album in the '90s," he says.

The album is currently undergoing final mastering after recording ended last week and is due to be released soon, along with a new

album of material, "Mystic Jour-ney," which marks Arlo's first new studio album in ten years. We talk about touring, which he does almost all the time. His home is in Massachusetts, but he not there much. "I love being on the road," he says. Johnathon brings in a small, chic-looking pizza for Arlo, who asks me if I mind if he eats while we're talking. I keep hoping he'll offer me a piece, but alsa, I was not destined to share a pizza with Arlo Guthrie. In between bites, he tells me a story of being 13 years old and seeing Bluegrass legend Bill Mon-roe play for free in Washington

Square Park in New York, which really impressed him.




