SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION,

FRANKFORT, OCTOBER 18, 1875.

DEAR SIR: A note on the Teachers' Register is as follows: "When the School is half taught out, let the Trustee give the Teacher a certificate of the fact, upon which he will draw forty per cent. of his pay. When the School is completed," &c. This is misunderstood. It refers simply to the time the Teacher is entitled to his voucher. The time for *payment* is prescribed by law to be January 10th (40 per cent.), February 15th, May 15th, and July 1st. Let Commissioners ALWAYS be governed by "Kentucky School Laws and Manual."

Roseburg Oregon June 21. 1881

Dear Sister:

I replied to your letter of the 3. 30 in which I acknowledged the receipt of your presents but as you made no acknowledgement of its receipt nor referred to it in your letter of condolence to my wife I must conclude that it was lost during the high water at Omaha, as I have not received it from the dead letter office. I must therefore say as well as I can what I said before, promising that my precious letter written upon the spur of the moment was more enthusiastic than this is likely to be. I cannot thank you too much for the kindness you displayed in sending us the mementoes of our father and mother, and the delicacy of tact which prompted you to send what we most highly prized. My old Sabre, my mothers quilt, my grandfathers certificate, the spoon, my old papers, the grandfathers watch (which is now running all bring vividly to my mind boyhoods days and cannot be other than an extreme gratification to one who has been almost thirty years beyond the range of civilization

The miniature you refer to was executed by a Mexican artist in Puebla during the armistice and the locket was made in the same City + I gave it to my sister Maria, and was anxious to know what became of it. I wrote to Mr Duke on the subject when he was in San Francisco, but he never answered my letter + I would like to have it as a memento of her and also to show to my wife who never saw me while I was young. William (Billy) McMaster's deer has been placed on a tatin properly framed and occupies a prominent position on the wall of our chief room + I will write him as soon as I have leisure, thanking him, but why cannot you <sup>give me</sup> a specimen of your handiwork. You must know that we would prize it very highly however small it might be +

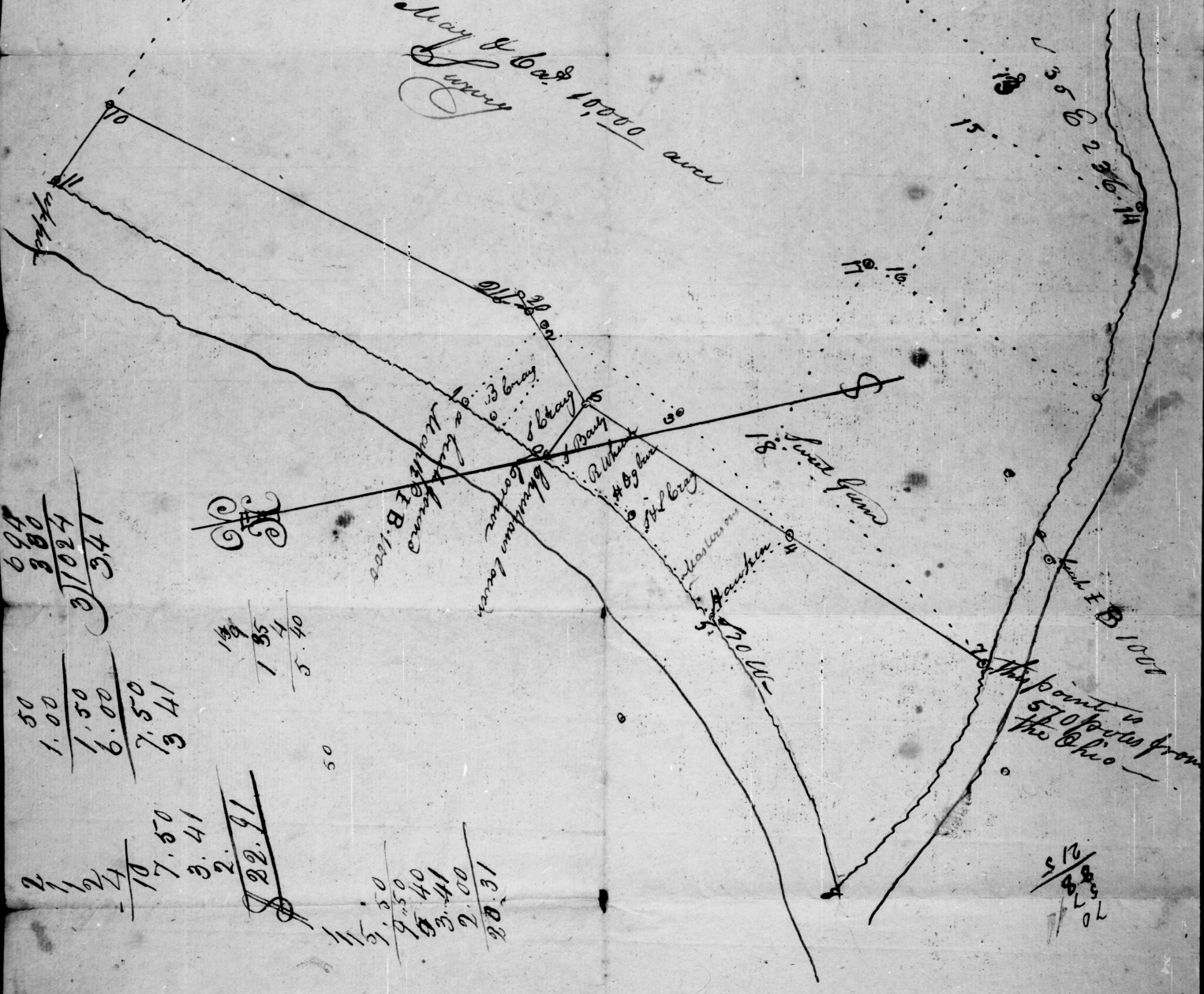
