WASHINGTON — A federal appeals court yesterday upheld the Environmental Protection Agency's authority to require 19 states to control interstate drifting of smog-causing chemicals from power plants. The U.S. Court of Appeals' 21 decision was a victory for the EPA and air-pollution control officials in the Northeast, and a set-back for utilities in the Ohio Valley and Midwest. The EPA issued the regulation in late 1986 in an attempt for the first time to reduce the interstate movement of smog-causing pollution.

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — The nation needs a president with a more consistent foreign policy that goes beyond being "the world's volunted fire department," Democrat presidential campaigner Bill Bradley said yesterday.
