Yet in spite of every effort that has been made to reduce the length of the casualty list 1957 had a very had record. The latest figure show that during its entire course 108 people lost their lives through motor vehicle accident every day of the 365.

Show that during its entire course too people lost their lives through more vehicle accidents every day of the 365.

Moreover, 1,360,000 persons were injured, great numbers permanently crippled or disabled. The total of deaths and injuries more than equalled the casualities of the World War, so far as American participation was concerned. It is conservatively estimated that the economic losses lagt year, amounted to at least \$1,700,000,000. As there was an increase of four per cent in casualities in '37, if the same rate of increase continues, 1938 will show one in every 13 of the population injured or killed.

Safety teaching in the schools seems to have had a most wholesome effect, as traffic accidents involving children under 15 decreased last year, and the death rate among children under 1se years fell by eight per cent.

Every method so far employed, and others that may not have been thought of, should be used, and with added zeal, in efforts to cut the toll of the machine and to render streets and coads safer for all that have to use them.

In the end it comes back to a question of individual sense of responsibility and spirit of consideration. Until each driver determines to car with due caution, to obey all rules, to give others the rights which belong to them, and to keep always in the forefront of the mind the importance of acting rationally and with becoming self-control, the slaughter will go on.
