Some believe sexual preference can lead to losing one's job, especially if that job is with a Baptist organization.

Pedreira, a 36-year-old lesbian, was dismissed from her job at Kentucky Baptist Homes for Children, a home for emotionally disturbed children, in October 1988 after her employers learned of her sexual orientation. She was a counselor at KBHC.

In a 1998 interview, Brenda Gray, KBHC's vice president for development and communications, said the organization strove to be fair in their dealings with all people, especially employees, but a homosexual lifestyle was contrary to their Christian values.

This year KBHC received \$15 million of its \$21 million budget from the state, according to a spokeswoman for the children's home.

Dow ends up 245, Nasdag falls 87

NEW YORK — Blue chip stocks surged yesterday, offsetting some of the damage in the technology sector where investors again sold off shares or turned away from companies viewed as too risky. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 245, 54 at 10,855,7, according to preliminary calculations, the second straight session that the blue chips have gained more than 200 points. On the NYSE, gainers led losers by a 240-1 ration.

ROLLA, Mo. — The widow of Missouri Gov-ROLLA, Mo. — The widow of Missouri Governor Mel Carnahan said yesterday she will accept appointment to the U.S. Senate if voters pick him over Republican incumbent John Asheroft next week. Jean Carnahan, 66, has never run for held public office, but she was offered a Senate appointment by Gov. Roger Wilson if Missouri toters chosee the governor who died in an Oct. 18 plane crash. Mrs. Carnahan's announcement came two weeks to the day after Carnahan, 66, the Carnahans eldest son, Roger, 44, and Carnahan adviser Chris Sifford, 37, died when a small plane piloted by Roger Carnahan crashed outside St. Louis on the way to a campaign rally.

#### Storms hit Britain, France; Four die

LONDON — A powerful storm barreled across western Europe yesterday, ravaging ancient oaks, grounding flights, cutting power to more than 100,000 homes and snarling traffic. At least eight people have been killed. The Eurostar train service, linking London with Paris and Brussels, was out of commission, and France's famous high-speed trains limped along at half-speed, as winds gusting up to 90 mph tossed trees onto highways and rail lines. Scores of flights were canceled at London's Heathrow airport-the world's busiest for international travel - and also at Gatwick outside London.

#### IRS may see credit card records

MIAMI — In a sweeping tax-evasion probe, the IRS was granted access yesterday to thousands of MasterCard and American Express credit card accounts held by U.S. taxpayers in three offshore banking havens. A judge agreed with the IRS that cardholders may have violated U.S. tax laws and that their identities are not readily available from other sources. The court order allows the IRS to issue summonses for charge, debit and credit cards issued or paid by banks in the Bahamas, the Cayman Islands and the country of Antigua and Barbuda in 1998 and 1999.

Louisville that prohibits dis-crimination against homosex-uals, but it does not apply to religious organizations.

The case has turned Pe-dreira into a local symbol for lesbian and gay rights, and on a larger scale, civil rights, which has gained her the sup-port of a wide array of individ-uals, including the parents of a child that was under her care, and the Rev. Paul Simmons, a former professor at the South-ern Baptist Theological Semi-nary in Louisville.

The contraction of the reasons the UK chapter of the ACLU is bring-ing Pedreira to campus.

Casey Holland, a political science sophomore and presi-dent of UK's ACLU, said the

goal of Pedreira's visit is to let people know that efforts are being made to stop this sort of discrimination.

"We want people to know that if this sort of thing happens, there is a recourse," he said. "This is not acceptable practice for a government-funded organization."

practice for a government-numerical organization."

The case also bears national significance by raising questions about where the Constitution draws the line concerning public funding of religious organizations. Supporters of Pedreira claim that Kentucky is violating the Constitution's establishment clause by using taxpayer money to fund a particular brand of Christianity. Holland is also concerned

tax dollars.
"Personally, I don't feel comfortable with my tax money being used to practice discrimination," he said.







Funkhouser used to be the Biological Sciences Building where one professor kept monkeys on the top floor. Every Halloween fraternity members would sneak into the building and release all of the monkeys allowing them to run free through the building.

The Gillis Building used to be the University Infirmary.

In 1975 the rage on campus was "Hit Man, Inc." This group of students was dedicated to "relieve the strain of school and the boredom of everyday life," by sending messengers to provide a "pie in the eye." Cost to customers was \$5 for students, \$35 for professors, and \$150 for administrators.

Rose Street used to be the boundary of campus, but in the 1960's the University ran out of space and had to move across the street.

The same architect who designed the south campus towers also designed the Kennedy Center. There were three towers in the original design.

Whitehall Classroom Building was built in the 1960's with bricks from the original classroom building.

On the first floor of the Administration Building there are magnificent pictures of the campus from the early 1900's. They include the lake where the Student Center is currently as well as the original Whitehall Building.

The most difficult aspect of Greek life, and the one that best prepares Greeks for the business world is accountability. Each fraternity and sorority at UK is a self governing business. It is up to the various members to collect, budget, and spend money collected from dues. At UK the amount of money circulated each year is over \$3.2 million. This money may not go where you think. Chapters must pay dues to their governing councils (IFC, PC, Nubian), their national organizations, and alumni boards. In addition many chapters pay for their housing, utilities, and general upkeep of their living facilities. Only after all that money is set aside do chapters start to determine how much money to put into philanthropic, recruitment, and social events.

Greeks also learn through their experiences how best develop their own skills within their organizations. The number of Greeks who start out as quiet members with no confidence speaking in front of a group is higher than those who finish that way. The number of Greeks who have a problem holding peers accountable is lower as their experience in their chapter grows. In talking to alumni of different chapters who are successful in the workplace, the vast majority of them will tell you that they still draw from their experiences in their fraternity or sorority.

The bottom line is that Greeks get a very well rounded college experience which prepares them for life after graduation. By no means is going Greek a guarantee of success, but the lessons learned in fraternities and sororities give people valuable experience to help better ensure success.

## **UK:** A Closer Look



Memorial Hall was dedicated on Memorial Day in 1929. It was built in memory of the 2,756 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War I. The total cost of the project was \$300,000. 150,000 school children were to raise \$1 each to help with the funding. Forty years after its construction Memorial Hall received a \$500,000 renovation. Included were new seats, carpet, curtains, the restoration of the organ, and air conditioning. After studying with Diego Rivera, Mrs. Richard O'Harlon spent one year painting the inside mural.

In 1964 a student snuck into the Memorial Hall bell tower and spliced the reel to reel recordings with Steppenwolf's "Born to be Wild." The clock is original but requires significant maintenance each year. In 1947 Carillonic Bells were installed. In 1964 new bells were dedicated by Chi Omega sorority. In 1987 the current cassette system was installed. (Yes, the bells are really on tape). There are 24 tapes which are seasonal. They play 5 minutes between classes, 5 intervals each day.

On May 13, 1950 Memorial Coliseum was dedicated. It stands in memory of the 9,307 Kentuckians who died in World War II. Professor Gillis spent 5 years recording the names of those who died. Professor J.S. Horine completed the lettering of the names, one of which was his own son. The bronze stars carrying these names wrap completely around the building and were a gift from SGA.

The Coliseum can hold 15,000 people with chairs and 12,000 for a basketball game. The basketball team used to play in Alumni Gym which held only 2,800. When Memorial Coliseum was completed many didn't believe fans would ever be able to fill it.

Being nearly acoustically perfect, Memorial Coliseum has hosted the London Philharmonic Orchestra, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, numerous concerts, and the opera La Boheme in 1955.



#### The Memorial Coliseum Inscription:

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them."



Omicron Delta Kappa National Leadership Honor Society started the initial fund drive for the building of the UK Student Center in 1921 and in 1933 the Kentucky Kernel pledged the first \$20,000 to the fund drive.

The first signs around Fayette County, identifying "Lexington, KY-Home of the University of Kentucky" were placed by Omicron Delta Kappa National Leadership Honor Society.

February 12, 1974 the Student (Center) Activities Board presents "Bruce Springsteen" in the Student Center Ballroom. Tickets are \$2.00 and opening act is Lexington Artists "The Hatfield Clan."

October 3, 1974 the Student (Center) Activities Board presented 'Jimmy Buffet" in the Student Center Ballroom. Tickets were \$2.00 and 794 attended. Jimmy Buffet went on to sell out the Ballroom at his next appearance, and Memorial Coliseum nearly sold out on two subsequent concert appearances by Buffet at UK.

The UK Student (Center) Activities Board becomes the first promoter to present Harry Chapin in concert along with brother Tom Chapin. Harry's young son, Josh, danced on stage throughout the performance. This would be one of the last appearances of the noted singer/songwriter as Harry Chapin was tragically killed in a car accident.




