Frat brothers win frosh race

Surrounded by members of their fraternity, Beta Theta Pi, Chris Price and Sean Coleman were elected 1987-88 Student Government Association freshman senators last night.

Price, an undecided major from Shelbyville, Ky., received 150 votes, and Coleman, a chemistry major from Dalton, Ga., came in second with 137 votes.

"I'm just so overwhelmed," Coleman said. "All week it's been a great race."

Only 390 freshmen, or about 10 percent of the freshman class, turned out to vote in the two-day election. That's a decrease in last year's turnout by about 2.5 percent, according to Will Renshaw, freshman senate elections board chairman.

In the past, some freshman senators haven't been too involved in SGA. Price said he and Coleman will "sit back" at first, but once they become adjusted he said they will be as involved as any other senator.

"Hopefully, we'll try to start out good and that won't happen to us," he said. "We're going to jump on things right away."

Price said he hasn't given much thought to many campus-related issues, but Coleman said an issue he wants to address early on is the right of privacy in the dormitories.

Price said he and Coleman will encourage the other freshmen candidates to also become involved with SGA.

"If we ever need any help at all, we'll call on any of the other candidates," he said.

Coleman and Price said they were a little unsure about the race's outcome. Coleman said he was especially concerned about Sean Lohman and Ashley Boyd, two candidates

who finished third and fourth, respectively.

Both Lohman and Boyd waged a strong campaign, Coleman said, but with the help of SGA Communications Senator Jason Williams, he said he and Price were able to win easily.

"We wouldn't have been in this race if it hadn't been for Jason," Coleman said. "He was out with us until three o'clock in the morning on some nights helping us put up campaign posters."

In fact, Price said he and Coleman weren't even going to run for SGA senate until Williams, a member of their fraternity, encouraged them to do so.

"He has so much experience and helped us with so many different things," he said.

Coleman said the chemistry between Price and himself also helped push them over the top.

"We've known each other ever since we got to school," he said. "We worked great together during the course of the campaign."

Once they get in the senate, he said they will continue that teamwork.

Lohman finished 21 votes behind Coleman with 116 votes and Boyd came in a distant fourth with 100 votes. Also:

UK professors: Jackson not likely as president

The Rev. Jesse Jackson is being heralded as the Democratic front-runner, but can he win the presidency?

Some UK professors and administrators say no, but say he might wield some power at the Democratic National convention.

"I don't think he'll get the nomination," said A. G. Dunston, assistant professor of history, "but if he gets to the convention with enough power, he'll be able to have a voice in the nominations and in deciding the party planks."

Dunston said the Democratic party is controlled by the people who can influence the structure of the platform. "The nominee doesn't have the power — it's the person who runs things behind the scenes," he said.

Several people said issues won't be the key factor for voters when

they decide the political fate of Jackson.

"I would like to think that if people dealt with issues, rather than personality and other types of criteria that seems important these days, that he would have a very good chance of having strong support," said Chester Grundy, director of minority student affairs.

"But at this point I think a number of people are too willing to dismiss Jesse Jackson as a legitimate candidate."

Grundy said many people agree with Jackson ideologically, but "inserted a dirty syringe dripping of modern satire under the skin of predictable 19th century comedy."

The audience finds itself no longer in the "observation booth" but another of the subjects being observed along with the actors. With this maneuver, the audience is transformed symbolically onto the stage along with the actors.

While the actors unwind Nikolai Gogol's political comedy of the 19th century, director Kagan-Moore imposes a modern view of social unrest without uttering a word.

The stage as a whole resembles a recent prize-winning photograph by

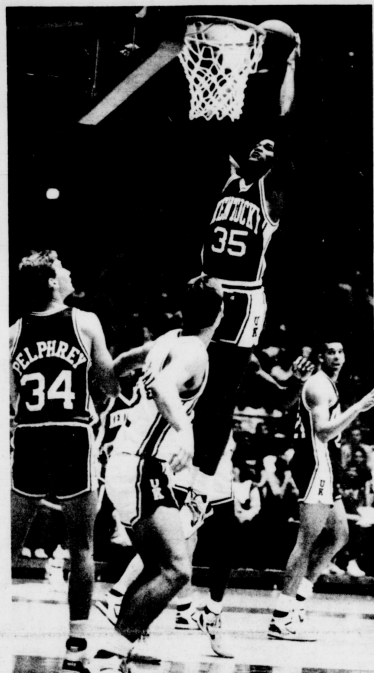
An adviser in College of Arts & Sciences has been named the 1987 Outstanding Adviser in the Southeast region by the National Academic Advising Association.

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TVs make play conceptually interesting

In UK theater's first mainstage production, "Inspector General," director Patrick Kagan-Moore inserted a dirty syringe dripping of modern satire under the skin of predictable 19th century comedy.

The set, designed by Zak Herring, is made up to look like iron scaffolding that frames the stage. Set inside the frame are 18 television sets and one large screen that looms over the center of the stage. The rest of the stage consists of the same iron material built into a barren set.

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"Inspector General," as a play, holds little social import from a modern perspective. Its saving grace is that it is a comedy.

Pat McDonough of the Courier Journal, who captured a viewer surrounded by a wall of TVs, all projecting the image of a hating Oliver North. In the UK version of "Inspector General," the same statement of a society imprisoned by the powers-that-be is made with the same sledgehammer impact. The fact that "Inspector General" also deals with the issue of "divestment of funds" only adds to the wry humor of the UK play.

This employment of theater and cinema breaks down artistic barriers as well as political ones. It ultimately produces much of the same conceptual innovation as did the movie, "The Battleship Potemkin." The movie also broke ground in the art world while making about the same political impact as Gogol's play would make on a modern audience if produced without the modern twist given it here.

"Inspector General," as a play, holds little social import from a modern perspective. Its saving grace is that it is a comedy. Drawing from the heavy comic tradition of Shakespeare and Moliere, it offers up a fatalistic plot grounded in

a case of mistaken identity. A backwoods Russian town is scared witless by the expected visit of an inspector general. When the town catches wind that he may be coming incognito, they immediately search him out, thus choosing the wrong man to be the inspector.

They choose a down-on-his-luck St. Petersburg youth who is only too happy to accept their hospitality, drops and runs-on lines of the main characters.

Old houses to be fixed by greeks

Five houses in the Georgetown Street area will have a new look tomorrow after the UK greek community finishes its Adopt-A-House project.

Each year the Adopt-A-House project is sponsored by Sigma Nu fraternity and a sorority Kappa Alpha Theta has been chosen as this year's co-sponsor.

Adopt-A-House is designed to improve areas of the Lexington community and has been around for six years.

John Townsend, from Mayor Scotty Baseler's office, has designated the houses that will be fixed. David Chewning, president of the Sigma Nu fraternity, said the Adopt-A-House project is aimed at elderly or needy homeowners.

Sigma Nu and Kappa Sigma Alpha chapters, along with 15 of the 21 fraternities and 13 of the sororities, will donate time and energy to scraping and repainting these houses. Paint will be donated by Porter Paints and other paint stores will donate the brushes and scrapers.

Lee Anne Fightmaster, co-chairperson of the Adopt-A-House project, estimates that between 800 and 900 people will participate this year.

Chewning said "this project gives the greek community a chance to interact, communicate, make friends."

"Everybody works together for one goal — not a selfish goal, but one for someone else," Fightmaster said.

The houses will be worked on from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and people will work in shifts. Both Sigma Nu and Kappa Alpha Theta chapters will work all day.

Fightmaster said food will be provided for the students working this year as extra motivation. McDonald's and Pizza Hut are donating the food.

Transportation will be provided for those who are working in order to cut down on congestion in the Georgetown Street area.

"The greek community has a bad reputation as being rich or partiers," Chewning said. "Adopt-A-House is used to project a positive image of service."

Fightmaster thinks that this project is a very strong tradition and wants it to continue.

3 Kentucky colleges rank among best

WASHINGTON — Stanford was named the nation's best university yesterday in a survey in which 764 college presidents took part.

It was the third time in the three years of the annual survey of American higher education that Stanford was selected best, narrowly edging out Harvard, Yale and Princeton.

Berea College in Berea, Ky., was named best in its category, Transylvania University in Lexington, Ky., was 10th in its group, and Centre

College in Danville, Ky., was 22nd in its division.

A total of 1,329 college presidents were surveyed and nearly 60 percent responded. The survey is conducted by U.S. News & World Report magazine.

Others in the top 25 national universities: University of California at Berkeley; Dartmouth; Duke; University of Chicago and University of Michigan, tied for eighth place; Brown; Cornell, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, all tied for 11th; University of Virginia; Johns Hopkins; Northwestern; Columbia; University of Pennsylvania; University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign; California Institute of

Technology; College of William & Mary; University of Wisconsin at Madison; Washington University; Emory University and the University of Texas at Austin.

Executives charged with price-fixing

WASHINGTON — Three soft drink bottlers and four of their former executives, including the current president of Seven-Up, were charged Wednesday with allegedly fixing prices on Coke and Pepsi in Maryland, Virginia and Georgia, the government announced.

One of the bottlers agreed to enter guilty pleas in two cases and pay \$2 million in fines.

An indictment returned in Norfolk, Va. accuses James J. Harford, currently the president of Seven-Up, of conspiring with at least two other executives and a rival bottler from 1982 to 1985 to increase soft drink prices of Allegheny Pepsi and Mid-Atlantic Coke.

During the time covered by the indictment Harford was president of Mid-Atlantic Coca-Cola Bottling Co.

Inc. of Silver Spring, Md. The firm had sales of \$240 million a year.

"I am innocent of the charges brought by the Justice Department and am fully confident that I will be vindicated," Harford said in a statement. He said that he was brought to Mid-Atlantic to engage in price competition against the local Pepsi bottler.

"Throughout the period covered by the antitrust division's case, prices in this area for soft drinks in general and Coca-Cola in particular, were among the lowest on the East Coast," Harford said.

The others charged in the Harford case were the Allegheny Bottling Co. of Timonium, Md., formerly Allegheny Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co. of Baltimore; Morton M. Lapidus, chairman of the board of Allegheny Beverage Corp. of Cheverly, Md., the former parent company of Allegheny Pepsi; and Odus Allen, the

former vice president and Virginia division manager of Mid-Atlantic Coke.

In a separate case, Mid-Atlantic Coke was charged in a felony information in Norfolk and agreed to plead guilty to price fixing and to pay a \$1 million fine. Federal prosecutors accused the firm of conspiring to fix soft drink prices in parts of Virginia served by the company's Norfolk and Richmond divisions in 1983 and 1984.

In another case in the District of Columbia, Mid-Atlantic Coke agreed to plead guilty and pay a \$1 million fine for allegedly conspiring with another company, General Cinema Beverages, of fixing Coke and Pepsi prices in 1984 and 1985. General Cinema, which distributes Pepsi products, pleaded guilty to a price-fixing conspiracy last year.

should do well on Super Tuesday, unless one of the other candidates can move to the forefront. Right now, there is no clear front-runner (in the Democratic race)."

Super Tuesday is the day on which primaries are held in several southern states. It is considered the best indicator of how a presidential candidate is faring in the race.

Gross feels that if the Democratic race stays crowded, Jackson has a better chance. "If other candidates stay in the race, it divides the non-Jackson vote, and makes it all the better for him."

However, Gross said he didn't think Jackson has a chance to win the nomination.

Bill Griswold, a journalism

professor who teaches a class in public opinion, said that though Jackson will do well with minority voters, he will probably not do well on UK's campus. "He doesn't really appeal to the values of the people on campus."

But Grunty said Jackson's appeal is more universal.

"His candidacy is based on some high ideals and principles. It demonstrates the best in what we call the democratic spirit," he said.

"The things he articulates, you can find in the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence. If the country is having trouble with them, then it seems to me that it's the country that's out of step."

CHE committee to meet over tuition decision

The state Council on Higher Education's finance committee is meeting today in Frankfort to make recommendations concerning tuition-setting policies.

The council is considering a mid-year tuition increase as well as a change in the way tuition is set. Tuition is set biennially by comparing tuition rates at benchmark institutions and state per capita income.

The tuition-increase proposal is in response to a projected \$9.4 million

shortfall in funding for higher education next year. The council is considering raising tuition next semester to offset projected budget cuts.

The council's finance committee will hold a budget hearing at 10 a.m., with the regular finance meeting following at 11:30 a.m.

During the last month the CHE has held three student hearings — at UK, Western Kentucky University and Ashland Community College — to gather student input about the tuition-increase proposal.

Lexington's Two Small Bodies pursue rock sound, not look

"I think Lexington has a pretty healthy music scene compared to Louisville. It seems like five or six new bands pop up every month and there's something interesting about each one," said drummer/vocalist Jeff Duncan of the local band Two Small Bodies.

The band, which also consists of Joel Effron on guitars and Chris Casey on vocals and guitars, has just released a full-length album on Hit A Note Records entitled Twelve Not Seven. The band released a two-song single last year featuring the songs "Don't Talk" and "Salty Dawg."

Two Small Bodies has been together for 2½ years, though the three have played together in different bands since their high school days in Frankfort.

The band claims no specific musical influences, but is of recent Replacements can be heard in the fuzzy guitar work and the

band lines seem heavily influenced by The Clash's Paul Simonon.

"Our biggest influences are ourselves and how we play off each other," said Duncan. "We are influenced by the do-it-yourself ethic of bands like Husker Du and The Replacements, where what you're playing is far more important than your haircut or what you're wearing," he said.

Duncan favors variety in his style of drumming as shown, for instance, by his employment of tom-toms on "What I Need." "I like drummers like Tony Thompson and Stewart Copeland who can do a mix of things," he said. "You don't have to be fast but you have to be in a groove or you can forget about it."

Band members work together and bounce song ideas off each other in the studio, according to Duncan. "Everybody knows a little about each other's instrument so that we can come into the studio and work with a certain riff or beat. We like songs that do things, that have breaks and don't just sit there," he said.

are left entirely up to the individual.

"The songs are basically anything we're thinking about. '3 Channels of Love' is about being in a band — the ego trip and what people think of you — and the similarities of being in a relationship. 'Read A Book' is about people whose actions are different than their words," said Duncan.

Because the band refuses to be locked into doing only one certain type of song, the band has few critics. "We don't like to do just serious songs so we do songs like 'What I Need,' which is a funky little boy-chases-girl song," he said. "Some people say that that shows no direction, but we're definitely not influenced by those bands that are repetitive and never change their formula," he added.

Two Small Bodies will play tomorrow night at the Bottom Line. This will be followed by an appearance at the 12 Post-Concert Party at Babylon Babylon on Oct. 23. Following a concert at The Bottom Line on Oct. 31, the band will embark on a tour of the South and Southwest, which will take them as far as Texas and Florida.

The long-awaited Tunnel of Love proves that Springsteen's marriage to model Julianne Phillips hasn't made him complacent, but rather has served to raise new questions of internal struggle.

The album is a hybrid that mixes the acoustic sound of Nebraska with the synthesized songs introduced on Born in the U.S.A. However, the sometimes innocuous music doesn't detract from the lump-in-your-throat lyrics that prevail throughout Springsteen's songwriting.

Sutton says now, no more Mr. Nice Guy

Why is this coach smiling?
"I had more fun today coaching than any day since I've been at Kentucky," UK basketball coach Eddie Sutton said of the season's first official workout yesterday. "I've never had as much talent as I have this year."

And Sutton likes what he can do with that talent.

Last season at this time, Sutton was beginning his third year at UK with seven players on the court. That's not even enough to scrimmage with.

Now, however, the UK coach is looking at five talented seniors, five top-of-the-line freshmen, two stand-out sophomores and a junior. He's even got room to redshirt.

What this means is no more easy does it on the practice floor.

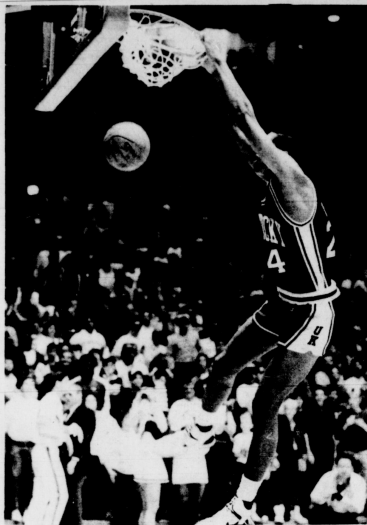
"We got to the point coaching-wise last year that we were afraid to have hard practices," Sutton said. "This season we're gonna have some real gut practices."

And if you don't have the guts to handle it, Sutton said you don't have to stick around.

"I used to chase (Sidney) Moncrief, (Darrell) Walker, (Alvin) Robertson and one day they all realized what I was doing," Sutton said of some of the greats he has coached. "I loved them, but I was demanding and they're great players today."

Sutton won't be the only demanding element on the practice court with the Cats this year. With the talent the team possesses, even veter-

ans will be feeling a little heat from the new guys.

"The big thing they got to understand, is that there is 200 minutes of playing time in a game and only one basketball," Sutton said. "They got to understand it's a team game. If some of the older players aren't working hard, I'm going to tell them they're going to work themselves onto the bench."

Senior guard Ed Davender is one returning starter who is happy to put up with the added pressure so he can take a breather.

"It's a lot different this year," Da-

vender said. "The best thing about this year is you can get a little rest. You got somebody to hop in there for you. You can catch your breath."

And Sutton said, with the team's depth, he will apply Davender's philosophy during the season.

"Last year I'd look down that bench and there was no one there," Sutton said. "But this year if there is someone not doing what they are supposed to do, I can look down the bench and say 'I can put him in.' You know that bench is a great motivator."

UK plans for war with Tigers

Ask Jerry Reese about playing LSU and the easygoing smile fades from his face.

"When LSU week rolls around, I'm the kind of guy where it's not a game—it's a war," Reese said.

Few of Reese's Wildcat teammates would argue. War is the attitude UK is taking into tomorrow's Southeastern Conference showdown with the sixth-ranked Tigers. And that's the attitude the Cats will need because 80,000 crazy Cajuns are waiting for them.

"I personally get excited for every game, but for those who need a little extra incentive, their Top 10 ranking should be enough to get us all going," UK defensive back David Johnson said.

"We're playing the No. 6 team in the country, on national television, in front of 80,000," UK coach Jerry Claiborne said.

"If they don't get excited about that, they better check their pulse or something. They might be sick." The crowd will be rocking when the 4-1 Wildcats clash with the 5-0-1 Tigers. To keep the noise down, UK will have to contain LSU's talented quarterback Tom Hodson.

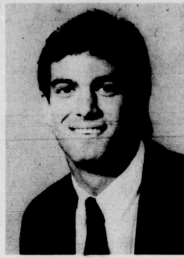
Hodson spearheads the Tigers' offense. The sophomore has completed 63 percent of his passes for 1,306 yards and seven touchdowns this season.

"Hodson is a great quarterback, one of the best in the country," Claiborne said. "He can scramble, spread it out and throw on the run. He's just a very accurate passer."

keep the pressure on Hodson all day.

"If you give him time, he'll kill you," Reese said.

Hodson's aerial attack features speedy All-American wide receiver Wendell Davis. Davis has already hauled in 40 passes for 542 yards this season. But Davis isn't Hodson's only weapon.

LSU coach Mike Archer has a whole arsenal of gifted receivers.

Tailbacks Sammy Martin and Harvey Williams have caught 37 passes out of the backfield this year.

"The tailbacks coming out of the backfield catch as many as their wide-outs," Claiborne said.

Anchoring the Tiger offense is a powerful line led by All-American

center Nacho Albergamo and senior guard Eric Andolsek.

"They just line up and don't do anything fancy," Claiborne said.

Offensively Kentucky's main man will be Mark Higgs. The senior tailback has already recorded a career high 682 yards rushing this season.

Higgs will be going full blast on offense. The other Wildcats will have to do the same on defense.

"I think we have to take the game to them," UK defensive end Tony Massey said. "Sure they're ranked high, but we're not intimidated by that, especially after last weekend's performance. They have a very talented quarterback, so defensively, it's going to take a total team effort to shut them down."

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Condoms not positive solution

CONDOMS: AN EASY WAY OUT
Let me first tell you, I'm a very traditional Catholic and even talking about condoms makes me feel uncomfortable. I have a difficult time talking about sex — especially to thousands of readers. But lately, I've realized the importance of my message and I hope you read further with an open mind.
