Master of Science in Home Economics

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The Committee on Duplication of Work presented the following new courses and changes in courses, which were approved:

Arts and Sciences

Library Science 131. Library Service to Children. The effective organization and administration of library work with children of elementary school age with special emphasis on methods of stimulating children's reading. One credit.

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Mathematics and Astronomy 122. Actuarial Mathematics. The object of this course is to give the student an introduction to Actuarial Science, showing him the mathematical principles upon which insurance is based. The topics included will be: Theory and Construction of Mortality Tables; a detailed study of the various types of life annuities; calculation of premiums for insurance policies including premiums for varying benefits; net level, preliminary term and Illinois Standard terminal reserves; annuities and premiums payable more frequently than once a year; Prerequisites: Mathematics 14 and Mathematics 7a. (Math 14 may be taken concurrently). Three credits.

Hygiene and Public Health 9. Hygiene for Teachers. This course is designed to meet the State requirements of two credits in Hygiene for the elementary certificate. Two hours per week. Two credits.

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Political Science 191. Parliamentary Procedure and Organization. This course is designed for the purpose of giving students a better understanding of conducting an organization under Parliamentary rules. Some attention will be given to the formation of organizations, the drafting of constitutions and bylaws and the various types of officers necessary to carry on the organization. One hour a week. One credit.

Change in Courses:

Hygiene & Public Health 1. Personal and Community Health. Two lectures a week. One credit. This is to replace the old Hygiene 1, carrying 1.3 credits, the requirements being thanged to correspond to the change in credits. The change was discussed with the Deans of the Colleges that require Hygiene, and met with the Deans' approval.

Change in Requirements for Graduation

To correspond to the change of credits attached to Hygiene 1, the Faculty ask that the requirement in Hygiene for graduation be changed from 1.3 credits to 1 credit.

College of Commerce

Commerce 115, Contemporary Economic Thought - be raised to Commerce 215.

The following recommendation of the Committee on Rules was approved:

"On January 5 the Rules Committee recommended to the University Senate that one-half to one unit in Typewriting be allowed for entrance to the University. This course goes in the group of vocational subjects."
