State's economy looks promising

Slowdown predicted: UK Center for Business and Economic Research presents annual report

The economy in Kentucky and the nation looks promising, but expect a slowdown in the next year.

The UK Center for Business and Economic Research in the College of Business and Economic Business and Economic Report for 2001 and reports that the future of the state's economy looks good.

"Kentucky should match or exceed the national economy this year, one reason is the manufac-turing in the state," said Eric Thompson, associate director of CBER.

The report predicts a significant economical slowdown for the state and the nation. One reason is the roller coaster ride last year on Wall Street.
"A heavy loss in the stock market last year and also the fuel

price hike," Thompson said. "With long commutes today and the ris-ing energy costs, people have less to spend on other things." The report predicts that in the years 2002 and 2003 we will see an

increase in employment in Kentucky of an average of 28,700 jobs

each year.

Although there has been a rapid slowdown in the nation's economy and reports of a recession, Thompson said he doesn't

In congressional testimony later Thursday in which he supported using part of the growing budget surpluses for tax cutsgiving a major boost to President Bush's \$1.6 trillion, 10-year tax cut proposal — Alan Greenspan issued a rather bleak view of current conditions.

"As far as we can judge, we have had a very dramatic slowing down and, indeed we are probably very close to zero at this particular moment," said Greenspan, chair-man of the Federal Reserve.

In that pessimistic assess-ment, Greenspan did not rule out a recession, saying that would de-

"marked decline breaches consumer confidence."

If consumers see a bad change in the economy and interest rates
do not flavor the public, a recession
could be over the horizon.

"The economic numbers that
have been comming in are very
weak and I think they are particularly scared by the consumer confidence numbers," said David
Wyss, chief economist at Standard
& Poor's Corp. "If people get
scared and stop spending, they

The plan: Computer lab may help academic performance

As UK begins work on its 20-year expansion plan, one fraternity on campus has stepped ahead of the game.

Phi Kappa Psi social fraternity, with a little help from its National Endowment Fund, will break ground for a new computer lab this February.

The fraternity's national fund has provided a \$46,000 grant for the project. The fund provides money for its chapters to improve their houses, increase membership and incorporate technology.

"They've given other chapters money for computers before, but we were really lucky to get a grant as large as this," said Ben Hayes, a Phi Kappa Psi member.

Building the lab will be no easy task, even with the money already provided. Before the computers can be set up, the fraternity members are faced with the daunting ask of turning an old basement into a state-of-the-art computer lab.

This means jack-hammering the low ceiling, cleaning up years of dirt and dust and finding the proper furniture for the lab's five computer stations.

The lab is part of a project by the fraternity.

The lab is part of a project by the fraternity to boost members' grades. Its newly adopted code of conduct, which requires members to maintain a 2.5 grade point average, is aimed at putting more focus on academic performance.

"The computer lab is going to be a big help." Hayes said. "We're really serious about trying to improve our members' grades, and the computer lab could make a big difference."

The lab, which includes five terminals will be equipped with printers and a fax station. Members will be able to use the lab to complete homework, connect to the Web on the UK server and check their e-mail.

"The lab will probably be most helpful for new members," Hayes said. "They will

'It was awful': Indian students grieve for their country. come together to begin fund raiser for those in need

News of Friday's devastating earth-quake in western India rocked Lexing-ton's Dr. Bizer's Value Vision on Saturday

It was an ordinary workday at the eyeglass store for Mita Dulabh, until her co-workers rushed up to her, asking if she had family in India.

"I said 'Yes, my grandparents live there, but why?" the biotechnology sophomore recalled.

Her mother had already learned of the earthquake and was trying desperately to reach their family, who live in the eastern part of the state of Gujarat in western land awhere the quake occurred. Phone lines in India were down, keeping the Dulabh family in suspense

for hours.

"It was awful," Dulabh said.
Finally a call reached their grandparents, who were unharmed.
But not everyone escaped the destruction. The earthquake flattened for the comment officials have counted 5.44 dead and 16.537 injured but many bodies remain rapped in the ruins of collapsed buildings, according to an Associated Press story.
Gujarat Home Minister Haren Pandya said the number of dead people would probably be between 15,000 and 20,000. Damage is estimated at up to \$5.5 billion.
Six aftershocks ranging from a magnitude of 3.3 to 4.5 rocked the Bhuj area through the night until Tuesday morning, but there were no reports of new damage or casualities.

Chrysler undergoes massive job cuts

Chrysler undergoes massive job cuts a UBURN HILLS, Mich. — Dalmler Chrysler is eliminating 25,000 jobs at its money-losing Chrysler division in the most dramatic sign yet that the 1989 merger of the German and American automakers is not living up to its promise. Under the plan announced Monday, Chrysler will cut one-fifth of its global work force over the next three years and idle six plants. Dieter Zetsche, a German who was named Chrysler's president and chief executive in November to stem the losses, called the moves painful but necessary in the face of "brutal" competition and slack U.S. sales. Chrysler posted a third-quarter loss of \$512 million and warned that its fourth-quarter loss could be more than \$1 billion.

WASHINGTON — President Bush, challenging traditional notions about separation of church and state, opened the door Monday for retheir work aiding addicts, prisoners, the homeless and more. "We will not fund the religious activities of any group, but when people of faith provide social services, we will not discriminate against them," the president said. By his signature on a pair of executive orders, Bush created a White House Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives — with counterpart offices in five Cabinet-level departments — that will facilitate competition by religious groups and charities for a share of the billions of dollars that the government pays out for social services.

WASHINGTON — President Bush promised Monday to "act boldly and swiftly" to address the nation's energy problems and directed Vice President Dick Chency to head a task force to develop an energy strategy. 

Research offers hope

It's in the genes: Scientists make progress in fight against genetic diseases; Potential cures and therapies could affect millions of people in the future

A common version of an immune system gene raises the risk of developing the most severe kind of dia-betes, a study suggests. The finding might someday help doctors treat the disease.

About 1 million Americans have type 1 diabetes, and they have to inject themselves daily with insulin. Genes and the environment both play a role in who

Genes and the environment both play a gets it.

Scientists have already identified a few genetic roots of susceptibility to the disease, and are pursuing leads on more than a dozen more.

The new work is reported in the February issue of the journal Nature Genetics by Grant Morahan of the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research in Victoria, Australia, with colleagues there and elsewhere.

They implicate a gene called IL12B. It helps the body make a substance called interleukin-12 which encourages the formation of a certain kind of immune system of a certain kind of immune system blood cell. By learning how this gene promotes diabetes, scientists should gain a better understanding of the disease, and that might help them devise better treatments, he said.

German candy might contain bad ingredient

Where's the beef: Mad cow disease may be the cause of contaminating ingredient in Mambo fruit chew candy

City health officials are investigating sales of a candy that was pulled from stores in Poland because one of its ingredients may have been made from beef in a country that has had an outbreak of mad cow disease.

The distributor of the Mamba fruit chew, made in Germany, insits it poses no health risks even though it contains a beef-based gelatin. The company, Storck U.S.A. said it had no plans to change the ingredients of the Mamba sold in the United States.

"The product is safe," Storck vice president Tony Nelson said from the company's Chicago office. The company said German health officials have certified its beef gelatin as properly prepared for human consumption.

There was no immediate indication whether Mamba old elsewhere in the United States.

There was no immediate indication whether Mamba is sold elsewhere in the United States.

The candy, which comes 18 pieces to a 75-cent pack in lemon, orange, raspberry and strawberry flavors, is sold throughout the city, the Daily News reported Tuesday.

"Obviously, we will look into it," city Health Department spokeswoman Sandra Mullin said. "People should not panic. We have not had animal or human cases of mad cow disease in New York or in the United States."

The candy is marketed in 80 countries by the Storck Co., of Werther, Germany.

Germany discovered its first case of bovine spongiform encephalopathy, or BSE, late last year in a cow. At least 18 others have been infected.

Storck recalled the candy in Poland last week after health officials there banned beef products from countries with confirmed cases of mad cow disease.

The company said it would eliminate the gelatin

The company said it would eliminate the gelatin only from Mamba distributed in Poland.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not received any alerts about the candy, the News said, quoting a spokeswoman as saying: "Just because it's a bovine source doesn't necessarily meant there's a problem."

BSE is believed to be spread through livestock feed made from infected animals.

The U.S. government has banned cows and sheep from being given feed made from animal parts.

The human version of the disease, called new variant CreutZeldt-Jakob, has killed some 80 Europeans since the mid-1990s, mostly in Britain. The disease first appeared in 1984 in a cow in Britain thought to have eaten feed that included offal from sheep that harbored scrapie, a similar illness.






