Q. What types of Living and Learning Communities are in operation, and where are they located?

A. We have several Living and Learning Communities on campus. On North Campus we have the Honors Pro-gram Community in Boyd and Patter-son Halls.

O. How do you resolve conflicts between roommates if the RAs can't seem to find a solution?

A. I think there is a number of support staff available to help in resolving roommate conflicts. One thing we try to do on the front end is to have students engage in discussion about lifestyles. We try to be proactive.

Students sign a roommate agreement form or roommate contract. And in working with this roommate contract, it causes students to engage in conversations about lifestyles, likes and dislikes.

Q. How do you become an RA?

Depending on when you want to be an RA, one applies via this office. They pick up an application. Then we review the application to determine whether the person meets the requirements, a certain GPA and lived a

That application is processed and se set up times for that individual to go arough an interview process. Typical-that process involves, in the first bund, an all-day interview.

round, an all-day interview.

They will interview with more than one Residence Life staff member. They'll interview with RAs, hall director, assistant hall directors, assistant directors, perty much everybody in the Residence Life family.

They have to also be involved in an RA shadowing experience. They have to spend an hour or two shadowing an RA. And they actually get evaluated in that process.

There's a reception they would attend as well. They don't get evaluated,
but that's just another opportunity for
the staff to take a look at the candidate.
That's like the third round.
So by the time all of that's over and
we look at scores based on interviews
and shadowing, then we determine, not
just based on scores but the quality of
the person's interview and whether he
or she will be someone considered worthy of the RA position.

Is there anything you would like to add?

A. I can't say enough good things about the RA staff, particularly as our RAs compare to other benchmark institutions. Every two years we do a benchmark institutions. Every two years we do a benchmark institutions group control of six. In addition to that, we also compare ourselves to the 230 schools that participate in this survey. There's another comparison group called a Carnegie class that we compare ourselves to.

Our RAs scored significantly higher than any other group in terms of student overall astisfaction, programming, etc. I'm proud of what they've done, and i shared this with the returning RAs because this was the survey just done last year.




