Economics 201, Advanced Economics - changed to Economics 203 History of Economic Thought - 3 credits.

Drop Economics 101 and Add - Economics 116 - Business Organization, 3 credits. and Add Economics 117 - Corporation Finance - 3 credits.

Economics 118 - Cost Accounting - 3 credits

Senate also approved the request of the College of Commerce to all members of the class of 1926 to qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Commerce by completing 30 credits in Commerce, 6 credits in English, 6 credits in a foreign language, 6 credits in a natural science, and a total of 127 credits, with a standing of one. This privilege is to be accorded to students who have had 15 credits or more in Economics.
