

This agreement made this the first day
of October, 1881, by and between H. C. M^cDowell
and Daniel Walker; Witnesseth that said
M^cDowell agrees to furnish about eight or
ten acres of men land more or less on the
northern part of his Woodlake tract of land
being that portion now in woodland the
northern line of which is the cliff of the
northern fork of Elkhorn Creek, to the said
Walker for the purpose of raising a crop of
tobacco on joint account. Under the following
conditions, stipulations and agreements:

The land is to be cleared by said Walker;
All timber suitable for use in maturing
and curing the contemplated crop, such
as poles, poles, tobacco sticks &c is to be preserved
and manufactured by said Walker and to
be the property of said M^cDowell.

The cord wood is to be cut and corded by
said Walker and is to be equally divided
between the parties hereto.

The land is to be grubbed of all undergrowth
and no forest trees are to be left except some
of the best walnuts and such trees as may
be selected to shade the crop.

M^cDowell is to furnish ^{teams} to break the land
and teams and wagons to haul the
