Some motorists may have noticed a street sign giving part of Cooper Drive a new name, but that name change may be temporary.

The streeth of Cooper Drive that runs from Nicholasville Road to University Drive was named Tubby and Donna Smith Way in honor of the Wildcats coach's banner year, but because a city policy wasn't followed, the sign may have to come down.

To change a street name,
the Lexington-Fayette Urban
County Government must

file a "911 agreement," which allows the street name to become permanently changed. This is done so that police can respond to a call to the correct street instead of having to guess where a temporary street might be.

The problem is that the new street sign was posted without adhering to this agreement.

"Tubby and Donna Smun Way is a violation of the (911) agreement," said Kenneth Clevidence, vice president of Auxiliary Campus Services at UK. "It would have to come down at this juncture." Without adhering to the

911 agreement, the 15 members of the council unanimously passed a motion to honor Coach Tubby Smith and his wife Donna at their March 20 meeting.

"I didn't know about the (911) agreement," council member Paul Brooks said. "As far as I know, UK asked for that change."

The order to put up the street sign was given from the council to Cecil Warner, who works at the Traffic Operation Office. "I had a contractor put the sign up under the direction of the city council." Warner said. "That's all I know."

The strip of Cooper has typically been used as a tribute to UK coaches who have fared well during their respective seasons. Recently, it was

named Hal Mumme Pass, for the former UK football coach, but the sign was removed when Mumme was fired for NCAA violations.

City officials are not certain what they will do in the future with the street name. They could just remove the sign or they may make an official change later.

But some said the street will keep the name of Cooper Drive unless a more major decision is made.

"It's Cooper Drive and will always be Cooper Drive in the eyes of the Urban County Government until it's changed by a resolution," said Phillip Stiefel, who has worked for seven years as an addressing specialist for the transportation department in Lexington.

MASHINGTON — The United States declared air supremacy over all of Iraq on Tuesday, asserting its warplanes can fly anywhere with impunity even though an Air fact plane was shot down near Baghdad. Air fly man and the plane was shot down near Baghdad will low, the Pentagon had said it owned the skies own all of Iraq except in the Baghdad area and over Fikrit, the hometown of President Saddam Hussein, where air defenses were the strongest. "Calition air forces have established air supremacy over the entire country, which means the enemy is incapable of effective interference with coalition air operations." Maj. Gen. Stanley McChrystal, vice director of the Pentagon's Joint Staff, said.

He did not mention that an Air Force A-10 warplane was shot down near Baghdad on Tuesday It is believed to be the first allied aircraft other than a helicopter to be downed by an Iraqi surface-to-air missile since the war began March 20. U.S. Central Command officials said the pilot ejected safely was recovered by allied ground forces and was in good condition.

The military also amnounced Tuesday that a U.S. Fi.S strike fighter had been missing in Iraq since Sunday The two airmen aboard the plane remain missing, a Central Command statement said.

U.S. Marshals arrest man near UK on rape charges

AN FBI fugitive was caught on Linden Walk Monday, bringing an end to an 18-day manhunt.

Roger David Carder, 53, was arrested by U.S. Marshals on charges of 23 counts of rape involving his daughter and stepdaughter, who are under the age of 13. He is wanted in northern Ohio for the charges, which police say occurred between 1988 and 2001. He was also arrested on five counts of being a violent sexual predator, said Dave Sacks, spokesman for the U.S. Marshals. Sacks said Carder, a Cleveland native, fled after he posted bond for the charges. The FBI, U.S. Marshals and other police agencies began searching in Lexington when they learned his brother lives here.

Carder's brother could not be reached for comment. Carder was arrested, he was living and doing carpentry work at 315 Linden Walk, off Euclid Avenue.

"He was somebody who had rented here before, said Bill Reed, one of the home's owners. "He said he was all right."

Education council given legal money
FRANKFORT — A panel of state lawmakers on Monday allowed funding for the Council on Postsecondary Education's legal defense
in a lawsuit brought against them by the
chairman of Eastern Kentucky University's
governing board. Fred Rice is suing the council over a law the General Assembly passed
this year requiring the council to fire Rice because he moved to the Virgin Islands. He has
obtained a court order to at least temporarily
block his removal. Gov Paul Patton had vetoed a different House bill that would have
ousted any regional university regent living
outside the 50 states or District of Columbia.
Patton said the bill he vetoed was a hodgepodge of issues, and that violated a constitutional mandate that legislation must not relate to more than one subject. He also cited
the bill's retroactive parts and general "ambiguity:

— eight of then critically — by the missile
strike, doctors said. The wounded were

In war, Buddhists emphasize peace

Peace and love — and transcending a human instinct to fight back — are the keys to finding personal peace at a time of difficulty, said Donald Rothberg said Buddhist teachings of love and inner peace are the best ways to solve problems in the midst of War.

The speech, "Cultivating Peace in a Time of War." was presented by the Gaines Cen-

ences," Rothberg said, adding that this is a cyclic pattern.

The best way to overcome these reactions is to follow guidelines that use Buddhist techniques, Rothberg said.

One guideline he said was to "recognize if it's out there, it's in here," saying that any human emotions felt are also reproduced on a much bigger scale in the real world. "(Reaction to) the war is our reflection of our souls. Do not answer hatred with hatred."

"Cultivate love in our own personal lives," Rothberg said. "We can work on those

core principles that make war happen."

He added that the human instinct to react when offend-ed is at the center of this

ed is at the center of this problem.

Disruptive and some-times violent anti-war demonstrations have been counterproductive. Rothberg said.

"They (protests) are being acted out of a will for justice, but it was really no less reactionary that anything else," he said. "Be in touch with beauty, joy and growth on a daily basis. This eliminates burnout."

War unjustified, deserves 'adamant and vocal dissent'

America, in its most recent war on Iraq, has set sail on a dangerous sea. In the shifting tides that sway our national agenda in its declaration of an unbidden war, it is vital to recognize what makes a decison to declare war wrong. The Bush administration's failure to ground its decision in a reasonable, good faith effort at the behest of international support has earned worldwide critics and is an unacceptable action by any country.

The Coalition of the Willing makes its case for this war on several grounds, including a reasonable response to the threat of terrorism, liberation of the Iraqi peoples from a corrupt leader and the unbending protection of American democracy from the future menace of Saddam Hussein. Acording to that administration, this war is a response to the imminent threat of harm to the American people and those of Iraq.

These justifications are patently unrue. Decisions of war must be made only in response to a proven threat and with paramount respect for those that stand to suffer tragic losses from those decisions. The bumper-sticker morality involved in the war-is-a-protection-of-freedom argument will not hold water where there is no proof of direct threats to that free the collision of the collis

troublesome when other countries begin to follow our lead.

If we are to create a test for judging the reasonableness of war (something of an oxymoron), then it is conceded we judge the options available to the decision maker at the time of the decision, weighing risks of harm by means of war against threats of greater harm by war-time adversaries. The decision for war is to be made only in good faith (proven, not presumed), with irrefutable evidence of the threat posed and having earned the majority support of the United Nation Without these, threat of war by a superpower is not an option, but a bully tactle.

The coalition failed to satisfy this test, insofar as the risks of harm by means of war far outweigh Hussein's threat. In addition to the 1000-plus civilian casualties (incidentally

killed by a coalition seeking to protect those civilians from the violence of their own leader), scores of soldiers have died, reconstruction costs are estimated to be \$450-500 billion and unprecedented foreign policy has been set into motion by declaring a pre-emptive war. Few would dispute that Hussein is a thuggish dictator who deserves little place in leadership. It is millions, however, that contend this war is an inappropriate means to the second of the

attoilishin with rain quamor of government.

We must hold our administration to the very highest standards of good faith investigations in order to prove the threat of harm to justify a war. Argument that suggests war is reasonable merely because our administration proffers its good faith efforts is circular and self-serving. Good faith must be proven via concrete evidence, and when that evidence does not exist, neither does the presumption of good faith. While the 'Great American War,' now in its third week, lays waste to those ideals once looked upon with applause by the international community, we are asked to turn a blind eye to what our administration's decisions have undone. Those decisions are woefully unreasonable and deserve our adamant and vocal dissent.

Coalition's thorough planning, Saddam's threat legitimize war

When choosing whether to support the war, one ought to evaluate the process that led to the decision. The easiest way to assess that process —based on its results — is clearly not appropriate. Judging a decision in this manner would only test the decision maker's ability to predict the future. The proper test is whether the war was a reasonable response in light of the threat Saddam Hussein posed to American and global security. This method puts the evaluator in the shoes of the decision maker at the time of the decision. Analyzing the decision as a response to a threat assumes that the war is a defensive measure. President Bush's administration has clearly articulated that the war's purpose is to diminish the threat of terrorism. As the president said in his March 19 address to the nation, "The people of the United States and our friends and allies will not live at the mercy of an outlaw regime that threatens the peace with weapons of mass murder."

The Coalition of the Willing took two good faith steps before it reached its decision. First, it diligently and extensively investigated the threat Saddam's regime posed. Second, it crafted a response to reasonably counteract that threat. This process ensured that its conclusion will withstand scrutiny.

We give people the benefit of the doubt until presented with persuasive contrary evidence. Applied to this situation, the leaders of the coalition would not have exercised good faith if they engaged in a war with greater risks than rewards.

The coalition extensively investigated the threat Saddam's regime posed. It calculated that threat by multiplying the magnitude of the risk—the dictator's ability to produce and distribute weapons of mass destruction—by the probability that terrorists would carry out an attack using those weapons. Articulating how the coalition made this investigation, although helpful to create wide-spread global support for the war, will not serve its best interests. Issues of national security and foreign relations enjoy absolute immunity from disclosure because making such information publicly available is dangerous.

Disclosure endangers those who gathered

and supplied the information. In Saddam's Stalin-like regime, dissidents — indeed, dissidents families — do not survive. Carifying to the world how the coalition discovered states and the world how the coalition discovered states are states as the state of the world how the coalition enjoys a tenuous toe-hold within Iraq's bureaucratic infrastructure. It needs those not loyal to Saddam to help rebuild Iraq once it removes the dictar Subjecting those dissidents to torture and death will not cultivate the environment of trust necessary for reconstruction.

After investigating this threat, the coalition crafted a reasonable response. It identified Saddam's regime — not the Iraqi people—as the substantial threat. The war's aim is to eliminate that threat. Thus, the war is a reasonable reaction, because its sole purpose is to remove that threat.

The reaction is also reasonable because each nation has the unqualified right to protect its national security When negotiations fall, war is a justified means to that end.

Further, the coalition has exercised great precision in prosecuting the war. It has concentrated its force only on the Iraqi government and army Indeed, the coalition has suffered significant casualties to avoid the needless slaughter of Iraqi civilians.
