The faculty met in the president's room at 3.30 P. M. Those present being President Patterson, Messrs White, W. K. Patterson, Kastle, Roark, Pryor, Anderson, Matthews, Miller, Pence, Brooks, Mackenzie, Norwood and Capt. Byrns.

The minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved. The following letter from Miss Clara White was read, and on motion it was ordered that it be received and spread upon the minutes

the team shall first present to the Athletic Com. of the college the written consent of her parent or guardian.

Prof. W. K. Patterson, seconded by Prof. Pence, moved as a substitute that the request of the team be not acceded to. The substitute motion carried.

Prof. Mackenzie called attention to certain changes made in the schedule of studies for the A. B. course (major English) in the last issue of the college catalogue, and protested against such changes being made without his knowledge or consent.

Upon motion of Prof. Anderson, seconded by Prof. Miller, it was ordered that in order to adjust these differences a committee of three should be appointed to edit the catalogue.

The President appointed Prof. Neville, Prof. White and Prof. Mackenzie.

Prof. Anderson called attention to certain improvements that he believed might be made in the size and form of the diploma of graduation, and moved that a committee of three be appointed to devise and submit to the faculty such a new form.

The motion carried.

President Patterson appointed upon this committee, Messrs. Anderson, White and Mackenzie.

Prof. Mackenzie requested that Prof. Neville should be appointed in his place.

In response to this request, Pres. Patterson appointed Prof. Neville upon the com. in addition to those already named.

The committee to which was referred the question asks whether or not Mr. Walsh may take the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Pedagogy in June 1904 by completing the work prescribed in our catalogue for the former degree and only the purely pedagogical work prescribed for the latter degree believe

- 1<sup>st</sup> that two bachelor degrees should be conferred simultaneously on a person only in exceptional cases,
- 2<sup>d</sup> that no material departure should be made from the prescribed requirements for any degree and hence the wholesale changes proposed in Mr. Walsh's case should not be allowed
- 3<sup>d</sup> that if a student after completing a portion of a course provided for any degree, leaves college and after the lapse of a few years returns to finish the work for his degree he should be required to do the same work (or its full equivalent) as is required of other students who receive the same degree at the same time.

Upon motion of Prof. Muen the report was ordered received and adopted.

Prof. Mackenzie read a letter from Mr. O'Shea of the C. S. R.R. calling attention to the presence in this country of a Mr. Yeats, an authority upon the subject of the old Celtic language and literature, and expressing the wish that the State College might in some way secure the delivery in Lexington of the lectures which Mr. Yeats is delivering in various University centers in the East.

Prof. Roark moved that if Mr. Yeats' lectures can be secured without expense to the college, the faculty endorse the proposition, and that Prof. Mackenzie be appointed a com. to confer with Mr. O'Shea and to arrange for these lectures, if the plan be feasible. Carried.
