Searching for shelter or warm in the dorm

Help: Some offer shelter, assistance to off-campus friends

It's not the week to diss dorm life.

While thousands of homes in Lexington lack power and heat, UK's dorms are warm and wired.

Some students took advantage of the amenities, staying inside on the rare day off from classes; others ventured into the cold to help off-campus friends recover from the storm.

Drew Butcher, a math senior who lives in Bland-ing I, was glad to be on campus.

"It's so great here be-cause we have Internet and everything," Butcher said. "We have everything we need and lots of time to spend doing whatever we feel like."

In Lexington and the In Lexington and the surrounding areas, an estimated 56,000 people were without power Monday, said Cliff Feltham, community relations manager for Kentucky Utilities.

"We are chipping away at it little by little but the whole problem could deally not worse." Feltham

away at it little by little but the whole problem could easily get worse." Feitham said. "Taking into consideration the extent of damage I've seen and our operational ability to fix it, it could easily take a week or more for everyone to have power back."

Administrators at UK and LCC canceled classes Monday and Tuesday because of fallen trees, power outages and the cancellation of Lextran bus services.

In the meantime, stu-

In the meantime, students who still had their power found ways to help those who didn't.

Artina Pettigrew, an integrated strategic communications sophomore who lives in Fairington Apartments on Laredo Drive, was left without power and decided to stay at a friend's dorm.

Blizzard buries East 4 feet deep in some areas

Blizzard: Travelers stranded; 21 deaths blamed on storm

The worst blizzard in seven years shut down much of the Northeast on Presidents Day with blinding, windblown snow that piled up as much as 4 feet deep and left more than a quarter of a million homes and businesses shivering without power.

At least 21 deaths had been blamed on the storm system since it charged out of the Plains during the weekend, piling snow in the Ohio Valley, producing mudsildes and floods in the southern Appalachians, and making layers of ice that snapped trees and power lines.

In Kentucky, tens of thousands of people faced the prospect of days without normal lights and heat, especially in Lexington, which caught the full fury of an ice storm that encrusted trees and power lines and pulled them to the ground.

Kentucky Utilities Co. reported upward of 74,000 customers without power throughout the company's 77-county service area. About 60,000 of those were in or around Lexington, which became a city of broken trees and downed power lines.

Airports for Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York largely shut down, stranding thousands of passengers trying to leave and enter the region. Amtrak's north-south service was halted between Washington and Richmond, Va., and regional bus service stopped in many areas.

The hollday meant there were few commuters, but police from Kentucky to Massachusets pleaded with motorists to stay home and some counties banned nomesential travel so they could clear the roads. "This is going to be days' worth of cleanup," said Maryland

Research center would focus on violence against women

Leaders: Studies would include effects of violence on physical and mental health, public policy issues

UK could soon be a der in the study of vio-

leader in the study of vio-lence against women.

The Center for Research on Violence Against Women would be the nation's first center to examine the effects of abuse on physical and mental health and the public policy and legal issues surrounding abuse, a UK administrator said.

rounding abuse, a UK administrator said.

The Board of Trustees will vote on the center's creation later this month. The faculty senate voted unanimously in favor of the center last week.

"The faculty that are involved in the center have been making plans for activities over the past few months so the center would be able to open immediately," said Provost Mike Nietzel.

The center would be the only facility in the country conducting research in the areas UK has chosen.

The center would not provide treatment for abused women, said Carol Jordan, he Executive Director of the Governor's Office of Child Abuse and Domestic Violence Services.

Instead, she said she hopes that "advancing the science in the field will ultimately make women safer."

The prevalence of violence against women prompted the center's creation, Jordan said. Physical abuse is one of the most common causes of death among women 15-44, she said.

The center would help.

The center would help women by providing a "bet-ter understanding of how abuse affects them and why abuse happens, so we'll be

able to do a better job of ending victimization." she said. Administrators are looking forward to the center. "I am very pleased that he university is creating this center," Nietzel said. "It is in an area we have a lot of faculty that could make major contributions and where UK could be a leader."

The opening of the center would be a collaborative effort between the university and Gov Paul Patton's office, which has made research on women's violence a priority.

The center would be financed through state funds, which UK has matched. UK is also raising money for an endowment for the center. \$425,000 has been raised all-ready, and Nietzel said UK will make the pledges eligible or a state match through. "Bucks for Brains," the Research Challenge Trust Fund.

"We're hopeful the state will provide continuing funding for the center so the fac-

ulty can continue to do the great research this center will support." he said.
Workers at the center would undertake two projects shortly after opening. One is to evaluate the effectiveness of domestic violence protective orders. The second is to evaluate the Kentucky domestic violent offenders treatment program.

21 dead, 57 injured during stampede at Chicago nightclub

Frenzied scene: Nightclub was operating in violation of a months-old court order meant to close it down

CHICAGO — It was a chaotic scene: Hundreds of screaming people stumbling down the darkened stairs of an illegally operated nightclub, gasping for air and stepping on bodies, only to find themselves trapped at the bottom trying to escape through a single exit.

At least 21 people were killed and 57 injured in the stampede early Monday at the crowded E2 nightclub, authorities said. There were reports that as many as 500 people were crammed into the second-floor club when someone sprayed Mace or peper spray to quell a fight about 2 a.m.

The nightclub was operating in violation of a months-old court order meant to close it down, fire officials said.

"The owner knows damm well that he is not to open that second-floor facility" said Fire Commissioner James Joyce. City officials said they plan to go to court as early as Tuesday to seek criminal contempt charges against the owner.

The nightclub had been cited for 11 building code violations and the city has been in court with the owners since last July officials said.

Some people fainted on the club floor; others were coughing and crying, gagging and blindly groping for any way out.

"People were being trapped underneath you ... so we're actually standing on people's heads and we didn't even know it, said Amishov Blackwell, a 30-year-old patron. "It was just bodies laying everywhere."

Blackwell said a man crushed between people told him, "I can't breathe! I want you to hold my hand, man. If I don't make it, tell my mom that I low her? He just basically collapsed."

Witnesses reported that lights were out in the stairwell. On Monday afternoon, Joyce backed off earlier statements that firefighters had used sleigehammers and pry bars to open other doors in the half-block-long building. He said one or two doors may have been blocked by laundry bags or other items from the first-floor parently surged down a single front exit. Joyce also scaled down the number of people in the club to about 300; earlier, the fire department had estimated as many as 1,500 people were on the second floor.

Police Commissioner Terry Hillard said investigators were trying to sort out conflicting stories about the source of the Mace or pepper spray and obtain videotape from inside the club. Witnesses said the spray may have come from the club's guards trying to end a fight between at least two women.

"Lives were tragically and senselessly lost, pinned down by a stampeding crowd," Hillard said. "We will get to the bottom of this," he said. "Right now our investigation is at full tilt." Friends and family of missing patrons flocked to the morque Monday afternoon, searching for information and holding out ho

UK right to cancel classes after storm

UK students couldn't avoid the ice storm that struck Lexington over the weekend, but the university side-stepped a public relations disaster by canceling classes Monday and Tuesday.

After trudging through snow After trugging through show and ice on multiple occasions this winter, many members of the UK community might have wondered if the institution ever closes. Reasons differ about why classes

are canceled so rarely, but the key

Since classes aren't rescheduled and tuition is not refunded to stuand tuition is not refunded to students, UK officials said they want students to get their money's worth. In turn, the university also has a monetary interest in keeping the school open. Closing the university means UK must pay 10,000 employees to take the day off. A closing would also take time away from

professors' research projects

It's good to know UK officials are looking out for students' monetary interests. But it's also refreshing to know UK cares about the safety of its students, faculty and staff.

Sure, students don't want to see their tuition wasted, but they also don't want to commute through a disaster area to get to class.

And that's assuming students were able to get back to Lexington. Many of those who went home for the weekend may have been unable to return to campus because of road closings.

Students who staved may also have more pressing matters than class, such as finding a warm place to stay or filing insurance claims.

UK officials made the right decision by canceling the first two days of class this week.

Networks reinforce stereotypes, should portray women differently

TV networks have seemingly always been in constant competition in a never ending race to the bottom. But some of today's most popular shows make one wonder if the networks have managed to outdo themselves in sinking to an all time low, particularly in regards to their portrayal of women.

Have you heard of "Amos 'n Andy"? In the days of segregation, when black people had little influence or power in our society, Alvin Childress, Tim Childress and Spencer Childress Jr. were a comedy team entertaining racist white audiences across the United States.

They performed comedy routines that reinforced just about every offensive stereotype white America had inflicted upon black people.

Thankfully the days when the portrayal of racist stereotypes were viewed as quality family entertainent have passed, and the network and TV audiences of the negative portrayal of black people in entertainment.

But the same is not true for women. Take the popular show "Who Wants to Marry a Millionaire" and the many spinoffs it has spawned. This show, which featured throngs of women vy-ing for the affection of a wealthy man they knew little or nothing about, went to great lengths to debase women by reenforcing negative stereotypes that women have been struggling to escape. A more appropriate title for this show and its kind would have been "Who Wants to be a Wealthy Whore" as these women were on television vying, not for love, but for the opportunity to prostitute themselves in exchange for money. This show went a long way to reenforce the negative stereotype that women should be considered brainless.

promiscuous and shamelessly willing to sell themselves to the highest bidder. The networks' attack on women doesn't stop there, however. Another good example is "Ally McBeal," who despite being a professional career women was still flighty and promiscuous.

All of this suggests to the audience that even if society must accept women in the workplace, it can still assume they attained their professional status by sleeping their way to the top, not through merit.

The networks have a good deal of apologizing to do for their portuyal of women on television. The days when black America had to sliently endure "Amos in Andy" are over How much longer will it take the networks to take some responsibility for themselves and pull shows that demean and degrade women?

no be tair to bush, Rumstein and the rest, this comic understanding of world affairs probably says more about how stupid the White House thinks we are than about its own agenda.

Saddam is interested in consolidating power in Iraq. crushing domestic opposition and squeezing both his own people and — to a lesser extent — his neighbors for anything they can offer. Like any good bulky, however, Saddam is extremely wary of folks who are tougher than he is Nothing suggests that he would pick a fight that he idin't expect to win, and there's certainly no evidence to suggest that either (a) he wants to rule the world, a la Dr. Evil or (b) he's interested in marryrdom of Kuwait in 1990? While better anything he's done in the past few years, it's still a poor foundation for the Dr. Evil comparison.

In 1990, Saddam was basking in the memory of being a close friend of Presidents Reagan and Bush, given Iraq's recent war with Iran.

Just a week before the invasion of Kuwait, Saddam met with the U.S. ambassador to air his grievances about longstanding boundary disputes with the Kuwaiti emirs. This testing-the-waters approach wasn't unprecedented in American foreign policy. President Suharto discussed his proposed invasion of East Timor in 1975 with Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and President Ford, who happened to be visiting Indonesia at the time. He was asked by his American guests only to delay his troops until Air Force One could get back to Washington. In July 1990, Saddam imagined that he could get away with his Kuwaiti adventure without upsetting his American friends.

In the event, Saddam either misread the tone of the meeting or overplayed his hand with his eventual attack or Kuwait.

Opting not simply to seize the oilfields on the disputed border between the two nations but to occupy Kuwait entire. Saddam made it hard for the United States — or any other nation — to turn a blind eye.

Perhaps if we imagine that Saddam really is Dr. Evil, then we'll feel less anxious about the fact that the truly scary guys are still out there, unaccounted for, watching us and waiting.

Saddam isn't about to smuggle a bomb into the Four Seasons because he knows exactly what would happen if he did: Baghdad would be incinerated.'


