MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE, JANUARY 31, 1972

The University Senate met in regular session at 3:00 p.m., Monday, January 31, 1972, in the Court Room of the Law Building. Chairman W. Garrett Flickinger, presided. Members absent: Staley F. The Chairman reminded the Senators of the ROTC proposal which was on the floor of the Senate as a result of action taken at the May 10, 1971 meeting to table the proposal to the regular November meeting of the Senate in the fall and, that due to the press of other business had been delayed further to the present meeting. He then presented Mr. Howell Hopson, secretary of the Senate Council, who recommended adoption of the Arts and Sciences proposal on reconstituting the ROTC departments as academic programs, with the following changes and additions by the Senate Council. The Arts and Sciences proposal had been circulated to the faculty under date of December 3, 1971 and the Senate Council substitute proposal had been circulated under date of December 9, 1971:

1. that under item (2) of the A & S report, the Senate establish a University Senate standing committee on ROTC programs comprising ten (10) members to be appointed as follows: one administrator and one staff representative from each of the ROTC programs to be appointed by the President; three faculty members to be appointed by the Senate Council; and four students comprising one cadet from each of the ROTC programs and two non-ROTC students to be appointed by Student Government.

## 2. The committee to be charged to:

\* (a) advise the Dean on evaluation, appointment, and rank of ROTC staff;

(b) review ROTC curricula, both those courses offered by other departments and those offered by ROTC programs, and to recommend to the College of Arts and Sciences on new courses and changes in courses as to content and credit;

\* (c) work toward creating an atmosphere of mutual understanding, cooperation and constructive cross-criticism between ROTC and the University at large;

\* (d) promote the cross-listing of appropriate ROTC courses (e.g., military history, national security policy) with relevant departments and where feasible to have such courses taught by the faculty of that department; investigate the redistribution of ROTC courses among the appropriate departments.

Following some requests for clarification of the substitute proposal the Senate voted to accept the substitution.

The floor was then thrown open for debate on the issue. Following extensive discussion Vice President Cochran pointed out the impropriety of a Senate Advisory Committee advising a Dean, specifically on the appointment of faculty -- that the University had other machinery to discharge this responsibility. He then presented a motion to amend the proposal to delete subhead (a) from item 2. of the proposal.

The Senate approved this motion. The sentence approved for deletion reads as follows:

(a) advise the Dean on evaluation, appointment, and rank of ROTC staff;

Following further debate Dean Royster of the College of Arts and Sciences stated his opposition to establishment of a University Senate standing committee on ROTC programs; that it should be a committee of the Arts and Sciences college to work with the Dean rather than a standing committee of the Senate.

Following Dean Royster's remarks motion was made to amend the paragraph on the appointment of the committee (which is item 1. of the proposal) to make the standing committee a committee of the Arts and Sciences Faculty Council appointed by the Arts and Sciences Faculty Council rather than a standing committee of the University Senate, so that item 1. of the proposal would read:

1. that the Arts and Sciences Faculty Council appoint a standing committee on ROTC programs to consist of the following ten (10) members: one administrator and one staff representative from each of the ROTC programs; three faculty members; four students, comprising one cadet from each of the ROTC programs and two non-ROTC students.



The Senate voted to stop debate on this amendment.

The Senate then approved the amendment to paragraph 1. of the motion.

Question was called which required a two-thirds majority vote. Following a voice vote, objection was raised concerning the results. A hand count of 84 to 28 indicated the required two-thirds majority needed.

The Senate approved the substitute motion as presented by Mr. Hopson and amended twice. The ROTC proposal as presented, amended, and approved, reads:

The existing ROTC departments shall be reconstituted as academic programs in the College of Arts and Sciences.

1. The Arts and Sciences Faculty Council shall appoint a standing committee to consist of the following ten (10) members: one administrator, one staff representative from each of the ROTC programs; three faculty members; four students, comprising one cadet from each of the ROTC programs and two non-ROTC students.
2. The committee is charged to:
  - (a) review ROTC curricula, both those courses offered by other departments and those offered by ROTC programs, and to recommend to the College of Arts and Sciences on new courses and changes in courses as to content and credit;
  - (b) work toward creating an atmosphere of mutual understanding, cooperation and constructive cross-criticism between ROTC and the University at large;
  - (c) promote the cross-listing of appropriate ROTC courses (e.g., military history, national security policy) with relevant departments and, where feasible, to have such courses taught by the faculty of that department; investigate the redistribution of ROTC courses among the appropriate departments.
3. Each college of the University determine which ROTC courses and what total number of ROTC credits are to count toward the degree requirements of that college.
4. The University support efforts of the Department of Defense and Congress to devise a system of full reimbursement for expenses incurred in maintaining ROTC programs, and offer its services in devising such a system.
5. Where these recommendations violate specific contractual obligations of the University to the Department of Defense, these contracts should be renegotiated.

The Chairman reported that the reports of the ad hoc committees appointed last spring on grading, accelerated programs, and scheduling have been received in the Senate Council office; that the accelerated programs report had been before the Council, changes had been made, and it was hoped that the report will be before the Senate at its next meeting on February 14th. He stated that the initial report of the grading committee had been circulated



to the deans and the credit and scheduling report would be submitted to them shortly. He emphasized that these are initial reports, that the Council frequently returns them for alterations and changes; and that one should not read an initial report and assume that it is the final word from that committee.

Chairman Flickinger further stated that the Senate would probably have some special meetings as it appeared the Senate would have some requests for changes in degree requirements but that he would try not to call any more special meetings than were necessary.

He also reported that the Council is having some difficulty in getting material out of the Duplication Center to comply with the 10-day circulation rule; that the Center does the best it can but remains overloaded with paper work processing. He recommended that the Senate consider the possibility of using the Kernel as a means of disseminating the various reports and other matters for the Senate's consideration; that it was cheaper to place material in the paper than to have some 2100 copies of papers containing pending legislation duplicated and mailed to the faculty outside the Senate. He asked that the Senators give some thought to this means of dissemination and stated that he hoped the Council would have a proposal along these lines for Senate consideration at the February meeting for presentation to the Rules Committee for finalization.

The minutes of the called meeting of December 20, 1971 were approved as circulated.

The list of candidates for degrees at the December 22, 1971 graduation date, which had been circulated to the faculty under date of January 14, 1972, was approved as circulated for recommendation to the Board of Trustees.

Dr. William H. Dennen, Acting Dean of the Graduate School, presented a request that the University Senate act on six candidates for honorary degrees at the May 1972 Commencement. Following his presentation, motion was made and seconded that the Senate not approve the last named candidate Dean Dennen had presented. The Senate defeated this motion. The Senate then approved the names of the six candidates as presented for recommendation to the President and Board of Trustees with the request that the names be withheld until the Board has taken action and the nominees have accepted.

The Chairman reported that the action taken by the Senate Council in its circularization of December 9, 1971 approving the change in the degree requirements in the College of Arts and Sciences from 128 to 120 credit hours had been objected to within the 10-day notification period provided for in the Rules; therefore, the Senate Council wished to recommend that the proposed recommendation of the College of Arts and Sciences to reduce the number of hours for degree requirements for the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science (exclusive of the Bachelor of Arts in Journalism and the Bachelor of Music degrees) from 128 hours to 120 hours (exclusive of physical education service courses) be approved by the Senate.

Dr. Flickinger then recognized Dr. Hans Gesund, Department of Civil Engineering, who spoke to his objections. Following Senate debate both for and against the reduction in credit hours, the Senate voted to approve the reduction in the number of hours from 128 to 120 (exclusive of physical education service courses) and excluding the Bachelor of Arts in Journalism and the Bachelor of Music degrees.

The Chairman reported that the Senate had a new Sergeant-at-Arms, Professor Relmond Van Daniker; further, that the Senate Council had appointed as an ex officio member of the Senate Mr. James Alcorn of the Placement Service who will serve as the Sergeant-at-Large to assist Mr. Van Daniker in maintaining order.

The Chairman reported that the results on the action ballot taken to change the admission requirements in the Colleges of Medicine and Nursing had been overwhelmingly in favor of the changes. Therefore, the Rules of the University Senate are changed as follows and the next updating of the Rules will include these changes.

Section III, B. 1. e., page 31, Admission Requirements of College of Nursing will be deleted entirely.

Section III, B. 2. c., page 33, College of Medicine will read:

- c. College of Medicine: Applicants for admission to the College of Medicine, in addition to meeting general University requirements, must meet the requirements of the College of Medicine and be accepted by the Medical College Admissions Committee. Applicants normally will be required to have taken the MCAT and to have completed a liberal arts degree program in an accredited college of arts and sciences. However, consideration may be given to applicants who have completed only two or three years of college if their academic background and other credentials demonstrate superior ability.

Applicants must be prepared with the following minimal requirements or their equivalent: two semesters of physics which include laboratory work; two full-year courses in chemistry with laboratory, including organic chemistry; two semesters of



Biology with laboratory; and one year of English with emphasis on communicative skills.

The Chairman reported that the action ballot concerning the modification of the educational unit at Fort Knox was also supported by the Senate, the vote being 128 to five. The recommendation was that the University of Kentucky operation located at the United States Army Armor Center, Fort Knox, Kentucky, be redesignated the University of Kentucky Center at Fort Knox, as a part of the University System of the University of Kentucky, and that this change be effective upon approval by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. Further, the recommendation outlined program offerings, admission requirements and procedures, degree offerings, administrative responsibility, and faculty constituency and ranks.

The Chairman stated that some questions were raised regarding the proposals in the program and that Vice President Cochran had agreed to answer any questions which Senators might wish to raise. There were no questions from the floor.

The Chairman asked for a waiver of the 10-day rule in order to consider two items on the agenda, namely, the proposed changes in the Rules of the University Senate concerning dates for application for admission or readmission to the University, and the proposed change relative to credit for work done at Community Colleges. Both these proposals had been circulated to the faculty under date of January 19, 1972. The Senate approved the waiver of the rule.

Dr. Flickinger called attention to the need for a minor editorial change in the Community College Revision, then called on Mr. Hopson who recommended that the proposed revisions in the Rules relative to credit for Community College work be approved as circulated. The Senate approved the proposed revision as circulated, with the minor change, to become effective Fall 1972 and thereafter for any student entering the University system.

Revise III. B. 1. b., page 29, to read:

b. Admission to Advanced Standing:

(Leave paragraphs 1 and 3 alone.) Change paragraph 2 to read:

Baccalaureate degree credit work taken at a fully accredited college or university is recognized credit hour for credit hour. In order to be classified as fully accredited, a college or university must be a member of one of the six regional accrediting associations, such as the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Advanced standing from an unaccredited college or university may be obtained by special subject examinations or by validation under conditions set forth by the Dean of Admissions and Registrar and the Dean of the College in which the student will enroll. The applicability of the transfer work towards a University degree shall be determined by the Dean of the College in which the student enrolls.



Revise III. D. 9., page 39, to read:

9. Credit for Work Done at University of Kentucky Community Colleges - Credit for work done while registered at University of Kentucky Community Colleges shall be transferable to the University System including and limited to a maximum of sixty-seven (67) credit hours of freshman and sophomore courses. This 67 hour maximum is to be reduced by any credit hours earned previous to enrollment or reenrollment in a community college or by concurrent registration in another institution or program. Grades, credits and quality points for baccalaureate degree courses taken in the Community College System shall be transferred when the community college student enrolls in the University System. The applicability of any given courses not offered in the University System towards a University degree shall be determined by the Dean of the College in which the student enrolls. The grade point standing, however, shall be determined solely by those courses which are common to the two Systems. (See III, B. 1. (b).

Delete IV. D. 1. g. (c), page 48.

The Chairman called on the Dean of Admissions and Registrar to present the proposed change in the University Senate Rules pertaining to dates for applying for admission or readmission to the University. The Senate approved the proposed changes as circulated, to become effective with the 1973 Spring Semester.

Delete in its entirety Section III. A. on pages 26 and 27 and substitute the following:

### III. RULES RELATING TO ENTERING AND ATTENDING THE UNIVERSITY

- A. Application for Admission or Readmission -- All applicants for admission to the University, and all University students who have not been enrolled for one or more semesters, must submit to the Registrar's Office an official application for admission and supporting documents as described below:
  1. Applications for admission and supporting documents must be submitted by the deadlines published in the University Calendar.
  2. This requirement shall not apply to University students taking summer work elsewhere who are enrolled in the University for the preceding spring and following fall semesters, except that these students must submit to the Registrar's Office official transcripts of such summer work; nor shall it apply to University students enrolling only in one or more sessions of consecutive summers.
  3. The professional colleges with the approval of the Dean of Admissions and Registrar, may set deadlines earlier than those set generally for the University.
  4. Applications for admission or readmission must be supported by official transcripts of all college work attempted elsewhere.



5. Every student whose native language is other than English is required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) prior to approval for admission. This test may be waived for such students who can present an official transcript of satisfactory work taken at an accredited American college, or a college in another country where English is the native language.

Change the official University Calendars for 1972-73; 1973-74; 1974-75 as follows:

1. April 1 - the deadline for applying for admission or readmission for any summer term for all categories of undergraduate applicants.
2. June 1 - the deadline for applying for admission or readmission for a fall semester for all categories of undergraduate applicants, other than non-resident freshman applicants, for whom April 1 shall remain as the deadline.
3. October 15 - the deadline for applying for admission or readmission for a spring semester for all categories of undergraduate applicants.

Chairman Flickinger stated that the Senate Council wished to report that it had approved a request from a professor in the Department of Business Administration, College of Business and Economics, to conduct, on a one-semester trial basis, a one-credit experimental course to be given on the Pass-Fail option which would not count toward the student's four-course limitation.

A Senator referred the Senate to its previous approval of the change relative to credit for work done at Community Colleges -- specifically, the statement under Admission to Advanced Standing, which reads ". . . The applicability of the transfer work towards a University degree shall be determined by the Dean of the College in which the student enrolls . . ." and made a motion that it reconsider that statement. The Senate defeated the motion to reconsider.

The Senate adjourned at 5:00 p.m.


