City considers tagging kegs to stop underage drinking

City-wide policy would require kegs to be registered; council members could vote as soon as Oct. 23

A proposed beer keg registration policy cleared its first hurdle toward be-coming a city ordinance Monday.

The Lexington-Fayette
Urban County Council's
Services Committee voted
6-1 in favor of the beer keg
ordinance.

ordinance.
Committee members
will make a presentation in
a council meeting next
Tuesday, asking council

members to vote to put the issue on the docket.

The council could vote on the measure as early Oct. 23.

Urban County Councilmember Dick DeCamp formally presented the idea to the services committee in early July 2003 after a constituent in his district asked him to, he said.

"At this point, I'm lis-

tening to both sides," said DeCamp, whose district includes UK. "This was mainly brought up because an awful lot of high school-ers, so we are told from national statistics, get adults to buy them alcohol for their parties," adding that some area liquor stores have independently adopted a similar policy.

"This is just city-

wide." said Lisa Johnson, vice president of the Aylesford Neighborhood Association. "I'm hoping that by
January, we can get someone to pick this issue up
and make it a state-wide
thing because this problem
is all over the state, not
just in Lexington."

If it is passed, Lexington would become the second city in Kentucky with

Former Gov. Edward T. "Ned"
Freathitt remained in a deep coma yesterday at the Chandler Medical Center, a UK spokesperson said.

Breathitt was removed from life support yesterday, said Attorney General and gubernatorial candidate Ben Chandler.

Breathitt was placed on a ventilator Friday after he collapsed at an LCC speech.

Mary Margaret Colliver, director of UK Public Relations, declined to give Breathitt's condition. At last report, and the second of the collapse was caused by an irregular heart-beat, said Dr. John Gurley, a cardiologist. Although Breathitt was revived after collapsing, if was not before a lack of oxygen damaged his brain, Gurley said. He said it is unlikely Breathitt will emerge from the coma.

Breathitt's wife and daughter have been with him since hincident. Other visitors have included President Lee Todd and Patsy Todd, former President Charles Wethington and Chandler. Breathitt, a Democrat, had campaigned for Chandler in recent months.



Country within 30 days.

When breaking up a party, police can record the number on the keg, which will link it to the person who bought the alcohol. Claretta Lahr, owner of Colisseum Liquors on Rose Street, said she has a reputation for carding but doesn't see the point of the proposed keg policy.

"No matter what, older takes will still buy alcohof Lahr sid.

"It isn't going to really stop anything. It's just like the issue with cigarettes; it's the same damn thing. I really don't see how this policy will help or hinder anything; she said.

Lexington Police Lt. William Henderson said "This certainly helps."

A common problem that seid police officers face when handling a party with kegs is that they must spend time attempting to discover who bought the alcohol. "Most of the time, at least in the parties that I've had to break up, it's a case of asking, Who's in charge." Well, mobody knows in charge. Well, mobody knows we can go to the keg's tag, which will give us information about who bought the alcohol, "he said.

was the least offensive candidate.

Certainly, Darrell Isaa and the Republican Party exploited an opportunity defeated the ACLU on its home turf (the 9th Circuit) and coalesced around Arnold Schwarzenegger.

But the memorable aspect of the '03 Recall will always be the image depreciation of Gray Davis, somewhat ironic considering he made his political fortune by doing that to others.

Tenacity is often a great trait of politicians, and it wins far more elections than it loses, but without complementary characteristics, it can be the death knell of a campaign — and of a political career.





Cool Cats succeed while pro hockey folds

Professional hockey teams in Lexington have come and gone. But the UK Cool Cats still remain popular among UK students after 20 years.

Through the support of college students, the Cool Cats draw capacity crowds to most of their home games — an achievement the Kentucky Thoroughblades and not claim for most of their time in the Bluegrass.

Ian Ward, Cool Cats general manager, said the key to the club's appeal among students is ensuring the fans will always have a goof time.

"With the students, we have a perfect target audience right on campus," Ward said. "If we provide a lot of fun for them, they are going to come back."

fun for them, they are going to come back."

The UK hockey club regularly draws about 700 fans to its games at the Lexington Ince Center. Ward estimates 90 to 95 percent of that crowd is students. Although both Lexington minor league teams gained more overall fan support, they were never able to draw more students than the Cool Cats.

UK graduate Josh Fisher,

who served as Director of Media Relations for the Men O' War, said one of the reasons for the Cool Cats success with students is the loose atmosphere at home games.

"I think they provide an excellent atmosphere and they kind of allow people to be a little on the rowdy side," Fisher said. "The \$5.00 ticket helps make it a draw as well."

Fisher said at the while the Cool Cats fill their arena almost every night, the Men O' War and Thoroughblades averaged 3,000 and 5,000 fans a game, respectively. Borkowski outlined the ways the franchise tried to reach out to the student community without ever seeing positive results.



She laughed again. "I don't think so," she said.





Kill Bill thrills, leaves audience eagerly anticipating next installment

In Jackie Brown, Samuel L. Jackson and Robert DeNiro sit in awe of the in-fomercial "Chicks With Guns." However, as Quentin Tarantino's fourth film shows, that only hinted at director's female vio-lence fixation.

Six years later, he has created a vio-

DIX years later, he has created a vio-lent half-epic that honors the movies of his youth while extending the "Chicks With Guns" concept to the next level: chicks with swords. In Kill Bill - Vol. 1, The Bride (Uma

Thurman) hacks, slices and stabs her way through a half-hour parade of yakuza gangsters and samurai warriors. The Bride doesn't believe in honor

like Mr. White. She's not immersed in pop culture like Jules and Vincent. She's not afraid of starting over like Jackie Brown. The sword is in the driver's seat toward retribution: her mind is just along

for the ride.

We never learn The Bride's name (it's bleeped out on every mention), but her back story is spelled out. As a member of the Deadly Viper Assassination Squad (Di-VAS), she was known as Black Mamba, acting on behalf of the enigmatic Bill (David Carradine).

On The Bride's wedding day, the Di-VAS murder nine members of the wedding party in what would the goriest scene in any other movie. Much to Bill's dismay

Four years later, The Bride awakens and, after a painstaking battle to regain feeling in her limbs, sets out for revenge. First on her list is O-Ren Ishii (Lucy Liu), a ese yakuza.

But we first see her next confronta tion, with another femme fatale named Vernita (Vivica A. Fox). After much nerve-wracking tension and some comic relief, The Bride seeks vengeance where it

hurts the most: at home and in the heart.

Kill Bill, like Tarantino's other films, reveals its treasures like a novel. Vol. I unwraps the first five chapters, the rest are being withheld until February. As if splitting the movie in two wasn't delay-ing the audience's gratification enough, The Bride's showdown with O-Ren is saved for last.

And what a showdown it is. As The Bride carefully caresses and holds her sword as if it were the unborn child she lost in the nightmare marital massacre, we are led to believe that an honorable samurai duel is about to unfold. Three minutes, two dismemberments

and a decapitation later. The Bride's sword has sliced those expectations and Tarantino gleefully hands them back to us, soaked in so much blood that some of the battle is shown in black and white to meet ratings standards.

The Bride (Uma Thurman) gets vindictive in



That kind of adaptation is what Tarantino is all about. The movie is his love letter to a diverse group of genres: Hong Kong martial arts films, Japanese samurai films and spaghetti Westerns. He even shows what anime a la Tarantino would look like.

The movie's soundtrack is an equal-ly eclectic mixture. An excerpt from a Bernard Herrmann score in followed by

the RZA. No further comment required.

With its hype and skillful execution, Vol. 1 easily stands alone as a film event. But, more importantly to the distributors, our appetite for Vol. 2 is also whetted. Daryl Hannah and Michael Madsen, two-fifths of the viper squad, only appear briefly in Vol.1.

We barely see or hear Bill until he dangles a final tidbit that leaves the au-

dience ready to reserve tickets for Vol. 2 That the split doesn't seem like a cheat is a testament to Tarantino and his longtime

has created before. The sharp, withy dia-logue is gone, but in its place are beauti-ful, bloody battles without honor or hu-manity. Though not as quotable as Pulp Fiction, Kill Bill is certainly memorable.





The 30-year-old country music sensation said he realizes not everyone at the concert may enjoy his music, but that wou't dampon his spir. but that won't dampen his spir-

but that won't dampen his spir-its one bit.

"We always have fun with that," he said. "My job is to make (non-country music fans) feel welcome at the show, too."

Wills said he sometimes asks members of the audience what kind of music thay like he.

what kind of music they like be-fore turning the answer around on the unsuspecting victim. In the past, he has tested his chops by playfully belting out popular hits like the Backstreet Boys' "I Want It That Way" to break mo-

notony at his concerts.

"We always have a good time," he said of his cross-genre crooning for audience mem-

Gestures like those are part of what Wills said is a con-scious effort to change the per-ception that his music is down-

beat just because most of his singles have been ballads. His most recent hit, "19 Some-thing," helped expedite the process by topping the Radio & Records country music charts

for seven weeks.
Wills said his upcoming release, And The Crowd Goes
Wild, which is due in stores Oct.

Wild, which is due in stores Oct. 21, should complete the transformation. He said the new album is "definitely a little more concert-friendly" and that he hopes the "depressing" tag will be a thing of the past.

"We've made a valiant effort to change that," he said. The title track off the new album, with its uplifting lyrics and upbeat tempo, reflects the artist's conscious effort to pick up the pace. The song currently up the pace. The song currently sits at No. 29 on the R&R listings


His concert at UK will kick off what promises to be a heavy sports load for Wills over the next couple of weeks. He will perform at a NASCAR Winston Cup race later this month and then sing the national anthem before the Nov. 2 Monday Night Football crowd in Atlanta As a college sports fan wellacquainted with the South's longstanding collegiate athletics love affair, Wills said he is looking forward to immersing himself in some of the passion associated with UK athletics.

"Knowing what we're coming up for, it's a real cool thing to be doing," he said.

Although he's still a Georgian through and through, Wills' concert will mark a comeback of sorts to central Kentucky, as he played in fellow country artist John Michael Montgomery's celebrity golf tournament in Lexington.
