FOR CAPT. HART GIBSON.

A Letter for a Kentucky Baby's Tress and a Picture, All Waiting Twenty Years.

Special Officer John H. Garrison of the Nassau Bank is a veteran of the late war. He served under the colors of the 139th Regiment, N. Y. V. In addition to the duty of keeping a sharp lookout for those who may harbor evil designs toward the bank's tidy surplus, he has to see that no one who is not a safe owner goes down the stairway that leads to the bank's safe deposit vault. But he found time yesterday in a lull of his double duties to take from the drawer of his desk and show to the reporter a time-yellowed envelope, evidently of home manufacture. The upper right hand corner was missing. "I had to sacrifice that much of my treasure," he said, explanatorily, "to the demands of a lady stamp collector. It bore a Confederate stamp and postmark, probably the last postmark that was put on a letter in the main Confederate Post Office in Richmond. It bore the date of the evacuation of Richmond over twenty years ago."

"The history of the envelope and the letter that it contains," Special Officer Garrison continued, "is rather interesting. At the date of the fall of Richmond I was temporarily detailed to the telegraph corps, and was one of the first bluecoats that entered the Capitol. On a desk in a sort of hallway near the meeting room, as I understood, of the Confederate Cabinet, I found the envelope and its contents, together with a telegraphic cipher code. They appeared to have been laid down together, and forgotten in a hurried departure. The seal of the envelope was broken, and the letter within had probably been read and replaced. I turned the cipher code over to my commanding officer, but forgot all about the letter. I probably put it, with letters from home, among my belongings, and never thought of it again. After my wife's death, I was looking over my papers and came across this letter. I have never taken it from its envelope, and do not know what it contains. I have always hoped to be able to restore it to the man to whom it is addressed, if he did not meet a soldier's fate in the war, or to his relatives. You shall be the first one to read it after a lapse of more than twenty years."

The envelope was addressed, in a lady's fine, angular handwriting, "Capt. Hart Gibson, care of Col. William Preston Johnston, Aide-de-Camp to President Davis, Richmond, Va." Opening the mellow-hued envelope, the reporter drew out a double sheet of time-stained foolscap. On the first sheet was written a letter, covering two-thirds of its surface. Its beginning was as follows:

LEXINGTON, KY., March 10, 1865.

MY DARLING HUSBAND: Hart was six weeks old yesterday. I should have written to you yesterday, but I was completely upset by the announcement of Ellen's engagement to Willie V.

Then the gossip of the neighborhood was given in a womanly, chatty way, showing that the writer, who signed herself "Yours devotedly, Mary B. Gibson," and her family held an excellent social position, and were possessed of considerable means. Attached to the back of the double sheet, with loops of blue silk, were a lock of golden hair and the photograph of a pretty little girl, five or six years of age, attired with the primness of twenty years ago. Over the hair and the photograph were written, "Here are a lock of baby's hair and a photograph of little Sallie."

Replacing its enclosure in the envelope, Mr. Garrison laid the little packet, brimful of woman's love and tender thoughtfulness, carefully away in his drawer, and turned the key.

"There," he said, "it will stay until the rightful owner, or some one who survives him, appears to claim it. I wonder whether it will be the loving wife, the gallant Captain, the golden-haired Hart—I suppose a sturdy man now—or little Sallie that comes or writes to make the claim that I shall be only too glad to honor. THE SUN is read and copied everywhere in the South, and perhaps an account of my memento of the fall of Richmond may reach some one of those that I earnestly hope may see it."
