Buscrash jolts UK band

Some members suffer minor injuries, sit out South Carolina football game

Two of six buses carrying UK band members were in a minor accident Friday on I-26 just north of the South Carolina border...

"The first thing I thought was 'we're gonna die,'" said Chris Carpenter, an undecided freshman involved in the accident.

Luckily, Carpenter's fears did not come true. While ten students had

to be taken to nearby St. Luke's Hospital, none of them suffered serious injuries, said George Boulden, associate director of bands at UK.

The accident occurred when one bus had to slam on its brakes quickly when approaching an eighteen-wheeler on mountainous roads. The eighteen-wheeler was traveling extremely slowly because it began burning its brakes, Boulden said.

Another bus then rear-ended the first and swerved into the guardrail and travelling

about fifty feet before stopping.

Nicole Schwartz, a music education freshman, said that there was virtually no space in between the bus and the edge of a cliff. In order to leave the crash scene, she and other band members had to walk sideways, she said.

"Thank goodness for the guardrail that was there," Boulden said.

While no students were seriously injured, the accident did affect the band in a couple ways.

The band's arrival at the University of South Carolina was delayed about four hours as a result of the accident, said Richard Clary, director of bands at UK.

Because of this, they arrived too late for their scheduled performance at a local high school, and also did not have a chance to practice before the game, Clary said.

In addition, some of the injured band members were not able to perform due to injuries such as whiplash and swollen lips.

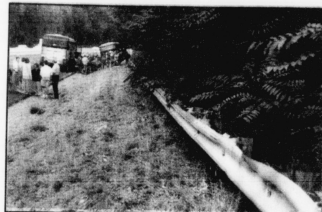
Ryan Sward, a chemical engineering freshman, hit his head on the front of his seat, and bit through his lip on the inside.

"That was fun," he said sarcastically.

Sward will not be able to play his tuba for a week but marched with the band on Saturday, just carrying his instrument. Clary commended the

drivers of T.O.B.Y. Tours. "We were quite fortunate that it was contained as it was," Clary said.

Children turned into soldiers

Guns, drugs and death: Youth recruited in unstable regions

An estimated 300,000 children around the world are being used to fight in conflicts, most of them against their will, UK human rights activists say.

"These children are often orphans, and they are basically handed an AK-47 and forced to kill," said Dr. Peter Little, UK anthropology professor.

UK's Amnesty International chapter is raising its voice about this issue. This evening at 7:30, they are showing an award-winning documentary, Child Soldier in the Whitehall Classroom Building. The film chronicles the use of child soldiers in Uganda.

The film viewing is part of an international campaign to end the use of child soldiers. "We want to raise awareness about this tragic situation on campus," Erik Hungerbuehler, electrical engineering freshman and Amnesty member said.

Conflict in their native lands produces displaced children and orphans when parents are lost and killed, Little said. These children are then kidnapped, shown violent films and addicted to drugs. Then, they are only given drugs if they fight.

"It's appalling what they do to these children," said Amy Shelton, president of UK's Amnesty International chapter. "Children are forced to kill other children; almost 100 percent of the captured females have sexually transmitted diseases from the adult commanders."

Those who try to escape are tortured or killed. Those that do escape are not always accepted back into their homes. The officers take revenge on the families of the escaped, Shelton said.

Like anyone who experiences trauma, child soldiers are sure to suffer adverse psychological affects later on, said Dr. Tom Widiger, a UK psychology professor.

"In order to deal with trauma, some children develop the ability to detach themselves from the traumatizing situation, as a defense mechanism or coping strategy," he said. "A reliance upon this coping strategy can obviously lead to many later problems in life, such as depression, altered emotions, nightmares."

Amnesty members are putting together a brochure about the campaign, passing around petitions and writing letters to governments. "As students and young adults in America, it's important for us to get involved with the Child Soldier action because the fundamental rights of children all over the world to peace, education, and childhood innocence are being violated," said Ryan LaFollette, Kentucky's student area coordinator for Amnesty International.

Wrestling star not coming to UK: The search continues for a pep rally MC

Homecoming committee officials have said that, contrary to campus rumors, The Rock, a professional wrestler, will not be appearing as Master of Ceremonies for the traditional homecoming pep rally Friday.

Mike Knox, assistant director of the Student Activities Board said The Rock was "never confirmed," and that at press time they were still working on a candidate for the position.

Knox stated that The Rock has no connection with

the University, but the committee felt that he would be someone to "excite the crowd."

"Right now we're waiting to hear from a couple of people we've asked. We've called several local people," said Amanda Holloway, pep rally chair of SAB.

Shelby Jett, chairman of the Homecoming committee could not explain how the rumor might have leaked out and declined to comment on other candidates for the position, stating that he did not anymore rumors started.

"It (the candidate) would be of a totally different type of person," he said, choosing

not to elaborate. Jett said even without The Rock, they still felt that the outcome will be strong.

The Rock has earned himself a loyal following among professional wrestling fans with his in-your-face style.

"It's a little disappointing, but I understand that he has time constraints," said Brian Raho, a math freshman. "It would have been a great time to see him, but he has a difficult schedule, so I'm not upset."

His popularity may be limited to the wrestling fans, though.

"Who is The Rock?" asked aural theory TA, Brad Rashley.

"I think that I've heard someone mention his name

before," said Chase Clift, an Accounting Freshman.

Jeff Chugg, a political science freshman, found the disappointing outcome of the rumor typical.

"It pretty much reminds you not to trust rumors on campus."

Hundreds dead, missing in Mexico floods

TEHUACAN, Mexico — More than 300 people are known to have died in Mexico's mudslides and flooding over the past week, and hundreds more are still missing. By yesterday morning, rescue workers had pulled the corpses of 15 people from the ruins of Dario Padilla's house and his relatives' two homes. His wife, his stepchildren and several grandchildren were among those killed in an avalanche of mud. "It took all my family in one blow," said the 55-year-old retired postal worker. As rain fell yesterday, the full scale of the disaster was only slowly becoming apparent.

N. Korea denounces US missile test

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korea denounced the United States yesterday for testing a defense missile system over the Pacific, and vowed to build up its own defense capabilities. "This (the test) shows that the U.S. policy to stifle North Korea has not in the least changed," said a commentary in a newspaper for the ruling Workers' Party. The U.S. Air Force earlier this month launched an unarmed missile and destroyed it with an interceptor rocket over the Pacific in its first test of a proposed missile defense system. North Korea rattled nerves in Asia last year when it test-fired a long-range missile over Japan.

Chechnya peace plan proposed

GROZNY, Russia — Chechnya's leader outlined a peace plan yesterday to end the fighting in his breakaway republic, and promised to crack down on renegade warlords if Russia withdraws its troops from Chechen territory. Chechen President Aslan Maskhadov called on Russia to immediately end "all combat actions," and said the two sides should observe the basic principles of a 1997 peace accord that ended the 1994-96 Chechen war. Maskhadov's plan appears unlikely to make much headway with the Russians.

Delay sought for test ban vote

WASHINGTON — The White House dispatched Cabinet members yesterday to press the Senate to put off voting on a nuclear test ban treaty because of rejection. One Republican opponent, Sen. Jon Kyl of Arizona, predicted certain defeat of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty if a Tuesday vote goes forward. Three Cabinet members and the president's top military officer said rejecting the treaty would prevent the United States from taking the lead in halting the spread of nuclear weapons.



SHOCKER: Pop star Michael Jackson and his second wife, former nurse Debbie Rowe, have agreed to divorce after nearly three years of marriage and two children, court papers filed in Los Angeles. Rowe filed for divorce in Los Angeles Superior Court, saying the couple had been separated since July 15.



MEG'S MONEY: Meg Ryan has joined the ranks of movieomd's highest paid female leads. The Hollywood Reporter says Ryan will receive \$15 million to star in "Proof of Life," based on a Vanity Fair magazine article about a hostage negotiator who falls in love with the wife of a hostage.

First Lady: End trafficking of women

REYKJAVIK, Iceland — First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton called for an end to the international trade in prostitution yesterday. Speaking at a conference on women and democracy in Iceland's capital, she decried a system that allows girls to be lured from home with the promise of jobs, "trafficked like drugs across state lines and sold into prostitution." The speech was her most outspoken of the tour, which also took her to Italy, Slovakia and Poland.

Thousands mourn rail crash dead

LONDON — Thousands of people sang hymns and prayed in a supermarket parking lot in west London yesterday, remembering 40 people killed nearby five days earlier when two passenger trains collided. Worshipers at churches across the country said special prayers, while forensic experts sifted through the charred remains of one carriage of the express train that collided with another train about two miles west of London's Paddington Station.

Ventura favors assisted suicide

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ventura says he would want the option of assisted suicide if he were terminally ill - an exception, he says, to his comments in Playboy magazine that he has "no respect for anyone who would kill himself." Another exception he makes: if someone were so mentally ill, they couldn't judge what they were doing. Otherwise, suicide makes no sense because if someone is at the point of considering suicide, "it can only get better," Ventura said. He made the comments in a taped interview for ABC shown yesterday.

Mich. St. gets big boost from win

NEW YORK — Michigan State leapt into the top five of The Associated Press' Top 25 college football poll for the first time in 32 years after beating Michigan Saturday. Michigan State jumped six places to No. 5, while Michigan fell seven spots to No. 10. Florida State and Penn State remained Nos. 12 for the fourth straight week. Nebraska moved up one spot to No. 3, followed by No. 4 Virginia Tech, Michigan State, Tennessee, Florida, Georgia Tech, Kansas State and Michigan round out the top 10.

'Kato' gets his day

HOLLYWOOD — Brian "Kato" Kaelin, O.J. Simpson's famous house guest, has settled his \$15 million libel lawsuit over the National Examiner's headline: "Cops Think Kato Did It!" Kaelin's lawyer, Gary Bostwick, wouldn't say how much Globe Communications Corp. agreed to pay.

Play is unsettling

Playwright Herman Daniel Farrell III tends to refer to *Desegregation*, UK Theater's season-opening production, as much more than a play. He calls it "a conversation."

The content of *Desegregation* requires examination from two perspectives. The first, and probably most important, is that of a political and historical expression of racism. In that light, the play is insightful, provocative and right on.

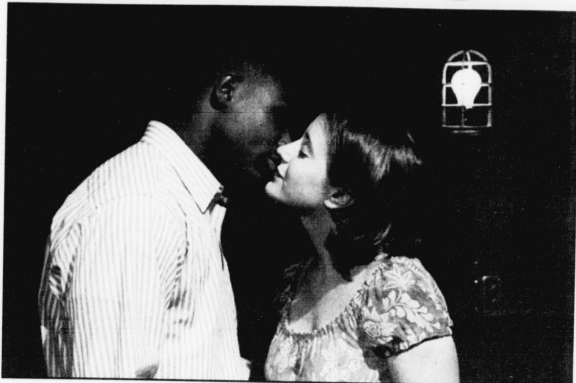
Farrell's script plays out key issues of America's race debate in the friendly confines of the Briggs Theater to examine several themes of racism on college campuses. These are the unspoken words, the conversations never begun, and the wounds never bandaged.

Asking for more questions than it attempts to answer, *Desegregation* is both an indictment of our history and an insight into our present. In this sense the work is exemplary—a frustrating, unsettling, even frightening picture of America's historical racial division.

As a piece of theater it does not fare as well. The production is too long. It is not the running time of three hours, but rather the lengthy scenes in the first act which involve little or no action. The unique opening moments quickly give way to pages of historical facts and tedious character exposition.

Farrell's script falls well short of good theater. The history lessons are boring until the characters begin to examine and dissect them. Even then, the passages involving the history of desegregation do not contribute significantly to the interaction of the characters onstage, although this is clearly the intent.

Despite some strong choices made by the actors, Farrell's characters are little more than stereotypes. Chuck is the loud-mouthed racist in denial, Jan is the female athlete, therefore a closet lesbian.

Felicity is the airhead Christian zealot who eventually finds compassion and tolerance. Obatala is the defiant young black woman who eventually finds compassion and tolerance. Did I mention that Chuck and Jan eventually find compassion and tolerance?

If the character development suffers from predictability and stereotyping, the plot suffers from just the opposite. The play begins with a confusing and seemingly random chat between a group of actors, then goes stampeding off in a variety of directions. Ultimately, it is the audience that gets drawn and quartered.

Farrell uses many of the age-worn gimmicks of a "play within a play." Breaking the proscenium barrier, toying with lighting and sound cues, and even offstage hollering by the director have delighted many audiences, but not this

one. The gimmicks here are nothing more. Generally, they lack subtlety and serve to disassociate the audience members from the production rather than draw them in.

Despite these numerous flaws, *Desegregation* is rich with quality acting. Several scenes yield powerful, creatively staged moments—apparently in defiance of the plodding exposition preceding them.

Spencer D. Christensen plays the abrasive, inflexible Chuck, a white guy who refuses to accept responsibility for his ancestors' racism. Angel Moore plays the abrasive, inflexible Obatala, a black gal who insists all white guys take responsibility for all racism, past and present.

In the scene where they abruptly begin to see the world from each other's perspective, Christensen and Moore make us believe in their conversions. The eerie blue moonlight that barely

illuminates them gives the moment a stark, genuine feel.

Also noteworthy is the work of Suzanne Sowards as Monique. In a brief monologue, she tells a harrowing tale of prejudice and intolerance. The scene is surprising and engaging. Sowards' performance, particularly in those moments, was deeply moving. Stephanie Parrott as Felicity and Kimberly Thomson as Jan also offer strong performances.

The play's conclusion is somewhat of a surprise. Like so much of *Desegregation*, it is neither unpredictable nor satisfying. Not only is everything—both in the world and in the characters' lives—left unsolved, the play's conclusion tries to make this into some kind of heroic reality. Things are bad, that's the way they are. Maybe we should talk about it.

Unfortunately, after three hours of this play, we've heard quite enough.

Cats add to Holtz's misery

Strong defensive effort makes up for "really bad" offensive showing as Cats move to 4-2

Kentucky coach Hal Mumme doesn't sugar-coat things, even when his team wins by 20.

When asked if his offense was less sharp than usual in the Wildcats' 30-10 victory over South Carolina on Saturday, Mumme was blunt.

"That's being kind. We were really bad," Mumme said. "Thank goodness for the defense."

The Wildcats (4-2, 2-1 South-eastern Conference) gained their second fewest offensive

yards this season (337), wasted two drives inside South Carolina's 10-yard line and were pretty much knocked off stride by the Gamecocks (0-6, 0-4).

"We never got into a rhythm today," said quarterback Dusty Bonner, who threw for a touchdown and ran for another. "We made a lot of stupid mistakes. I made some throws that I should have put more air under."

The Gamecocks extended Division I's longest losing streak to 16 and etched more worry lines into coach Lou Holtz's face. Never before in 28 years of coaching has Holtz

gone this deep into a season without winning.

For a change it was Kentucky's defense that saved the game. "They played really well," Mumme said. "That's why we got a SEC win on the road."

The Gamecocks fumbled twice inside their 35, both of which led to touchdowns. Eric Kelly's interception set up Bonner's 27-yard TD throw to Brad Pyatt.

Bonner finished 23 of 34 for 263 yards. It was only the second time this season that Bonner was held to fewer than three touchdowns passes.

Kentucky tight end James Whalen had nine catches for 119 yards. The Wildcat defense got things going. Marlon McCree

forced a fumble on South Carolina fullback Andrew Pinnock at his 5-yard line and safety Anthony Wajda returned it for a touchdown to put the Wildcats up 13-3.

On South Carolina's next drive, Kelly picked off Mikal Goodman and returned the ball 29 yards to the Gamecocks' 27. Four plays later, Bonner found Pyatt and it was 20-3.

"We didn't feel like we played as good as we could have," Whalen said.

Mumme, who took the Wildcats to a bowl game last year, and Bonner have answered a lot of questions about thriving without the Cleveland Browns' star-in-waiting Tim Couch. But while the team has piled up the points, it has also given them away in bunches.

This time, they held the

Gamecocks to nine first downs and 55 yards rushing.

"This shows the defense is finally coming together like we thought it was going to be at the beginning," Wildcats linebacker Jeff Snelgegar said.

South Carolina again struggled with a young, banged-up offense.

"This is just difficult," said Holtz, who at times played seven freshmen on offense. "But that's all we have."

The Gamecocks were held to 38 yards in the first half. Holtz subbed freshman quarterback Goodman with seldom-used backup Kyle Crabb for much of the third quarter. They had 78 yards of offense with nine minutes to go in the game when Goodman completed a 78-yard TD pass to Kerry Hood — South Carolina's longest play in

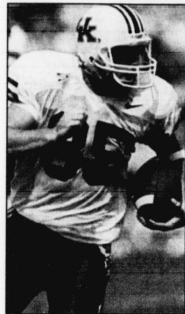

four yards. It was just the Gamecocks' third touchdown this year.

Women keep on rolling

Victories over Cincinnati and Vandy bring Cats' winning streak to nine

Nine. And counting. The UK women's soccer squad went 2-0 over the weekend against Cincinnati and Vanderbilt, extending their school-record winning streak to nine games.

The previous UK record for consecutive victories by either the men's or women's soccer team was seven. In 1993, the UK women captured seven straight games.

Friday in Cincinnati, the Cats (10-2-1, 4-1 SEC) shut out the Bearcats (5-7-1-0) for the victory.

After a scoreless first half, sophomore Annie Gage scored the game's only goal at the 77:14 mark when she fired the ball past UC goalkeeper Katrina Smolarczyk.

Junior forward Deanna Stayton was credited with an assist on the play. The goal was Gage's eighth of the season.

UC outshot the Cats 10-8, while Smolarczyk made four saves for the Bearcats. "This match could have gone either way tonight," UK coach Warren Lipka said.

"Both teams really fought hard out there tonight but we found a way to win. Beth Wells was outstanding in goal for us tonight and really gave us a chance to win this game." Wells notched her

fourth shutout of the season, recording a season-high ten saves.

Yesterday, UK scored three times in the last 45 minutes of play to defeat Vanderbilt (4-9, 2-3 SEC) in Nashville. The final score was 5-2.

Anne Gage led the way for the Cats once again, scoring twice — including the game-winner — 20 minutes into the game, the Commodores jumped out to a 1-0 lead.

UK evened the score at the 28:40 mark with a 25-yard shot from junior midfielder Jen Reese.

The Wildcats took the 2-1 lead just three minutes later on a penalty kick taken by Gage.

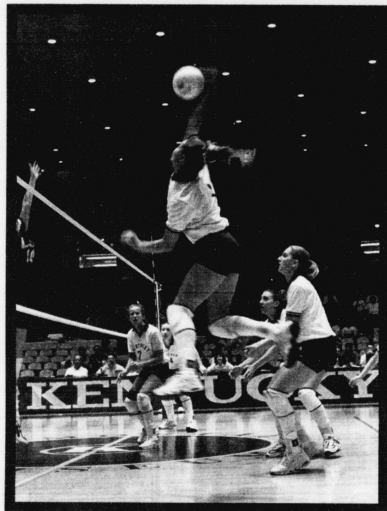
Vanderbilt tied the game with 10 seconds left in the first half, but the Cats shut down the Commodores in the second half.

UK tallied three goals from Gage and freshman forwards Christ Mattingly and Keri Boyce within seven minutes of each other to secure the win.

The 24th-ranked Cats return home for the first time in nearly three weeks for a weekend homestand beginning this Friday night.

UK will take on the Mississippi Bulldogs at the Soccer/Softball Complex. Game time is set for 3 p.m.

UK faces Ole Miss in Sunday's finale at 1 p.m.

JEREMY STRECK, 1976-1999

Streck dies after auto accident

Former UK football player Jeremy Streck, a starting senior offensive guard last season, died Saturday of injuries suffered after being hit by a car. He was 23.

Streck had been in critical condition at the Ohio State Medical Center in Columbus since he was struck at 8:10 a.m. on Oct. 1. He was pronounced dead at 12:05 a.m. Saturday, said Ken Phillips, hospital administration manager.

At the time of the incident, police charged Paul K. Synadinos with DUI. There was no word whether further charges would be filed.

"It was a tragedy," said UK coach Hal Mumme. "Any time someone as young as him gets shut down, it goes to show you that we are not in control. I know he is in a better place and he was a great person."

A 6-foot-5, 313-pound lineman from Cincinnati, Streck started 18 games and played in 32 during his career at UK. He started all 12 games last season at left guard as the Cats went 7-5, making their first appearance in a New Year's Day bowl game since 1952.

Red-shirted in 1994, Streck played defensive tackle as a red-shirt freshman, totaling two tackles, one against Cincinnati and one versus Tennessee.

He moved to offensive line in 1996 and started seven games despite missing three games with a dislocated kneecap.

In 1997, Streck alternated with Mike Webster at left guard. Last year, he took over the starting spot at left guard, while Webster moved over to right guard.

Mumme said Streck was the team's most improved lineman last year. "He was really the most consistent offensive lineman we had when you look at all 11 games," he said. "He was a guy that got a little better each week and he played that way."

UK feasts on DePaul University squad for back-to-back 6-1 victories

The UK Cool Cats swept a weekend series with back-to-back 6-1 victories over visiting DePaul University. The scores may have been the same, but each game had a different feel to it.

Friday's game was a rough affair that saw the two teams rack up 128 minutes in penalties. Kentucky Coach Brian Graham has gotten used to physical matches with DePaul. "Every time we play these guys it's always a blood bath," he said.

After DePaul tied the game early in the second period, UK reclaimed the lead when Phil Sweeney took a cross-ice pass from Aaron "freight train" Stephenson and beat DePaul

goaltender Mike Lewis. "I just kind of closed my eyes, hit it and it went in," Sweeney said.

Kentucky goaltender Justin Clark made the lead stand up, making 10 saves in the second period including several key stops on a DePaul 5-on-3 power play midway through the second period.

"If it wasn't for him, it would have been a lot closer than it was. He won the game for us tonight," Graham said.

The Cats would add three more goals in the second period, including Toni Haalapa's second of the night. Sweeney would find the net again in the third period to tie the scoring.

On Saturday night, the Cats called on their "freight train" to lead them to victory.

Stephenson got Kentucky on the board at 11:50 in the first

period when he deflected a Ryan Gardner point shot past Lewis on the power play.

Stephenson had to take some punishment in front of the net before he scored. "I took some cross-checks in the back. It doesn't feel so good but it all pays off," he said. Stephenson would later add a pair of assists to finish off his three-point night.

For the second straight night, Haalapa had two goals and an assist as Kentucky built a 5-0 lead before DePaul scored on a power play near the end of the second period.

Saturday's game was less physical than the night before.

"Last night was a little rough. (DePaul) got a little chippy near the end, but I think it was a little cleaner tonight," Stephenson said.

"Things got a little out of control for a couple of minutes, but things settled back down in the third period. We got our act together and started playing hockey again," Graham said.

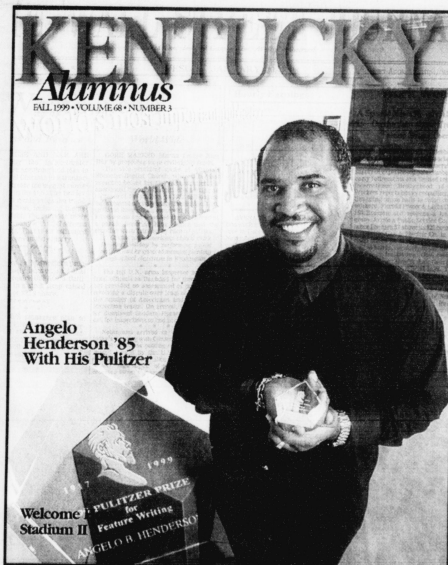

Gore, Bradley spar over loyalty

DES MOINES, Iowa — Al Gore and Bill Bradley tangled over their political loyalties Saturday in a rare showdown of Democratic presidential candidates, with the vice president suggesting his rival abandoned the party in its darkest hours. Gore used his speech to confront Bradley directly with his challenge to debate weekly.

"What about it, Bill?" said Gore, moving from behind the lectern to gesture to the former New Jersey senator sitting in the audience. Bradley merely smiled in return.

Gore questioned Bradley's commitment to core Democratic issues, and Bradley suggested that the vice president resorted to attacks because he lacked vision.

"To the extent that someone is confident in their own vision of the future, they don't need to resort to the darts," Bradley said. "I think I can talk about the future in a way that's compelling enough."

"I did not walk away from the fight when (former Speaker) Newt Gingrich took over the Congress. I did not walk away from the fight when Reaganomics was put up for a vote on the floor. I did not walk away from the fight when farmers needed farm credit," Gore said at a news conference, implying that Bradley turned away from Democrats every time.

Bradley left the Senate in 1996, two years after Republicans won control of Congress.

Asked if he were calling Bradley a quitter, Gore demurred.

Bradley rejected any suggestions of disloyalty.

"I've always been a Democrat since I cast my first vote in 1964," said Bradley, who has suggested that Gore's centrist politics undermine his claim to the Democratic mantle. "I am simply not going to deal with the darts that are being thrown."

Homecoming game time change hurts organizational events — SEC should allow advance notice

Times, they are a changin'.

In fact, changing times are on the minds of many people this upcoming weekend. The time, specifically, is the kickoff of the UK-LSU game, which was originally set for 7 p.m.

However, this past Tuesday, the Southeastern Conference announced that the game time was changing to 12:30 p.m. to accommodate a regional telecast on Jefferson-Pilot Sports, the television network of the SEC.

Network and conference executives selected the game as the SEC game of the week, meaning the game will reach roughly one-tenth of the nation's television households.

What is the price of this sort

of exposure? Well, ask the people who are most affected by this change.

Homecoming weekend attracts thousands of visitors, mostly alumni, to UK's campus for a series of reunion events.

The College of Business, School of Journalism and Telecommunications, the College of Agriculture and the Greek system are among the many groups who have events planned for this upcoming weekend.

Most of them are scrambling to cover their losses and replan other events that have now come into conflict for this weekend.

Many will lose chunks of money that have already been put down on deposits for cater-

ing, sound system rental, tent rental and so forth.

They are left in a lurch. And the UK Athletics Department is not offering much relief.

First of all, let's clear up a few misconceptions about this situation. C.M. Newton is not responsible for this situation, nor is Larry Ivy, Alvis Johnson, or for that matter, Charles Wethington (who seems to get blamed for everything on this campus).

UK's membership in the SEC means the conference office is the only one to blame for this change.

As part of their membership agreement for the SEC, UK (along with all SEC member schools) agrees to change the start times of games up to 12 days in advance

if either ESPN or Jefferson-Pilot wishes to televise the game. If the UK Athletics Department refuses to do so, it faces stiff penalties.

This situation surfaced last year when ESPN contacted UK about moving the date of the game with Mississippi State to Thursday night to accommodate a national television audience. UK declined because the date of the game was in question, not the time of day. UK doesn't have to change the date of a game if someone asks.

They also don't have to refund tickets, per department policy. Many ticket holders have contacted the office in the past few weeks asking for refunds, but they have been unsuccessful.

The SEC, Jefferson-Pilot and ESPN need to come together for some sort of agreement to give schools more prior notice for changing the times of games.

A time change affects thousands of people; this game is more important than more typical games because of the Homecoming weekend. Giving people a month's advance notice might be a good idea in the future.

Until that happens, some have advocated a boycott of the game because of this situation. Don't be stupid — this is not UK's fault.

Galileo Spacecraft Has Hot Date with Volcanic Moon

NASA's Galileo spacecraft is getting up for a daring rendezvous with Jupiter's moon Io pronounced EYE-oh, the most volcanic body in our solar system, on Sunday night, Oct. 10 (Pacific Time).

Galileo will swoop down to within 617 kilometers (389 miles) of its fiery surface at 10:06 p.m. EDT (7:06 a.m. Oct. 11 EDT), snapping the closest ever pictures of this intriguing, molten body.

Io is a natural laboratory for volcanoes," said Dr. Dino Risler, leader, Galileo manager of science operations and planning. "By studying Io close up, we'll learn more about how and when volcanoes erupt and why they act the way they do. This may even help us predict the behavior of volcanoes on Earth."

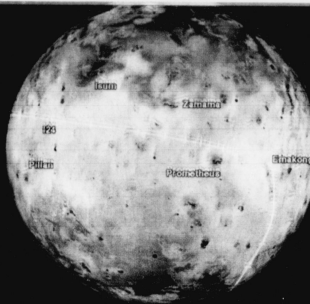
During the flyby, Galileo's science instruments will study the chemistry, heat distribution, gravity and magnetic properties of Io. For scientists, this thrilling encounter promises to yield a bonanza of pictures and information, but for Galileo engineers, the flyby presents a serious challenge with uncertain results. Io's orbit lies in a region of intense radiation from Jupiter's radiation belts, which could affect the performance of spacecraft systems or even knock out various spacecraft instruments. A mere fraction of the dose that Galileo will receive would be fatal to a human.

Long, strange trip

In addition to studying Io, Galileo has also examined three other Jovian moons: Ganymede, Europa, and Callisto.
