A lifelong Muslim, Al-Otaiba, along with other Muslim students, began celebrating Ramadan Sunday night.

The hollday is one of the five pillars of Islam. Muslims celebrate the hollday by fasting from surrise to sunset. During the fast, Muslims do not eat, drink, smoke, chew gum or engage in any sexual activities. WASHINGTON — Lawsuits by the fistful,
lawyers by the score, contested ballots by the
thousands — and still no president-elect. That's
the simple arithmetic of the 2000 race for the
White House as Al Gore struggles to overcome
George W. Bush's certified victory in Florida
three weeks after Election Day. "The state of
Florida has certified a vote count that is neither
complete nor accurate," Gore said Tuesday as he
appealed to the courts for a manual recount of
13,000 ballots and to the public for patience while
he presses his unprecedented legal challenge.
That's not how the Bush high command saw if,
Gore "proposed yet another count and yet another deadline" after losing each tally in Florida
thus far; countered Karen Hughes, spokeswoman
for the Texas governor. "Common sense does not
allow it and the rights of the citizens of Florida to
have their votes count do not allow it."

Gone are the early morning practices. Gone are the long bus rides that last into the wee hours of the morning.

But that is of small consequence to the UK men's soccer team, because gone also is the rest of their season.

"It's kind of nice to relax, but I'd rather be out there practicing and trying to win another game," said UK sophomore defender J.D. Stephenson.

The coaching staff feels the same way.

"As a coach, you live to coach soccer. You don't live to do paper-work and you don't live to do all that administrative stuff," said head coach Ian Collins. "I miss it already, and we've only been done two days."

The Cats' (11:9-2) season came to an end last Saturday, when they ran into a firestorm known as Southern Methodist University and especially Mohamed Fadim, who knocked in a hat trick to give the Mustangs the 3-1 win

Despite being knocked out of the

NCAA tournament, this year's team had their most successful season.

This wasn't the team with the program's best overall record or with the most goals scored — that honor belongs to the 95 Cats, who went 165-1 and scored 50 goals.

But the 95 Cats were defeated in the MAC conference tournament, and didn't go on to the "Big Dance."

This Cat team went further than any team before them, making it to the second round of the NCAA tournament.

"All the hard work and effort we put in was well worth what we got out of it by going to the Final 16," said sophomore forward Chris McDaniel, who led the team in goals and points this year.

And coach Collins is happy with team's progression.

"I think we've raised the bar again for this program," he said.

This team only loses six seniors, but those seniors were important to this young team. Players like Giovanni Fernandes and Tyler Cook gave

the team scoring and much needed leadership.

And for them, UK soccer is over, "I came here in the first place to play soccer," Fernandes said. "Now it's done. It's kind of weird to adjust to a new life now."

Next year's team will also have a hard time replacing senior Brian O'Leary in goal. O'Leary played in 20 of the team's 22 games, shutting out nine opponents, including four of the last five.

"We're very confident that we're going to have a better season next year." Stephenson said. "We've just got to come together as a team. It's definitely going to be a lot of fun next year."
