

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky,
Tuesday, May 3, 1966

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the Board Room in the Administration Building on the campus of the University on Tuesday, May 3, 1966, at 2:00 p. m., Eastern Standard Time, in accordance with KRS 164.170, with the following members answering present to the roll call: Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Chairman, Dr. H. B. Murray, Dr. Harry A. Sparks, Dr. Harry Denham, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Mr. Sam Ezelle, Mr. Clifford E. Smith, Mr. Floyd Wright, Mr. O. L. McElroy, Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer, Mr. William R. Black, and the two non-voting faculty members, Dr. Stephen Diachun and Professor Paul Oberst. Absent were Dr. Ralph Angelucci, Mr. Smith Broadbent, Mr. W. F. Foster, and Mr. Wendell P. Butler. President Oswald, Vice Presidents Albright, Willard, Kerley, and Johnson, Provost Cochran, and Dean Ellis Hartford represented the administration at the meeting and members of the news media were also present.

A. Meeting Opened

Governor Breathitt called the meeting to order and asked that Dr. Stephen Diachun pronounce the invocation. Dr. H. B. Murray, who called the roll, reported 11 voting members and two non-voting members present, with 4 members absent. Governor Breathitt indicated a quorum was present and announced that the meeting was officially open for the conduct of business at 2:10 p. m.

B. Minutes Approved

On motion by Dr. Bushart, seconded by Mr. Hillenmeyer, the reading of the Minutes for the March 17, 1966 meeting of the Executive Committee was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

C. Board Thanked for Flowers

Governor Breathitt read a letter from Dr. Glenwood L. Creech expressing thanks and appreciation for the flowers sent by the Board of Trustees to the funeral of his mother. The letter was accepted and ordered filed.

D. Executive Committee Appointed and Dr. Murray Named Secretary

Dr. Bushart called attention to the fact that with the termination of Judge Sutherland's appointment to the Board on March 1, 1966, when Mr. William R. Black was appointed to the Board of Trustees, there existed a vacancy on the Executive

Committee and the Board was without a secretary. He made the following motion: (1) that the present members of the Executive Committee--Dr. Angelucci, Mr. Broadbent, Mr. Hillenmeyer, and Dr. Murray--be re-elected and that Dr. Denham be elected as the fifth member of the committee; (2) that Dr. Angelucci be re-elected Chairman of the Executive Committee and Vice Chairman of the Board; and (3) that Dr. Murray be designated as Secretary of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee.

Mr. McElroy seconded Dr. Bushart's motion and it passed unanimously.

E. President's Report on Activities

Dr. Oswald commented briefly on each item in his Report to the Trustees, reminding them that copies of this report (PR 1) were not only distributed at the meeting but were sent to the faculty members and selected alumni following presentation to the Board.

Governor Breathitt ordered that without objection the report be accepted and filed.

F. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

PR 2, Recommendations of the President, contains routine but important items of business and is sent to the Board members in advance of each meeting. Dr. Oswald recommended that the report be approved as a whole. He said two items in the report merited special mention prior to approval:

(1) Section III which recommended the transfer of course work in astronomy from the Department of Mathematics to the Department of Physics and the redesignation of these two departments to reflect the transfer.

(2) Section V which recommended the reappointment of Dr. Ralph Angelucci, Dr. Carl Cone, and Mr. Edward Dabney as members of the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation.

On motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Hillenmeyer, and carried PR 2, Recommendations of the President, was approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the May 3, 1966 meeting of the Board of Trustees. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3)

In presenting PR 3, Supplemental Recommendations of the President, Dr. Oswald explained that the items in the report were similar to those in PR 2 but had

reached his office too late for inclusion in the latter report. He called attention to the following items in the report:

(1) Section II - reminding the Board that this was the first time approval had been sought for the associate degrees and certificates for students completing the two-year programs offered by the Community Colleges. A total of 270 persons were included from six of the Colleges--Somerset and Hopkinsville were not included since they have not been in operation long enough and Fort Knox has such a transient enrollment that there were no candidates who had completed a two-year program.

(2) Section IV - recommendations for promotions and for the granting of tenure. Promotions were recommended for 18 persons from Associate Professor to Professor, all with tenure; 1 person from Visiting Associate Professor to Associate Professor with tenure; 25 persons from Assistant Professor to Associate Professor, with 23 recommended for tenure; and 19 persons from Instructor to Assistant Professor--making a total of 63 persons. In addition, 7 persons were recommended for tenure without change in rank.

(3) Section IV - In connection with Dean Matthews' sabbatical leave for 1966-67, Dr. Oswald announced that he had appointed Professor Paul Oberst to serve as Acting Dean of the College of Law for the academic year 1966-67.

(4) Section IV - retirement for 13 individuals, 7 of whom had been with the University for 40 or more years and 2 who had served for more than 36 years. The other 4 had served for periods ranging from 15 years through 26 years.

Mr. Ezelle objected to approval of PR 3 as a whole inasmuch as the Board members had not had an opportunity to examine the individual items in advance. Governor Breathitt suggested that action be deferred until later. Following the presentation of the next item on the agenda, the Governor called for a motion on PR 3 and Mr. Smith moved that PR 3, Supplemental Recommendations of the President, be approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the May 3, 1966 meeting. His motion was seconded by Mr. Ezelle and passed without dissent. (See PR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Approval of Degree Candidates (PR 4)

Dr. Oswald said that the primary purpose of the meeting in May was to approve the candidates for degrees. He asked that the Board approve the recommendation presented in PR 4, indicating as a matter of interest that a total of 2,129 names were included in the list for the May 1966 commencement exercises, compared with 1,799 for 1965. A breakdown of the figures shows the following:

On motion by Mr. Ezelle, duly seconded, the recommendation for approval of candidates for degrees was accepted and PR 4 with the attached list of the candidates was ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the May 3, 1966 meeting. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Community College Established in Perry County in the Vicinity of Hazard (PR 5a)

Dr. Oswald said that following several studies which had been made by University personnel, both before and since he had become president of the institution, relative to the selection of a site for a community college in the "Blackey-Hazard" area, he had appointed a Special Advisory Committee of Trustees composed of Dr. Harry Denham, chairman, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Dr. H. B. Murray, and Mr. Floyd Wright, to review these studies, to visit the proposed sites, and to prepare recommendations for presentation to the Board of Trustees. He asked Dr. Denham to present the committee's report.

Dr. Denham said that the committee had met several times and had held two meetings in Letcher and Perry counties. They talked with many individuals and found everyone to be most cooperative and helpful. On the basis of their visits and a careful study of all available data, the committee reached the conclusion that the best site for the community college was in Perry County in the vicinity of Hazard. He called attention to PR 5(a) which contained the committee's recommendation for the site for the college, listed the twelve criteria used in determining the location of community colleges and the application of these criteria to the recommended site, and gave a brief historical review of the situation.

As chairman of the Special Advisory Committee, Dr. Denham made the motion that the Board of Trustees (1) rescind its action of September 18, 1962, locating the "Blackey-Hazard" college in Blackey; and (2) that it locate its tenth community college in Perry County in the vicinity of Hazard. The implementation of this decision is conditional upon the provision of an approved site, including utilities, police and fire protection, and upon satisfactory arrangements to provide faculty housing by responsible authorities or organizations in that community. The Governor is urged in appointing the Advisory Board to the community college to provide strong representation from the entire region to be served, including Letcher

and Perry counties as well as the cities of Whitesburg and Hazard. The University should proceed so that the college can open possibly in 1967, but no later than September 1968. Mr. Sam Ezelle seconded Dr. Denham's motion.

Governor Breathitt said that prior to any discussion of the motion, he wished to read a letter from former Governor Bert Combs to the Board of Trustees. He said that he wished the letter, which follows, to be made a part of the Minutes of the meeting and, without objection, he so ordered.

MEMORANDUM TO THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Prior to 1962 several community colleges had been authorized by previous and separate sessions of the Legislature without much regard to planning for a statewide system. At the 1962 Session, Senator Archie Craft of Whitesburg, who represented the Letcher-Perry District, announced early that he intended to sponsor a bill for a community college in Letcher County. As the Session progressed it became apparent to me that Senator Craft had enough votes in both houses to pass his bill.

It was also apparent that unless the then existing community colleges, and such others as might be created in the future, were made part of a unified system, with proper planning and direction, the colleges would not be able to fully accomplish their intended purpose. Consequently, I, as well as others who thought as I did, prevailed upon Senator Craft to permit the proposed Letcher College to become part of a statewide system, under the direction of the University; and Senator Craft was requested to work for a bill which would accomplish that purpose. He agreed to do this providing it was also agreed that one of the new colleges would be located in Letcher County. (At that time some of us were under the impression, later found to be erroneous, that Blackey would perhaps be a suitable location). I, as the then Governor, promised Senator Craft that if he would agree for his bill to be presented as part of a more comprehensive proposal to establish a statewide system of community colleges, under the direction of the University of Kentucky, I would explain the matter to the Board of Trustees and would recommend to the Board that the new college in the Hazard-Blackey area be located in Letcher County. The phrase "Hazard-Blackey area" was inserted in the bill at my insistence in order to placate the then representative from Perry County but he was informed at the time that there was a commitment, insofar as I was able to make one, that the college would go to Letcher County. We thought at the time that the college would be constructed, or at least the location agreed upon, before the expiration of my term as Governor.

My commitment in regard to the location of the new college was made known to many people in both Perry and Letcher County, both privately and publicly, and I understand that Governor Breathitt has stated publicly that he

would use his efforts to keep the commitment which had been made by me.

Perhaps no commitment should have been made by me and it might be said with some basis, that it was a political commitment, but actually the commitment was made in order that the community colleges could be taken out of politics and incorporated into a unified system, with proper planning and direction by the University. I thought at the time the price was not too much to pay and I take some pride in the fact that the bill did pass and that our community colleges are making great progress under the capable direction of Dr. Oswald and Dr. Ellis Hartford.

In order that the Board may have this background on the question of location of the college in the Hazard-Blackey area and in order to keep my commitment to Senator Craft and the people of Letcher County, insofar as this is possible under the circumstances, I have asked that this memorandum be read to the Board of Trustees.

Following the reading of the letter from Governor Combs, Governor Breathitt said he wished to state his position in the matter. In his campaign for the governorship, he made commitments to the people of Letcher County, both publicly and in private, that he would honor Governor Combs' commitment to locate the college in Letcher County and he had continued to pledge his support to this commitment since becoming Governor. He said he wished the record to read: "in the event a motion were made for the location in Letcher County, I would cast my vote for the location of the college in Letcher County." This was part of his commitment to Governor Combs and to the people of Letcher County. He added that Governor Combs' actions were entirely proper and in the highest concepts of what he felt was best for the University of Kentucky and the Commonwealth.

Mr. Smith said that a motion and second was before the Board but he would like to suggest that following action on this motion, a second one be made which would include an expression of thanks to the Special Advisory Committee and would call for the inclusion of Governor Combs' letter and Governor Breathitt's statement as official parts of the Minutes of the meeting. He said that he had been a member of the Board when approval was given to the location of the college at Blackey but that this site was no longer available and that conditions had changed so that he felt the Board should follow the recommendations presented to it by the Special Advisory Committee and that he was sure neither Governor Combs nor Governor Breathitt would wish for the members of the Board to vote for any location that would not best serve the area in which it is to be located. Commitments are sometimes made under conditions which frequently change, as has the Blackey site.

President Oswald said he wished to comment on the portion of Governor Combs' letter relative to the community college system and the act which set it up, saying he thought the foresight and the action in setting up this system and relating individual colleges closely to the community and yet assuring the strength and resources of the University behind it was of tremendous importance to the Commonwealth. In fact, other states look to Kentucky for guidance in this area. The University is greatly indebted to Governor Combs for his wisdom in encouraging the passage of this act and to Governor Breathitt for his support in launching it. The University is currently operating 9 colleges, the site for the Louisville college was approved at the April meeting, and the sites for the Blackey-Hazard and Maysville colleges will be determined at this meeting. In addition, negotiations are being carried on with the Paducah Junior College for possible inclusion of it in the system under permissive legislation passed by the last General Assembly. The Special Advisory Committee should be commended for the efforts made to study as objectively as possible the 12 educational criteria and to apply them to the Blackey-Hazard area.

The Chairman called for a vote on the motion before the Board which had been made by Dr. Denham and seconded by Mr. Ezelle. The motion was approved without dissent, the Governor abstaining from voting.

Mr. Smith then made a motion that the Special Advisory Committee be commended for the time and effort which had gone into the evaluation of the situation and which had resulted in the motion just approved, that Governor Combs' letter relative to the location of the college in the Blackey-Hazard area be made a part of the Minutes of the meeting, and that Governor Breathitt's statement be included in the Minutes. His motion was seconded and approved without dissent. (See PR 5a at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Activation of Maysville Community College (PR 5b)

Dr. Oswald, in presenting the three recommendations relative to the activation of the Maysville Community College as contained in PR 5(b), a copy of which is appended, indicated that the North Licking Independent College Foundation had shown the selection committee seven different sites. On the basis of the type of land and its lay-out, not only for immediate building but for future recreation and other facilities that go with it, the seventy-five acres, known as the "Wood property", was deemed by the committee as the best site for the community college.

Dr. Denham made the following motion: (1) that the site popularly known as the Wood property be officially designated as the site of the new Maysville Community College at Maysville; (2) that appointment of an architect and development of plans and specifications for the construction of the new facility be initiated; and (3) that the above actions be taken with the understanding that the North Licking Independent College Foundation will cause this site to become available by deed in fee

simple of the property, as specifically described on the sketch attached to PR 5(b), to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky without cost to the University. The motion was seconded by Dr. Murray.

Prior to calling for a vote, Governor Breathitt said he wished to express his deep concern over the limited acreage in the proposed site. He cited the problem which Hopkinsville is facing now in attempting to provide for expansion of the campus there. He said that all too frequently the land adjacent to a community college site is purchased by developers and it becomes impossible to acquire additional acreage for the college either because there is no longer any land available or because the price for the surrounding land has become prohibitive. He, therefore, urged the Board to amend Dr. Denham's motion to include additional acreage.

Dr. Denham said that the land under consideration was high priced land and that it would be almost impossible for the North Licking Independent College Foundation to raise sufficient funds to acquire more land at this time. It was then suggested that the motion before the Board be acted upon as presented and, if the motion should be approved, then an additional motion might be made urging the acquisition of more land.

Governor Breathitt called for a vote on Dr. Denham's motion, which had been seconded by Dr. Murray, and all present voted "aye". Mr. Smith then made the following motion: that the Board go on record as commending the citizens of Mason County and the adjacent territory for taking the initiative in establishing the North Licking Independent College Foundation to raise money with which to acquire the minimum acreage approved in the previous motion of this Board and, further, that the Board express to members of this Foundation and the people of Mason County and vicinity that for the greatest public benefits in the future they should also acquire additional acreage contiguous to the 75 acres of not less than 50 and preferably 75. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ezelle and approved. (See PR 5(b) at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Report on Educational Television

Before asking Dr. Albright to present the report on the plans for educational television, Dr. Oswald indicated that the University had been working in two areas: the internal development of television instruction within the University, and with the state educational television system which plans a tie-up with the University and its community colleges.

Dr. Albright said the University for some time has had a Committee on Educational Television and this is a part of the institution's strong effort to improve teaching and instruction not only here but in the community college system as well. Institutions across the country have used educational TV for various instructional purposes. It should not, however, be considered as a supplement for able staff and advisement of students but certain things can be done better through ETV than can be

done otherwise. For example, it is easier for ten students to look in a person's mouth on TV than to look down someone's throat. Dr. Michael T. Romano, Coordinator of Television for the Medical Center, has been asked to assume the responsibility for educational television on a University-wide basis for the next few months and to bring all the elements together into a "package" which will represent a program for the whole University. It is not difficult to foresee the time when educational television will be used as a means for extension and service programs not only through the community colleges but to all communities. This is the first step. Dr. Romano will work with the group planning the production studio which will tie in with the state ETV system for which the University has provided the land.

Mr. Ezelle commented on a recent experience he had had in seeing at first hand what educational television was doing for some of the inmates of the penitentiary at Eddyville. The Governor said that he had scheduled a conference on the state educational television system on May 17 and President Oswald responded that Dr. Romano would be present at this conference as a representative of the University.

L. Implementation of Capital Improvement Program Authorized (PR 7)

Mr. Kerley said that he would like to assure the Board that the University has the capacity to finance the programs presented in PR 7, Implementation of Capital Improvement Program, with the projected bonding capacity of the University and the general obligation bond issue of the state. The recommended program is the result of a long period of work, study, and planning, particularly on the part of the President's Advisory Committee on Buildings and Campus Development of the faculty.

On motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Dr. Murray, and passed unanimously the recommendation presented as PR 7 was approved. (See PR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. School of Biological Sciences Established; Dr. Conti Named Chairman (PR 8)

The recommendation to establish a School of Biological Sciences in the College of Arts and Sciences marks a most significant step in the development of the academic program. Dr. Oswald commented in calling attention to PR 8 (attached). The combination of the biological sciences into one School will provide a much more effective undergraduate program and will strengthen the graduate program.

In recommending the appointment of Dr. Samuel F. Conti as Professor of Microbiology (with tenure) and as the first Director of the School and Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences for Program Planning, Dr. Oswald said that the University was particularly fortunate to have been able to interest one of the outstanding young scientists in the country in accepting the position and he predicted that Dr. Conti would provide great leadership in this area.

Dr. Willard concurred in all that Dr. Oswald had said and added that the biologists in the Medical Center considered this one of the most important moves which had been made to attain academic excellence.

Mr. Smith commented that it was one of the most important reorganization steps taken to strengthen the University program and made a motion that the recommendation as presented in PR 8 be approved. His motion was seconded by Mr. McElroy and passed without dissent. (See PR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Report on Retirement and Hospitalization Programs (PR 9)

Mr. Kerley made the presentation of PR 9, Report on Retirement and Hospitalization Programs. He said the report was self-explanatory and was presented primarily for the purpose of keeping the Board informed relative to these two important programs of the University.

The report was accepted with thanks and ordered filed. (See PR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Mayor Dawahare Comments on New Community College

Governor Breathitt recognized Mr. William Dawahare, Mayor of the City of Hazard, who was present at the meeting. Mayor Dawahare expressed his gratification with the action which the Board had taken in establishing the college in Perry County near Hazard and pledged the support of all the citizens of Hazard in helping to build the "best" college in the system.

P. Mr. Hillenmeyer and Dr. Creech Thanked

Governor Breathitt expressed on behalf of the entire Board thanks and appreciation for the tremendous job done by Vice President Creech and Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer as co-chairmen of the Steering Committee, in connection with the Association of Governing Boards meeting which had been held on the campus May 1-3, 1966. He said that from the comments he had heard this was the best meeting the Association of Governing Boards had ever had.

Q. Meeting Adjourned

Having first determined that there was no further business to come before the meeting, the Chairman called for a motion for adjournment. Such motion being

made, seconded, and passed, the meeting adjourned at 3:55 p. m.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

May 3, 1966

1. RECORD TURNOUT AT GOVERNING BOARDS MEETING

The University has been both pleased and honored to serve as the host institution for the 44th annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, a most successful three-day conference which closed only this afternoon. A preliminary examination of registration totals indicates that, from the standpoint of attendance, this meeting has established a new record for the organization.

Noteworthy, too, were the timely and significant thoughts which the delegates heard expressed in talks by such outstanding speakers as Mr. Jerome C. Byrne of California, Chancellor Herman B. Wells of Indiana University and President Homer D. Babbidge of the University of Connecticut. Equally effective were the views shared by guest panelists Edwin S. Hewitt of Grinnell College, Manning Pattillo of the Danforth Foundation, Maurice Harari of Education and World Affairs, Glen Olds of the State University of New York, and our own Dr. Richard Butwell.

A special word of commendation is in order for members of the Board of Trustees, who more than a year ago took the initiative in seeking to bring this meeting to Lexington for the first time.

2. CONSTITUTION REVISION ASSEMBLY MEETS ON CAMPUS

The Kentucky Constitution Revision Assembly came to the campus on April 26 for an informational session for benefit of the general public as well as for faculty and students. Although the audience was not large, its participation was lively and many searching questions on the merits of various sections of the proposed new Constitution were addressed to the Assembly delegates.

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, who spoke briefly, praised the contributions of two University faculty members, Dr. Thomas D. Clark, who is the Assembly historian, and Prof. J. E. Reeves, whose services as an Assemblyman were termed eminent. Former Senator Earle C. Clements, chairman of the Assembly, presided.

The delegates were guests of the University at a luncheon at which Vice President A. D. Albright served as host.

3. HOSPITAL REPORTS ON 'UNIT-DOSE DISPENSING' PLAN

More than a year ago, the University Hospital became the first anywhere to install the "unit-dose" system of dispensing medications. Several apparent advantages of the system were reported by three of the hospital's representatives at last week's meeting in Dallas of the American Pharmaceutical Association. Presenting their evaluations were Richard D. Wittrup, the hospital administrator; Paul F. Parker, director of pharmacy central supply, and Miss M. Sue Kern, director of nursing services.

Chief among the system's indicated advantages is improved patient care. Because they are relieved of the time-consuming tasks of preparing medications, nurses can spend more time with patients. The patient also benefits because the danger of his receiving the wrong dose or the wrong drug is greatly reduced. The unit-doses are accurately labeled by the manufacturer or the hospital pharmacy so that the nurse can check the label with the physician's order for treatment.

An exhibit displayed at the Dallas meeting included the three components which enable a hospital pharmacy to dispense medications entirely in unit-doses--drugs purchased in strip packages or in prefilled cartridge-needle units, a machine that packages and labels tablets or capsules as single units, and another that fills small glass vials with individual liquid doses. Eventually, as more drugs are prepackaged in unit-doses by manufacturers, hospitals will be able to purchase virtually all medications in this form and will have to do only a minor amount of their own packaging.

Other economic benefits from unit-dose dispensing, in addition to billing patients only for medications received, are the more flexible methods of setting hospital charges for drugs and the reduction of wastage and pilferage of drugs. Greater cost savings can be predicted as more medications become available in pre-packaged unit-doses directly from the manufacturers.

4. 18 EARN COLLEGE OF PHARMACY AWARDS

The College of Pharmacy's annual Honors Day dinner on April 19 saw the presentation of awards to 18 students for outstanding academic and professional achievement. Making the presentations was Dr. A. C. Glasser, acting dean of the college. Mr. C. W. Eckstrom of the Eli Lilly Company was guest speaker.

The award recipients were William I. McMakin III, LaGrange; Nancy Lee Mueller, Louisville; Patricia H. Parker and Lloyd W. Housman, Paducah; Jack Edward Allen, Stanton; Chester Lee Parker, Reubin James Spencer, Carol C. Wills and Levi Rice, Jr., all of Lexington; Wilma Jean Winkler, Irvine; Robert Lee Miller, Mt. 5. ALUMNI SEMINAR TO EXAMINE WORLD TROUBLE SPOT

The Alumni Association will conduct its ninth annual Alumni Seminar on May 5-6. It seems safe to say that never before has the seminar dealt with a topic so timely, even crucial, as that to be examined this year-- Southeast Asia.

The chairman of the seminar, Dr. Richard Butwell, director of the School of Diplomacy and International Commerce, has arranged for a panel of distinguished visiting speakers who will analyze the situation in Southeast Asia and discuss U.S. diplomatic policy there. The speakers include L. N. Palar, Indonesian ambassador to the United States; Dr. Kenneth Perry Landon, director of American University's Center for South and Southeast Asia; Dr. Wesley Fishel, Michigan State University political scientist who from 1956-58 headed the M.S.U. Vietnam Advisory Group, and Dr. J. Norman Parmer, professor of history at Northern Illinois University.

All sessions of the seminar are open to the public. The May 5 sessions, morning and afternoon, will be at Guignol Theater. The final session, Friday morning, May 6, is to be held at Spindletop Hall.

6. KERNEL EDITOR MAKES MAJOR STAFF APPOINTMENTS

Walter Grant, Winchester, who recently was reappointed by the Board of Student Publications to a second term as editor of The Kentucky Kernel, has announced the appointment of other key editorial staff members for the 1966-67 year.

7. SEWAGE-TREATMENT USE MAY HIKE COAL PRODUCTION

The University's annual industrial coal conference, held on campus last month, brought good news to the nearly 100 coal-industry leaders who were in attendance. They were told of a developing new use for coal in the treatment of sewage, a process that could create demand for 12 million or more tons of coal per year.

A vice president of the Rand Development Corporation, Mr. Bertram C. Raynes, told the conference delegates that his company's experiments show coal to be superior in many respects to current conventional treatment of sewage. It can be less expensive than conventional treatment, he said, and provides a means for removing 85 per cent of detergent residue, now a major problem in virtually all sewage treatment plants in this country.

8. HISTORY HONORARY INDUCTS 37 NEW MEMBERS

Thirty-seven students--26 of them undergraduates--were inducted April 11 into the University chapter of Phi Alpha Theta history honorary. The ceremony preceded the annual Phi Alpha Theta dinner at which the guest speaker was Dr. Boyd Shafter, Macalester College historian and former editor of the American Historical Review.

9. MAYSVILLE SENIOR WINS \$5,000 TRAVEL GRANT

A member of the College of Engineering's graduating class, Art Henderson of Maysville, has been awarded a \$5,000 travel fellowship by the Corning Glass Works Foundation. Mr. Henderson, who is a former co-chairman of the Student Centennial Committee, will spend the summer at Corning's New York headquarters, examining company operations and planning his nine-month study trip. He will leave in the fall for Latin America, where he will investigate the possibility of new investments by the United States chemical industry, particularly in Mexico, Venezuela and Brazil. A long-range goal of his study will be to stimulate interest among U.S. industrialists and other business leaders in working for a closer union of the Americas, both economically and politically.

Only five of the Corning Foundation awards are made each year. Participating institutions, besides the University, include Yale, Harvard, Vanderbilt and the University of North Carolina.

10. LANGUAGE CONFERENCE DRAWS MORE THAN 400

The University's 19th Foreign Language Conference, held on campus April 28-30, was attended by more than 400 language specialists from throughout the United States. Over 150 research papers were presented during the meeting. Dr. Penrith Goff, assistant professor of modern languages and literatures, was the conference director.

11. GRANT ASSURES JOBS FOR OVER 500 STUDENTS

The University recently received a grant of \$512,550 from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, thereby assuring the second full year of its participation in the student work-study program. The sum represents 90 per cent of a fund that will pay for the employment of more than 500 students in part-time jobs on the Lexington campus and in the community colleges. The University will provide the remaining 10 per cent from its own resources.

Purpose of the work-study program is to provide part-time employment opportunities and full-time summer jobs for students from low-income families. The students work a maximum of 15 hours a week during the academic year, and may work up to 40 hours a week during the summer if they are not enrolled for classwork.

A similar grant last year made it possible for the University to employ about 300 students during the 1965-66 term. More jobs are becoming available as enrollment rises, however, and this year's grant will permit the hiring of some 200 additional students.

Through the Office of Student Financial Aid, directed by Mr. James E. Ingle, every effort is made to place students in jobs that are related to their academic interests. Many work with faculty members on research projects, while others work in offices, on the University farms, or wherever they may be needed. A student who works part-time during the school year and full-time during the summer may earn \$1,200 to \$1,500, a sum that is reasonably close to his annual financial needs.

12. DR. JOKL NAMED ARTS AND SCIENCES PROFESSOR OF YEAR

Dr. Ernst Jokl, director of the physical education research laboratory, has been named Distinguished Professor of the Year in the College of Arts and Sciences. He is the 23rd winner of the award, which was established in 1944 as a means of recognizing outstanding academic achievement. Dr. Wendell C. DeMarcus, professor of physics, was last year's winner.

Dr. Jokl, who was elected to the honor by his fellow Arts and Sciences faculty members, is regarded as the founder of sports medicine in the United States. Among his scientific publications are reports on the effects of sustained physical activity on aging, physiological and psychological adjustments to prolonged and intensive physical training, and the problem of sudden death among athletes. He has conducted research surveys at the last four International Olympic Games--at Helsinki, Melbourne, Rome and Tokyo--and currently is engaged in research on the effects of altitude on physical performance.

13. ALUMNI TO HEAR REVIEW OF NEW ACADEMIC PLAN

Alumni returning to the campus for the annual alumni reunion banquet will hear a review of the University's new academic program. Making the presentation will be Dr. Edmund D. Pellegrino, chairman of the Faculty Senate Council. The May 5 banquet is scheduled for 6 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom.

Other year-end events planned for the returning graduates, in addition to the Alumni Seminar referred to on another page of this report, include the alumni picnic at 12:30 p.m. May 6 at Spindletop Hall, and the Alumni Association's annual business meeting, which follows the picnic.

Another commencement week highlight will be the 50th anniversary reunion luncheon of the Class of 1916, at noon on May 5 in the Student Center. Dr. Karl P. Zerfoss, who was professor of psychology at the University of Chicago for many years, will serve as master of ceremonies. Reunions also are scheduled for the Classes of 1906, 1907, 1926, 1931, 1936, 1941, 1946 and 1956.

14. HOSPITAL MARKS FOURTH ANNIVERSARY OF OPENING

University Hospital marked the fourth anniversary of its opening with a reception on April 24. Special recognition was accorded to employees who have been with the Hospital throughout its four years of service.

On its opening day in 1962, the Hospital had 65 available beds and six patients. It now has 292 beds and 26 bassinets. Figures for the last fiscal year show there were 36,515 visits to the outpatient department, 11,371 patients were seen in the emergency room, 7,876 persons were seen in radiation therapy, and 1,673 in the dental outpatient clinic.

During the past year, the Hospital has opened two important new units, the General Clinical Research Center, on the fifth floor, and the Care-by-Parent unit, on the fourth floor.

15. UK PRESS BOOK ANALYZES HIGHER EDUCATION

Four scholars underscore the importance of liberal arts in higher education in a study published in April by the University Press. In "The University in the American Future," Kenneth D. Benne, Sir Charles Morris, Henry Steele Commager and Gunnar Myrdal analyze current tensions in higher education and the forces which they believe are likely to shape the American university of tomorrow.

The essays which make up the new book are based on lectures which the four scholars gave prior to and during the Conference on Higher Education-Alumni Seminar held on campus last year as part of the Centennial observance. Dr. Thomas B. Stroup, professor of English, edited the volume.

16. SECOND EDITORS' CONFERENCE SCHEDULED

Magazine editors and education writers from New York and Washington will visit the University on May 5-7 as participants in the second annual National Editors' Conference sponsored by the Alumni Association.

The visiting group includes Edwin Crawford, publications editor for the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges; Erwin Knoll, education editor of the Newhouse National News Service; George Harris, senior editor of Look magazine; Harry Harper, executive editor of Readers Digest; Edwin Diamond, senior editor of Newsweek; William Emerson, Jr., editor of The Saturday Evening Post; Kermit McFarland, chief editorial writer of Scripps-Howard Newspapers, and Don Whitehead, former Associated Press correspondent.

While on campus, the editors will be guests at several functions, including the Alumni Seminar. They will attend the Governor's Derby Breakfast in Frankfort, proceed to Louisville for the Derby, then return to Lexington via Bloomfield, where they will be guests at a party given by alumnus R. R. Dawson and Mrs. Dawson. Heading the UK host group will be Mr. and Mrs. Richard Cooper of Somerset, Dr. and Mrs. Harry Denham of Maysville, and Mr. and Mrs. William Gant of Owensboro.

17. LAW COLLEGE NAMES MOOT COURT TEAM

A team that will represent the University in next fall's regional oral arguments of the National Moot Court competition was chosen recently at the College of Law. Mrs. Judith Ward Smith of Bowling Green, A. Mitchell McConnell of Louisville, and J. Kevin Charters of Springfield, Ohio, were selected by a commissioner and three judges of the Kentucky Court of Appeals in the final round of the yearlong law school competition.

The three team members, who will be senior law students next fall, will compete at the regional level in St. Louis next November. The national finals will be held in New York the following month. Last year's UK team won the regional event, which was held on campus, but was eliminated in the national competition.

18. PRESTONSBURG SEEKS PROGRAM FOR HIGH SCHOOLERS

Prestonsburg Community College has submitted its application for an Office of Economic Opportunity grant which, if authorized, would provide a summer program for the area's high school students, principally in the fine arts. Dr. Henry A. Campbell, Jr., director of the college, says the program, estimated to cost about \$100,000, would provide training for about 400 high schoolers in music, literature, drama, biology and physics.

19. JUNIOR DENTAL SCIENTIST COMING TO UK

For the second year in succession, the University has been designated as one of 13 institutions throughout the United States which are participating in the junior dental science research program sponsored by the General Electric Company. The program sends a graduating high school senior to each of the 13 dental schools and research centers for eight weeks of exposure to the environment of dental research laboratories. Its purpose, according to Dr. Louis J. Boucher, research director for the College of Dentistry, is to introduce students to challenging research problems in the field of oral health. The student who has been assigned to UK for this summer's program is John McCormick of Louisville St. Xavier High School.

20. 20 CADETS HONORED AT ARMY AWARDS DAY

Awards were presented to 20 Army ROTC cadets at a recent campus ceremony attended by parents of the honored students. Among the award winners were Bruce S. Coleman, Lexington, and Thomas M. Lowe, Carlisle Barracks, Pa., recipients of the American Legion awards for excellence in military science; Carson B. Harreld, Owensboro, and Miguel A. 21. UNIVERSITY HOST TO CIVIL ENGINEERING CHAIRMEN

The Department of Civil Engineering was host on April 15-16 to the chairmen of civil engineering departments of 30 other colleges and universities. The group met at Carnahan House for a conference on academic and administrative problems in civil engineering education. Delegates also toured the new College of Engineering building and were guests at a dinner given at Spindletop Hall by Mr. J. S. Watkins, Lexington consulting engineer.

22. TELEVISION NEWSMAN HONORED BY UK DEPARTMENT

David Dick, news editor for WHAS-TV, Louisville, has been named recipient of the first "Professionalism in Communications Award" presented by the Department of Radio, Television and Films. The award is to be given annually to a University alumnus for superior adherence to the art and ideals of professional communications. Winners are to be chosen by the faculty of the sponsoring department. Mr. Dick, who accepted his award at a dinner in Lexington last Friday, holds a master's degree in English from the University. He has been a member of the WHAS staff for seven years.

23. FRATERNITY MEN GIVE HAND TO BOYS' RANCH

Members of Phi Delta Theta fraternity spent a recent Saturday cleaning and painting at the Bluegrass Boys' Ranch in observance of their annual Community Service Day. The fraternity men not only donated their time, but provided at their own expense the materials and supplies required for the renovation project.

24. 750 VISIT CAMPUS FOR SPEECH FESTIVAL

About 750 students representing 147 junior and senior high schools throughout Kentucky participated in the 46th annual State High School Speech Festival and Debate Tournament, which was held on campus April 21-23.

Topping 15 other debate teams in competition for the Phil Cornette championship trophy awarded by the Lexington Herald-Leader Company was Harrodsburg High School. The runner-up team was from George Rogers Clark High School, Winchester. Winners of trophies for individual performances were David Gocch, Belfry, debate; Ronnie Corn, Ashland, original oratory, and Tim Futrell, Cadiz, extemporaneous speaking.

The three-day event was sponsored by the University Extension Division and the Kentucky High School Speech League.

25. DONOVAN SCHOLAR BECOMES VISTA VOLUNTEER

One of the University's Donovan Scholars, Mrs. Noyes Miller of Lexington, left April 26 for Chicago to begin a six-week training period in preparation for an assignment with the Volunteers in Service to America. She is one of the first persons of her age to be accepted as a VISTA volunteer.

Before leaving for Chicago, Mrs. Miller told a reporter that, wherever her VISTA assignment may take her, she hopes to be working primarily with the elderly. It was her interest in the problems of the aging that led her to the University, where Donovan Scholars study under a cost-free program open only to persons who have passed their 65th birthday. While on campus, Mrs. Miller was a student of Kentucky history and assisted in the office of Dr. Earl Kauffman, director of the Donovan program.

26. COURSES TRAIN OFFICERS FOR CIVIL DEFENSE

The Civil Defense Office of the University Extension Division conducted five-day courses in April at Louisville and Bowling Green to train Civil Defense officers for a total of 18 counties. In addition, courses were started at Russellville and Murray for the training of Civil Defense personnel for 10 other counties. The training program is under the direction of Mr. Charles Reedy of the Extension Division.

28. PADUCAH ENGINEER EARNS DEPARTMENT CITATION

Mr. Hugh Van Antwerp of Paducah, resident construction engineer for the Barkley Dam and power plant, has been designated by the Department of Civil Engineering as its current alumnus of the month. Mr. Van Antwerp, who holds two engineering degrees from the University, has worked on several major dam construction projects directed by the Army Corps of Engineers.

29. MAYSVILLE STUDENT WINS NURSING AWARD

Mrs. Bessie McCord of Maysville, a senior in the College of Nursing, has been named winner of the first Mary P. Winternitz Memorial Award for high scholastic standing and excellence in nursing care. Mrs. Winternitz, who died last year, was the wife of Dr. W. W. Winternitz, professor of medicine. She was a nurse. Dr. Winternitz presented the award to Mrs. McCord.

30. SCIENCE FAIR DRAWS OVER 250 EXHIBITORS

The 1966 State High School Science Fair, a joint presentation of the University and the Kentucky Junior Academy of Science, was held on campus April 8-9. It drew approximately 260 entries, each of whom set up an exhibit in the Memorial Coliseum concourses.

The first-place winner, who will represent Kentucky this month at the International Science Fair in Dallas, was Craig Jarvis, a student at Waggener High School, Louisville. Runners-up in the fair's senior division were Stuart Martin, Owensboro, and Joe Mador, Morehead. Another Waggener student, John Rumble, took top honors in the junior division. Other award winners in the junior division were Jane Crittenden of Fort Knox and Dean Carpenter of Waggener.

Mr. Robert M. Boyer of the College of Arts and Sciences and Dr. Morris Taylor of Eastern State College, director of the Kentucky Junior Academy of Science, were coordinators of the fair.

Dr. Holman Hamilton, professor of history, recently was named winner of the Alice Hallam book award, which is presented in recognition of the year's best historical work published by a UK faculty member. Dr. Hamilton received the award for his "Prologue to Conflict," published originally by the UK Press and subsequently issued in paperback by the W. W. Norton Company, New York City.

Dr. William A. Seay, dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, has been elected vice president of the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers.

Dr. Marion A. Carnes, professor of anesthesiology, recently was installed as president of the Southern Society of Anesthesiologists.

Dr. Charles W. Hackensmith, professor of physical education, is the author of a newly published book, "The History of Physical Education," issued by Harper & Row, New York City.

Dr. Donald J. Cotter, associate professor of horticulture, was a recent guest of France's Comite' des Plastiques in Agriculture at Montpellier. Dr. S. Sidney Ulmer, chairman of the Department of Political Science, recently was elected vice president of the Kentucky Conference of Political Scientists.

Dr. Richard Miller, assistant professor of agricultural entomology, has been elected chairman of the Survey and Extension Entomology Section of the North Central Branch of the Entomological Society of America.

Dr. A. Lee Coleman, chairman of the Departments of Sociology and Rural Sociology, was installed last month as president of the Southern Sociological Society. Dr. Willis Sutton, associate professor of sociology, at the same time assumed the chairmanship of the Society's archives committee.

Mr. Martin B. Solomon, Jr., assistant director of the Computing Center, has been elected chairman of the Kentucky Chapter of the Association for Computing Machinery.

Dr. Clement Eaton, professor of history, is the author of a chapter, "The Forward Lookers of the New South," in the volume, "Americana Austriaca," published recently in Vienna.

Prof. Bruce Poundstone, chairman of the Department of Feed and Fertilizer, recently was presented a plaque by the Distillers Feed Research Council in recognition of his outstanding service to the feed industry.

Dr. Borys Surawicz, associate professor of medicine, has returned from Poland where he gave an eight-day lecture tour at the invitation of the Polish Academy of Sciences.

The property consists of a strip of land approximately 670 feet in length, with a frontage of 150 feet on the Tates Creek Road and a width of 250 feet at the point of junction with the land owned by the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The proper University officials may purchase the aforementioned property or may institute eminent domain in proceedings to acquire it in accordance with the applicable statute of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.



III. Easement to Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company

Recommendation: that the Board authorize the proper University official to grant to the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Company a right of entry to lay and construct a 30" gas pipeline over and through the lands owned by the University, located in Caldwell County and known as the West Kentucky Experiment Substation. It is further recommended that the Board authorize this official to negotiate and grant an easement to the aforesaid company for the said pipeline upon such conditions as may be necessary and desirable.

Background: In 1955 the University granted the company an easement to lay a pipeline on its West Kentucky farm. The company now desires to negotiate a new easement to enable it to install a new pipeline approximately 25 feet west of the old line. In addition, the company wishes to negotiate for the same type of easement on two adjacent tracts of land acquired by the University since the granting of the original easement. The personnel at the substation have determined that installation of the pipeline will not impair the operation or usefulness of the substation farm.

IV. Appointments and Other Staff Changes

Recommendation: that approval be given to the appointments and/or other changes which require Board action and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted.

Background: Approval of the Board of Trustees is required for all appointments to positions with the rank of Associate Professor and above, for promotions, for the granting of tenure, and for salary changes above \$12,000 for non-academic personnel and \$15,000 for academic personnel. All other appointments and/or changes may be made by the President and reported to the Board.

Subject: Site Recommendation for "Blackey-Hazard" Community College

Recommendation: The Special Advisory Committee of the Board of Trustees unanimously recommends to the President and to the Board that the Board (1) rescind its action of September 18, 1962, locating the "Blackey-Hazard" college in Blackey; and (2) that it locate its tenth community college in Perry County in the vicinity of Hazard (see attached criteria and a report of their application to Hazard and its environs-- Appendix A). We recommend further that the action of the Board should stipulate that the implementation of this decision be conditional upon the provision of an approved site, including utilities, police and fire protection, and upon satisfactory arrangements to provide faculty housing by responsible authorities or organizations in that community. We recommend further the Governor in appointing the Advisory Board to the community college be urged to provide strong representation from the entire region to be served, including Letcher and Perry Counties as well as the cities of Whitesburg and Hazard. We recommend that the University proceed so that the college can open possibly in 1967, but no later than September 1968.

A historical review of the movement to establish a community college in the "Blackey Hazard" area is attached as Appendix B.

APPENDIX A
"Blackey-Hazard" Community College

Twelve criteria have been developed and used in studies of the feasibility and locations of new community colleges. *

1. Environing Nucleus Community

All experience of the University's Community Colleges clearly indicates that the immediate environing community must be large enough to provide a strong nucleus of the total enrollment, support for scholarships, and employment opportunities for students and graduates.

2. Future Economic Outlook

Study of the possibility of a community college should include the prospects of the basic economy and its future development. It is true that the location of a community college enhances the economic growth of an area but it is necessary that the potential for growth and development be present. An economy based on several types of supporting enterprise offers stronger promise of future growth.

3. Evidence of Support

Contributions and commitments concerning support for the college should be considered. The degree of support provided for other educational and cultural institutions provides significant evidence in this regard. Economic prospects of the community for the future must be considered in this connection.

4. Continuing Local Interest

The availability and quality of the local leadership (individual and group) is of strategic importance. Evidence of local interest should also be considered. It is clear that most communities show initial interest in a community college but it is important to find evidence of action to follow up this interest. There have been instances of early commitments by local groups that have not been fully realized after the community college was started.

5. Potential Student Enrollment

Authorities suggest a minimum enrollment of 400 "Full Time Equivalent" students by the end of a 5 year period as a desirable standard. We have looked to an initial expected total enrollment of 350 students, with a potential of 500 within three to four years.

6. Commuting Area

Past experience of the Community Colleges of the University and studies have shown that about 45 minutes driving time and up to 25 miles each way represent

the realistic limits of the commuting area. In the past 95% of University of Kentucky Community College students have traveled under 20 miles to commute. However, it is expected that this commuting distance will be increased when modern highways are available to students in more areas. There is recent evidence that this trend is under way.

7. Cultural Attractions for Faculty

The immediate community should afford a wholesome, attractive, and cultural setting for the college personnel. Adequate schools, recreational facilities, and cultural advantages for faculty members and their families are essential for the attraction of the type of instructors that is required in community colleges.

8. Housing for Faculty

Appropriate housing for faculty personnel at reasonable cost is an essential provision for establishing a community college. Initially, practically all faculty members will be young instructors whose salaries will provide for housing of modest price level. Experience suggests the need for something more than mere assurances that adequate housing will be available.

9. Professional Pool for Part-Time Instruction

Curricular offerings of community colleges are such that a good many instructors must be employed on a part-time basis, especially during the early years. Normally, the great majority of these must be found within easy commuting distance from the college. A sizeable number of professional leaders should be available in the immediate community to serve as a source of part-time instructors.

10. Proximity to Other Institutions

Due consideration should be given to other existing institutions - both two and four year - within the general area to be served by the college. The distance and travel time to other community colleges is an especially significant point. Relationships with other institutions of higher education represent an important matter for policy consideration.

11. Highways and Accessibility

A community college site must be readily accessible to adequate highways and free of transportation hazards. Sponsors cannot expect the state to build access roads to a site well off a modern highway route. This point has been reiterated by the Department of Highways.

12. Adequate Physical Site

Standards for a community college require adequate space for growth in terms of the environs of the institution. In the past University of Kentucky Community Colleges have been required to have not less than 45 acres for free and unimpeded use of the college program and communities have been expected to provide the site, with all utilities at hand. All recent state standards for new community colleges (save Hawaii) set 100 acres as the minimum for colleges that will grow to 1,500-2,000 students. For downtown metropolitan community colleges where radically different standards must be used, there are available guides from professional organizations and studies at the junior college level

A sufficiently large number of students close in exists to assure a good initial enrollment.
- VI
COMMUTING AREA ADEQUATE
Studies of highway distances, conditions, and construction plans show that commuting to the Hazard area will become feasible for students from additional areas in the near future. Area should include Perry County and large parts of Breathitt, Knott, Leslie, and Letcher Counties.
- VII
CULTURAL ATTRACTIONS FOR FACULTY VERY GOOD
Cultural and recreational attractions for faculty and staff families in Hazard compare very favorably with facilities for communities of this size. Relatively good facilities; several types of commercial recreation.

VIII

HOUSING FOR FACULTY ADEQUATE

Housing situation reported to be satisfactory. However, the Hazard Independent College Foundation would propose to enter into an agreement to construct proper housing for faculty (to be leased to UK until rentals have repaid the Foundation) which would eventually be transferred to the University.

IX

PROFESSIONAL POOL FOR PART-TIME INSTRUCTORS SATISFACTORY

Number and diversity of professionally-educated personnel is comparable to three existing community college towns and superior to two.

X

PROXIMITY TO OTHER INSTITUTIONS APPARENTLY SATISFACTORY

The only institution now operating within commuting range is Lees Junior College at Jackson, which has facilities for a limited enrollment. Although located some forty-five miles from Hazard the distance will be shortened when Ky. 15 is rebuilt. Little information is available on the projected new institution at Blackey, Calvary College. The proposed location at Hazard will not adversely affect the enrollment of other institutions of higher education in Eastern Kentucky.

XI

HIGHWAYS AND ACCESSIBILITY ADEQUATE

Location will be on route of the new Ky. 15 (Mountain Turnpike extended). This will bring decreases in distance and in driving time to Jackson, Hindman, Quicksand, Whitesburg, and intermediate points. The planned improvement of Ky. 80 will bring Hyden and other communities on the East-West axis even nearer by miles and in time.

XII

ADEQUATE PHYSICAL SITE SATISFACTORY

Two adequate sites have been shown to visiting groups, another has been promised if this should be desired.

"Blackey-Hazard" Community CollegeHistorical Review of the Situation

A full account of the development of the movement to establish a community college in the "Blackey-Hazard Area" would constitute a sizeable historical sketch. This review will be confined to a brief listing of highlights in the development of the situation which is now before the Board for consideration.

1. The origin (1947)--The Community College System of the University of Kentucky had an obscure origin in the establishment of the "Extension Center" in Northern Kentucky by the University in 1948. This soon became a "center" which in 1957 was joined by a center at Ashland and in 1958 by another at Fort Knox.
2. First action by State (1958)--The successful start of three centers by the University was followed by legislative provision for two additional centers which opened at Henderson and Cumberland in 1960.
3. March 15, 1960--The General Assembly enacted legislation which established an "extension center of the University of Kentucky" at Elizabethtown, provided for the appointment by the Governor of advisory boards at all the centers, and authorized a five-man commission to study "the need for and placement of additional public higher educational institutions in the Commonwealth."
4. December 2, 1960--The Governor (pursuant to powers granted in KRS 164.570) appointed the Commission on the Study of Public Higher Education to be composed of the following: Otis Amis, Lexington, Chairman; W. R. Patterson, Louisville; Cloyd McDowell, Harlan; Maxon Price, Barlow; and R. V. May, Prestonsburg.
5. November 1, 1961--The Commission on the Study of Public Higher Education presented its report which included recommendation that new regional junior colleges be built at "Prestonsburg, Hopkinsville, Somerset and, perhaps, Hazard in that order."
6. February 15, 1962--The General Assembly enacted House Bill 234--"The Community College Act"--which provided for (a) the establishment of the University of Kentucky Community College System; (b) the conversion of the existing centers (except Fort Knox) into the System; (c) the establishment of new community colleges at "Prestonsburg, Blackey-Hazard, Hopkinsville, Somerset, each to be established as funds become available;" and (d) the appointment and duties of 7-member advisory boards for each community college.
7. Spring and Summer, 1962--The spring and summer months of 1962 brought forth vigorous efforts on the part of groups of interested and influential persons from both Letcher and Perry Counties to locate the new college in Blackey or Hazard respectively.

A Site Selection Committee, composed of faculty and administrative persons, appointed by President Dickey in May 1962 visited both areas (June 25 and 26), compiled a complete set of data, and prepared a report.

8. September 13, 1962--The report of the Site Selection Committee to President Dickey named Hazard as the unanimous choice of the group, supported by the findings of an evaluative instrument used to rate the sites.
9. September 18, 1962--The Board of Trustees unanimously designated Blackey as the site for the new community college.
10. Fall and Winter, 1962-63--The fall and winter months were characterized by further activity on the part of leaders and groups favoring both Letcher and Perry County locations.
11. March 21, 1963--The Site Selection Committee by direction of President Dickey and following requests from Letcher County leaders, visited Whitesburg to study proposed sites.
12. June 3, 1963--The Site Selection Committee reported its further findings to President Dickey. The chairman, Dean R. D. Johnson, summarized the findings: (a) neither of the proposed sites in Letcher County was satisfactory; (b) Whitesburg was not a satisfactory location; and (c) Hazard was the unanimous choice of the committee as the location for a community college. President Dickey sent copies to members of the Board shortly before leaving the University in June 1963.
13. The 1963-64 College Year--President Oswald assumed office in September 1963 and immediately began work upon the implementation of the Community College Act by planning the Community College System. During his first year as president various groups and spokesmen visited or communicated concerning the relative advantages of the Whitesburg or Hazard sites. The position of the president during this period was that priority be given to the four community colleges (Elizabethtown, Prestonsburg, Somerset, and Hopkinsville) for which sites were definite. The construction and activation of these four he contended was all that the University could do in this area in the 1964-66 biennium. His position was that the Blackey-Hazard and possible subsequent community colleges would have to await construction until the 1966-68 biennium.
14. July 1, 1964--The Community College System began operation under the new policy and organization of the University.
15. Fall 1964--The old Stuart Robinson School plant at Blackey was sold by the Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian U. S., Ministry in the Mountains of Kentucky, Guerrant Presbytery, to the Open Door Children's Home Society. The latter announced that the plant would be used to operate an evangelistic training college, featuring liberal arts education and self-help opportunity for students.
16. November 29-December 2, 1964--The President and Dean Hartford with a research assistant visited Whitesburg, Blackey, and Hazard, met with all interested groups, collected information and gained first-hand acquaintance with the area. During this trip the president emphasized to each group that educational criteria had been set up for the location of community colleges and the decision of the University would be based solely on these educational criteria.

17. December 1964 and January 1965--Following this visit staff studies were made on the following topics for both counties and submitted to the president: Economic data and prospects, population characteristics and trends, potential student population (enrollments, holding power of high schools, graduates in commuting areas), roads and transportation (conditions, distances, future plans for highways, etc.), and a resume of information about the "Sites" which had been proposed at Whitesburg and Hazard.
18. March-December 1965--On March 15, 1965 the president appointed a Special Advisory Committee of Trustees to consider all staff studies and other pertinent data regarding the proposed locations for the community college authorized for the Blackey-Hazard area and ultimately to make a report and recommendation to the president and the Board.

This committee (Doctors Bushart, Denham, and Murray, and Mr. Wright) visited the two communities on May 26-27, 1965. All members had nothing but praise and respect for the leaders and groups they met while touring these two fine Eastern Kentucky counties.
19. Fall 1965--Further consideration was postponed until it could be determined if there would be funds in the 1966-68 biennium budget to establish and operate the college.
20. With provision in the executive budget for funds for the operation of the Blackey-Hazard college, planning could then be resumed. When leadership in the area was informed that funds for the establishment of the college were in the University's 1966-68 biennium budget, the University officials were assured of the strong feelings for the need of the college in the region and were given assurance of strong support for the developing college at whatever site the University deemed educationally the wisest.
21. Preceding the May 3 Board Meeting-- The president asked the dean of the Community College System to make one more visit to each community--Whitesburg and Hazard--to receive any further information, make first-hand visits, etc. , and to file a report of any further findings. These were completed by April 6, 1966. The President then met again with the Special Advisory Committee of the Board

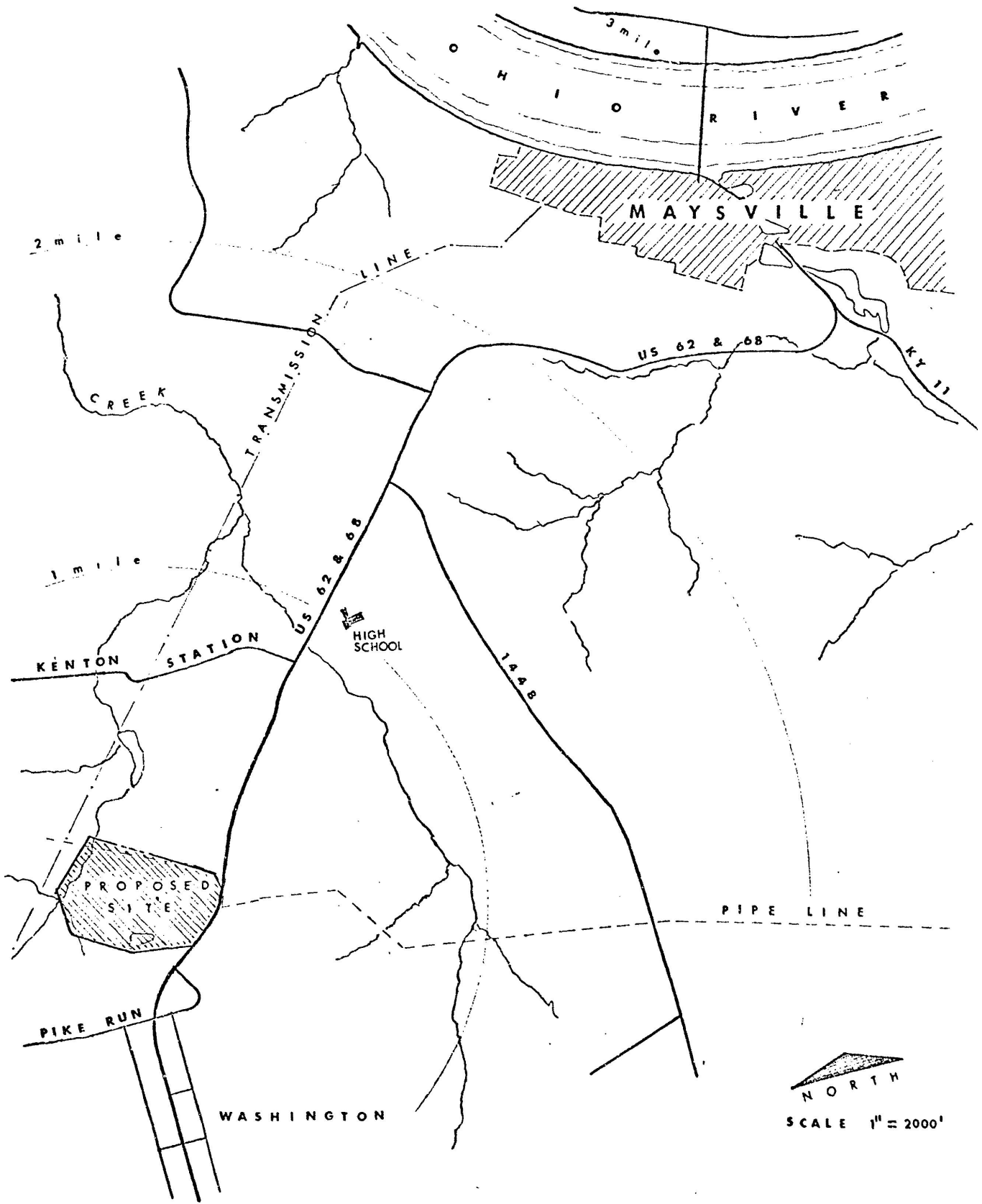

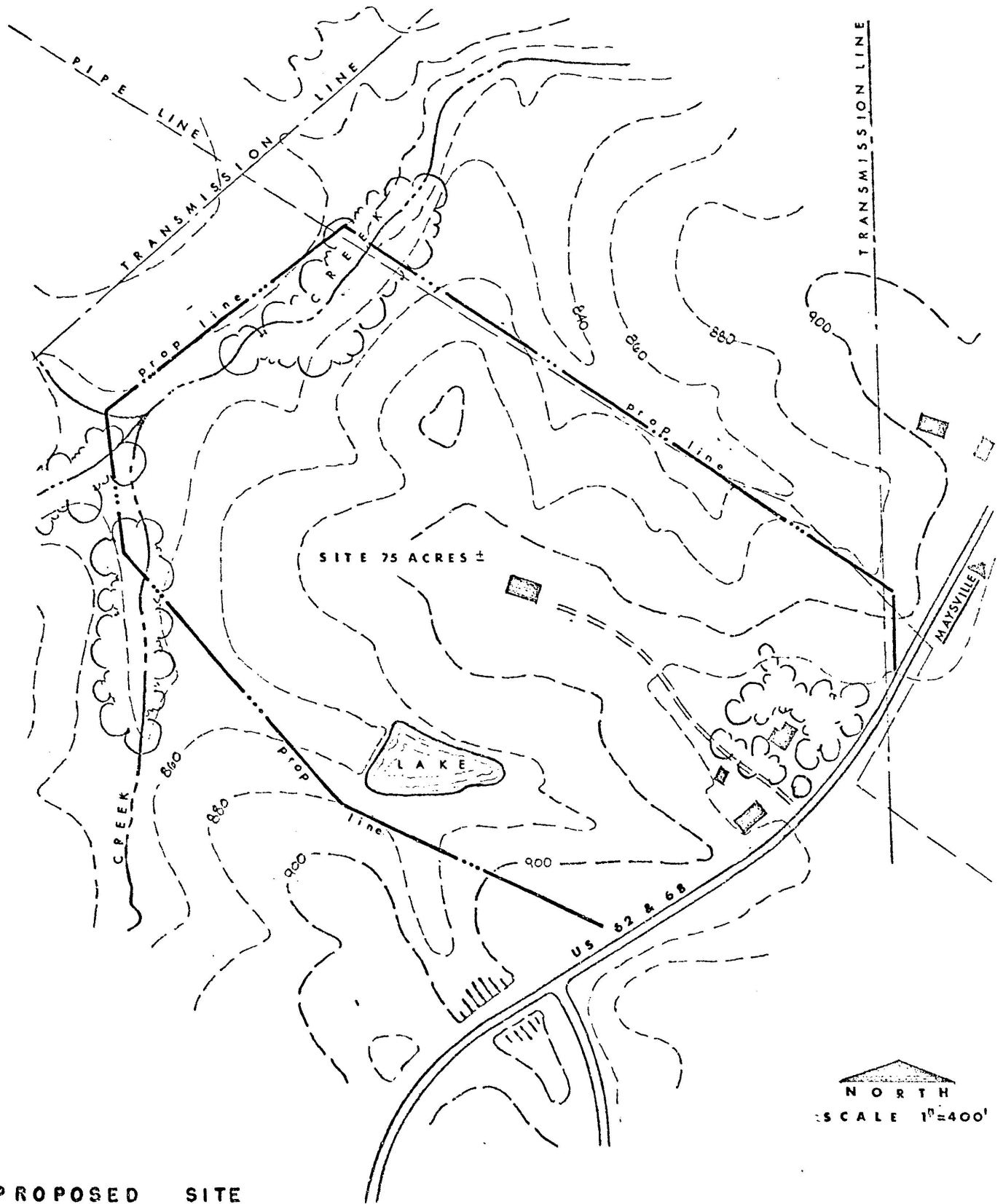


VICINITY MAP

IMPLEMENTATION OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Recommendation: that (1) the President be authorized to acquire land for the Lexington campus necessary for the University's capital program as funds become available; (2) the following capital improvement projects be approved; and (3) the President be authorized to initiate with the State the appointment of architects and the preparation of plans and specifications for them--it being understood that individual project cost estimates and plans will be presented to the Board for approval as they become available:

ORGANIZATION OF THE BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

Recommendation: that effective July 1, 1966 (1) there be established in the College of Arts and Sciences a School of Biological Sciences, consisting of the existing departments of Botany, Microbiology, Zoology, and new departments of Biochemistry, Cell Biology, and Physiology and Biophysics; and (2) that Dr. Samuel F. Conti be appointed Professor of Microbiology (with tenure) and the first Director of the School of Biological Sciences and Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences with responsibility for the direction and coordination of undergraduate and graduate instruction and research in the School. Parallel departments of Biochemistry, Cell Biology, and Physiology and Biophysics will continue in the Medical Center.

Background: In the development of the new Academic Plan of the University and with an awareness of the critical space needs in the general area of basic biology, there was appointed in the summer of 1965 a special committee of biological scientists from the Medical Center, the College of Arts and Sciences, and the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, with a charge to plan a more modern and effective program of instruction in the biological sciences. This committee reported on October 15, 1965, advising the creation of a first year course sequence in the principles of biology to serve the total student body of the University and a second year sequence of courses on principles to serve as a base for major work in the various areas of specialization. It is clear that the faculty for such course offerings would need to be drawn from most of the existing departments and there was a recognized need for a reorganization that would provide leadership for the integration and implementation of this program.

A second committee, consisting of the Vice President of the Medical Center, Dean of the Graduate School, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Assistant Vice President for Research, and the Provost, recommended the establishment of the School of Biological Sciences. This recommendation is consistent with the previous action of the Board of Trustees approving the internal organization of the College of Arts and Sciences into a system of Schools.

Each department of the School of Biological Sciences will have a chairman responsible to the Director of the School for undergraduate and graduate instruction, research, and other departmental activities, exclusive of professional instruction in the colleges of the Medical Center. The same individuals will serve as Chairmen of the Departments of Biochemistry, Cell Biology, Physiology and Biophysics in the School of Biological Sciences and in the Medical Center and the Chairmen of these departments will have direct responsibility to the Vice President for the Medical Center for the appropriate professional instruction in the Colleges of the Medical Center. It is anticipated that biological scientists in the College of Agriculture will participate in the instruction and research activities in the School of Biological Sciences through a system of joint appointments.

Dr. Conti, now at Dartmouth College, has a national reputation as a scientist and as an imaginative leader in developing programs of instruction and research in biology. His appointment is endorsed by a special faculty search committee comprised of scientists from the College of Arts and Sciences and from the Medical Center. His experience will be most helpful in the programming of new physical facilities for the School and it is anticipated that the program will be developed for presentation to an architect by September 1, 1966.

REPORT OF RETIREMENT AND HOSPITALIZATION PROGRAMS

University of Kentucky Retirement Program
Quarterly Status Report

The present program for funded retirement began in July, 1964. The Non-Funded retirement program is the same program as the old "change of work" plan, as it was formerly called.

Group I was established for academic and selected administrative personnel. Group II includes all service and clerical personnel.

Group I

(TIAA Funded Retirement Program)

1. Seven hundred and forty-eight individuals are now participating in this program.
2. It is anticipated that 15 new enrollees will begin participation in the next 3 months of the current fiscal year.
3. It is anticipated that 143 new enrollees will begin participation July 1, 1966
4. Two employees (W. R. Stromberg, Dentistry and M. M. Sanders, Nursing) died during the last 3 months and their retirement annuities are in the process of being settled with their respective beneficiaries.

Group II

(University Non-Funded Retirement Program)

1. One hundred and twenty-eight individuals are now drawing retirement pay from the University

3. Six retirees have died since July 1, 1965 -- 2 faculty members and 4 staff members.
