In hindsight, many students can look back on the results of the last Student Government

the last Student Government election with amazement, and wonder what the future will hold. SGA president TA. Jones was not the typical leader. When first deciding to run for president, Jones explained that he intended to take a different approach to Student Government. The campaign slointended to take a different approach to Student Government. The campaign slogan "The New Spirit" was the brainchild of Jones, and one that he hopes will shine through during his administration.
"I selected the 'New Spirit' as our slogan because our campaign was a new spirit for campus,"

was a new spirit for campus,"
Jones said. "I hope we can usher
in a new age for students, and a
new energy for Student
Government."

new energy for Student Government."
To complete his team Jones chose personal friend Benny Ray Bailey to run as vice president, a decision that Jones' contends was sound from the outset.
"I knew he was a rabble rouser, and that is what I liked about him" Jones said. "I definitely think he was a good choice for a running mate."

Jones said that the results of the election came even as a sur-

the election came even as a sur-prise to him when his victory was

prise to him when his victory was announced.

"I remember being at the announcement and seeing 200 people who were supporters of other candidates," Jones said. "We had like eight people which definitely made me wonder."

Jones ran an unconventional campaign for president the year before and lost narrowly to Lance Dowdy. This year's campaign was strikingly different from the last. Among a field of strong greek candidates, Jones pulled out a victory that was unlikely at best.

"We ran a more conventional campaign," Jones said. "We visit-

ed greek houses, made posters and buttons, and did the things necessary to win an election."
"The year that I lost, I never went to any greek houses. This year I did and I was surprised at the openess that I found. They actually listened."

Immediately after his victory, however, Jones faced obstacles with many senators disgruntled at

with many senators disgruntled at Jones' victory. "Nobody ever put their name behind those statements," Jones

Jones, it seems, overcame most of the antipathy toward him. He describes his current position with the Senate as respectful, but

firm.
"They have to put their personal problems behind them,"
Jones said. "All I ask is for them to be professionals because I am very much looking forward to working with them."

The most important matter to Jones, concerning the Senate, is the establishment of criteria for

funding.

"I've given them what I think
the criteria should be for funding
organizations," Jones said. "We
will establish criteria for the fall,

will establish criteria for the fall, or I'm not funding anything."

Jones submitted his criteria for funding to the Senate at the first interim meeting in May. According to Jones' guidelines, organizations must obtain 350 signatures and show that they have attempted fundraising on their own.

Beyond some opponents' personal dislike, however, some have said that many of Jones' campaign promises are unrealistic. Jones defends many of these promises as merely ambitious and things that can be started with his administration.

One of the promises Jones made during his campaign was to literally tear down the front wall of the SGA office allowing for





Robert Hemenway, Chancellor Robert Hemenway, Chancellor of the UK campus, announced, on the last day of classes of the 1994 academic year, that because the University was losing more than \$200,000 annually with the credit card program, it must be

terminated.

Medical Center sells drug patents to Maryland firm

In order to market a new drug and make it more available for the mass public, UK has joined forces with MedImmune Inc., a Maryland-based manufacturer of notherapeutics and vaccina-

tions.

UK recently sold worldwide exclusive rights for the drug, T10B9, to MedImmune, Inc. who will pay royalties to the University.

In addition, MedImmune Inc.

In addition, Medimmune Inc. has agreed to pay for further research on the drug. A new drug is on the horizon that will improve the outcome of trans-plant surgeries by reducing rejec-tion, and preventing disease.

UK's hopes to find funding for a new library from the 1994 state legislature may have swiftly ended Monday afternoon behind closed

doors.

But University officials, and some legislators, still see hope for the library — if not from this month's special session, then from the biannual organizational session of both houses in January.

House democrats held private meetings last weekend to carve a compromise between Gov. Brereton Jones' and the senate's Brefeton Jones and the senate s-budget proposals. These discus-sions focused on funding for the new library and more than \$100 million in funding to state parks

The House democrats, prethe Governor's budget in the leg-islature, appeared to side with the senate leadership's package, ignoring Jones and UK's pleas for

ignoring Jones and UK's pleas for a new library.
State Rep. Joseph Barrows, D-Versailles said the proposal is expected to be submitted to the senate this week, basically void of "bricks or mortar anywhere."
Some of the construction projects eliminated in the proposal's final copy, aside from from the UK library, are two civic centers in western Kentucky, a new football stadium for the University of Louisville and an engineering school at Paducah Community College.

College.
Jones' push for state parks pro jects was supported in the draft, which included a controversial,

\$3.2 million golf course in eastern

S3.2 million golf course in eastern Kentucky.
Why did legislators choose the parks above the construction projects, particularly the library?
"There are some people who believe the library is too expensive," said Barrows, referring to library's S28 million price tag.
"When times are tough and money is tight," he said, "it's a bad time to build a multi-million dollar library."
However, UK's Director of Libraries, Paul Willis, said a new building is "desperately" needed for students across the state.
Willis said he views the House Democrats' action "as a delay rather than a rejection," for building the library. ing the library.

As a 1974 UK graduate with a



UK athletics took a bigger blow than it might have realized last week. In fact, the University and

the city of Lexington suf-fered a substantial loss as well.

UK quarter-back/rightfielder

Pookie Jones announced last week that he was giving up his final season of collegiate eligibili-ty in both football and baseball, saying he intends to concentrate on a career in professional base-ball.

Jones will spend his summer toiling in Bend, Ore., the begin-ning of a long trek to what he someday hopes will culminate in a chance to play for the Colorado Rockies. The Rockies drafted him in the 14th round of the Major League Baseball draft two weeks

ago. And so Pookie leaves UK qui-

etly.
Fitting, isn't it?
Fitting because Pookie Jones never seemed really comfortable in the spotlight, although at times it seemed to love him. There were times like his 405-

total yard performance against Mississippi State his sophomore year and his near-flawless offensive showing in last season's Peach Bowl.

And of course, there were times like his two home run, five RBI performance against Louisville and his game-winning homer against South Carolina in the Southeastern Conference

Baseball Tournament.
And I, for one, hope that it's for
performances like those that
Pookie Jones is remembered at
UK. Why? Because he deserves

it.

He deserves it for working so hard in the shadow of a football program that has struggled throughout the better part of its bistory. He deserves it for never history. He deserves it for never giving up on the dream to play

Major League Baseball. And most of all, he deserves it because he did what he did with a sense of class and style that could, and should, serve as an example for athletes everywhere. UK football coach Bill Curry



Harden helped equal his individual success when he joined forces with senior Clyde Rudolph, sophomore DeMarcus Lindsey and freshman Chris Jackson to take runner-up honors in the 400 meter relay as well, finishing with a time of 38.94, the second fastest collegiate mark of the year.

"I'm excited," UK sprint coach Darryl Anderson said of the quartet's performance. 



The annoying sounds of early morning construction seem welcome to the staff at the William B. Sturgill Development Center.

The reason — a \$465,000 construction project is underway to add approximately seven offices and a 27 station phone-a-thon room to the building.

Though the construction might temporarily disrupt the center's daily activities, the staff members do not seem to mind.

The center, completed in late 1983, handles all gifts and donations to UK from private corporations, foundations, and individuals, excluding the government. These gifts add up to around \$28 million annually.

Staff Assistant Sally McGuire said that the addition enables the development center to better serve the University.

"We need to have all of our staff under the same roof," McGuire said.

This addition will consolidate the entire staff of the Development Center. Currently, staff members have offices both in the Sturgill building and Scovell Hall.

Eleven staff offices and the phone-a-thon room, which is used to solicit donations from alumni, will be moved to the addition.

alumni, will be moved to the addition.

The phone-a-thon room is used by the University and its 16 affiliated colleges to contact alumni. Phone-a-thons run twice a year — once in the fall and once in the spring — for each of the 17 instrictions.

Terry Mobley, associate vice president for development, said he looks forward to the completion of the addition's construc-

tion of the addition.

"I think it will help us coordinate the fund-raising efforts of the three sectors (the main campus, Lexington Community College, and the other community colleges) more effectively," Mobley said. "The people responsible for coordinating each sector's fund-raising will be together again."

Regarding the aesthetic value of the addition, Mobley adds: "It will be much prettier than the construction makes it look. It will have the same brick and lines as the existing structure."
The addition, which is expected to be completed by the end of

Alcohol and tobacco should share burden

Tobacco is an essential part of the Kentucky economy. Not only does it provide income for thousands of Kentucky farmers, but the crop also pays tuition for more than just a few students at UK.

The health dangers of tobacco, and the burden its users put on the health care system (578 billion every year), have been known for some time. It is only quite recently, however, that it has become vogue for members of Congress to trash those in the tobacco industry for selling a perfectly legal product.

Admittedly, leaders from the major tobacco companies, have not

Admittedly, leaders from the major tobacco companies, have not helped their cause at all with flippant statements like 'tobacco is no

neeped their cause at an unit inppant statements like tooseco is no more addictive than twinkies.'

Nevertheless, hypocritical politicians seem to forget that while tobacco is certainly to blame for some of our health care woes, alcohol contributes even more to this problem, to the tune of \$90 billion

annually.

Simple arithmatic dictates that alcohol should help finance health

The reason tobacco alone is under fire is clear: it is easier on Congress

Easy? Yes.

Fair? Not at all.

Congressional leaders realize that to split the tax burden between tobacco and alcohol would mean dividing fronts and taking on two major strong lobbying efforts at one time.

Health care bills introduced into Congress propose hiking taxes on tobacco from 75 cents a pack to \$2.

In response to these threatening bills, 4,000 farmers converged on the state capital to protest the probable tax on tobacco. In a media biltz, farmers expressed their anger by tossing tobacco into the Kentucky River; reminiscent of the Boston Tea Party.

Their anger is justified, but, unfortunately, the farmer's cries seem to fall on deaf ears, both on Capitol Hill and the general populace.

Farmers in this state have seen their livelihood suffer because of high taxes on their crop, and the importing of cheaper tobacco.

Meanwhile, the alcohol industry, their partner in crime, gets by unscathed in the health care debate because Congress has neither the will nor the gumption to do what is right, instead of what is easiest.

Journalism school greets new director candidate

UK's School of Journalism and Telecommunications is desperately searching for someone qualified to lead.

Under the guidance of acting director Roy Moore, the school has existed for two years without an official leader. A search committee has recommended three different candidates — all three have declined the offer.

The fourth and most recent applicant, E. Eugene Pell, visited UK earlier this week.

On Tuesday afternoon, Pell met with a panel of faculty members, students and administrators.

Pell has no academic experience, but he served as president of Radio Free Europe for eight years, and he also worked as a

years, and ne also worked as a network correspondent for NBC. During a presentation, he acknowledged he was not yet able to answer specific questions about the school, which is part of the College of Communications and Information Studies.

He focused primarily on details of his career, and his wishes to expand the school's broadcast

program.
Pell, who's academic accomplishments include a master's degree and a Neimann Fellowship at Harvard University, applied for the posi-tion May 16 after learning that the search was once again reopened.

The search committee has con-

sidered three people for the job.
The first turned it down, and
the second accepted but later withdrew.

withdrew.

The third prospect, James Willis, head of the Department of Communications at Boston College, accepted the position last April, but then withdrew due to unexpected medical problems.

Willis' withdrawal added yet another lawer to the search's company that head to the control of th

another layer to the search's com-plex storyline. The dean, Douglas Boyd, said even the most creative soap opera writers would find the tale too farfetched.

The first search committee was terminated last year when it elim-inated all but one finalist, faculty member Roy L. Moore. Moore

accepted a temporary job as acting director of the school.

The new committee recommended three finalists, but by early May, Moore was once again the lone candidate.

The former director of the School of Journalism and Telecommunications, David Dick, said he felt the job required someone with at least a doctorate. Since he had a master's degree he

decided to step down.

Three other late candidates have applied: Nancy Green and Ruby Anderson, who both come from the professional world, and Buck Ryan, an associate professor from Northwestern University, None of these applicants have Ph. D's.

more openess in the organization. Although the project is possible, Jones says that there are more pressing matters to attend to within SGA.

Jones also spoke of getting two more student members on the Board of Trustees, a goal many of his opponents called impossible. Jones admits that it may be an uphill battle, but that the fight can be won.

"We've met with the Governor

we ve met with the Governor and it is not on the agenda for this special session," Jones said. "It's a big fight, but we will make a cohesive effort to get it done." Jones says he was also dismayed when he learned the funding for a new library at UK was in jeopardy.

"It's a real loss for Kentucky,"

Jones said. "... but the vision is still there."

Despite these criticisms and setbacks, Jones has hit the ground running by working hard during the summer in an attempt to better SGA making it more open to students, and portraying a positive image of SGA to everyone. As part of these initiatives, SGA is establishing a hottle (323-GOVT), and will be opening an account on UKCC.
