# Police release details of SAE party

Police found a student "show-

They also found a student "show-ered" in beer.

They also found cocaine, mari-juana, rolling papers, digital scales and other drug paraphernalia at a Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity party last May, according to a UK police report.

party last May, according to a UK police report.

This party, hosted May 15 by SAE member Seth Burnet at 410 Pennsylvania Court, has sparked intense debate between UK officials, who charged the fraternity with hazing Aug. 29, and SAE, who denies it. Neighbor cat 2:12 a.m. on May 16 and complained that the party had grown too loud. While inside Burnett's house, police found

cocaine in the room of Scott Hopkins, a non-fraternity member who wasn't there when police arrived. Hopkins denies the cocaine, which he says was in his room in plain view, belonged to him. He said he was not sure who the drug belonged to.

"I wasn't there the day before or that night because of the hazing that I knew was going on," Hopkins said. "Next thing I knew I was being arrested.
"It wasn't my cocaine," Hopkins said. "What kind of morm would leave his occaine out on a plate in his bedroom when there's a party going on? It wasn't mine."
Hopkins said this incident has caused him and his family a lor problems.

problems.

"I'm tired of this," Hopkins said. "I'm not going to let these

guys do this to me — drag me through the mud like this. I told Dean (Victor) Hazard there was stuff going on that night, but none of this had to do with me."
Then-SAE vice president Burnett told police Hopkins used the room where police found cocaine. He added Hopkins had left "so they could intitate new members."

Hopkins said he entered an Alford Plea in Fayette County Court to avoid a felony charge. An Alford Plea is a no-contest plea where the defendant acknowledges the presence of evidence against him or her. He was charged with a misdemeanor.
Lexington Police issued citations at the party, and Burnett was arrested at the scene.
When UK Police arrived, Lexington police officer David Ash-

ford was already in the basement of the house with chapter president Peter Nesmith, rush chair Scott Bochnlein and about 23 other SAE members.

One of them, Bryan Elegood, had his clothes covered in beer, which, according to the report, he told police was part of his "initiation" into the fraternity.

Elegood's wrists were discolored "as if they had been bound. His back appeared to have been struck possibly by an open hand," she said. Elegood would often not explanation for the marks, the report continued.

"Since SAE does not currently have a house on campus," the report reads, "they were holding their "initiations" in the basement of 410 Penn. ... all occupants had consumed alcohol."

Last Thursday, Burnett denied the fraternity had held the party to initiate new members and said that no hazing occurred, a denial he also made in the report.

Officers of the fraternity refused to comment on the issue.

Through September, national officers and local alumni will conduct their own internal investigation of the charge against its UK chapter.

Normally, director of chapter services Frank Ginocchio investigates such charges, but he has been at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, looking into the death of an SAE member the chapter in the penalized unfairly, said Pete Stephenson, director of communications for the fraternity's Evanston, Ill., headquarters, which sent one of its officers to

campus to meet with the UK Dean of Students office last Tuesday about the charges.

The fraternity may focus its investigation on whether the chapter should be considered active year-round, or only during fall and spring semesters. UK considers fraternities, like most student organizations, active year-round, a policy nationals say is "broad, but that's the opinion that the University has," said Steve Sikorski, director of foundation services for SAE nationals.

The investigation will involve a review of the fraternity's membership and look into any members that acted irresponsibly, Sikorski said, "but we're not admitting to hazing," SAE nationals have until Oct. 1 to turn in their report to the dean's office.

### **NATION America Online** to acquire CompuServe

NEW YORK — America Online has struck a deal to acquire Compuserve's 2.6 million users, creating a cyber-behemoth that would be the Internet ornamp for 60 percent of Americans logging on from home.

If approved by government regulators, the deal will allow America Online to swallow its closest competitor and add to its base of nearly 9 million subscribers, already the biggest in the industry.

Under the complex, three-way deal announced vesterday, WorldCom, the nation's fourth-largest long-distance telephone company, will buy money-losing Compuserve for \$1.2 billion and then sell its online business to AOL.

### Investigators: Open valve caused Belle to sink

Investigators: Open valve caused Belle to sink LOUISVILLE — Fresh water pouring trough a valve left open on the Belle of Louisville caused the historic steamboat to partly sink air moorings two weeks ago, Coast Guard investigators said yesterday.

The valve, about the size of a small saucer, was within reach of passengers on the Belle's cruise the night before it sank, Coast Guard Commander Bill Wagner said. But Wagner was quick to add that determining whether it was a passenger or a crew member who opened it would be impossible.

"It just becomes one of those mysteries you can't explain," Belle of Louisville Executive Director Ken Merideth said. "It's impossible to tell why it happened."

A customer yesterday morning had to pay \$1,104 for a round-trip fare on Delta from Atlanta to New York, much more than he expected to pay, a company spokesman said.

American Airlines spokesman Tim Smith said his carrier pulled back its fares not so much because of such negative reactions, but as "a competitive response." He said the higher fares were in place such a short time that he doubted most people were aware of the increases.

### Suit alleges *barassment*

COLUMBIA, S.C. — A former female Citadel cadet sued the school yesterday, saying she was sexually harassed by male cadets who humiliated her with taunts, attacks and altered photos that were distributed on the Internet. "Tim seeking justice. The major goal here is to make sure that it doesn't happen to anybody else," Jeanie Mentuvios said.

Her lawsuit alleges federal civil rights violations.

"I can honestly say there in nothing I miss about that school," said the Charlotte, N.C., woman who now attends Queens College there.

Mentavlos also sued The Citadel's governing board, the officer who oversaw the barracks where she was assigned, and five male cadets who were in Echo Company with her.

The school had no comment and the others either would not comment or could not be reached. Two have dropped out, along with 42 male cadets. None of the woman have reported being hazed.

Mentavlos' lawyer, Dick Harpootlian, would not say what she seeks in damages.

"We think she lost a year of her life. What's that worth?" he said.

Mentavlos and Kim Messer quit the state military school in January, saying they were hazed and harassed, including having their clothes set afire.

Two other women who enrolled at the same time did not report any problems and are now sophomores at The Citadel.

Twenty women enrolled this

woman have reported being hazed.

The school first voluntarily accepted women last year after Virginia Military Institute's all-male policy was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Ciadel's first woman cadet, Shannon Faulkner, entered the school in 1995 under court order, but left after a week, citting stress and isolation.

The lawsuit claims Mentavlos suffered "insults, indignities, physical assault and humilitating treatment which went far beyond any need to traphen, strengthen of military discipline." Male cadets digitally altered a picture of Mentavlos to show her with a penis and exposed breasts,

pictures, it said.

One of the cadets named as a defendant, James Saleeby, once entered her room wearing only underwear.



State investigators and the FBI also were called in, but a local prosecutor said there were no grounds to bring charges.

# Pamphlets detail UK policies on harassment

### Officials suggest documenting incidents of racial discrimination

Some say it seems like there is always a construction project going on around campus, whether it's modifying a facade here or laying new grass there.

But this fall brings a sign of the more subtle social construction that also takes place at UK.

Starting this semester, you will see cream and green brochures that address UK's racial harassment policy at various locations on campus. This brochure is products of the Inclusive Learning Community Committee.

Although those incidents and resulting discussions may have been painful, they fostered dialogue on campus and allowed the opportunity for concerns about UK's commitment to diversity to

be raised. do
These concerns led to the need
for a racial harassment policy.

However, to the surprise of many, UK already had such a policy on the books.

Dean of Student Affairs David Stockham said, "the people who needed to know (about the policy) didn't know about it."

The committee was responsible for producing the brochure, said member Lauretta Byars, vice-chancellor of minority affairs.

The committee decided that printing and disseminating a brochure would put the information "at the fingertips" of the UK Community, Stockham said.

These brochures were issued throughout the UK systemicluding residence halls, Greek houses, the Student Government Association offices and at Human Resources.

But the six-panel brochure, which is prefaced by a letter from UK President Charles Wethington, goes beyond just stating the University's stance on racial harassment.

It offers suggestions of what to

harassment.
It offers suggestions of what to do if you are racially harassed and where to turn for help.
For example, the brochure

Jimmy Glenn, a civil engineer-ing freshman, said this is good advice.

"Most people don't think about writing down what happens, but that way you have something to back up what you're saying," said Glenn.

The brochure also lists several

The brochure also lists several offices a person can go to for information, clarification or assistance. If a charge is made, the victim is the one who guides the type of response the University takes, said Stockham.

Possible courses of action include mediation, formal discipline and the filling of a police report. If the person prefers, an informal report can also be made.

Although that might semi-insignificant, action can be taken if repeated reports are made involving the same person over a period of time.

Byars said she is pleased with how the brochure turned out.

"Diversity is integral to academic excellence and by publicizing the policy, it shows that UK has made a commitment to keeping the UK community a place that appreciates and encourages differences," said Byars.

Included was a brochure titled "Sexual Harassment is Prohibited and Illegal."

The brochure, "a guide for tac-utly, staff, and students," was pub-lished in 1992 by the Affirmative Action Office and has been dis-tributed since that time. The pamphlet outlines the pol-icy definition of sexual harassment as found in the UK Administrative Regulations.

as found in the UK Administrative Regulations. It states, "Sexual harassment — a form of sexual discrimination — includes unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other verbal or physical actions of a sexual nature. This policy takes effect when the rejection of such conduct is a basis for a decision regarding employment or academic standing, or interferes with an individual's work or academic perfor-

Maso included in the pamphlet are examples of sexual harassment

Also included in the pamphlet are examples of sexual harassment and common reactions that victims experience.

Sexual remarks and jokes, unwelcome physical contact and the display of sexually explicit materials in the workplace or classroom without a "compelling educational purpose" are examples of sexual harassment given that they may create an intimidating or offensive working or learning environment, according to the pamphlet.

Sexual harassment is a violation of Title VII of the Givil Rights Act of 1964, and Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

A letter from UK President Charles Wethington that begins the pamphlet states that harassment diminishes the work of the University by undermining its educational mission.

"Sexual harassment by any member of the community violates both state and federal laws as well as University policy and will not be tolerated," it reads.

Penalties for sexual harassment at the UK range from reprimand termination.

to termination.

"Sexual Harassment is Prohibited and Illegal" suggests that individuals keep a written record

of dates, times, witnesses, discussions and actions each time they believe they are being harassed and inform proper authorities of any inappropriate behavior.

The back of the brochure lists the University offices charged with handling both formal and informal complaints.

Dean of Students David Stockham was not sure of the exact number of sexual harassment cases reported on the University campus or if harassment of this kind has been a significant problem in the past.

"One case, two cases, whatever—we wanted a shorthand, convenient way to provide the community with the information necessary if an incident should occur," Stockham said.

Freshman Lauren Ciccone said, "Sexual harassment is definitely a bad thing, but I just threw all that stuff that was on my desk away. I don't even remember seeing a brochure."

The Student Government

Association hopes to more widely inform students of the problem of sexual harassment during a variety of activities to be held on campus Women's Awareness Week, Oct. '5-10.

# Study shows students have credit woes

Unlike many of her friends, Kristen Goble is not in debt. Goble, an integrated strategic communications junior, said, "I pay off my credit card bills every month.
"A lot of my friends are in debt," she said, "It can happen easy if you'r ent careful."

But many college students run into problems when it comes to credit cards.
In fact, a recent study by a

comes to credit cards.

In fact, a recent study by a
UK professor shows that students do not use them wisely.
The study was conducted by
Celia Ray Hayhoe, associate
professor of family studies, and
involved six universities includ-

ing UK.

The research was gathered last spring through question-

last spring through questionmes.

The study found that most students do not have the experience or the education to handle credit cards.

Fourteen percent had never received any personal finance education before college and 13 percent had some after they came to college.

Twenty-five percent of the students had their first credit card before college, and 80 percent of the students had at least one credit card.

Another problem students faced is they had too many cards to handle.

Most had three cards or less,

but 10 percent had more than seven cards.

"We had two students who had 18 cards," said Hayhoe.

Many students said their parents never discussed finances with them, she said.

Most parents also end up paying a good chunk of their childrens' credit card bills.

Twenty-eight percent of students said parents sometimes pay the bills.

Forty-five percent of those students, on the other hand, said their parents agreed to pay the bills after a purchase was made.

Forty percent of the students said they plan to pay their parents back.
Researchers are concerned

that credit card bills accumulated in college might affect a student's ability to pay back student loans.

Forty-six percent of those surveyed have student loans. Some of these students gave permission for researchers to follow them after graduation to see if credit card debt affected their ability to repay student loans.

"I write all my charges down and treat it like a checkbook," said Sandowski.

### Chelsea to stay off paper's pages

STANFORD, Calif. — Don't look for news about Chelsea Clinton in Stanford University's school paper: The editor is promising to treat the first freshman like any other student. Chelsea, accompanied by her parents, is expected on campus Sept. 19, when 1,600 first-year students move into their dormitories.

Like the mainstream media, the Stanford Daily plans to cover the Clintons' arrival. But after that, said Carolyn Sleeth, the Daily's editor in chief, Chelsea "will be treated by us as a student, a regular student."

That means her classroom and social life will largely go unreported.

"Of course, if she involves herself in a news-worthy event, we'll cover it — for example, if she founds a Stanford Democratic Club," Sleeth said.



UK also received recognition from other coaches involved in the tournament.


