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The Secretary, University Senate Council, reported that since its circularization dated September 27, 1966 to the faculty of the three recommendations from the Calendar Committee, the Council had held further discussions and wished to make the following recommendations:

that the proposed Calendar for 1967-68 [which was in the September 27th circularization] be approved by the Senate; that a Calendar Committee be appointed to make a full study of the advantages and disadvantages of the various types of calendars; that it utilize the services of the Office of Institutional Studies; that the opinions of both faculty and students be sought; and that the Calendar Committee report its conclusions to the Senate, via the Senate Council, by March 1, 1967 and that discussion of the report and action on the calendar, to be prepared by the Calendar Committee, be on the March Senate agenda.

The College of Law then presented the following amendment:

that the University, except for the College of Law, continue to operate under the present type calendar for the 1967-68 academic year.

Professor Flickinger presented pedagogical reasons why the College of Law felt it could not operate within the present-type calendar. Mr. McConnell reported that a referendum taken by the Student Bar Association of the first and second year Law students resulted in an 87% vote with 81% opposed to any change in the present semester system. On request, a vote count of the Senate was taken. Following a count of fifteen (15) in favor and a majority number opposed, the amendment was defeated.

The original motion as presented by the Secretary, Senate Council, was then approved. The 1967-68 approved University Calendar follows:

Upon determination that no waiver was required in order to bring it to the floor of the Senate, the following proposal, which had been approved by the Graduate Council, and which had been circulated to the faculty, was presented to the Senate with the recommendation that the Senate consider it only for its educational plausibility and sensibility for recommendation to the Board of Trustees. The Senate concurred in this recommendation.

1. That students regularly enrolled in the Lexington Theological Seminary be permitted to take courses at the University of Kentucky and that graduate students with a doctoral program in the University be permitted to take courses at the Seminary for credit and residence; that the specific courses taken be subject to the approval of the student's special committee and the Dean of the Graduate School; that the number of credits in such courses not exceed 50 per cent of the student's degree program; and that no additional tuition fees be charged by either school for such courses.

2. That if either the University or the Seminary so desire, it could appoint certain faculty members of the other school as adjunct professors and list them as such in its catalog, with the understanding that it would in no way alter the faculty member's salary or affect his full-time position in his own institution.

The Senate voted to set aside the 10-day rule governing circularization of recommendations in order to consider a request for modification of the grading procedure for College of Medicine students which request had been distributed to the Senate members on the floor of the meeting. The Senate Chairman presented the request with recommendation from the Senate Council that it be approved. Following questions from the Senate floor directed to Dr. Wayne, the Senate approved modification of the grading procedure for College of Medicine students as presented.

Since 1960, when the initial College of Medicine class was enrolled, the faculty of the College has been concerned about the use of letter grade designations (A,B,C,D, and E) to represent student performance in the various courses. For the past six years, evidence has accumulated to indicate that in a professional school, letter grading of this type lends itself to undue anxiety and grade consciousness which reduces the capacity of the student to learn effectively.

Minutes of the University Senate, October 10, 1966 (con't)

The recent development of a new approach to curriculum organization which will emphasize more time for individual study and a widening of elective choice, makes it important to institute an evaluative method which will foster a student's sense of responsibility for his own learning and a sense of initiative in accumulating and intergrating necessary medical information. The use of a five letter grading system is not, in the view of the Faculty Council of the College of Medicine, consonant with the objectives of the new program and, in fact, might well tend to vitiate it.

In support of the proposed curriculum revision and on an experimental basis, the Council has approved a recommendation of the Second Year Student Evaluation and Promotion Committee to establish Honors, Pass, and Unsatisfactory as the designations to be utilized for all student performance. The effect of the new approach will be thoroughly evaluated over a four year period, commencing with the current academic year. It is of interest that the number of medical schools utilizing this approach is growing and that many of these schools are in the forefront of curriculum innovation.

The recommendation was discussed with Dr. Cochran and Dr. Ockerman. Neither has voiced objections and both in fact are in favor of it.

It should be made clear that the H, P, U designations will be utilized only for medical students and that the few graduate students in essentially medical classes will continue to be graded as before.

The Faculty Council of the College of Medicine submits this request for an experimental grading trial for your approval.

A member of the Senate raised the question of the plans of the Senate Council for Senate meetings for the remainder of the year. He expressed concern for the many University problems for which the faculty is responsible and suggested some major issues which should be brought to the Senate for discussion, among these, the committee reports which went to make up the academic plan, many of which were not considered, recommendations that were made to the administration, and recommendations made by the Senate itself. He suggested that at variance with the recommendations that were made last year in the academic plan, the Senate Council set up, as an independent body or as an active subcommittee of itself, a Program Committee, which would have as its main concern what takes place in the Senate meetings. Following Senate interest in such a proposal the suggestion was put in the form of a motion and approved by the Senate.

The Senate adjourned at 5:10 p.m.
