**UK makes the technology grade**

**Top 100: UK makes list of schools with the best technological resources in the country**

Yahoo! UK is ranked as the 94th most wired college in the nation in Yahoo! Internet Life, a monthly magazine. Yahoo! ranked 100 out of 1,300 universities and colleges in its annual technology survey, which appeared in October's issue.

"This survey ensures the fact that UK students have some of the best resources to work with in the United States," said Doyle Friskney, an associate vice president of information technology.

Friskney said credit for this should be given to the faculty, staff and administration, but a great deal should also be given to the students. Students pay tech-

nology fees each semester, which are included in tuition.

About 1,300 universities and colleges in the United States were researched to determine how they incorporated higher learning with network technology.

This examination of the use of technology with higher learning could help improve technology at UK.

"For schools that do not make the list, the survey can serve as inspiration and guidance," said Jeremy Caplan, the co-author of the survey feature

and senior associate editor of Yahoo! Internet Life.

"This demonstrates what types of services the most wired schools have and encourages institutions to adopt cutting-edge technologies which help foster a great learning environment," Caplan said.

Each school was graded on, among other things, its computing power, integration of the Internet and availability of technical support.

UK received an "A" for technical support and a "B-" for infrastructure. This category in-

cludes a university's backbone for its network, high-speed Internet access in residence halls and desktop systems in computer labs.

"As far as I'm concerned, UK is wired enough right now, and with recent administration focus, [it] can only improve," said Lance Osborne, a telecommunications sophomore.

Receiving first rankings on the Yahoo! poll are Carnegie Mellon University, Stanford University and the Georgia Institute of Technology. UK placed one ranking behind Notre Dame.

**It's in the numbers: UK allows students to pick ID numbers**

Though cases of identity theft occur with stolen Social Security numbers at what many consider an alarming rate, most UK students still use their number as a student identification number.

Student ID numbers are used often throughout campus, for access to the UK-VIP system, dining accounts and to find out exam scores.

UK has set up an easy way for students to change their ID numbers to prevent others from learning their Social Security numbers.

Associate Registrar Ruby Watts said students interested in changing their ID numbers can go to room 12A of the Funkhouser Building and write a letter requesting new randomly-picked numbers. This provides documentation for UK that lists those students who want their numbers

changed. The process is easy, he said.

Students come by once or twice a week to change their numbers, Watts said.

Most students are unaware of the process. "Can you do that?" asked Erin McKenzie, an English senior. "I thought that's how it had to be. I can't believe they don't change the numbers automatically and give every student a new number."

Some students are pleased there is a process to change their identification numbers.

"You are constantly giving your student ID number out. When you sign up for anything, they ask for your name, your phone number, your address and your Social Security number," said Krista Rubeling, an elementary education sophomore. "Your information could fall into the wrong hands."

There are downsides to changing ID numbers, though.

Watts said it creates problems in the future when a former student calls UK to request a transcript. When two students have the same name, UK needs the student's ID number to obtain the right records.

But Watts said many students tend to forget their student ID numbers if they changed them to something other than their Social Security number. Using Social Security numbers makes it easier for UK when students apply for federal loans, because the government also uses the numbers to identify individuals.

For some students, a number change won't be necessary.

"It's easier for me to remember my Social Security number, and nowadays people can get your Social Security number from anywhere," said Troy Todd, a graduate student.

**Sexual violence rally**

**Taliban orders bin Laden to leave Afghanistan**

After days of saying it couldn't locate Osama bin Laden, Afghanistan's Taliban government said Thursday it had delivered a week-old message to America's prime suspect in the terror attacks on the United States, asking him to leave the country voluntarily.

The nation's top clerics recommended Sept. 20 that bin Laden be asked to leave Afghanistan, where he has sheltered for the past five years. The United States says he has used Afghanistan as his headquarters for a far-flung, loosely linked international terror network known as al-Qaida, or "the base."

President Bush has demanded the Taliban surrender bin Laden or share his fate, raising expectations of an American-led military action against Afghanistan, though none has yet materialized.

"Osama has now received the (clerics') recommendations that he depart Afghanistan," the Taliban's ambassador in neighboring Pakistan Abdul Salam Zaeef, said Thursday. It marked the first time since the Sept. 11 terror attacks that the Taliban, the hard-line Islamic movement that rules Afghanistan, indicated they knew bin Laden's location or how to communicate with him.

As the confrontation over bin Laden has hardened, fears have grown over the safety of eight foreign aid workers, including two Americans, accused last month of preaching Christianity in Afghanistan. On Thursday, diplomats were notified that their rival, halted in the wake of the terror strikes, would resume Saturday.

John Mercer, the father of American defendant Heather Mercer, said the planned resumption was an "encouraging" development. The aid workers' Pakistani lawyer Asif Ali, who is schooled in sharia, or Islamic law, said he would "do my best to defend the accused."

The eight - two Ameri-

cans, four Germans, and two Australians - are employed by German-based Shelter Now International, a Christian aid organization. They were arrested along with 16 Afghan workers on charges of proselytizing, a serious offense in a country under Islamic rule.

While the United States has sought to marshal support for a coalition targeting bin Laden, much attention has focused on a ragtag opposition alliance that has struggled for years to wrest key territory from Taliban troops.

The anti-government guerrillas have reported no major battlefield gains, but in the rugged valleys of northern Afghanistan, fighting has grown fiercer in recent days. One forward patrol, accompanied by an Associated Press television news crew, pushed to within four miles of Kabul before falling back, exchanging fire with Taliban fighters.

The Taliban leader, Mullah Mohammed Omar, warned the rebels not to look to the United States to help them topple his government.

"Those Afghans who want to seize power with the help of America are just like those fools who tried to stay in power with the help of the Russian army," he said in a message distributed Thursday by the Afghan Islamic Press. "If America interferes in Afghanistan, then it will be no different from Russia."

Even while it keeps up fiery calls for a jihad, or holy war, if America attacks, the Taliban opened the door Thursday to the possibility of outside mediation, saying they would be willing to receive civil rights leader Jesse Jackson as an envoy.

Jackson said he was invited by the Taliban; the Taliban said it was Jackson who approached them, but they were willing to accept his offer to "mediate between the Taliban and America."

Bush administration officials indicated they would discourage such a trip.

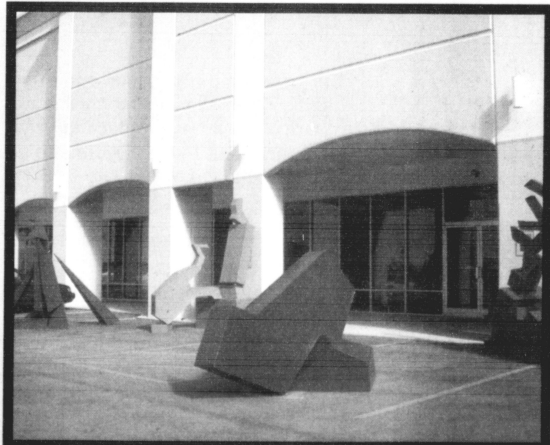

## Court rules on campaign speech law

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Supreme Court on Thursday agreed that a campaign law intended to keep employers from coercing their workers' votes was unconstitutional.

Whether intended or not, the law "places an unconstitutional restriction on campaign speech," the court said in a 4-3 ruling.

It upheld a 1999 decision by the Kentucky Court of Appeals in a lawsuit pitting Fayette County Clerk Don Blevins against the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance, which enforces campaign finance laws.

The case dates to 1994, when Blevins distributed to workers in his office a letter soliciting votes for Don Todd, a Democrat who was running for state Senate. The letters, addressed "Dear Friend," were on Blevins' personal stationery. They extolled Todd and concluded: "I'd very much appreciate your vote and support for him."

The registry, acting as a Republican complaint, concluded that Blevins' letter violated the anti-coercion law.

The statute banned distribution of "any statement or report that employees are expected or have been requested or directed by an employer" to vote a certain way. Blevins said the statute was overly broad. The Court of Appeals agreed that it "stifles an endless array of political speech."

Writing for the Supreme Court's majority, Justice William Graves of Paducah said "the line between persuasion and coercion is drawn subjectively and depends on one's point of view." A prosecution cannot be "based on the perceptions of the recipient of a letter," Graves wrote.

## Civil rights museum turns 10

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — The museum built on the site of Martin Luther King's assassination enters its second decade amid a capital campaign for a \$10 million expansion and a marketing push aimed at changing its public image.

"The National Civil Rights Museum for a long time has been perceived as a local or regional museum," said executive director Beverly Robertson. "We're not only a national museum, we're also an international museum. We are going to start living that vision."

The museum turns 10 Friday and is trying to overcome the perception that it focuses only on the period surrounding King's fatal shooting at the Lorraine Motel on April 4, 1968.

Its mission, in fact, is to tell the story of the movement King died defending, documenting civil rights abuses and victories from the beginning of slavery in the United States.

# Acquaintance rape can be prevented

Two out of five women say they have been victims of sexual coercion while dating in college. This may be a national statistic, but it also can happen to you.

"Most college students who have been sexually assaulted knew the person who assaulted them," said Pam Woodrum, health educator with the University Health Service at the University of Kentucky. "Although stranger rape can occur on campus, acquaintance rape is far more prevalent and can be just as devastating."

Acquaintance rapes often occur in areas that you believe to be "safe," such as your car, residence-hall room or apartment. But these assaults can even occur at parties with several people nearby.

A majority of these sexual assaults involve the abuse of alcohol, where the victim, the assailant or both have been drinking.

"Things people would not normally do sober, they may do while drinking. Drinking decreases social inhibitions," Woodrum said.

Students need to know that having sex with someone who is drugged, intoxicated, passed out, or incapable of saying no can be sexual assault.

And, students also need to be aware that drinking, dressing in a certain way and agreeing to be alone with a person indicates to some people that they are willing to have sex.

"To avoid mixed messages, talk to your companion early about whether you want or do not want to have sex," Woodrum said. "Set sexual limits because it is your body and no one has a right to force you into any type of physical contact."

"Women need to be clear and not give mixed messages. Say 'yes' when you mean 'yes' and say 'no' when you mean 'no,'" Woodrum said. "And men need to remember, no means no."

To decrease the risk of being a victim or perpetrator of sexual assault, Woodrum offers the following advice:

- Females:**
- Communicate your desires clearly.
  - Avoid drug use and excessive drinking. Keep your drink with you at all times to avoid being slipped "date rape" drugs.
  - Be aware on your dates. Pick appropriate places to meet, avoid secluded places, and drive yourself.

- Be alert for warning signs such as invading your personal space, continuing to touch you when you've asked them to stop, aggressive behavior, not listening to what you are saying or considering your feelings, and a lack of respect or derogatory behavior toward women.
- If you are unsure of a new date, go with a group or double date.
- Attend large parties with friends you can trust. Arrive and leave with a group.
- At a party, if you see a friend in trouble, don't hesitate to intervene.

- Males:**
- Remember that acquaintance rape is a crime.
  - Avoid drug use and excessive drinking. Remember that being drunk is not a defense for rape.
  - Make sure a woman's yes is a "sober" yes.
  - Don't assume a woman's desire for affection is the same as the desire for sex.
  - Don't take rejection for sex as rejection as a person.
  - Be sensitive to a woman who is unsure whether she wants to have sex. If you pressure her, you might be forcing her.
  - If you receive mixed messages from a woman, clarify what she wants.

- If you have been sexually assaulted, immediately go to a hospital emergency department. Medications for prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases can be provided.
- To cope with the sexual assault, talking about it can be helpful. It is never too late for medical and psychological help.

"Acquaintance rape is a problem on all college campuses," Woodrum said. "We need to be discussing this issue and working on ways to decrease the risk of sexual assaults."

# For UK instructor, terrorism nothing new

The terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center raised a question that few Americans have spent much time considering: What can we do to prevent and combat terrorism?

Tom Preston, a part time instructor at UK, has been grappling with these questions for years. Preston is CEO of Preston Global, a Versailles firm that specializes in crisis management and anti-terrorism.

"We provide programs for the prevention and response to any aggressively defiant acts," said Preston. These programs can include workplace violence, violent protests and terrorism.

"The first thing we do is make a vulnerability assessment," said Preston, explaining the work of his firm. "We look at the organization as though we were the adversary. How would a terrorist try to attack the organization?" To accomplish this, Preston Global examines the motives, philosophies and techniques of potential terrorists.

Preston gave as an example "certain zealous environmental groups" who attack animal laboratories. These groups often resort to arson as a means to release the animals, so Preston would first work to make the laboratory safe from arson.

Preston Global is unique because it combines several types of services, such as those provided by public relations and security firms. Preston said, "We blend the issues of security, reputation management with intelligence gathering and analysis, with communication and media training and litigation abatement."

Preston Global began as a public relations firm and continues to provide these services. Intense media scrutiny often follows a violent incident. "We work to protect the favorable reputation of the company and to prevent and correct false rumors," said Preston.

While Preston does not release the name of his clients, he said, "We represent corporations and institutions, and sometimes government agencies or even individuals."

Preston Global once protected a former

British prime minister. A non-profit group asked the prime minister to give a speech in the Midwest. When they learned a terrorist group planned to violently disrupt the speech, they called Preston Global. "We provided counsel and advice for the safety of the event and the prime minister," said Preston.

They also worked for one of the largest religious organizations in America, when the organization learned that a militant splinter group was planning to bomb a televised Christmas pageant. "We provided a plan to intensify security, to protect from and also [to] discourage the attack. The situation calmed when the opposition realized it was the worst thing they could do, that we were too well prepared," Preston said.

Many of Preston's clients come after a violent incident has occurred. However, Preston said, "We are seeing an increase of those who think prevention rather than response and reaction. They are finding that prevention is more cost effective."

Preston believes that the recent terrorist at-

tacks will make services such as his more visible. "When an incident occurs, there is always increased attention from both existing and potential clients."

Preston says that America's response to these attacks may eventually help prevent terrorism. "I believe that, in the long term, there is a good chance that President Bush's activities will have a dramatic impact on the ability of terrorists to inflict damage."

Preston's optimism did not come without a warning. He said, "This is not to say that we will not experience one or more terrorist events in the near future. We are dealing with a huge network of people who hate the U.S."

"Bush is definitely on the right path, however," Preston continued. "He is moving aggressively, properly and with absolute determination."
