Robert McCowan, former chairman of the UK
Board of Trustees, died Nov. 12 from complications
caused by Alzheimer's disease. He was 75.

McCowan served on the board from 1881 to 1898

Smoking ban decision delayed again Fayette Circuit Judge Larry VanMeter overruled two motions by attorneys for the Lexington-Fayette County Food and Bever-age Association at a smoking ban hearing on Friday, but delayed ruling on the ban it-

self.
The association, which formed earlier this year in opposition to the smoking ban, moved to strike language in the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government's brief regarding studies of smoking bans in other locales.

er locales.

The association also moved for a de-tault judgment because the government had not filed a response to the associa-tion's complaint within the 10 days nor-mally allotted.

VanMeter said that his instructions— requiring both sides to present briefs to him—made a separate response by the city unnecessary.

Neither side of the controversy ex-pressed surprise at the results of Friday's hearing.

restrict supersess at the results of Friday's hearing pressed surprise at the results of Friday's hearing the VanMeter has made his views on this issue very clear" said John Walters, attorney for the association. "We are prepared to take our case to the Court of Appeals as soon as he makes his ruling." Members of Bluegrass Action, which supports the smoking ban, say they are not worried about the ban losing in court.

"We have said all along that this ban could stand up to a legal challenge," said Lisa Greathouse, a registered nurse and member of Bluegrass Action. "The tobacco industry and its allies' goal is to delay local anti-smoking efforts until it can get state legislators to pre-empt local laws."

Former UT student injured at UK dies
KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — A former University of Tennessee track athlete who na million-dollar lawsuit against the school for a head injury suffered at a meet in 1987 died Wednesday.

Scott Hartman, 36, never regaine complete consciousness and died after a period of deteriorating health, his mother, Kay Hartman, told The Knoxville News Sentinel on Wednesday night.

"Scott fought a hard battle," Kay Hartman said. "The doctors told me the day he was injured they didn't know if he'd live through the first night."

Hartman was a 19-year-old freshman

through the first night."

Hartman was a 19-year-old freshman from Brentwood, Tenn., when he was hit in the head by a 16-pound steel field hammer, which is a ball attached to a wire, during warm-ups at a track and field meet at UK.

His injury was so significant it "require(d) custodial care for the rest of his life," the state Court of Appeals ruled in April.

Hartman was treated at a rehabilita-tion center after his injury and eventually returned home to his mother's house, where he lived the past 14 years. His moth-er and a team of nurses cared for him.

At the Kentucky meet, Hartman was walking away from the throwing pit outside the foul line during warm-ups when he was hit in the back of the head by a practice throw from another athlete.



In their final game before it counts, the UK women used defensive intensity and a fast-breaking offense en route to an 88-59 exhibition victory over the visiting Premier All-Stars on Saturday "It's a style of play that I enjoy coaching and most players enjoy playing." head coach Mickie DeMoss said of her team's fast break offense. "We were able to run and make good decisions, and that allowed us to extend he lead in this game."

The Cats and the All-Stars played a sluggish first half in which neither team established a flow. The defensively-dominated half saw

"I think at times we lost our focus in the first half," senior center SeSe Helm said. "We have to stay disciplined."

The Cats did just that when they started the second half. Using defensive discipline, UK converted on three straight All-Stars turnovers to open the half with a 92 run.

"We have team goals that we set, and it seems like the last two games we've reached most of those goals," DeMoss said.







'McJob' entry not a mistake

It's official: If you have "a low-paying job that requires little skill and provides little opportunity for advancement," you have a "McJob."

The forthcoming 11th edition of Merriam-Webster dictionary will include the term, which describes such jobs as the infamous low-paying ones at the world's biggest fast food company, McDonald's. By defining the term, which has been in use for quite some time by the public as well as in print, it has brought the wrath of the fast food giant onto them.

Granted, a listing in the dictionary that since its first publication in 1898 sold 55 million copies worldwide and claims to be the best-selling dictionary on the market, will make the term more official. It is also understandable that the McDonald's corporation is not happy about this development. But it does not warrant such actions as chief executive Jim Cantalupo calling the definition a "slap in the face" to the 12 million people who work in the restaurant industry, according to an Associated Press article.

Merriam-Webster is not responsible for employing a vast army of underpaid workers who are so unhappy they came up with a term describ-

ing their condition. If anybody is at fault for this it is McDonald's for handing down such employment practices to its workers.

As the "corporate vision" includes "a People Vision — to be the best employer in each community around the world," according to the McDonald's Web site, maybe the fast-food giant would be better off changing some things in its own locations. Rather than complaining about the usage of "McJob," the corporation needs to offer better wages in order to stray from the stained image.

This, however, might not be financially feasible for the company, McDonald's budget is already tight due to financial trouble as well as a new ad campaign reportedly costing more than \$1 billion worldwide set on reinventing the image of the fast food provider, so an increased wage for its workers might be out of the question.

Yet, the only thing that can change the usage of the term "McJob" is a change of conditions at the source. Only then will McDonald's employees respond with a smile and a resounding, "I'm lovin' it" when asked whether they like their jobs.

MONDAY

LCC is one of the state's most overcrowded universities, and President Jim Kerley says the school is trying to come up with creative ideas to meet the needs of students, the Kernel reported.

Charles McGrew, Institutional Effectiveness and Planing coordinator, said the results of a 2001 LCC study showed the square-feet per-student, per-class ratio is the lowest in the state. At LCC, there are 4.5 square feet per student, per class; the next lowest is the Kentucky Community, and Technical School, with seven square feet. The state average ratio in 2001 was 13.8 square feet per student, per class.

TUESDAY

UK has raised Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart's pay to nearly \$500,000 for this year; the Lexington Herald-Leader reported. His base salary is \$383,000 after a recent 2.2 percent raise. Along with \$70,000 in performance bonuses and \$39,000 in retirement pay he's making a little more than the \$575,000 he agreed to on signing with UK last year. President Lee Todd said that Barnhart's accomplishments include working with UK fund-raisers, providing football tickets to the provost for prospective donors and putting \$1 million a year for the next two years from the athletics budget into academic scholarships.

WEDNESDAY

UK Police responds to two or three false fire alarms a days aid Cmdr. Travis Manley of UK Police Communications and Information Services, the Kernel reported. UK Police is responsible for securing areas during possible fire

mergencies.

The No. 1 cause of false alarms is burnt microwave popcorn, said Garry Beach, UK's fire marshal. He said it isn't uncommon for a fire truck to crash into a person's car while responding to an alarm. Other areas of campus are not as well protected when fire trucks are busy tending to false alarms, he said.

THURSDAY

Students who think they have received unfair parking citations should appeal their tickets, Student Government suggests, and the organization has taken on a role in hearing appeals itself. The Kernel reported that SG passed legislation Now 5 outlining a process for students to appeal citations before a jury of their peers.

Appeals first go to a parking administrator and then to an adjudication officer, who is appointed by the parking appeals committee. If the citation is appealed further, students will go to the SG judicial board, which decides whether to grant a hearing.

The College of Pharmacy received its largest grant ever Thursday a \$6 million gift from the National Institutes of Health to aid in ongoing research for new treatments for incotine addiction.

The research is an example of the UK studies that could benefit smokers in the state and throughout the country. Research on the potential of Indian tobacco for helping drug abusers in the department previously received a \$2 million grant and will be first tested on animals.


