## Bars hope to stay open later after smoking ban

Bar owners plan to push for bars to remain open until 2 a.m. if the ban is upheld on Oct. 6

If the smoking ban goes through as planned, local bars may have extended hours, according to talks within the Lexington-Payette Urban County Council.

The talks suggest that to compensate for possible economic loss sustained by bars from the smoking ban, establishments that serve alcohol may extend their hours to gain more revenue. Currently, bars can stay open until 1 a.m. According to Vicki Steel,

a staff member to the Council, the talk is just that: talk.

"It is still under consideration and has never moved past the suggestion stage," she said.

Steel also added that for this to go into effect, they would have to see exactly how the smoking ban affects bars.

"Bar owners may be against the smoking ban, but we want to appease them if at

all possible," Steel said.

The talk is not on Mayor Teresa Issac's agenda, said Bruce Edwards, the mayor's press secretary.

Third District Councilman Dick DeCamp, who represents the campus area, said he would likely support extending bar hours.

Both Edwards and DeCamp, though, said they were going to "see how the court

rules" before deciding on making the talk an ordinance.

While a survey done by the UK Survey Research Center found that the smoking ban would not heavily affect businesses, many bar and restaurant owners said they would be in favor of lengthening hours to pad a possible blow due to the ban.

Linda's Sandwich Shop downtown prepares to close, ending 23 years of warm pot roast and comfort

For 23 years, the downtown location kept it accessible. Home-cooked food kept its patrons satisfied.

But the real secret behind Linda's Sandwich Shop was the comfort in consistency it generated for its customers, those who ate there say.

"I am a country boy at heart, and Linda's has al-

ways had that kind of food I enjoy," said Michael Mattingly, a regular patron.

Linda Gallagher, owner of Linda's Sandwich Shop on 214 S. Limestone, will be closing her restaurant this Friday. Gallagher wants to spend more time with her 11-year-old daughter. Plus, she says, she'd enjoy the free time.

Now, downtown workers, students and locals must say good-bye to one of

Lexington's unending hot spots.

Gallagher said she's sure her restaurant's success has come from years of concentrating on the quality of food she serves and making her customers feel at home.

"I have had the same downtown lawyers come in for 23 years," Gallagher said. "Patrons like this place because my food is home cooked, and I keep things consistent, making people feel comfortable."

Gallagher never "prepped" her food — cut-

ting, opening or preparing food early. Instead, she cooked to order each and every meal, carefully preparing meals to suit each person's taste.

"I don't prepare my foods early," said Gallagher. "If I did, I'd end up wasting it all, and I always liked to cook to order anyway — I prefer that."

Over the years, Linda's Sandwich Shop has offered a variety of weekly food specials, including pot roast, fresh veggies and fish.

## UK and other schools lobbying General Assembly for money

Coalition announces campaign to get more funding

UK has formed an alliance with Kentucky's public schools and universities, historically fierce competitors for the public dollar, to lobby collectively for increased funding.

UK and the others are part of a coalition — Partners for Kentucky's Future — that on Wednesday announced a campaign aimed at selling the public and the General Assembly on increased funding of education at all levels.

"We started talking about instead of working against each other in the General Assembly, we need to come together and form an alliance," said Tom Harris, the associate vice president of external affairs who has worked with President Lee Todd on the partnership.

"UK has made great strides in putting people in place to become top 20, but obviously we've been asked to do a lot. Now is not the time to pull back funding," he said.

The partnership "stresses institutions of post-secondary education are together on this," Harris said.

One of the "Partners" — the Council for Better Education, made up of school superintendents and school board members — has sued the General Assembly in an attempt to get more money for elementary and secondary education.

Another partner, the influential trade organization Associated Industries of Kentucky, this week issued a position paper that says Kentucky needs less spending by government, not higher taxes on business.

"We all agreed that we would have our own agendas," said Robert Sexton, representing a coalition member, the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence. In any event, the Council for Better Education lawsuit would not affect short-term education funding, he said.

What the academic institutions have in common is that their share of the state's General Fund has been decreasing. Overall education funding accounted for 62.5 percent of the budget in fiscal 1990 but is 57.9 percent of the budget this year.

A report issued by the Partners says Kentucky has made "noteworthy progress in improving education at all levels," since passage of the Kentucky Education Reform Act in 1990. That law included a huge increase in public school funding through a 1-cent increase in the sales tax.

The report says Kentucky's current budget problems "threaten to undo that progress and relegate the state once again to educational mediocrity."

At current rates of revenue and spending, the state faces a \$274 million shortfall this fiscal year on top of a shortfall of \$225 million or more in the Medicaid program, according to the administration. A panel of economists that makes the state's official revenue forecasts concluded in a meeting earlier Wednesday that the shortfall projection will change little, if any, in a new forecast later this month.

## UK mascot hopes to scratch out opponents in competition

Some fans say the real battle isn't necessarily on the field.

The head-to-head action will be among UK mascot Scratch and 11 other division IA and IAA university mascots for the second annual CapitalOne All-American Mascot Team.

"Scratch has a lot of enthusiasm," said Sarah McDaniel, a sophomore UK cheerleader. "He knows just how to get the crowd excited."

Matt Hogg, a marketing senior, is better known to many as UK mascot Scratch.

"When there is down-

time on the field, it is our turn to shine," Hogg said of Scratch and himself. "We have to get everyone excited."

The winner will be named at the CapitalOne Bowl on Jan. 1, 2004.

Fifty percent of the scoring is based on judges' rankings in areas including interaction with fans, sportsmanship and community service.

The other 50 percent is online voting by students and fans.

So far, Scratch is having problems accumulating points.

As of Wednesday night, Scratch commanded 2.2 percent of the 872,209 votes.

In 10th place, he is being

beaten by University of South Carolina's Cocks, Ohio State University's Brutus Buckeye and Western Kentucky University's Big Red, among others.

University of Colorado's Chip and University of Washington's Harry the Husky are behind Scratch.

Seth Eden, a UK graduate and former Scratch, got the mascot involved in this competition.

"I just sent in an application and made a photo album of all the different events I attended as Scratch, and they chose me," Eden said.

After being picked as part of the team, Eden and the 11 other mascots were flown to New York City and

then sent to Miami, Fla., to shoot a commercial for the competition.

In their spare time, the mascots had fun together.

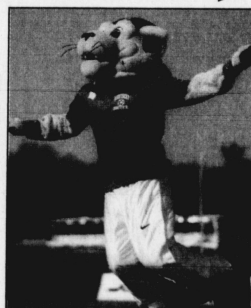
"We were treated like royalty," Eden said when talking about the free plane rides, expensive hotel rooms and meals they were given.

Eden said it's important to make each appearance a bit different than the last.

To do so, he always wore a new outfit and had another surprise for the fans.

UK cheerleading coach, Jomo Thompson, believes it's his famous C-A-T-S cheer as well as the skits he designs

Jimmy Meredith, the general manager of Varsity Blue, said he would definitely consider extending the hours of his business if the option becomes available.

"We will feel the heat if the smoking ban goes through," he said.

Tom Behr, owner of Pazzo's Pizza Pub, said that the talk of extending hours was a good idea even before the smoking ban was implemented.

"Most college kids don't go out until 10 o'clock (p.m.) or 11 p.m., so of course, if you are open later, that will create more business," Behr said.

"As far as smokers, who knows if they are going to be the ones being out later or not."

Behr added that his establishment serves more food than alcohol, so time will tell how it affects his business.

UK students have mixed emotions about the proposal.

Michael Canfield, an undeclared sophomore, said he felt extended hours will help compensate for possible economic loss.

"I think that it is a good idea," he said. "The smoking ban could affect businesses, and if that helps make up for losses in revenue, then they should be granted that opportunity."

Others were less optimistic.

Tina Kinslow, a business freshman, had mixed feelings

about the extended hours.

"Extended hours will depend on what people want to do considering there may be boycotts from smokers," Kinslow said. "Personally, it wouldn't persuade me to go or not go out."

Tara Brooks, a psychology sophomore, said that the extension of hours wouldn't help at all.

"I don't think that extending bar hours because of the smoking ban will help businesses economically," Brooks said. "Bars may lose some business initially because of the smoking ban, but people will begin to realize that they don't have to smoke to have a good time. After all, the alcohol will still be there to attract business."

For Mattingly, the owner of nearby Michael's Hair Studio, the Friday fish special at Linda's is just one of the foods he came weekly for.

"I always looked forward to eating that," Mattingly said.

Gallagher has always been in the restaurant business, working as a manager at the Holiday Inn restaurant, among others.

Despite her experience, Gallagher said she knew nothing about cooking when she started out. She had no one to start the business with and knew she'd be working from scratch, she said.

"I had always been in the business, and when I came down to this area, I saw this business," formerly Lawrence's Sandwich Shop, was for sale," Gallagher said. "So I bought it, and then I realized I didn't even know how to make bread."

Joyce Odean has worked

as a waitress for Gallagher for over five years. She attributes Linda's success to the loyalty of customers.

"The customers are so great here," Odean said. "They are so loyal and kind to this business."

Within a few years, Gallagher's restaurant was a household name. She has experienced customers from all walks of life, from business-

men to college students.

"I have had so many different people come in here," she said. "We see a lot of regulars and people from downtown, and sometimes students will wander in."

Two decades and three years later, Gallagher is ready to close up shop. She said the store will be Hanna's On Lime, a restaurant much like hers, as of Monday.

The closing of the shop is more about the beginning of another part in Gallagher's life, she said.

"My child has been in day care since she was 6 weeks old, and I want to see more of her [Plus], I am getting tired of it now."

No matter who wan-

dered into Linda's, they were sure to get a good meal and probably a smile on their face as they enjoyed a low-key, comfortable atmosphere, regular patrons say.

Now, one day before the close of her locally famous shop, Gallagher sits at a table with her daughter in the middle of her restaurant and stares out the window.

Slowly tapping her finger tips on the faded wood table and shaking her head, Gallagher sums up the past 23 years of hard work she's endured.

"I've met lots of people over the years and made some really great friends, but I'd like to spend some more time with my daughter now."

# Do-not-call list stirring confusion

WASHINGTON — The national do-not-call list went into effect Wednesday, but a complex legal fight has made it impossible for the government to judge its ability to stop unwanted telemarketing.

Reacting to court decisions that threatened to derail the free service, the government scrambled to rework the system a day before it went into effect, turning the public away from a dedicated do-not-call Web site and phone number that had been promoted for months. Instead, officials directed people to file complaints with the Federal Communications Commission.

The FCC said it got about 250 complaints about telemarketers by Wednesday, most of them from people registered with the do-not-call list who

said they were still being called. The list contains more than 50 million numbers.

The agency received nearly five times as many inquiries from people who wanted to sign up for the list even though it is the Federal Trade Commission, not the FCC, that registers phone numbers. And the FTC is shutting down registration.

"The worst part is that consumers don't understand what on earth is going on," FCC Chairman Michael Powell said.

Telemarketers and government officials say it could be days before it is known how effective the list is at preventing unwanted calls.

Companies could face thousands in fines each time they call a registered number. The FTC was blocked from operating and enforcing

the list last week by U.S. District Judge Edward W. Nottingham in Denver, who said the program violates the free speech rights of telemarketers. The FTC asked the Denver-based 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Tuesday to suspend Nottingham's ruling while the agency appeals.

Attorneys for several telemarketer groups on Wednesday asked the appeals court to reject that request, saying that the court shouldn't allow that agency to enforce the list.

Wednesday the court's three-judge panel told the telemarketer groups and the FTC to comment by the end of the week on a proposal to combine three appeals concerning the do-not-call list.

Many telemarketers are confused, with many unsure about which numbers can be called and what actions will

result in penalties.

The do-not-call list requires telemarketers to pay for a copy of the list so they can know whom to avoid calling. Many telemarketers have the list, but some do not and cannot obtain it since the FTC shut down that aspect of the program on Sunday in response to the court ruling.

The FTC has been getting calls from scores of confused telemarketers unsure about how to obtain and comply with the list, agency spokeswoman Jen Schwartzman said. The trade commission is directing telemarketers to the FCC, which can only penalize those who have the list.

The FCC's Powell sent a letter to major telemarketers asking for copies of their do-not-call lists since the courts have blocked the FTC from giving the information.

Its kitchen serves food Monday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., and on Sundays from 11:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. Drink specials vary nightly.

The average cover ranges from \$3 to \$5 depending on the event scheduled for the evening. The bar hosts a DJ Thursday through Saturday nights, Laugh Track Live on Tuesdays, and ladies' night on Thursdays.

we think we can play," she said.

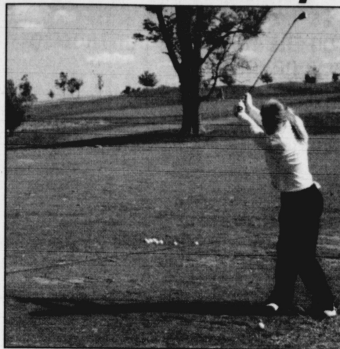

"Erin has really started out well," Barker said. "I know she didn't feel like she hit the ball very well at all in Nashville, but I think it was a great learning experience for her."

Faulkner notched a 21st place finish in the Cougar Fall Classic on the strength of a three-over 75 in the final round, while Muir finished 57th in the Mason Rudolph with rounds of 78, 81 and 76.

This weekend gives Barker the chance to see more of her players in action as the Cats will have eight players in the field.

"For a young team, I think every tournament we get under our belt is going to

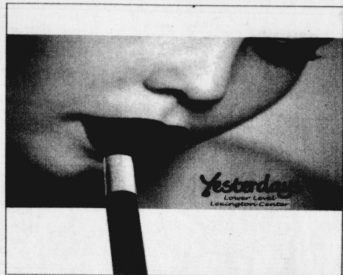

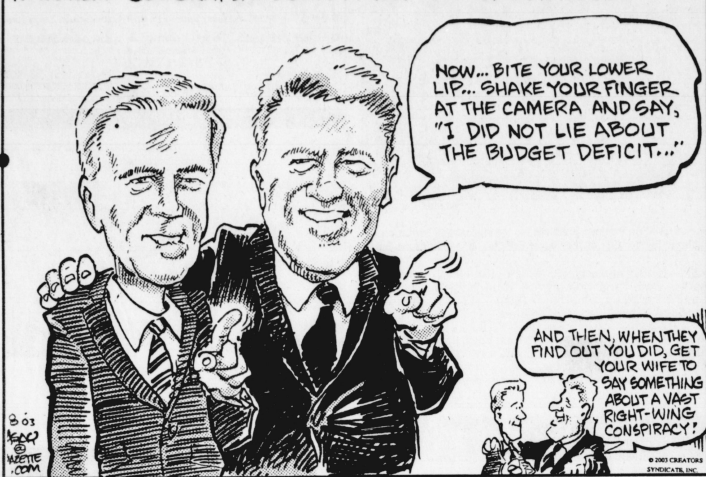

## Extended closing times good for bars, students

The recent debate in the media, courts and the Lexington Fayette Urban County Council over the city's smoking ban ordinance has developed an intriguing offshoot. Community and Council members are discussing an extension of bars' closing hours from 1 a.m. to 2 a.m.

The proposal would come as an attempt to appease business owners who anticipate revenue losses should the courts let the smoking ban stand.

Extending the hours alcohol can be served is a good idea for several reasons.

While a preliminary UK survey taken of smokers indicates they will spend about as much time in bars with or without smoking privileges, the likelihood of this remains to be seen.

It's safe to say, either way, that the later time would be more friendly to college students, who sometimes even travel to Louisville and other cities so they can stay out later.

Regardless of the smoking ban's impact, what's good for business in this context is good for Lexington. The idea that the city may be will-

ing to compromise with business owners who feel threatened by the smoking ban speaks favorably of the city. That is, if the compromise works. It's all still just a consideration and a lot of talking at this point, said Vicki Steel, a staff member to the Council.

"Bar owners may be against the smoking ban, but we want to appease them if at all possible," Steel said.

That's good news for students, especially those who don't get a chance to get out to the bars until late. Keeping the bars open longer would allow people who work late to have more time to hang out and would reduce the pressure to "catch up" with one's friends and drink several drinks in rapid succession.

Also, there is the sad truth that people do drive home after going to a bar. Some have really only had one or two drinks and are fine. Others just think they are. Keeping the bars open later, while allowing more time to drink, also allows patrons more time to sober up.

All in all, keeping bars open until 2 a.m. would put smiles on the faces of bar owners and students.

## U.N. aid in Iraq unlikely after Bush presentation

After overthrowing an evil dictator and liberating the people of Iraq, President Bush rode into the United Nations meeting last Tuesday with his head held high, ready to give a stirring speech to the general chamber of the international body. The speech was to focus on giving the United Nations a broader role in the rebuilding of war-torn Iraq and hopefully mend differences between the United States and other member nations who had opposed the invasion of Iraq in the first place.

Unfortunately for the president, the reaction from the U.N. member nations was tepid, at best. This cold reception is due in large part to the fact that many nations thought we were hasty in going to war and unclear of what our strategy would be once we defeated Saddam Hussein's forces.

Instead of admitting to the other nations that they were at least partially right, Bush chose not to disclose any mistakes on America's part. Using rhetoric that has been heard already many times over, Bush promised to "reveal the full extent" of the illegal weapons program which the administration still insists exists in Iraq. Hussein's government has been gone for several months now. It's ironic that the same Bush administration that kept asserting that time was of the essence and we needed to go to war right now is currently finding itself in a position where it needs more time to find those weapons of mass destruction.

The cool reaction to the president's speech in the U.N. chamber could also signify greater problems looming ahead. Even if the president is granted a U.N. resolution giving the organization a greater role in the rebuilding efforts, it could be difficult to get the proper funding and troops needed from the other countries. Those nations, already irritated with the Bush administration for invading Iraq and fighting what seems to be an unnecessary war, will be apt to think twice before opening their pocketbooks to relieve us of the burden.

The Bush administration had a chance to make amends with the rest of the world community by acknowledging that some aspects of the Iraq war had gone as planned, and now we would like the help of our friends around the world to create a better environment for the people of Iraq.

Instead, the opportunity was squandered by the same heavy-handed tone that has come to typify the Bush administration. Whatever good will that existed for us prior to the speech has all but vanished, and the tough stance the administration chose to take has backfired, leaving us more vulnerable than before. It is amazing that all of the support the United States had in the days immediately after 9/11 has now evaporated.

In a laughable plan to relieve the burden of rebuilding, an idea has been floating around Congress that in order to help pay for the rebuilding, the Iraqi people should be asked to take a loan of \$20 billion from the U.S. This will be added to the tens of billions they already owe to other nations and will essentially mortgage their newfound freedom. If this is the road the administration has to go down in order to properly clean up the mess, it is truly in trouble.

The real losers in all of this may be us, the tax-paying American people. If the administration is not able to secure the outside money needed for the rebuilding effort — and it appears very unlikely they will — the cost of the effort will have to come in large part from our own pockets.

## Democratic Party yet to embrace front-runner

If you've been following the buildup to Election 2004, you're most likely aware of two things. Howard Dean, physician and former governor of Vermont, is the clear Democratic front-runner, and the Democratic Party has been slowly uniting in an anti-Dean movement.

They're doing so because he is the only serious Democratic candidate that is presumed not to have a shot at President Bush, as Senators John Edwards, John Kerry, Joseph Lieberman and Congressman Dick Gephardt seem more in touch with the public.

Wesley Clark, retired four-star general and for-

mer Supreme Allied Commander of NATO, was rumored to have been persuaded by the Clinton folks to enter the race either as a stalking horse for Hillary Clinton or a counter to Howard Dean.

This is shaping up to be the most important storyline of this election. It seems the Democratic Party as a whole does not believe Dean can carry the day.

They haven't fully attached themselves to a political figure that has the finest grassroots appeal, who generates the most money, who has the sharpest lines, and has taken the "right" position on the war in Iraq for the Democratic Party.

At last count Dean was up double digits over Kerry in New Hampshire and leading Gephardt in Iowa. If the Democrats truly believed in Dean, this nomination would be over. The

new story would be the mystery of the running mate and Chairman Terry McAuliffe would have 13 months to campaign against the president with a united Democratic Party that is anxious to evict Mr. Bush. It is Dean's dark side that Democrats find scary.

He is the most abrasive presidential candidate with a serious chance to win a major party nomination since Richard Nixon — not exactly the finest of comparisons. He stood with despised House Speaker Newt Gingrich in the Medicare fight of 1995, a position Gephardt and Kerry reminded him of in New York last week.

Dean has waffled on trade. Once a supporter of NAFTA, he now has become more in tune with views of the liberal base. What is his real position about the retirement age? We know he supported the actions of

President Bush with regard to Afghanistan, and came out against the Iraqi campaign, but what is his real foreign policy?

In the 1990s, he made the front page of national newspapers by signing civil unions legislation in Vermont, sparking a nationwide gay marriage debate.

Dean is a likable and charismatic candidate who has struck the right tone for the anti-war left and his brusque rhetoric and speeches have captured the support of ideologues.

When attacks are made in intra-Democratic squabbles (sometimes called debates), they are invariably aimed at Howard Dean.

Whereupon Dean answers in his trademark fashion — witty and overly sardonic — much to the chagrin of party operatives. It seems that Dean is trying to be Bill Clinton.

He claims to have the

same position on the Israeli-Palestinian mess as Clinton and claims to be the only white person he's ever heard that discussed race with white people, and he claims to have the budget balancing skills of the former president.

But his tone and his demeanor often appear shrill. Shrill does not win presidential elections, at least not since 1972.

Republicans are salivating for Dean, but they had better be careful. If the governor triumphs in Iowa and New Hampshire, he will head to South Carolina with essentially one goal on his mind: pull a Bill Clinton.

In 1992, then Gov. Clinton was struggling, as the result of character issues, to maintain credibility in the Democratic primaries.

With the Gennifer Flowers story still hot and fresh, Clinton stunned political observers with an exceptional-

ly strong finish and tearfully declared that the voters of New Hampshire had made him the "Comeback Kid."

It would be a while before the future president began winning states, but the seed was planted that day.

A third major win for Dean would be an awkward "comeback," but no less extraordinary, and it might be enough to persuade the Democratic Party that Dean (by virtue of carrying a state with a sizable minority electorate) is for real and can beat Bush.

The Democratic Party just wants someone to grab the mantle, and if Dean knocks off Gephardt, Kerry and Edwards, he'll have secured the nomination, and more importantly a united Democratic Party.

# Braves tie series with Cubs

ATLANTA — John Smoltz blew the save and got the win — good enough to keep the Atlanta Braves from the brink of another postseason meltdown.

Smoltz, making a rare two-inning appearance in a game the Braves had to have, allowed the tying run before Mark DeRosa's two-run double in the eighth pushed Atlanta past the Chicago Cubs 5-3 Wednesday night.

The Braves evened the best-of-five NL division series at one game apiece.

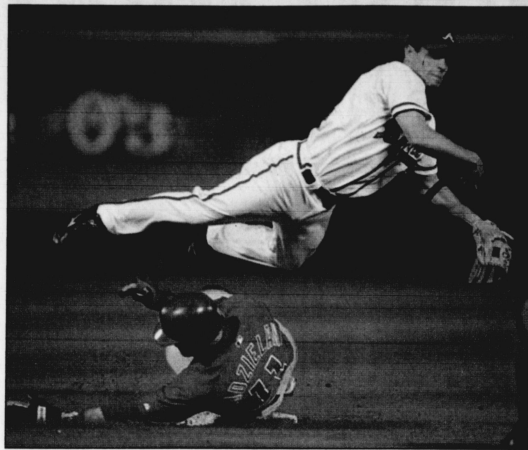
DeRosa was starting at second base in place of Marcus Giles, who had a deep bruise on his left leg.

As an added bonus, Giles appeared as a pinch-hitter in the sixth and came through with a run-scoring single that put the Braves ahead 3-2.

The Cubs weren't intimidated when Smoltz took the mound in the eighth. Eric Karros singled, went to third on Aramis Ramirez's hit and scored the tying run on pinch-hitter Tom Goodwin's sacrifice fly.

Smoltz redeemed himself in the bottom half with the bat, getting down a bunt with two strikes after Vinny Castilla walked against losing pitcher Dave Veres.

The Cubs walked Rafael Furcal intentionally, a move that looked good when Veres got ahead of DeRosa with a 1-2 count. But the utility infielder cleared the bases with the next pitch, lining a dou-
