The defendant James Wilkerson had been a democratic candidate for County Treasurer of Jennings County, Indiana, at the election of 1878, and was elected to that office, and several of the other defendants were candidates of the democratic party for various offices, and all of the defendants were democrats who were indicted for conspiracy to violate the federal election laws by importing to Indiana citizens of other states that they might be voted illegally in Indiana at the election of 1878.
