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SWEATING IT OUT

Wellness Hall gives students fitness forum

The moaning and groaning coming from the basement of Kirwan II is not the sound of a Halloween haunted house, but the sound of students working away with weights and bicycles.

Kirwan II, known as the Wellness Hall, is a residence hall dedicated to helping students become more concerned with health and fitness. The building's old recreation room now serves as a gym and offers a multitude of ways to get and stay in shape.

The hall's program promotes the six dimensions of wellness, which are spiritual, occupational, physical fitness and nutrition, intellectual, emotional and social, and community and environment — which are portrayed in a mural at the entrance of the wellness center.

The wellness center houses stair-step machines, rowing machines and stationary bicycles for aerobic exercise and cardiovascular training, and free weights and universal type equipment for weight training.

Hall Director Nathan Frisbie, a graduate student in sports management, said he and the hall's other resident advisers were chosen because of their backgrounds in physical fitness or environmental sciences.

The Wellness Hall project was the brainchild of Jim Plonskonka, director of Residence Life; Tim Dungan, of the wellness department; and Alan Rieman, director of Auxiliary Services, Housing Operations.

Housing fees for residents of the specialty hall are slightly higher than for students in other residence halls.

"The extra cost per semester was \$36 — or \$72 for the school year of 1993. In 1994, the cost will be \$52 per semester — or \$104 for the year.

"Delay in the arrival of some of exercise equipment was the reason for the reduced rate for 1993," Rieman said.

Biology senior Marlana White said she is willing to pay more for the services the hall offers.

"I workout three times a week because I really need to get in shape, and I feel the extra cost in room and board is worth it," White said.

"I especially enjoy working out with Gilad on ESPN around noon on weekdays."

Environmental law freshman Kimberly Childress agreed.

"I chose the wellness program because I workout every day. I vary my workouts with weights and cardiovascular work."

"I plan to stay here the entire

four years because I feel that the extra cost is worth it to stay in shape."

Blood testing was performed on 60 of the 172 residents on a volunteer basis. Karen Ashcraft of the wellness department explained the results to the students.

The residents will be able to use this service on a regular basis, Frisbie said.

The School of Environmental Sciences is responsible for the interior designs, which colorfully exhibit wellness in different forms, in the workout areas and in the lounging areas on each floor.

The school also will be responsible for offering nutrition advice and healthy cooking classes in the future.

Newly installed kitchen appliances will be available for residents' use 24 hours to help steer the students toward healthy eating habits.

Sexism clear in advertising, speaker says

Women are treated as sex objects in the advertising world, said Ann Russo, a professor of women's studies at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Tufts University.

"My objectives are really to show some connections between pornography and advertising and also to get people to start discussing the objectification of women and how women are made into commodity," Russo said.

Russo gave a lecture on the "Buying and Selling of Women's Bodies" Friday afternoon in the President's Room at the Otis A. Singletary Center for the Arts. It was a part of the 15th-annual Women Writers Conference.

Russo gave a slide presentation that showed examples she had chosen to illustrate how women can be portrayed as sex objects.

For instance, a jeans advertisement had a woman in bed with tight shorts and a sheet barely covering her top.

Other slides were pictures from different pornographic magazines.

"It was very strange to sit and

watch images that I have seen either in magazines or film or television and other images that I haven't seen," UK instructor Sheila Hale said.

Some women between 13 and 18 years old get into pornography because it's an easy way to make money, Russo said. Abuse in the past by boyfriends or fathers, and glamorization are other reasons, she said.

"I'm not in a group that fights against pornography, but I've definitely been a part of activism against pornography. But, I'm not affiliated with one group," Russo said.

Russo, who was a victim of sexual abuse in her family, said she wants to present her lecture because she knows the kind of abuses that are going on around the nation all the time.

The fact that she was abused, however, was not the main catalyst for her lectures.

"I can't change what happened to me, but I can change what happens to other people," Russo said.

"The movement has helped me come to terms with what happened to me, and I want to make that possible to other women who hear me."

Stabbing victim still in hospital

Victor Aranea initially thought he had been punched in the gut.

Everything was happening so quickly, and it was too dark to see the blood on his clothes.

But when Aranea, a UK freshman, finished walking the last block to his parents' house Saturday morning, he knew he had been stabbed.

"I woke (my mother) up, and she just freaked out," Aranea said last night from his bed at Central Baptist Hospital, where the student's wounds — including a punctured liver — are being treated.

According to police reports, Aranea was riding his bicycle home from a friend's house about 4:30

Saturday morning when three men approached him on East High Street.

Aranea said they shouted something at him, and when he tried to flee, the assailants chased him down and knocked him off his bicycle.

In the scuffle that ensued, one of the men took \$10 from Aranea's pants pocket and stabbed him in the abdomen.

"I think they got scared when the one guy stabbed me," Aranea said. "That's when they ran away."

Hospital officials declined to comment on Aranea's condition, but the student said he hopes to be released sometime today.

Lexington police are investigating the incident. No arrests have been made in connection with the stabbing.

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Somalia uneasy after gunfighting

Skirmish threatens to undercut plans for peace demonstration

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Sub-machine gunfire cracked across central Mogadishu yesterday on the eve of a protest that threatens to explode into clan violence.

Somalis said two people were killed and three wounded in an hour-long shootout over a water well.

The gunfight was adjacent to the Kilometer Four traffic circle in the southern stronghold of Gen. Mohamed Farrah Aidid, whose supporters held their regular Sunday rally barely a mile away. It wasn't clear if those in the shootout were

affiliated with Aidid or his opponents.

Aidid's deputy, Mohamed Nur Aliyo, repeated warnings against a demonstration planned for today. Protesters plan to cross the Green Line dividing rival clan leader Ali Mahdi Mohamed's territory from south Mogadishu.

Tens of thousands of people are expected.

"If they come over, we are not responsible for what will happen," Aliyo told hundreds of cheering people at the rally. "They want this to create problems, not support peace."

Ali Mahdi broadcast a message Saturday night saying, "If anyone tries to interfere, we will cross by

force."

More guns were seen on the streets, and both sides reportedly were arming themselves.

There are fears Ali Mahdi wants to provoke conflict in hopes the 33-country U.N. peacekeeping force will be forced to intervene and renew its fight against Aidid.

U.N. sources said Ali Mahdi has refused their suggestions for less provocative routes for the march. U.N. troops no longer patrol Mogadishu's streets and are visible mainly at fortified checkpoints outside their 11 strongpoints.

Peacekeepers are supposed to fire only when they are in danger, but an attack on U.N. troops could drag them into the fray. If U.N. forces then were overwhelmed, U.S. soldiers could be forced to intervene.

"If there is a requirement for us to go on the ground, then we will do so and we will do so in force," U.S. military spokesman Col. Steve

Rausch said.

An American army helicopter dropped flares over the city yesterday warning, "If any attempt is made against UNOSOM (U.N. Operations in Somalia) installations or its army, UNOSOM forces will take appropriate action."

The demonstration also threatens to spark internal clashes in Aidid's Somali National Alliance.

Yesterday, pickup trucks with armed guards toured south Mogadishu with megaphones, urging people to march. They were manned by dissidents from Aidid's alliance who believe he is obstructing peace.

"If anyone tries to create problems for those people coming from the north, we will fight you because we want peace," one message belated.

The planned march is a result of a U.N.-sponsored peace conference

Conference to focus on foreign students

Issues affecting foreign students attending American universities — and those who educate them — are being addressed at a conference held by UK.
 The NAFSA Region VI Conference, a meeting of the Association of International Educators (formerly National Association for Foreign Student Affairs), will include discussions of such topics as issues in Japan affecting educational exchange, testing and training foreign teaching assistants and the situation in the republics of the former Soviet Union.
 Speakers will include Audrey Parks Shabbas, founder of Arab World and Islamic Resources and School Services, a non-profit organization aimed at improving education about the Arab world and Islam at the primary and secondary levels of education.
 Syham Manns, an immigration specialist at UK, will preside over the conference, and two UK professors will make presentations.
 About 300 participants from Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana are expected to attend the conference, which will be held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel in Lexington.

Environmental scholarship to be awarded

The Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, through the Kentucky Water Resources Research Institute, is funding renewable Environmental Protections Scholarship for college-level undergraduate junior and senior students and graduate students in selected disciplines.
 Each scholarship award is intended to cover the approximate in-state costs of tuition, room and board, books and fees.
 Applicants selected for awards must become full-time students in one of Kentucky's eight state-supported universities by the initial semester of the funding year.

Jones considers legislation to tighten Ky. gun control

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Gov. Brereton Jones' entry into the gun-control debate apparently surprised some of his staff but hasn't changed the minds of legislative leaders who say all but the most minimal proposals are doomed.
 Three days before last week's shooting rampage at Fort Knox, Jones told a meeting of newspaper editors that he would offer gun legislation during the 1993 General Assembly because "we need to deal with the gun issue."
 But Jones didn't have any specific proposals in mind, said Franklin Jelsma, his chief executive officer for public affairs.
 "He believes this is a problem that's really intensified recently and we can't go on ignoring it," Jelsma said.
 Jelsma said Jones discussed the matter with him before the speech, but acknowledged that he and Jones' staff "haven't spent a lot of time on it." Jones' remarks apparently surprised other staff members, who were sent scrambling to round up information on the issue in time to make proposals for the legislative session that begins Jan. 4.
 General Counsel Mark Guilfoyle, who is managing the issue for Jones, declined to say when the governor first suggested he wanted to deal with it.
 "We're working on a proposal," said Guilfoyle, who also is Jones' policy adviser.

Volleyball Wildcats get ears rung 3-1

ATHENS, Ga. — The ninth-ranked UK volleyball team's ears are still ringing.

The Wildcats (22-2, 5-2 in the SEC) were upset yesterday afternoon by the 12th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs (20-1, 7-0) in four games 15-4, 15-10, 9-15, 19-17.

"It is real disappointing to lose after playing so well like we did, but that is a tribute to the way Georgia played today," UK head coach Fran Ralston-Flory said.

The Wildcats came out looking nothing like the ninth-ranked team in the country, while the Bulldogs came out looking like world-beaters.

After scoring the first point of the

match on a kill by senior middle blocker Eunice Thomas, the Wildcats were dominated by Georgia's two outstanding outside hitters Priscilla Pacheco and Nikki Nicholson.

The Bulldogs never looked back in game one after taking a 2-1 lead. Pacheco, who leads the nation in kills, got the Bulldog faithful excited with her jump serve early. "Ahhh Boom!" rang out each time a Bulldog served, and the crowd seemed to rattle the Cats.

Pacheco, who finished the match with 32 kills, and Nicholson, who added 30 kills, could do no wrong against the blocking scheme of the Wildcats.

"We went around the block. They had a good block against us, and we knew that we could not hit through them, so we went around them,"

Nicholson said.

While the Bulldogs were able to hit their shots around the Wildcat defense, UK could not seem to counter in the first two games.

The best example came with the score 11-3 in favor of Georgia in game one. The Bulldogs blocked three consecutive Wildcat spikes to put the game one away, winning it 15-4.

That tenacious Georgia blocking defense continued into game two as, like in game one, Georgia jumped out to a 6-0 lead.

Ralston-Flory called a time out to try to pump some life into the Wildcats. The Cats seemed to begin to play back to form after that timeout and battled back to close the deficit in game two to 14-10, but Georgia's blocking once again was the clincher when middle blocker Hadli Anstine blocked Thomas shot to end game two at 15-10.

The Wildcat momentum that started midway through game two continued in game three, leading to the Wildcats only game victory 15-9.

UK's outside hitters, sophomore Molly Driesbach and junior Krista Robinson, began to find the open shot in the middle of Bulldog defense. Driesbach finished the match leading the Wildcats with 23 kills, while Robinson added 14.

The Wildcats took the big early lead in game three 7-2. Georgia appeared to think that the match was already over.

"We were looking for the win. We let up. We lost our momentum," Nicholson said.

Georgia closed the gap to 7-5 after a timeout, but UK remained focused and won the game going away 15-9.

Game four was a classic struggle between the two teams. Neither team had more than a three-point advantage over the other at any

time in the game.

Both teams came up with superb defensive plays to stay in it. UK fought off five match points, but just could not get past Georgia. The most outstanding defensive play was at 15-16 when senior setter Jane Belanger dove outside the court and brought it back into play allowing the Wildcats to continue the match.

UK had chances of its own but could not capitalize on them, making either service errors or hitting their spikes wide.

Nicholson finally ended it with a service ace of the hands of Mara Egliotis.

"We were looking for a win like this. We deserve it," Nicholson said.

The Wildcats opened the weekend with victory against South Carolina (12-9) on Friday night in Columbia, S.C. A close match throughout, UK managed to win in

four games by the scores of 15-12, 15-17 and 15-6.

"We did a good job getting the ball to our middle blockers. South Carolina played as good a match as they have all year," Ralston-Flory said.

UK was paced by its big three hitters Driesbach, Thomas and Robinson. Driesbach led the way with 20 kills and attack percentage of .320. Thomas returned to her dominating early season form with 18 kills, and Robinson continued her steady play as she contributed 18 kills and had an attack percentage of .293.

The one bright spot of the weekend for the Wildcats was that senior Ann Hall became the all-time digs leader at the UK. Hall, despite being sick most of the weekend, managed to play in all matches and added to her lifetime total with 28 digs on Sunday.

Gaston answers critics in Series

TORONTO — Let's hear what the critics have to say about Cito Gaston now.

Let them criticize his moves. Let them second guess all they want. He's the guy sitting with two World Series rings. He's the guy traveling in the company of some of the game's most renowned managers.

"It doesn't matter what I do," Gaston said. "I'll still get criticized. I don't mind. Some people were really nasty with their comments and I think some people are jealous about it. I'm not a jealous person. No matter what happens, as long as I have the respect of my players, that's what I care about."

There's no problem with that, not after consecutive World Series championships — the first manager to accomplish that feat since Sparky Anderson with Cincinnati in 1975-76. Only nine others — Dick Williams, Ralph Houk, Casey Stengel, Joe McCarthy, Connie Mack, Miller Huggins, John McGraw, Frank Chance and Bill Carrigan — have done it in 90 years of World Series history.

Most of those pilots were high-profile guys in stark contrast to Gaston, who is the strong silent type.

"Cito doesn't speak loud," Series hero Joe Carter said. "A team meeting is maybe four or five words. That's the truth. But when he comes to the mound, it's not a conference call. He let's you know what he's there for in no uncertain terms."

Gaston is a big man — 6-foot-4, 220 pounds — and he works with a purposeful stride. He rarely argues with umpires and he is fiercely loyal to his players.

"I love these guys," he said after the Blue Jays won the Series. "They make my job easy. They play hard. They play every day. I'm really happy for the guys on the club who never won a World Series before."

Gaston played for 10 seasons and never made it to the post season. He was a productive hitter with San Diego and Atlanta, batting .256 for his career with 91 homers. "I was a hitter," he said, "a so-called hitter."

He was Toronto's batting coach from 1982-89. On May 15, 1989, he was appointed interim manager of the Blue Jays, replacing Jimmy Williams. Two weeks later, the Jays stripped the "interim" from his title.

The Jays were 12-24 when the change was made and went 77-49 under Gaston to win the American League East title. That made him just the 24th rookie manager to lead his club to a first place finish since 1900.

TORONTO — Lenny Dykstra slumped in his locker. He looked small, vulnerable. A child's hand was on his face. He wanted to hide. He knew he couldn't. He was drained, pallid, dazed. His voice a whisper. A season over.

"I tried. I tried and tried and tried again. It wasn't enough."

Dykstra tried his damndest to make the 1993 World Series all his. In so many ways it was. Then it wasn't.

Joe Carter homered. Dykstra stared.

"It was a weird feeling, watching that ball go out. Helpless, man. I can't really describe it."

Dykstra couldn't move, bent over for a moment in the outfield as if wounded. Then he jogged slowly toward the Philadelphia dugout.

He didn't look back. The Toronto Blue Jays mobbed Carter, cavorted like crazy. Dykstra was gone.

"I didn't want to watch it. I didn't want to just sit there while all that happened."

No tears, no regrets. Nothing more to offer. Only ifs.

"If we'd won tonight, Danny Jackson would have pitched tomorrow, and he's been a big-game pitcher for us. We would have put a lot of thoughts into a lot of people's minds around here."

If the Phillies won Saturday night and Sunday, Dykstra would have been the MVP.

Toronto won, so it was Paul Molitor. Deservedly, Dykstra knew.

"If I learned anything during this World Series, I learned that Paul Molitor can hit."

Everyone learned that Dykstra can hit, too.

Homers, singles, clutch situations. And he can field, bouncing off the center-field wall, chasing down gapers.

They learned what a pest he is on the basepaths. How cold and penetrating and resolute his eyes look at the plate.

No. 4 showed them what kind of ballplayer he can be when he's not all busted up as he had been for most of two seasons.

Everyone saw beyond the chaw in his cheek, the muscled forearms that seemed too large for his body. He's short and chunky. In this World Series, he loomed gigantic. Rickey Henderson may be the best leadoff hitter in history. Dykstra outplayed him in the same spot from spring to fall.

"What can you say about Dykstra?" Carter wondered.

"I thought we had the best leadoff hitter in the game. After not seeing Lenny play over the past three years, I may have to change my mind. Rickey is a great athlete, but that little guy can just flat-out play."

Dude knew it all along. Didn't surprise himself.

Didn't prove anything to himself. Didn't have to. Said he's just doing his job, hitting .348, driving in eight runs, scoring nine more, whacking his fourth homer of the series in Game 6.

Only one man in history, Reggie Jackson, hit more homers in a World Series.

No one ever hit more homers in the playoffs and World Series together than Dykstra's six.

His 10 career postseason homers matched a fellow named Lou Gehrig. And only five players ever hit more. Mickey Mantle, Babe Ruth, Yogi Berra, Duke Snider and Reggie Jackson. Dykstra's keeping good company these days.

Two and a half years ago he got drunk and nearly killed himself driving into a tree. So many other injuries since. It makes a man hard. It makes him appreciative.

"It was nice because I got to prove to people in baseball what I could do as a player, what I expected myself to do. What I did this year is the way I play, the way I should play."

He wasn't going to the plate looking for walks in his final game. Especially not when he had a 3-1 count with two men on in the seventh inning.

"When I went up there, one thing occurred to me. I looked up and I said, 'Man, it's the seventh inning. I'd better do something before it's too late.' It was a criddle count, and I wanted to hit it as hard as I could there."

"If you had to pick a year to lose a game, then this was probably the year to lose it. We were so close. We lost two heartbreaking ball-games in this World Series, and that's the reason they're celebrating over there and we're not celebrating over here."

Dykstra knew the glory and the pain.

He won a playoff game in Atlanta with a 10th-inning homer. He hit two more in a 15-14 loss last Wednesday in Philadelphia. He manufactured the game-winning run without a hit in a must-win game Thursday.

Could he have done more? "Yeah, I could have gotten a hit every time up."

It seemed he did. "Well, I tried," Dykstra looked up. "That's it. Uncle."

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Sensible's concept songs sag in sincerity

Once, while I was flipping through some ratty fanzine a friend of mine picked up in Seattle, I read an article which claimed that the more pathetic and worthless an ex-punk rocker's music is these days, the cooler he used to be when he was still a punk.

For instance, John Lydon, who brought the British Empire to its knees as frontman for the Sex Pistols, soldiered on with Public Image Ltd., a band that, if this world had even a grain of justice in it, would have long ago been hit by a flaming meteorite.

Mick Jones, who played guitar in the way-cool Clash, now assails our ears with his miserable dance-rock combo, Big Audio Dynamite. And Generation X's Billy Idol ...



well, you get the point, don't you?

This in mind, I was understandably curious when I heard that Captain Sensible had released a new album.

The good Captain, you see, used to play bass (and, later, lead guitar) in the Damned, a terrific British punk rock unit that gave the world "New Rose," a certifiable head-banger classic.

I was hopeful that, despite the examples of Lydon, Jones and Idol, Captain Sensible still knew how to make cool music. Rules, after all, are made to be broken.

But not by him. *The Universe of Geoffrey Brown*, Captain Sensible's 50-minute 1-have-seen-the-future-and-it-sucks concept album, is a whole lot of concept without a whole lot of good music to back it up.

A concept album is a pretty hard thing to pull off successfully;

you've got to have an engaging storyline as well as great chops if you want to do it right. Sadly, the good Captain has neither.

The showman thread tying everything together is as follows: Geoffrey Brown, a middle-aged Englishman trapped in a dead-end job and a loveless marriage, receives a transmission from outer space claiming that the rapid technological progress humanity is making will ultimately be its undoing.

The powers-that-be, who view this message as a threat to their control, try to suppress Brown and his radical message. Eventually, Brown disappears from the face of the Earth, presumably to join his brethren in the stars.

It's a theme that has been covered time and again in literature — the lonely misfit discovers an important secret, only to be pushed down by intolerance and greed — and Sensible doesn't do anything fresh with it, certainly nothing that a fair-to-middling episode of *Star Trek: The Next Generation* couldn't do.

Sensible appends most of the songs with lengthy spoken-word

segments to help drive his story along.

That's fine; concept albums often include such portions to explain things more fully than the songs could by themselves. But Sensible goes too far, makes them too long.

Instead of offering a few clues to what's happening, his spoken segments turn into a massively detailed Cliff's Notes, delineating the story so fully that the songs become unnecessary, which defeats the purpose of making an album at all. The songs ought to be the focal point, not the window-dressing.

Oh, the album has its moments. "Getting To Me" and "Home" are reasonably pleasant pop songs. "Holiday In My Heart," the opener, has a pretty cool guitar lick. The title track and "A Trip To Cornwall" are both pretty good cuts. But this is much too little, much too late.

Virtual future for artists

NEW YORK —The Guggenheim Museum's Soho gallery for the next week is exhibiting five examples of virtual reality.

Visitors don headsets and gloves to enter computer-generated worlds where the rules of movement and space and even simple manners disappear.

The Guggenheim exhibit is meant to show that VR can be more than a hyperventilated space race.

"It's not unusual in the history of art and visual arts that artists would be exploring the use of every new medium that is available to them," said Michael Govan, deputy director of the Guggenheim.

The museum's interest in VR was spurred by contemporary artist Jenny Holzer, who has gained fame for putting eclectic messages on scoreboards and other electronic message systems.

Holzer developed two programs for the exhibit, one inspired by the strife in the former Yugoslavia.

The participant wanders through an abandoned virtual village. When he or she walks into a house or building, the voice of a soldier, rape victim or observer is heard.

Musician Thomas Dolby, who had a hit song a decade ago, created a virtual string quartet exhibit.

"I think it's very important to grab a stake in this new technology for the other half of the world," Dolby said. "We're not all teen-age boys."

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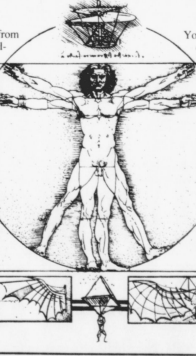
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Books capture fierce spirit of hooks

Feminist author bell hooks said her Kentucky roots have helped nurture her controversial branch of writing.

hooks, born in Hopkinsville, Ky., as Gloria Jean Watkins, spoke Friday night in Memorial Hall as part of the 15th annual Women Writers Conference.

"Fundamentally, deeply and profoundly, I feel that I am a Kentucky

writer," hooks said.

Dressed dramatically in black with an orange and green Kente cloth draped around her shoulders as a colorful cowl, hooks attributed the fierce spirit in her works to her Kentucky upbringing.

"I think the spirit that runs through all my books is the spirit that I was raised in here in Kentucky," she said.

"It's a wild, roaming spirit inside me, a questing spirit, a spirit that wants to open things up, to know more — and I think that is a deeply Kentucky spirit in me."

hooks' works include feminist theory such as *Feminist Theory: From Margin to Center*, *Talking Back: Thinking Feminist, Thinking Black* and *Yearning: Race, Gender and Cultural Politics*.

She has also published a book of poems, *The Woman's Mourning Song*.

Although hooks said readers often mistake the fierce spirit in her works for anger, she thinks anger can be a powerful catalyst for change.

"My books have a tendency to provoke people," she said. "They

last week of leaders of the Hawiye clan, which includes Aidid's Habre-Gedir and Ali Mahdi's Agbal people.

The U.N. newspaper Maan reported yesterday that Aidid militiamen have abducted three elders who attended the conference, including Habre-Gedir Chief Ahmed Rage.

Retired U.S. Admiral Jonathan Howe, the U.N. secretary-general's special envoy, told reporters he was concerned about the kidnapping of a key figure with whom U.N. officials have pursued a new initiative to resolve Somalia's conflict.

Rage "is very important to the restoration of peace not only in Mogadishu but throughout the country," Howe said.

U.N. officials have abandoned their hunt for Aidid, who is blamed for the killings of dozens of peacekeepers, in line with President Clinton's decision to refocus on diplomacy and his criticism of the United Nations for personalizing the conflict.

Mogadishu has been relatively calm since Aidid declared a unilateral cease-fire Oct. 9 and released a captured U.S. helicopter pilot and a Nigerian peacekeeper.

The moves were designed to overshadow Aidid's fugitive warlord image and enhance his political stature — a transition that clearly worries Ali Mahdi.

Ali Mahdi expressed concern Saturday about the new U.S. policy, saying Aidid is biding his time until American troops leave by March 31, taking the backbone out of the U.N. force.

Aidid has said Clinton's plans to send thousands more soldiers to protect troops here are provocative.

About 300 artillerymen and engineers from the 24th Infantry Division arrived here yesterday from Fort Stewart, Ga., increasing U.S. troop strength to 6,900 ashore and 13,000 on ships offshore. The U.N. army has about 30,000 troops.

Girl Scout policy draws criticism

MINNEAPOLIS — Promising to serve Allah instead of God, or simply to serve, is now OK for Girl Scouts, but the decision to allow the choice was not universally cheered yesterday by people outside the scouts.

"This is one more organization that has become morally relativistic and that's deeply disappointing," Tom Minnery, a spokesman for Focus on the Family, said yesterday. Focus is an evangelical Christian organization based in Colorado Springs, Colo.

The Girl Scouts national convention delegates voted 1,560 to 375 Saturday to allow girls to pledge service to the spiritual power of their conscience — or none at all. The measure, which takes effect immediately, keeps the Girl Scout promise's official wording intact, but allows individual girls to substitute for God another word or words they deem more appropriate.

The official wording reads: "On my honor, I will try to serve God and my country, to help people at all times, and to live by the Girl Scout Law."

The new flexibility springs from "a rather small movement within the leadership that is trying to act on what it sees as a politically correct position," he said.

The group's leaders said the change acknowledges growing religious and ethnic diversity among the nation's 2.6 million Girl Scouts. Dean Gupta, a Hindu board member of Geeta Ashram Church in Brooklyn Park, Minn., said the word "God" is not exclusively Christian.

"Saying the word 'God' I think creates some kind of uniformity," Gupta said.

"That's like saying 'man' stands in for everybody, which we have discovered is not true also. Often, uniformity is in the mouth of those who believe that their understanding should be the one everyone should accommodate."

Gang conference shows old wounds heal slowly

CHICAGO — Members of street gangs came here to work out their conflicts.

National black leaders who came to guide them seemed to be having trouble doing the same thing.

Yesterday was to mark the first appearances of civil rights activist Jesse Jackson and NAACP Executive Director Benjamin Chavis, even though it was the fourth day of the five-day summit.

Jackson was slated to address the gang members in a rally at Operation PUSH, the civil rights organization he founded more than 20 years ago.

Chavis was invited to deliver an address at Muslim minister Louis Farrakhan's mosque yesterday afternoon.

Leaders of the truce effort said it was made clear to the national leaders that the Chicago meeting was a grassroots effort, and that they were invited as observers and advisers.

"We have conflict resolution going on," said Earl King, founder of No Dope Express Foundation. "It is our obligation and our responsibility to show the old guard we have respect for them, too."

In a rare display of unity at a Washington forum last September, Jackson, Chavis, Farrakhan and Congressional Black Caucus Chairman Kweisi Mfume, D-Md., identified ending gang violence as an issue on which they could work together.

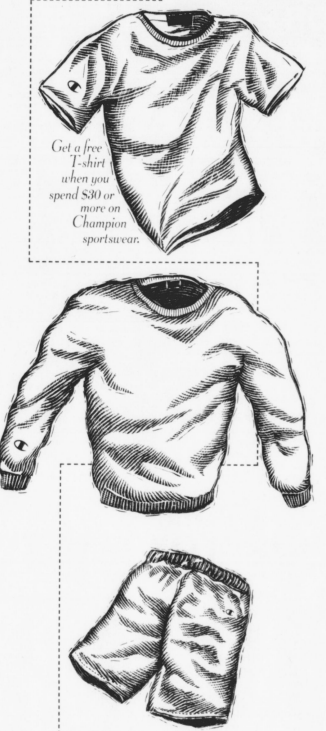

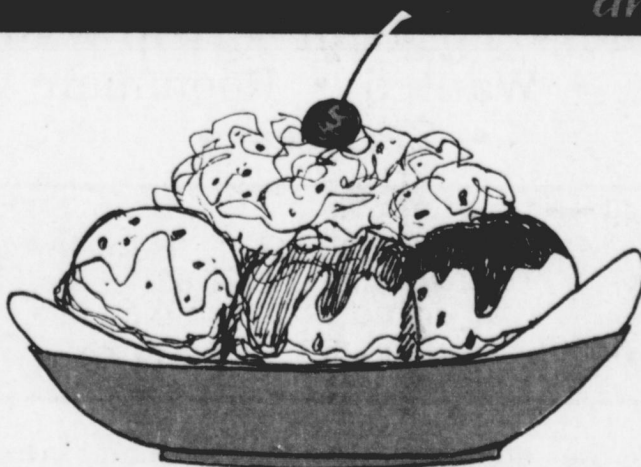

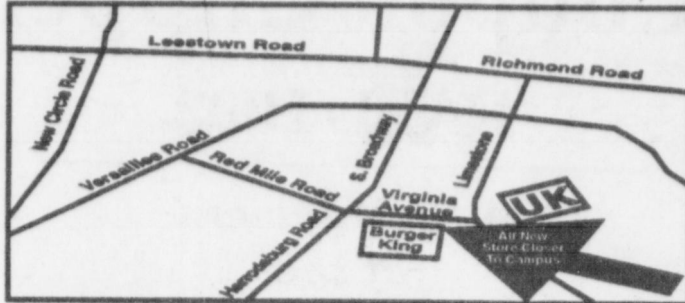
