Dr. William H. Dennen, Acting Dean of the Graduate School, presented a request that the University Senate act on seven candidates for honorary degrees at the May 1971 Commencement (five candidates and two alternates). The Senate approved the names of the seven persons named for recommendation to the President and Board of Trustees with the request that the names be withheld until the Board has taken action and the nominees have accepted.

Dr. Staley Adams, Secretary of the University Senate Council, presented a recommendation that a Department of Family Practice be established in the College of Medicine. This proposal was circulated to the faculty under date of January 19, 1971 and follows below. Following comments by Dr. Peter Bosomworth, Vice President of the Medical Center, the University Senate approved the establishment of the Department of Family Practice in the College of Medicine for recommendation to the President of the University.

In accordance with the Rules of the University Senate, the Senate Council circulates the following proposal for the establishment of a Department of Family Practice in the College of Medicine for recommendation to the President of the University. The establishment of this Department has the endorsement of the Academic Council for the Medical Center and the University Senate Council.

Background:

Legislation enacted by the 1970 Session of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, requires that "each and every Medical School established and assisted financially by the state of Kentucky shall include in the curriculum a Department of General Practice of Medicine under the direction and supervision of a qualified general practitioner. The minimum requirements of the Department shall include courses of study in family care, including clinical experience, a program of preceptorships, a program of internships or general residencies in a hospital, and such other teaching techniques that in the judgment of the management of the school shall be best suited to encourage and implement the preparation of students for the general practice of medicine."

The College of Medicine proposes to establish a Department of Family Practice to strengthen and coordinate the undergraduate programs already in existence and to develop a special postgraduate residency program. The goals of the Department are:

- (1) to provide undergraduate medical students with training in and understanding of Family Practice.
- (2) to establish a Residency Training Program in Family Practice in conformance with the "Essentials" for such a program as approved by the Council on Medical Education and the House of Delegates of the American Medical Association.

It should be noted that the Specialty Board and the "Essentials" refer to Family Physicians and programs of Family Practice, not General Practice. The names are often used synonymously, but there is a significant difference as these terms are officially defined, and it would be archaic, if not retrograde in concept, to use the term "General Practice" as specified by the Legislature. Accordingly, in keeping with the specialty designation, the new department will be called the Department of Family Practice.

Note:

The preceding statements have been submitted by the College of Medicine as background information relative to this Department. The academic program, when it is ready, will be submitted in accordance with the Rules of the University Senate for approval.

On behalf of the Senate Council and with its recommendation, Professor Garrett Flickinger, Chairman of the Commencement Committee which had presented a proposal to the Senate at its meeting of January 11th which the Senate referred back to committee for additional study, presented the following to the Senate:

that Baccalaureate Exercises at the University of Kentucky be eliminated and that Commencement Exercises be held in 1971 on Saturday, May 8, at 4:00 p.m., with the rearrangement of final exams which are in conflict from 2:00-4:00, to 1:30-3:30 p.m., and that the Dean of Admissions and Registrar make arrangements for the next three years' academic calendars to schedule final exams so that they will not conflict with future Saturday Commencements. Further, that the Rules Committee be instructed to make appropriate codification in the Rules as necessary.

Following discussion in which Professor Flickinger explained the Commencement Committee's rationale, the University Senate approved the elimination of Baccalaureate Exercises at the University of Kentucky, the movement of the 1971 Commencement Exercises to Saturday, May 8, 1971 at 4:00 p.m., subsequent Commencements to the Saturday following the end of final examinations, and directed that the Rules Committee make appropriate codification in the University Senate Rules.

On behalf of the Senate Council and with its recommendation, Dr. Adams recommended that the Senate accept the proposal on Academic Policies for International Programs which had been circulated to the faculty under date of January 18, 1971. Following discussion the Senate voted to accept these policy recommendations as circulated.

Introduction

A planned international/intercultural dimension is an important element of the program of any university which aspires to a high level of achievement. Since World War II many American universities have taken steps to strengthen international and cross-cultural programs and to reorient curricula in keeping with the vast changes that are occurring in the world and with the enlarged responsibility of the United States in international relations.

The University of Kentucky has made modest progress in this direction but developments have been sporadic, partially and generally uncoordinated. Major parts of the curriculum remain almost exclusively oriented to Western culture. Experience with technical assistance projects abroad has made little impact on the on-campus programs. Languages taught continue to be largely those of Western countries. The number of foreign students remains low in comparison to other universities, particularly at the undergraduate level. The number of faculty with international and cross-cultural interests has increased but arrangements for them to continue their scholarly interaction with other societies have not been institutionalized. Cooperation among units of the University on international/inter-cultural programming remains minimal.

Progress in international education is currently threatened by competition from domestic concerns and by a shortage of funds for higher education. Continued progress in areas where a beginning has been made, and the rounding out of an adequate international, cross-cultural dimension will require more effective and coordinated planning, more efficient use of available resources, and greater cooperation among the various units of the University. While major outside funds may be desirable for international programs, the Committee feels that significant advance is possible within regular budgeting, assuming that faculty and administrators give higher priority to this aspect.

The development of more adequate and University-wide policies for international programs is necessary for further advance; implementation of policies will depend on faculty commitment and leadership by faculty groups and academic administrators. As a contribution toward the establishment and implementation of University policies for international/intercultural programs, the Senate Advisory Committee for International Programs, submits the policy recommendations which follow for discussion, modification and adoption by the University Senate.

Although the Committee concurs that higher education might benefit from a complete overhaul, these recommendations are conceived in terms of the present organization of the University; hopefully, they will contribute significantly to needed general reform. (Appendix I is a more detailed statement of rationale, discussion of policy recommendations, and suggestions for implementation of the recommendations. Appendix II is a statement of purposes of international/intercultural education.) (These two appendices are available in the Office of the Senate Council for perusal.)

Policy Recommendations

Policy I: FOR MORE EFFECTIVE USE OF RESOURCES THE UNIVERSITY SHOULD GIVE PRIORITY TO A LIMITED NUMBER OF GEO-CULTURAL AREAS OF THE WORLD FOR PROGRAM EMPHASES, BUILDING UP RESOURCES AND PROGRAMS IN RELATION TO THOSE AREAS, WHILE MAINTAINING A UNIVERSAL POSTURE.

(This could apply to courses offered, including language courses, exchange programs, library holdings, institution-to-institution

associations, faculty strength, overseas research and special on-campus activities. The selection of areas for emphasis would depend largely on faculty interests.)

Policy II: THE UNIVERSITY CURRICULUM SHOULD INCREASINGLY REFLECT THE UNIVERSE OF KNOWLEDGE AND HUMAN EXPERIENCE. THE NEED FOR UNDERSTANDING AND RESPECT AMONG SOCIETIES AND CULTURES, THE EMERGENCE OF A WORLD SOCIAL SYSTEM, AND THE ROLE OF NATIONS IN THAT SYSTEM.

(This may involve infusion of courses with non-Western and other cross-cultural materials, addition of international/intercultural courses in many departments, initiation of interdisciplinary courses on world problems, the planning of international majors and minors for students preparing for work abroad, reorientation of the general studies requirements, and revision of language programs.)

Policy III: CROSS-CULTURAL AND INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE SHOULD BE MADE AN IMPORTANT PART OF THE LEARNING RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO STUDENTS; OPPORTUNITIES FOR EXPERIENCE WITH MINORITY CULTURES IN THE UNITED STATES SHOULD BE COORDINATED WITH OPPORTUNITIES ABROAD.

(Implementation involves expansion of exchange opportunities, planned domestic community experience among minority groups, interaction among foreign and United States' students, on-campus lectures by visiting foreign lecturers, fine arts festivals and cross-cultural seminars.)

Policy IV: ALL STUDENTS SHOULD BE ENCOURAGED, AND SOME REQUIRED, TO BUILD AN INTERNATIONAL/INTERCULTURAL EMPHASIS INTO THEIR PROGRAMS, MAKING USE BOTH OF CURRICULAR OFFERINGS AND PLANNED EXPERIENCE IN CROSS-CULTURAL SITUATIONS.

(Improved awareness among faculty and students, improved advising regarding international opportunities, "clustering" of courses for maximum impact, and required international/cross-cultural minors for some students are some of the elements required for implementing this policy.)

Policy V: THE PRESENCE OF FOREIGN STUDENTS IN SIGNIFICANT NUMBERS AND QUALITY SHOULD BE CONSIDERED AN OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE A CLIENT GROUP IMPORTANT TO WORLD COOPERATION AND ALSO A RESOURCE OF FUNDAMENTAL IMPORTANCE TO THE EDUCATION OF AMERICAN STUDENTS.

(This involves systematic developmental planning for foreign students, recruiting and aiding larger numbers of foreign students, making greater use of them for cross-cultural learning, and the initiation of academic programs specifically to meet their needs.)

Policy VI: EXTENSION PROGRAMS SHOULD INCLUDE AN INTERNATIONAL DIMENSION IN RECOGNITION OF THE NEED FOR GREATER UNDERSTANDING OF WORLD AFFAIRS AMONG THE SEVERAL CLIENT GROUPS IN ADDITION TO ON-CAMPUS STUDENTS AND IN RECOGNITION OF THE UNIQUE RESOURCES OF THE UNIVERSITY WITHIN THE STATE TO MEET THOSE NEEDS.

(This should include changes in existing extension programs, inclusion of an international dimension in new extension programs, greater use of educational television and radio, and special attention to the in-service needs of teachers in Kentucky schools and colleges.)

Policy VII: RELATIONSHIPS WITH INSTITUTIONS IN OTHER COUNTRIES AND ARRANGEMENTS FOR INTERNATIONAL COOPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS SHOULD BE AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE UNIVERSITY'S TOTAL INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM.

(Institution-to-institution relationships, involvement of additional colleges in cooperative development projects, and greater involvement in continuing international academic, research and professional projects are needed.)

Policy VIII: FACULTY EXPERIENCE ABROAD AND CROSS-CULTURAL EXPERTISE SHOULD BE EMPHASIZED AS A MAJOR FACTOR IN THE INTERNATIONAL REORIENTATION OF THE UNIVERSITY'S PROGRAMS.

(To implement this policy department analysis of need, recruitment of faculty with overseas experience, including foreign faculty, support for research and teaching abroad, planned use of international/cross-cultural experience of faculty on return, are some necessary steps.)

Policy IX: THE COSTS OF INTERNATIONAL AND CROSS-CULTURAL PROGRAMS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED A LEGITIMATE CLAIM ON STATE FINANCIAL RESOURCES WITH FOUNDATION AND FEDERAL FUNDS TO BE SOUGHT FOR SPECIAL PROJECTS AS A COMPLEMENT TO REGULAR FUNDING.

(Integration of international costs in regular budgeting processes, provision of modest funds to complement unit budgeting, systematic approaches for grants from outside agencies, phasing of program needs in terms of priorities and interdepartmental planning for the best use of resources, are involved.)

Policy X: INCREASED ATTENTION TO THE INTERNATIONAL/INTERCULTURAL DIMENSION SHOULD BE GIVEN BY THOSE FACULTY GROUPS AND ACADEMIC OFFICERS RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING AND IMPLEMENTING ACADEMIC POLICY: TO ACHIEVE UNIVERSITY-WIDE PLANNING, COORDINATION AND ADHERENCE TO UNIVERSITY POLICY, A STRENGTHENED INTERNATIONAL OFFICE IS NEEDED.

(Adoption of definite policies by the University Senate, commitment of support to policy implementation by University administrators, combining of existing agencies with international responsibility into a single strengthened office, and initiative by the international office in planning long-range strategy for implementation of policies, are necessary elements of leadership and coordination.)

At the January 11, 1971 University Senate meeting the Senate approved for circulation to the faculty background information and a copy of a motion by Dr. J. R. Ogletree to recommend revising the Governing Regulations to reinstate the voting privileges in the Senate for certain administrators and academic personnel currently designated as non-voting, ex officio members of the Senate. This circulation went to the faculty under date of January 25, 1971.

Dr. Ogletree then presented a motion that the University Senate accept the motion contained in that circulation for presentation to the Board of Trustees. The motion reads as follows:

The ex officio membership shall include the President, all Vice Presidents, all Deans, the Director of the Libraries, the Professor of Military Science and the Professor of Air Science who shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership including the right to vote.

Other ex officio members shall include the chairmen of the several standing University Senate committees, including Senate Advisory Committees, if not already members of the Senate and other persons whom the University Senate Council may add for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. These ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

Dr. Adams stated that the University Senate Council considered the "Ogletree" amendment and after some discussion with different administrators and the President the Council wished to present the following amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment:

The ex officio voting membership shall include the academic deans.

The ex officio non-voting membership shall include the President, all Vice Presidents, the Director of Libraries, the chairmen of the several standing University Senate committees, including Senate Advisory Committees and the Academic Ombudsman if not already elected members. Other ex officio members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. These ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

Dr. J. W. Patterson presented an amendment to the amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment to give the academic deans the same eligibility for election to the Senate as any other faculty member and that they have voting privileges only if so elected. The Senate defeated this amendment.

Mr. John Nelson, student Senator, presented an amendment to the amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment that the academic deans be given the same eligibility for election to the Senate as any other faculty member and that they have voting privileges only if so elected, but that academic deans elected to voting membership in the Senate not be eligible for election as faculty representatives on either the Board of Trustees or the University Senate Council. The Senate defeated this amendment.

Dr. Stanford Smith presented an amendment to the amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment to add the Director of Libraries to the ex officio voting membership and to delete it from the second paragraph listing the ex officio non-voting membership. The Senate approved this amendment.

A Senator presented an amendment to the amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment to add the Directors of Aerospace Science and Military Science to the ex officio voting membership. The Senate defeated this motion.

By a hand count of 40 to 27 the Senate then approved the amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment, as presented by the Senate Council, and further amended. This amendment to Dr. Ogletree's amendment as presented by the Senate Council, and amended, reads as follows:

The ex officio voting membership shall include the academic deans.

The ex officio non-voting membership shall include the President, all Vice Presidents, the chairmen of the several standing University Senate Committees, including Senate Advisory Committees and the Academic Ombudsman if not already elected members. Other ex officio members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. These ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

Dr. Ogletree reminded the Senators that the Senate is responsible for academic policy and that there are at least three Vice Presidents who deal directly with academic affairs: the Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Vice President for the Medical Center, and the Vice President for the Community College System. He then made a motion to amend the previously approved motion to return these three Vice Presidents to voting status in the Senate. The motion was seconded.

At this point in the deliberations question was called of the presence of a quorum. A count indicated the lack of a quorum.

The Senate then voted to adjourn, and the Senate adjourned at 4:30 p.m.
