Dean White presented the following recommendations from the
College of Arts and Sciences, for new courses and changes in courses:

1. NEW COURSES

Botany 1 General Botany (4)

Principles of botany with emphasis on the flowering plant. Cells and tissues; the structure and functions of the root, stem, and leaf; alternation of generations; life cycles of the moss and fern; reproduction in flowering plants. Two lectures and two two-hour laboratory periods per week.

Botany 2 General Botany (3)

Structure, life cycles, and biological relationships of typical lower plants; the gymnosperms; and introduction to taxonomy, ecology, and heredity in plants. Two lectures and one two-hour laboratory period per week. Prerequisite: Botany 1 or 25

English 11a-b Argumentation and Debate (3 each)

This course is organized to familiarize the student with classics of argumentative technique and to provide him with the opportunity to exercise his skill in making logical constructions, logical defenses or refutations of social, political, and economic phases of life. Prerequisites: English 1a-b.

Psychology 235 Diagnosis and Counseling in a Student Personnel Program (3)

An advanced course requiring recent background in both psychological measurement and the principles of guidance. It lays stress on skill in interpreting diagnostic material rather than on theory. Attention is given to techniques for collecting information regarding the student, the making of a diagnosis, and the techniques of counseling and interviewing. Prerequisite: A graduate major in psychology or Education and Psychology 121.

Romance Languages 30a-b Elementary Russian (3 each)

The study of the basic principles of the language through grammar and reading with emphasis on oral practice through the use of oral exercises.

Zoology 1 Principles of Animal Biology (4)

Two lectures, four hours of laboratory. Demonstrations, microscopy, dissections, drawings illustrating animal morphology, physiology, phylogeny, development, taxonomy, and ecology. Detailed studies of vertebrate and invertebrate types such as amoeba, paramecium, hydra, earthworm, frog larva and adult; vertebrate homologies. Habits and natural history, economics of wild life, conservation. This course is the prerequisite to the other courses in the Department of Zoology.

- (1) That the requirement of English D English Composition be dropped. This course will remain as one urged upon students who are unreasonably deficient in the use of English punctuation.

1a-b English Composition (3,3) 1, 11 S Staff

A course designed to teach students to develop and express their own ideas in clear, sensible English. The principal means are the reading and discussion of essays and articles, and practice in writing. Required of all freshmen.

- (3) That certain sections of English 1b be restricted and described in the General Catalog as follows:

1bR English Composition (3) 1, 11, S Staff

A variant of 1b, for especially qualified students, which in the reading substitutes imaginative literature for factual essays and articles. An elective for students from 1a recommended by their instructors and approved by a committee of the staff.

- (4) That Geography 133a-f Special Problems be extended to Geography 133a-k.
- (5) That Physical Education 3 be dropped as Boxing.
That Physical Education 23 be dropped as Ballet.
(These numbers will remain in effect under different title).
- (6) Reinstatement for the summer term only of Physics C217c Theoretical Physics.

In addition, the College had recommended that the following rule be abolished:

"A student transferring from one curriculum to another will not be allowed credit in excess of the normal load of the curriculum to which he is transferring, except as the student may be eligible for extra work."

The Faculty approved the recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences.

Assistant Dean Horlacher presented for the College of Agriculture and Home Economics new courses in forestry and a proposed pre-forestry curriculum, as follows:

New Courses

Forestry 10. Elements of Forest Mensuration. 3 credits

The theory and application of measurements of logs, trees, and stands of timber. Lectures two hours; laboratory two hours. Prerequisites: for. 1 or 2, Math. 3 or approval of instructor.

Forestry 20. Seeding and Planting. 3 credits

Artificial regeneration of forest stands; fundamentals of forest nursery practice; planting techniques and methods. Lectures two hours; laboratory two hours. prerequisites: For. 1 or 2.

The recommendations of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics were approved by the Faculty.

Dean Terrell presented the following recommendations from the College of Engineering, which were approved by the Faculty:

Change of credit and write-up:

Electrical Engineering 110 from a 1 to a 2 semester hour course.

Electrical Engineering 110-Electrical Laboratory (2)

An experimental study of electrical machinery. Lecture, 1 hour; laboratory, one three-hour period. Prerequisite or concurrent; Elec. Eng. 116

Drop Electrical Engineering 163 - Radio Engineering 11 (4) and substitute:

Electrical Engineering 164 - Radio Engineering 11 (4)

High frequency phenomena: Coupled circuits, impedance transformation, high frequency lines, antenna feeding and matching, wide band amplifiers, square wave testing; trigger-and-pulse circuits, high frequency measurements. Lecture and recitation, three hours; laboratory, three hours. Prerequisite: Elec. Eng. 162.

Change of credit:

Mechanical Engineering 108 - Internal Combustion Engines from a four (4) to a three (3) semester hour course.

In the absence of Dean Taylor, Dr. Meece presented the following recommendation from the College of Education, which was approved by the University Faculty:

That the following course, which was dropped in April 1942, be reinstated:

Education 290a-b, Techniques and Professional Work of the Registrar, 3 semester hours each. A comprehensive study of permanent records and transcripts, including the history, literature, and present day tendencies; rules of the University, recommendations of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars; special problems in the administration of the office.

Dean Pardue of the Graduate School presented the following recommendations from the Graduate Faculty, which were approved:

"An off-campus university center is a center that has been established by the Board of Trustees for a continuing program of instruction, with supervision and facilities provided on a permanent basis and administered by the Department of University Extension.

"1. Each course offered in a University of Kentucky off-campus center and each class offered by extension and each instructor for these courses shall be approved by the graduate dean, the dean of the college, and the head of the department in which the course is offered on the Lexington Campus.

"2. One-third of the residence and credit required for a master's degree may be taken in an off-campus center or by extension or by a combination of off-campus center and extension work. (Correspondence courses are excluded).

"3. Courses for graduate credit shall be taught by regular instructors of the University of Kentucky and the work shall count as part of the regular teaching load. All staff members participating in off-campus instruction will do so only after satisfactory arrangements to them have been made with respect to load, salary, and teaching conditions.

"4. This program of graduate work is authorized for two years, at the end of which time a committee from the Graduate Faculty will review the program and make recommendations to the Faculty.

"5. A student must be admitted to the Graduate School prior to the admission to such courses for graduate credit. Each student must secure his advisor's approval of every course. Otherwise, there is no guarantee that a given course will be acceptable in satisfying degree requirements."

Dean Seay presented the following proposal concerning undergraduate work in off-campus centers and by extension. The Faculty approved the proposal as amended. It is as follows:

An off-campus university center is a center that has been established by the Board of Trustees for a continuing program of instruction with supervision and facilities provided on a

permanent basis and administered by the Department of University Extension. The following regulations are proposed:

1. Each course offered in a University of Kentucky off-campus center and each course offered by extension and each instructor for these courses shall be approved by the dean and the head of the department of the college and department in which the course is regularly offered on the Lexington campus. (This is the current practice).

2. Every prospective instructor in a University of Kentucky off-campus center must be recommended to the President for appointment by the head of the department and the dean of the college prior to the instructor's employment by the Department of University Extension.

Colonel MacKenzie reported to the Faculty that a conference was being held at Fort Meade this week, attended by representatives from the University's Military Department; that the results of this conference would affect students at the University of Kentucky. He stated that the Department would be prepared to answer questions concerning the new draft law after the 28th of August.

President Donovan reported briefly to the Faculty on the suit of Lyman T. Johnson, Negro, to be admitted to the University Graduate School. In connection with the above, President Donovan outlined the plan approved by the University's Board of Trustees under which graduate and professional work could be given to Negroes at Kentucky State College.

Minutes of the University Faculty October 11, 1948

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, October 11, at 4:00 p.m. President Donovan presided. Members absent were George K. Brady*, Alfred Brauer, A. J.
