Chief search delayed until safety position filled

The search for UK's new police chief has been put on hold until a new director of public safety is chosen, UK spokesperson Jay Blanton said.

In October, Ken Clevidence, the associate vice president of auxiliary services, announced his intention to retire this June and the idea of replacing him with a director of public safety began to unfold. The new police chief would report to the director.

"When he (Clevidence) announced his intention to retire, Frank Butler took the opportunity to rethink the position in that general area," Blanton said. "He modified it some and out of that created this new position."

Butler, the executive vice president for finances and administration, was leading the search for a new police chief along with Kim Wilson, the vice president for human resources. He wanted to wait until after a director of public safety is chosen to continue that search so that person may also add input to the police chief decision, Blanton said.

Blazer cafe set to get millions in renovations

Extensive \$1.4 million renovation plans for Blazer Café were approved at the December UK Board of Trustees meeting.

The renovations will occur in four phases with the first beginning in February. The phase will include a new salad, sandwich and beverage area near Blazer Express. This will be one of three demonstration stations that allow students to see the food while it is being prepared, said Director of Dining Services Jeff DeMoss.

This will be Blazer Cafe's first major renovation in about 45 years, DeMoss said. Minor renovations began in 2004 with limited changes including new lighting, fixtures and furniture at a cost of \$520,000. Students surveyed two years ago on dining services asked for fresh and healthy food. The three demonstration stations are the "wow" behind how dining services hopes to address students' concerns through the renovations, DeMoss said.

"We're moving the kitchen to the front of the house," DeMoss said. "The goal is to improve the ambiance along with the perception of quality."

"I'm glad (the BOT) was able to approve the project," Williams said. "For Dining Services to accomplish the kind of service it wants, this renovation is necessary." "There's still a lot of area for growth in dining services at UK," DeMoss said.

In addition to renovations at Blazer Café, Dining Services plans to bring a Subway to K-Lairt this summer.

Commons Market, which has not been renovated in 15 years, is the next area of concern for Dining Services. Renovations will cost approximately \$1.5 to \$2 million, and unless Dining Services receives bond money, it will be at least another two years before those changes begin.



Q. What is SAB?

A , SAB is a student-run organization funded by student fees. The main goal of SAB is to provide programming for campus by having concerts, comedians and multicultural events.

Q. What are the other goals for

A . Our goal is to provide a wide range of programming — something every student can enjoy. We aim to provide a diverse range of events, so throughout the year you are bound to like something we put out.

Q. How long has it been in existence?

A. We looked at that when I first got here. Q. Who determines how much each activity/committee gets?

A. It is a proposal process, and takes two weeks of voting. The first week the program goes to the board's weekly board meeting. They present their idea to everyone, and the board has a week to research and think about the proposal. The next week they vote where they read over the proposal again. It is really nice, because everyone has a shot at it.

Q. How much money does SAB have to work with this year?

A. With carry over from last year, we have around \$400,000.

Q. The activities seemed very successful last year, how do you plan on maintaining that success this semester?

A. We did have a very successful semester, and I am proud and excited. We did more events last semester than the entire year last year. We had a little over 40 events this semester.

This spring semester will be lighter, because there are basketball and other programs going on. The programmers really look for programs outside of the box. We try to look to what students actually want, and I have complete faith that every program passed. I can't wait for this semester to get started. I am very excited.

This semester we have the Little Ken-tucky Derby, and this is the second year of reviving that. We added events to it this year, and I am praying for good weather. It used to be such a huge, essential part of campus, and I hope to get that again.

A. It is a lot of dealing with agents and booking. You never know about things, and that is the hardest part of it. It involves a lot of scheduling, and the advisors are excellent about helping us.

We have been given this great opportunities to spend money, but we always get into a situation where the person demands more money than originally and things like them.



avert a civil war and make democracy flourish; at best, it will stall the impending civil war by a few months, at the cost of thousands more American lives.

Indeed, when Bush says that an increased "sacrifice" is needed — a word he will almost certainly use tonight — it is a disturbing reminder of how reluctant Bush was to say it in early 2003, before the war began. Remember how casualties would be low, the war would only take a few months, and the increased oil revenues would make up for the cost of fighting?

Maybe if Bush had been honest about what kind of sacrifice the war would require — time, money, and human life — the media and the public would have been more reluctant to let him do whatever he want-ed. Congress voted on the war authorization in October 2002, a little over a year after the Sept. Il attacks, back when one could be labeled "anti-American" simply for showing skepticism about pronouncements from the executive branch.

branch.
At this point in the war, "sacrifice" has taken on a slightly different meaning. We're not giving up needless amenities; we're throwing our children onto the fire, hoping to appease the gods of war.
And if the post-Vietnam experience is any indication, the needlessness of our sacrifice now will become an excuse to justify even more

killing in future decades. As the 2004 presidential campaign demonstrated, the political fight over Iraq was a rehash of the battles over Victnam, with many Iraq war proponents' hawkish views having been shaped by their harted of campus activists in the 1960s.

The right-wing revisionist narrative about Vietnam is that the public's declining support of the war was the cause of the U.S. loss — troops lost morale and didn't fight as hard as they could have. War proponents have hauled that one out numerous times recently to try to stiff dissent: "By expressing your views, you're harming the troops!"

I can already predict the op-eds in 20 years: "If the leftist media's war coverage hand't biased the public against the war and forced Bush to back down from a troop surge. Iraq would have avoided a civil war. That's why if we stick it out and stay for just a few more months, we will surely achieve our goals in (country name here)."

And thus the cycle will continue. In the 2020s, when liars misrepresent history to justify wars, remember where we are now — throwing away the lives of U.S. soldiers to try to "win" a fight that's long past lost, having been ricked into it by the same sort of liars.






