

Health Service swamped, students experience symptoms of biggest outbreak of contagious virus in the past four years

More students have the flu this year than in the last four years, and there is nothing students can do to keep from getting it, according to Lance Churchill, clinical service coordinator at the Student Health Service.

Churchill said the health service sees about 140 to 220 students every day in the walk-in clinic alone, and about 60 of those come in with the flu.

"I hope to start seeing a decline in it in the next few weeks," he said.

He said there is no way to tell which strain of the flu it is because all strains have the same conditions.

During the first few days of the flu, people may have a high temper-ature, chills, headache, muscle sore-ness, nausea, vomiting and diar-

hea. Churchill said. Some students also have complained of dizziness.

Churchill said students should take 1 easy those first days, soe aspirin or Tylenol for the fever and drink lots of fluids. If students have nausea, an upset stomach and diarrhea lawy should eat crackers, toast. Jallo and soup.

Students, however, should only eat when their stomach tells them it is ready for food, he said. 





Remedial program still needed despite selective admissions

In case you haven't heard, the University is very proud of its selective admissions policy. And rightly so, but let's not get snobbish.

With the quest for the quality student through selective admissions, an enrollment of better-educated high school graduates is expected. But better educated does not mean adequately educated in every subject.

So far, figures indicate the first freshman class admitted under the policy had a higher overall average on the American College Test. But this does not mean that all students are well informed in all areas.

The need for a remedial program of classes was first realized in 1975 with the Developmental Studies Program. Today the program no longer exists and the skeletal course list consists of only Math 108R and Chemistry 102R.

The stigma attached to the term "remedial" leads many to believe that class members are less than intelligent and have no place in a system of higher learning. But nothing could be further from the truth.

While the ACT scores are increasing, all high schools still do not offer the counseling necessary to prepare every college-bound student. And even the most intelligent English student may have deficiencies in math or chemistry.

Along with the ill-prepared are those University students who wish to gain a limited education in other areas at a lower level. These remedial courses are a good introduction for such students.

The courses also can be helpful to students who have not declared a major and are trying to find an area of interest at the introductory level.

The scarcity of remedial classes is a slack that must be taken up in other areas of the University, according to Barbara Mabry, director of special programs and adviser for the College of Arts & Sciences. Programs such as a writing lab, the counseling and testing center and the chemistry resource room are supposed to bridge the rest of the gap.

But until all high schools can educate students in all areas, the need for remedial classes and special assistance programs will remain. It is do

Selective admissions is a quality measurement but is not, and should not be seen as a cutoff for students who

don't excel in every area.

While we can boast about our successful selective admissions results, let's not turn our noses up at remedial classes. They, too, are a vital part of a good education.

The mistake affected about 10,000 companies in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia, and caused special problems for banks that collect and transmit payroll withholding tax payments for corporate clients.

Soviet missile found in Finland



American, Soviet students disagree

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Students at Harvard University are far less worried about the chance of a nuclear war than their counterparts in Moscow, according to a survey of 100 Soviet and 100 American students broadcast by Japanese television. And, while 63 of the Harvard students said they believed nuclear weapons were an effective deterrent against war, only three of the students at Moscow State University agreed.

Identical questions about foreign policy and military rength were posed separately last month to the two roups of students, who used an electronic voting sys-m to respond. Soviet authorities did not allow students ere to answer four questions.
