 The faculty met in president's office at 3 P.M. in
 pursuance of an order from the Executive Com. of
 the Board of Trustees as follows.

The following resolution was passed unanimously at the Executive
 Committee meeting held November 10, 1904.

By Judge Kinhead:-

The Executive Committee direct the faculty of the state Col-
 lege to make at once a vigorous investigation of the alleged outrages
 perpetrated on the part of the students on Halloween night and especial-
 ly to direct them to investigate that feature of the outrage which con-
 sists of the boys entering the rooms of the girls and perhaps the girls
 extending an invitation to enter their rooms and request them to act
 promptly and report to the Board at their meeting in December.

The faculty proceeded to investigate ~~the present~~
~~occurrences~~ of Halloween night.

The first witness heard was Mr. Sloan of the
 Lexington Police Force who was detailed for service
 at Patterson Hall on that night.

Mr. Sloan stated that about eight o'clock
 on that night a large body of men came into
 the grounds beating drums, tooting horns, etc.
 and dragging a heavy horse lawn mower which
 they brought on to the veranda.

He made two attempts to get the lawn mower
 down from the veranda, at first being prevented by
 the students, but afterwards, about a half hour later,
 he holding the shafts, several boys lifted the mower
 and started to assist in getting it down the steps,
 but had proceeded but two or three steps when
 they dropped the machine forcibly upon the
 steps, leaving him (Sloan) to get it to the bottom as

but he could under the momentum already imparted to it. Within this period a number of boys, twelve to fifteen probably, had climbed to the roof of the veranda by means of the columns and were talking with a number of young ladies who were also upon the second story of the veranda.

Later in the evening he ~~saw~~, while at a considerable distance from the building in the street under the electric light, ^{he saw} in a room upon the second story of Patterson Hall which was brightly lighted, apparently by a grate fire, some men moving about.

Major Burt stated in contradiction of Mr. Sloan's testimony, that it was impossible to distinguish between men and women from the point where Mr. Sloan stood when he claimed to have seen men in the room upon the second story. He further stated that he positively knew it to be a fact, because Mrs. Burt was present in the room referred to and at the time referred to, that no young men were at any time in the evening present in that room.

Mr. Whittoughill testified that he came into the main college building upon the night of Halloween, in search of Mr. Anderson whom he understood to be on guard in the building, but who had told him that he was to be at another place on that night. He participated in no damage to property, but took a minor part in some of the harmless pranks.

Prof. James White was asked to interview Mrs. Wallis, Matron of Patterson Hall and secure a statement from her as to the occurrences there upon Halloween night.

Upon motion the meeting adjourned to meet at 3 P.M. Nov. 15 - to continue this investigation.
