When David Botkins opened his mail in the SGA office yesterday, the surprise he got from receiving an attorney general's opinion—was surpassed only by what it staid. The opinion stated that the dormitory room a state university is not a public place. A film concerning AIDS prevention is now available to the UK community through Health Education
Programs.

"The AIDS Movie" deals primarily with the topic of 'low-risk exe"—mainly condom use—as well as the effects of acquired immune deficiency syndrome on its victims.

The film, which was purchased for the University by the dean of students office depicts a doctor speaking frankly to a group of college-eage students about how the disease spreads and how it can be prevented, as well as interviews with three people who have been infected with the AIDS virus.



Kenny Arington, chairman of RFL's Board of Directors and senior vice president of the Student Government Association, has been pretty pleased at the turnout thus far.



"We deplore the Marxist Sandinis-ta takeover of Nicaragua and the Marxist attempts to destabilize El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras. We do not support United States as-sistance to any Marxist government in this hemisphere, and we oppose the Carter administration aid pro-

gram for the government of Nicara-gua. However, we will support the efforts of the Nicaraguan people to establish a free and independent government."

Reagan continues to ignore the facts with regard to the two opposing factions in Nicaragua. The contras are, in fact, a small but savage group of solders led by former supporters of Somoza; their previous history — murdering civilians (including women and children) and destroying private property—labels them as terrorists in the fullest sense of the word. The Sandinistas, though far from perfect, retain the popular support of the Nicaraguan people and have instituted progressive programs in land reform, health care and education.

Without a doubt, the overthrow of

Without a doubt, the overthrow of Somoza by the Sandinistas in 1979 has resulted in a marked improvement in the quality of life for the people of Nicaragua. The United States propped up the sadistic Somoza regime for almost 50 years and was, in large part, responsible for the atrocities committed by that government on its people. One cannot but believe that, had the revolution never occurred, Ronald Reagan would have happily supported the Somoza regime indefinitely.
