are. He also explained some of the problems and costs involved in implementing recycling procedures on campus.

For the present, individual library departments wishing to recycle materials are required to transport the material themselves to either of the two roll-off bins located on campus. One of these bins is located near Blazer Hall and the other is located at the corner of University and Hilltop, near Parking Structure #2.

Guidelines for recyclable materials are as follows: Aluminum cans (please empty), newspaper (remove glossy slicks, remove from plastic & brown bags, do not tie or bind in bundles), computer and white office paper (remove staples, paperclips, labels and rubberbands), mixed paper (junk mail, paper bags, colored paper, legal pad paper, etc. -- remove paperclips, and rubberbands. No envelopes, no magazines, no carbon, no film, no wax-coated materials, no blue print, no file folders, no cardboard, no FAX, no glue. Paper with glue cannot be recycled.) Plastic such as 2-liter soft drink bottles, milk jugs and any plastic container with 1 or 2 is recyclable.



(Remove lids, rinse). No plastic bags.

Plans for the future call for the library to draft a memo in the form of a petition requesting that the library be established as a pilot pick-up site. Such a memo will be written and distributed for signatures in the near future.

Advanced Research Institute

The Library Research Center of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science, University of Illinois with support from the Council on Library Resources will offer an Advanced Research Institute from July 7-26, 1991. The institute is designed for the most promising and capable researchers in the field of library and information science whose research focus is questions related to the library in transition.

The institute is designed to build a community that is "safe" for participants to expose ideas to rigorous review by some of their most talented professional colleagues. In addition to seminars in which participants will present their current research, large blocks of time will be set aside for writing, computer analysis, independent consultation on methodology and library research. The institute will not teach research methods or proposal writing or other basic skills. The focus will be on the research problems of seminar participants.

The two resident faculty of the institute will be Paul Kantor, a quantitative methodologist who first helped plan the institute and J. Brett Sutton, an anthropologist with particular interest in qualitative and interpretive methods.

In addition to a fee of \$500, participants will be responsible for transportation to and from the institute, for weekend meals and personal expenses. Housing, meals (Sunday evening through Friday noon) and use of University of Illinois facilities will be provided each participant. These include computational, library and human resources. A small amount of scholarship assistance is available.

To apply, please send three copies of the following:

- A brief cover letter
- An outline of the proposed or ongoing research
- A brief statement of why you believe the research questions and/or methods proposed for analysis are significant to the problems of the library in transition
- A current vita
- Copies of one or two of your publications
- A letter of support from your dean or director
